FRIENDS SUPPORT WELLBEING SERVICES IN SELSEY

The Friends of Selsey Medical Practice have undertaken to pay the salary of the Community Support Manager for the coming year. This arrangement links the emotional and mental health services of the Care Shop (run by the Community Forum) and the Medical Practice, further developing the availability of community services in Selsey.

On Mondays two counsellors will be at the Practice offering up to six free sessions. On Thursdays the Community Support Manager or Parenting Coach will be present at the Medical Practice offering support to patients. Appointments for these services can be made through the Care Shop or Medical Practice Receptionists.

This is an example of the way the Friends assist the Practice to maintain the best service for their patients and our community. By collecting contributions in the form of Membership fees (upwards from £5 per annum) from our patient community, together with income from activities such as the summer Tombola, the Friends can purchase equipment and services not normally provided by the NHS.



'I like art because it is fun. You can do cross hatching and scribbling but circling is the best" Cruz


"I like art because we colour with pencil and pastels. My favourite is cross hatching. I'm proud of myself because my work is good." Maria

A message from Sussex Police....

It is illegal to use a privately owned e-scooter on pavements, cycle paths or roads at present. Under current UK law, e-scooters are classed as 'powered transporters', which means they are treated in the same way as motor vehicles, so pavements and cycle paths are strictly off limits. If you are considering buying an e-scooter as a Christmas present. West Sussex Police have asked us to remind you of the law and that e-scooters can be seized by Police.







JAMES SMEATON 1908 – 1972

As this is the festive time of year, it seems appropriate to write about someone who was closely linked to it! Some of you may remember James Smeaton and the off-licence in the High Street which is now Country Gardens – a greengrocers. Younger inhabitants may remember it as Clarksons.



James was born on 1 December in 1908 in Brockley, Lewisham, younger son of John and Emily Smeaton. John was a Stockbrokers Clerk employed by Limoden & Co. Stock Brokers of 29 Cornhill, London. In 1911 they, along with John, Emily (junior) and James lived at 29 Minard Road, Catford in South East London.

By 1921 The family had grown considerably although they were still living in Minard Road with Nellie, Ronald Walford and new arrival, Leslie

On 30 April 1938 James Smeaton married Winifred Grace Guest at St Peter's Church in Selsey and it was reported in the Portsmouth Evening News of 2 May 1938: Henceforth we will be referring to her as Wendy which is the name by which she preferred to be known.

The service was conducted by the Rector, the Rev. R. Franklin, and in addition to the chosen hymns, "The voice that breathed o'er Eden," and "O Perfect Love," the solo "Ave Maria" was sung by Miss Grace Bodey.

The bride, who was given away by her father, wore a charming dress of white satin cloque, with train, and carried a sheaf of Madonna lilies.

The bridal party included Miss Joyce Inglis and Miss Emily Smeaton (who wore dresses of green taffets cut ankle length in the Medici style), and two child bridesmaids, Miss Patricia Morphett and Miss Irma Moulds, who wore ankle length dresses of pink taffets. 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

For the uninitiated, of whom I am one, 'cloqué' is 'a double fabric with a jacquard effect, produced using yarns of different characters or twists, and often blended with silk/wool or silk/cotton.'

Rather more entertaining was the article in the Chichester Observer of the 7 May which described how the happy couple 'left for their honeymoon in a motor boat, to the great amusement of the party.' This, of course, allowed them to avoid the wedding guests tying tin cans to the car exhaust or filling the suitcases with confetti! Their daughter, Liz, told me that the confetti the guests did throw blew back all over them rather than the happy couple.

On Thursday 12th May 1938 a fire at the Off Licence could have been a lot worse. This report was in the 'West Sussex Gazette of 19th May:

'The Fire Brigade was called out about 9 pm on Thursday to the off-licence premises in Hillfield-road. Though it was only a chimney fire, it was 'terrifying' states an eye-witness, and even the firemen admit it was the worst of its kind that they had ever had to tackle. The thatch caught alight, and it was but a question of seconds whether the outbreak could be got under control or would demolish the whole structure. The customary promptitude of the brigade saved the situation.'



On 9 March 1940, James Smeaton applied for an off wine licence which was granted and in December 1940 the licence was transferred to Wendy This was normal in those days as the men went off to war. James joined Bomber Command and here is a photo of him in uniform.



He was stationed in Lincolnshire and, according to Liz, he was a wireless operator on Lancaster bombers when they were bombing Berlin. In 1944 he told Liz that he was returning to Lincolnshire the following day to take part in 'The Big One'. We know now that this action would eventually bring World War II to an end. I'm still researching James as the AG and the wing in his photo would indicate that he was an Air Gunner. Watch this space!

James Smeaton of 33 James Street, Selsey died on 21 November 1972 and was interred at Church Norton on 2 December 1972 in E14 in the old plot on the left, nearest to the lychgate.

Aware of the struggles of individuals and families right now with the worry of the cost of living, for one day of the year we will bring people together to enjoy a traditional meal, warmth, joy and love.

This year at Selsey Community Forum has been extremely busy. All our areas of the charity have developed massively as statutory services continue to struggle in responding to need. Whether growing the services or in developing new elements of them has only been possible due to the support of our amazing volunteers, staff and Trustees. It has also been due to the generosity of local businesses at a time that they too are responding to increased financial operating pressures. The activities SCF are not funded by local authorities, but via donations, legacies and writing many funding bids.

Three course cooked meals have been provided to 30+ Thursday's **Together Time** guests at the Methodist Church by our local pubs, restaurants and café's over the last few months and will continue to do so thanks to their ongoing generosity. Guests at these activities are busy knitting warm blankets to provide some protection for people from the cold.



Mobilising Mindfully has been a hit at the same event- Sarah Palmer offers chair exercises that enables flexibility, mindfulness and improvement in cognition to 20 people over two sessions. This is in addition to the various activities that are offered to guests on a Thursday.

The Friendship Group on a Wednesday goes from strength to strength. It has welcomed visitors attending to discuss either their work in the community or some interesting topic.

Sing Your Heart Out Friday Club has taken off and will continue in the New Year. This is an inclusive music workshop for people with cognitive impairment and their carers to join us in making some amazing sounds together, as well as providing friendship and support. This is led by Belinda Gannon who is a skilled practitioner offering a relaxed version of her Sing Your Heart Out group on a Monday (an Arts Dream activity).

The Games at the Rookery has grown rapidly since starting in the spring, and those living at The Rookery join others to enjoy a variety of traditional and new games led by Paul Everett.

The Hidden Garden has seen many visitors during the year and will continue to offer opportunities for people to find a quiet space to reflect, volunteer, or to join activities. Some of our young people who have accessed the **Selsey Employment Service** are now volunteering at the Hidden Garden. There will be lots of exciting plans in place for 2023 to continue to develop the Hidden Garden for the wider community. We are also grateful for the support of the neighbouring Men in Sheds, which provides mentoring, friendship and development of skills for many.

Our mental health and wellbeing services include individual counselling sessions, and group activities as well as bereavement support. The partnership in this connection with Selsey Medical Practice is proving

Likewise, the Selsey Money Support has become a strong element of the charity providing various activities including debt management, completing DWP forms, LPOA and housing guidance. Given the growth in this area, we have appointed Janet Sorrell who will manage and coordinate the services.

We have focused above on certain aspects of **SCF** support services, but it is important to acknowledge the other regular activities: Carers Teas, MS/Parkinsons/Thursday's Dementia Group/Say Aphasia/Resbite

Teas/Menopause Group/Morning Live/Shop Talk. For more information check the website or ask to subscribe to the Selsey Community News.

As I have said before, if you are struggling with cost of living, remember we have the **Pop-Up Pantry** at the Beacon Church (Tuesdays), Victory Club Food Supply (Mondays and Thursdays) and Warm Spaces dotted around Selsey. Foodbank vouchers are also available at the Selsey Care Shop.

Selsey Community Forum are proud to work in partnership with a range of commissioned services and other voluntary agencies: Carers Support West Sussex, Citizen's Advice, Frontline, Alzheimer's Society, Clarion, Selsey Medical Practice, Sussex Police, UK Harvest, Community Warden, WS Fire and Rescue, My Sisters House, Chichester District Council.

Watch this Space for 2023

We continue to develop our services as needs change. We will be offering a training programme for care providers, whether a care home. a private carer or care-at-home. Discussions are underway to develop a coffin club/death café also. Growing our My Future Care Handbook offer is important too, with the help of our Later Life Buddies. This is a great tool to use and plan future needs, wants and wishes as these are all noted in the book for the future.

Mobilising Mindfully will also be running on the alternate Tuesdays at The Rookery and is open to residents of The Rookery and the wider Selsey Community.

Drumming Workshops are due to start in February 2023. These are inclusive workshops to encourage wellbeing and cognitive exercise.

Update from the Chichester Neighbourhood Policing Team

Throughout December, we will be launching our Christmas crackdown on drink and drug driving.

Sussex Police will be working with the Sussex Safer Roads Partnership to provide motorists with thought provoking information and statistics on the risk and impact of driving when under the influence whilst also preventing and detecting incidents of drink and/or drug driving. 

This is an opportunity for us to visit you in your homes and ensure that you have working smoke detection, are fire safe at home and have support with your health and wellbeing if requested.

All the equipment provided is free such as smoke detectors, carbon monoxide alarms, blankets with retardant spray that can keep you safe if you are smoking in your homes and have dexterity issues that are causing you to drop your cigarettes/ ash onto your clothing or furniture/flooring. If you live alone and cannot hear your smoke detectors and do not have a care linked alarm we can also install deaf alarms for you.

We can discuss how to reduce the risk of fire in your home and support you with your health and wellbeing by referring or signposting you on to our partner agencies for further advice.

With the increase of heating/fuel prices we can advise with regard to heating your home safely and the dangers of using old heaters and candles etc.

Fox

Christmas is almost here folks and it'll soon be time for that fella in the red coat to come sneaking around. Yep, your neighbourhood Fox is on the prowl and shortly after Santa has finished pulling presents out of his sack, your local Fox will be busy trying to pull half a turkey out of your bin bag.

Foxes have lived among us for centuries and, just like Christmas, they're celebrated in folklore and myths all around the world. Whether the story belongs to the Greeks, Japanese, Celts, Native Americans, Disney or Roald Dahl it is always the same – the Fox is portrayed as cunning, slippery and devious. I prefer intelligent, adaptable and resourceful - and it's these traits that have helped the Fox to survive in the modern world. It was the modern world that transformed the Fox's wild woods into endless



agricultural fields, towns, cities, tower blocks and cul-de-sacs. Traditionally, in the face of development Britain's wildlife has silently been displaced and died. But where others fled destruction the Fox, like any shrewd opportunist, saw a brave new world of golden

opportunities where the dustbins overfloweth and where the streets are paved with cast away kebabs and finger-lickin' chicken.

And for me this is the chapter in the Fox's story that does indeed seem mythical: that in urban Britain there are wild dogs living among us. I can look out my bedroom window and see a relative of the Wolf, Dingo, Jackal and Coyote casually sauntering across my lawn. It's a touch of the Serengeti in suburban Sussex. Studies undertaken by the University of Brighton have estimated that there are 20 Foxes per square kilometre in the city. Of course, tradition dictates that some people do not like Foxes. As a child I always viewed the Boxing Day hunt as the antithesis to Christmas; a reminder that amidst this season of goodwill there are still people who are proud to dress up in costumes in a public celebration of their cruelty.

It's in the bleak midwinter that Foxes are at their most vocal. The blood-curdling, human-like scream of the vixen sounds like something from a Hammer Horror film. This foxy lady is only fertile for a few days

Her cubs will be born about fifty-two days after mating and emerge from their earths in April.

So this Christmas if you've had it with the plastic snowmen, the fake tree and the fake sentiments take a short walk away from it all and out into the darkness. Listen for the sound of wild dogs howling at the moon, the sound of survival. Let it stir something wild in your heart. Merry Christmas everybody and best wishes for 2023.

Wild Winter Wonderland!

Father Christmas isn't our only visitor from the far north this season – many water birds, ducks and geese have flown thousands of miles from the Arctic to be here. But why have they come all that way? Well, it might seem a bit chilly to you and me, but compared to the winter conditions in the Arctic, it seems positively Mediterranean to these visitors from the cold and, at this time of year, continuous darkness of the polar north. And our reserves are packed with lots of the special types of food these birds like to eat. So what might you find at our RSPB reserves over Christmas and the New Year?

Let's start with two of the wader species you're most likely to see. Black-tailed godwits are large wading birds, rather plain grey above and pale below at this time of year, with long legs and long, straight bills, which they use to fish in the pools of water and mud for invertebrates, including worms and snails. The black-tailed godwits you see here now will have come from the land of ice and fire – lceland!

At the other end of the wader scale are the dunlin. These common, small waders are about the size of starlings and are short and round, with brown-grey backs and pale bellies, and short, slightly down-curved bills. You'll see them flying or running around in large flocks, digging their little beaks in the mud, looking for molluscs, worms and small crustaceans. Our winter-visiting dunlins will have flown all the way here from Scandinavia and Russia.

Then we have the many wintering ducks and geese. RSPB Pagham Harbour and Medmerry reserves are nationally important sanctuaries for these birds at this time of year. They are also drawn to our food-rich wet fields, saltmarshes and muddy harbours and estuaries. The ducks include wigeon, teal and a nationally important number of the rather smart-looking northern pintail duck. The sound of hundreds of ducks whistling at dusk on the marshes is one of the most atmospheric sounds of the winter.

Finally, this month is a great time to look for the brent geese for which our reserves are famous at this time of year. Our smallest goose – about the size of a mallard duck – they nest on the boggy tundra in the Arctic during the very short summer in the far north, and begin to arrive on our coasts in large flocks from early October onwards. In East Anglia and here on the south coast, we see flocks of the dark-bellied brent geese, which nest in eastern Siberia and fly about 3,000 miles each year to spend the winter with us. When here, they divide their time between feeding on eelgrass in estuaries and the Solent at low tide and feeding and roosting in nearby fields at high tide. Look up to see flocks of these small, dark geese fly out to sea and back again, calling softly to each other.



Now is a great time to wrap up warm and go for a walk at one of our coastal reserves to look for wintering flocks of brent geese, which have come here to enjoy our comparatively warmer weather, before they return to breed in the Arctic in spring. [Credit: Andy Hay (rspb-images.com)

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DONNA'S DELIBERATIONS

Happy December everyone.....and, I have to say it......'It's Christmassss.....' Obviously the immortal words of the great Noddy Holder have to be repeated at this time of the year! It just wouldn't be Christmas without it, would it? Yes, I admit it - I am of the Slade generation and that song is firmly embedded in my memory, evoking slightly embarrassing



memories of my teenage years. Music can really resonate, can't it? Immediately, we are propelled back to significant times in our lives, accessing those memories we have long since 'filed' in the 'back folder!' More than any other way, music can bring back images and feelings we thought we had long since forgotten. Infact, some people think music might predate language, and when you think about it, tone can be just as important when we speak with someone as the actual words we use.

It's important because it's the one thing that really does cross nationality, culture and race. It seeks out our emotions and feelings, in a way that language cannot always do - it 'transcends' language, in my view. Composers who really know their 'art' can manipulate emotions and control when their audience experiences specific feelings. Psychologists call this a 'synesthetic' experience: a sort of 'blending' of the senses; it can certainly trigger some pretty intense memories. 





Lists. I've recently been up to my eyeballs in them. Of late, life seems to have become one enormous timetable, stripped bare of spontaneity. It causes me a fair amount of frustration

if I'm pinned down by too much detailed planning. For the past few weeks, I've been trying to finalise a holiday in New York. I'd like to get

The D class inshore lifeboat (ILB) launched at 5.44pm on Sunday 7 August at the request of the UK Coastquard, they had received a 999-emergency call saying a casualty had been pulled from the water after sustaining a back injury whilst swimming at West Beach, Selsey.

The casualty was in severe pain and had loss of feeling in one leg and pins and needles in the other. When the ILB arrived on scene at 5.58pm the casualty was close to the water's edge with an incoming tide. Selsey and Hayling Coastguard Rescue Teams, The Coastguard Rescue Helicopter (Rescue 175) and South East Coast Ambulance service also attended the incident.

The paramedics from the SECAmbulance and Rescue 175 assessed the casualty and gave





pain relief before transferring to the LVII Coastquard stretcher. All the crews Selsey RNLI assists with casualty evacuation Lifeboats worked together to slowly move the casualty up the beach to the ambulance for transfer to Hospital.

> The ILB returned to station at 7.35pm and was recovered straight away. The crew tonight were Helmsman Sam Corcoran-Smith. Will Moir, and Harry Emmence.

Monday evening, we received news from the man's wife that after spending time in hospital recovering, he is now at home, so good news and we wish him well in his recovery.

I needed a new gas cannister for camping, and asked a local if there was a B and Q in Chichester. "No", he said, "But there are two Es in Leeds



This will be recognised by those that stayed

and worked there, the carriage was in a poor state and considered beyond repair even before it went to Bunns in late 80s/90s, I have several old vehicles that I am restoring but decided to put them on the back burner to concentrate on the

I asked if I could bring it back to my property and restore it, the Bunn family kindly agreed and I set about trying to get it moved it was sitting on a lorry trailer that had not been moved or MOT'd for 30 years when the carriage was moved there in the late1980s.

I found someone who would risk bringing it the 3.2 miles to my home at Sidlesham, and since then myself, and helpers when available, have spent about four years restoring it and have another year to go. I have a few other inside restoration projects to work on whilst waiting for the good weather to return.

The Vintage Carriage Trust responded to an email with "The carriage body is known to the Society as LNWR 155, built in 1888, it is an early sleeper carriage, later converted to a 'Picnic Saloon', and would have been used for hire by groups or families where it would be attached to service trains for days out to North Wales Coast or Blackpool etc. Quite a large number of these were built but very few survive. They began to be phased out as the motor car and motor bus became more available in the 1920's and 1930's."

They list the carriage as historically very important and unique. In 1917 the carriage and thirteen others were converted by LNWR for use in France in WW1 as General Haig's Headquarters train.

In 1927 Captain Charles Vale bought several carriages, some at "£25 each delivered to your nearest railway station", to Elmer to be converted into homes, at this time there were only 2 houses in Elmer, Farmer Brown and his

pigman.

From there it seems to have gone to the Lavender Line who mailed me "We sold it as restoration was beyond our means (I recall serious suggestions that it should be burnt to get rid of it!) and I am quite surprised it survives."

I am putting up a website soon about the carriage and if anyone has any info about its life at Selsey or elsewhere or about Captain Charles Vale whose wife came from Chichester or about General Haig's use of his train whilst in France, please get in touch by

Update from the Chichester Neighbourhood Policing Team



One Police resource that we are often asked about is the Police helicopter.

Our helicopter is provided by NPAS - National Police Air Service. NPAS have 15 bases across England and Wales supplying 19 helicopters and 4 planes.

Arun and Chichester is mostly served from the Redhill base which has officers from Surrey, Sussex and Kent Police working on the helicopter as Tactical Flight Officers (TFOs) alongside pilots who are directly employed by NPAS.

The helicopter is an EC135T2+ which has a standard set up of 4 seats. One TFO sits in the front with the pilot and their main role is to operate the cameras. All the aircraft are fitted with daylight cameras capable of reading number plates or seeing a suspect's clothing. They are also equipped with a thermal camera which can search large areas for suspects, or a missing or vulnerable

The second TFO sits behind the pilot and operates the mapping computer software, the radios to communicate with control room, officers on the ground or other police aircraft, the public address system and the "Nightsun" a large search light that can illuminate an area the size of a football pitch or be focussed into a thin pencil beam to identify a particular point or individual to officers on the ground.

Using the helicopter to search for missing or vulnerable people means that large open areas can be covered in a short space of time, saving ground officers having to spend hundreds of hours searching those same areas on foot. In the event of the helicopter crew locating a person who appears to be in need of medical attention, they are able to land (if it's safe to do so) and deploy from the aircraft with a defib machine and first aid kit if they assess that the location is very remote or if the nearest ambulance is a long way off.

Last year NPAS flew 220 hours and attended 225 incidents for Sussex. During that time they found 16 vulnerable people, 23 missing people, 62 suspects and 17 stolen vehicles.

Selsey RNLI all-weather lifeboat joins search Lifeboats

The UK Coastguard had received a Mayday form a yacht with two persons aboard saying they required immediate assistance.

The Selsey Shannon class all-weather lifeboat (ALB) launched at 11.50pm on Monday 5 September and proceeded to a position given by Coastguard 22nm southwest of Selsey Bill. At 12.58am the ALB arrived on scene and the Coastquards asked the lifeboat to commence a parallel track search with leg lengths of ten miles and track spacings of two miles. Bembridge ALB was also launched and was conducting a similar search pattern further to the west. Two Coastguard helicopters Rescue 175, and Rescue 163 were also tasked with an area to search.

The weather on scene was wind northeast 2-3 sea state slight although less than two hours after a violent thunderstorm crossed the area. At 3.28am at the end of the third leg the Coastguards requested the Selsev ALB stopped the parallel track search and return to station conducting a line ahead search back to Selsey. The ALB arrived back at Station at 5.10am and was recovered straight away. The crew today were Coxswain Rob Archibald, Mechanic Phil Pitham, Sam Corcoran-Smith, Pip Skeet, Neil Hopcraft, and Jake Harnett

Jobs for December

Hard prune late-flowering Clematis. Cut back to near ground level, above a strong pair of buds on each stem and dispose of all the old growth above. Don't prune Spring-flowering Clematis however, or you'll lose next year's flowers.

Prune Apple and Pear trees (but not Plums and Cherries which are susceptible to disease when pruned in Winter). Pruning at this time of year encourages strong new growth. Cut this year's whippy stem back to leave about five buds on each and take out all crossing or damaged branches. Apply some slow-release general fertiliser to the ground around the root area.

Prune Grape vines now while they are dormant. If left until late Winter the sap will be rising and will bleed copiously from every cut. Prune back this year's lateral stems to leave one strong bud on each. Renew ties on the framework.

Tip Top Tips

- Reputable garden centres can be worth a visit for seasonal gifts and pot plants.
- Cut some Holly for Christmas in the middle of the month and keep it in a bucket of water in greenhouse or garage to avoid birds stripping the berries.
- Plants can make excellent Christmas gifts. Keep Cyclamen and Azaleas cool and Poinsettias warm.
- Have a rest, take a glass of Christmas sherry and browse through the latest seed catalogues to plan the flowers and vegetables that will fill your garden in 2019.
- Remember to keep bird feeders well filled-up so our feathered friends can also have a good Christmas.
- Dress-up drain pips for Christmas with clip-on post holders and pots of colourful Winter flowers

Great Spotted Woodpecker by Michael Blencowe of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

My New Year's resolution is to try and be more positive about the future - but I already feel like banging my head repeatedly against a tree. Standing out in the street this morning, I heard a noise that reassured me that I'm not alone.



The drumming of the Great Spotted Woodpecker is a familiar sound throughout February, surely earning this striking black and white bird the reputation as one of Britain's most famous drummers along with Ringo Starr and Phil Collins. The bird's drumming serves an important function because the Great Spotted Woodpecker realises it can't sing and doesn't attempt to. Sadly, the same can't be said for Ringo Starr and Phil Collins. Instead, its drumroll is a percussive proclamation that hammers home the message to other male woodpeckers to stay away from its territory in the treetops. It also serves to drum up support from female woodpeckers in the vicinity who may be looking for a pied partner.

This 'song' may not be as sweet as the melodies sung by the Robin or Blackbird but it still gets its message across. Indeed, the drumming can carry the bird's message across half a mile of countryside,

with a male broadcasting up to 600 drumrolls a day. Each drumroll consists of up to 10-16 beats, typically in a one second burst. Of course, if I did attempt to take my frustrations out on a tree in a similar way, I'd suffer some form of concussion - but woodpeckers are specially designed to avoid this by having shock absorbent tissue between the base of their bill and their strengthened skulls to cushion

Their incredible beak is more than just a drumstick, it's also a pickaxe which allows them to chip away at trunks to excavate their own nest hole; and a chisel with which the woodpecker prises open tree bark to find food. That mighty beak is a formidable weapon too, which sends other birds on the peanut feeder scarpering pretty sharpish. And Great Spotted Woodpeckers are becoming more greatly spotted, as it is a British bird which is actually increasing in numbers. The pecker's population leapt in the seventies and nineties, with some estimates stating they have increased by 300% over the past five decades. The availability of dead wood thanks to Dutch Elm Disease and the availability of peanuts thanks to British bird lovers being among of the reasons for this increase. See, I ended the article on a positive note, maybe I won't break my New Year's resolution after all. Well done to me, I'm feeling upbeat about the future. Now to put the kettle on, put my feet up, and turn on the news...

A SUSSEX CATHEDRAL AND A CHRISTMAS STORY

Church Norton is a sleepy hamlet on the west side of Pagham Harbour easily by-passed by the B2145 road across the Manhood Peninsula to Selsey. Today it's most revered building is the de-consecrated chapel of St. Wilfrid's now in the care of the Churches Conservation Trust and maintained by local volunteers. Centuries ago, it was the cradle of Christanity in West Sussex and hundreds of years after that the inspiration for a famous British writer.



After the Romans left Britain in the forth century, the then West Sussex area became isolated and cut off by densely wooded hills and forests. Around Britian, the sea became the main highway and in the fifth century, Saxon tribes invaded to found the pagan kingdom of the South Saxons, although the Saxon King Ethelwald converted to Christanity in 648 AD influenced by his Christian wife, a Mercian princess.

The focal point of the development of Church Norton was the arrival of St. Wilfrid, Bishop of Ripon in the Kingdom of Northrumbria. Wilfrid had a reputation for "being difficult" and, after a spectacular quarrel with the King, fled Northumbria eventually landing at Selsey in 680 AD with a party of monks, clerics and lay personnel. Here, according to the Venerable Bede, they "administered to them the word of the Faith and Salvation" - helped by a few miracles, charitable deeds and advice on improving the fishing! As a result, King Ethelwald gave Wilfrid land on which to build a cathedral in 681AD; tradition claims it was at Church Norton and became Selsey Cathedral. After five years, Wilfrid was able to return to Northumbria but he was then succeeded at Selsey by a long line of Saxon bishops until the Norman Conquest.

A Saxon cathedral would have been a comparatively modest building from which clergy and monks travelled out into the countryside to minister to the population. The Normans had a different concept of cathedrals regarding them as seats of religious power alongside, but usually subordinate to, the secular power of the monarchy. Thus the Norman invasion of

1066 prompted the rapid decline of the Selsey Diocese. In 1070, King William gave his chaplain, Stigand, the bishopric of the South Saxons and the See was transferred to Chichester. However, it is unlikely that the buildings at Church Norton were immediately abandoned and were used in some capacity until Chichester Cathedral was consecrated and fully functioning.

> With the eventual demise of the Cathedral at Church Norton. much of the remaning stonework and artifacts were used locally in the construction of buildings, walls and as garden furniture. Yet, in later centuries, prominent local Christians requested to be buried at Church Norton describing the site as the "former cathedral". St. Wilfrid's Church, as it became, was re-dedicated as the parish church for Selsey but it gradually became too distant to serve as such. In 1864, it was decided to move it stone by stone to build the present parish church of St Peter's in Selsey just leaving the chancel (St. Wilfrid's Chapel) at Church Norton intact.

> However, for the writer, Rudyard Kipling, the site at Church Norton inspired literary connections. In 1910, in his book for children "Rewards and Fairies", Kipling made the chapel the subject of a poem "Eddi's Service". It describes how, on a very stormy Christmas Eve, Eddi, the priest, was deternmined to celebrate Midnight Mass. Despite no parishioners arriving, an old donkey and a weary oxen turned up for the service. The story is apocryphal but may be based on a local traditional especially as St. Wilfrid's chaplain during his time at Selsey was Eddeus Stephanus or Stephen of Ripon and this could have inspired the

Both St. Wilfred and Kipling's poem are associated with myths and legends relating to the first cathedral in West Sussex but possibly also contining elements of truth. St Wilfrid's Chapel, Church Norton is now a peaceful and charming, small, ancient ecclesiastical building well worth a visit, whilst also being adjacent to the RSPB Pagham Harbour site.

The Selsey RNLI lifeboats were tasked to four Lifeboats separate incidents on Saturday 13th

1st ILB launched at 10.44am to a report of a paddleboard with two people in the water holding on to it off Aldwick. The Inshore lifeboat (ILB) was stood down on route as the two persons in the water were free divers using the board as a SMB (Surface marker buoy) The crew were Helmsman Sam Corcoran-Smith, Craig Sergeant, and Jake Harnett

2nd ILB launched at 12.30pm to conduct a search for an elderly woman missing from a nursing home in Bognor Regis. An extensive search was completed by the ILB with nothing found before the UK Coastguard released the ILB to return to Station. The crew were Helmsman James Albrey, Will Moir, and Craig Sergeant. The ILB was close to Bognor Pier when they were stood down and the crew had exhausted their water supply in the extremely hot conditions, so Craig was put ashore to get some drinks on BNPL, but the Bognor Rock Shop donated 3 cans of drink and 3 Vanilla cones to the crew so thank you very much to them.


 3^{rd} ILB launched 4.28pm to a report of a paddleboarder possibly in trouble after being observed from the shore not moving for 20 mins the ILB was stood down on route after the paddleboarder started to make for the shore. The crew were Helmsman Harry Emmence, James Albrey, and Neil Hopcraft.

4th ILB launched at 8.47pm to a report of a paddleboarder falling off the board and not seen to get back on in a position approximately one mile offshore from the beach by the Windmill Selsey. Once on scene the ILB found a paddleboarder who said he had not been in the water but had seen another boarder further out. With this information and darkness looming the ILB requested the ALB be launched to assist with the search. Once the ALB was on

scene parachute flares were fired by the lifeboats to illuminate the area, but nothing was seen. The ILB spoke to several people on the beach to the west of Selsey and all had seen different paddleboarders and confirmed they had all made it back to shore safely. With this information the UK Coastguards stood the lifeboats down to return to station. The crews tonight were ILB Helmsman Sam Corcoran-Smith, Dan Langford, and Tim Scott. ALB Coxswain Rob Archibald, Colin Pullenger, Mechanic Andy Lee, Will Moir, Craig Sergeant, and Neil Hopcraft.

1 November 2022

Selsey RNLI launch to person in the water at Bognor Regis



The ALB launched at 5.10pm and made best speed to the area around the Pier. The ALB arrived on scene at 5.22pm and the Coastguards had just received a call from the Ambulance service that the person was out of the water. The weather on scene was wind south westerly force 7-8 sea state rough in heavy rain. The Littlehampton and Selsey Coastguards Rescue Teams (CRT) were also tasked to the incident and the lifeboat was requested to stand by until they teams arrived to confirm the person was safe.

At 5.41pm the UK Coastguard released the Selsey ALB from the incident. The ALB arrived back at Selsey at 6.08pm and recovered straight away. The crews today were



My staff at The Centre are all very excited because finally the barn upgrades have been completed! Thank

you to everyone who has supported this project over the years, I am so happy to hear that the cats staying with us have such a nice area that will ensure they are kept happy and healthy.

The barn work was completed just in time as only last week we had a large group of cats arrive from a home where the owner had got overwhelmed. INSIDE THE WILDLIFE HOSPITAL IN DECEMBER

Very worryingly, the UK is currently in the midst of an unprecedented Avian Influenza (AI) outbreak, or 'bird flu'. Due to this, it is after much deliberation and with very heavy hearts, that the team at Brent Lodge have made the difficult decision to temporarily suspend the admission of any new birds to the hospital until further notice. We kindly ask that if anybody comes across a wild bird in need, that they do not bring the bird on-site, but instead call us on 01243 641672 (ext. 1) for

This decision has been very upsetting for our team to make, but the risk to our current patients and possibly having to shut down is currently too great. We ask that people are kind and respectful towards our staff during this difficult time as we try to manage the situation as best as we can. In hopeful news, construction of our Admissions and Isolation blocks are well underway and due to be completed in the new year. Once complete, we hope to be able to admit certain low-risk avian species again.

PATIENT STORIES

We have seen a rise in hedgehogs being admitted with heavy

worm burdens that then require faecal samples for diagnosis and specialist treatments. Hedgehogs are at risk of becoming underweight over winter (our smallest is only 102g!), but we do ask that members of the public do not unnecessarily pick up hedgehogs for weighing without real cause for

concern. If a hedgehog is spotted during the daytime, this is always a warning sign and we recommend

phoning immediately for advice. However, if it is the evening, it is less likely to be quite so urgent and again phoning is recommended before acting.

HELPING BRENT LODGE WILDLIFE HOSPITAL & LOCAL WILDLIFE

Winter remains one of our busiest seasons assisting the hundreds of animals in our care. If you would like to help, we are desperately need items such as wet cat/dog food (non-fish) and newspapers for bedding (we cannot use glossy magazines, office paper or newspapers with staples) and would be incredibly grateful for any possible donations. We are also selling Christmas cards on-site to raise funds for the animals.

To help your local wildlife, we encourage putting out bird food (e.g. fat balls / suet pellets) as often as possible. Also leaving low dishes of clean water to prevent dehydration and low dishes of wet cat/dog food (non-fish) overnight to feed small mammals such as hedgehogs. These measures will significantly help local wildlife build up their fat reserves and resilience for the brutal winter months ahead and ultimately improve their chances of survival!



Our theme for this year at Beacon Church has been 'Let your light shine' and at Christmas particularly, don't we all just feel so much better seeing the Christmas Lights shining like a message of 'hope' out of the darkness of the night.

Darkness for many people represents a fearful thing. Our imaginations run free when we cannot see our surroundings. To be plunged into total darkness is a terrifying experience. It has often been used in interrogation and solitary confinement to disorientate and break people down. Last month after yet another wave of Russian attacks on Ukraine's Electricity supply, President Volodymyr Zelensky was defiant on social media, writing: "Light always prevails over darkness." He said the enemy occupiers would never understand this, "existing for a long time in an impenetrable darkness themselves".

With shorter days, longer nights, and bad weather leading to the winter blues for many, and for some the more severe Seasonal Affective Disorder, it is recognised that light can help. In fact, there are specially designed lights that can help improve how we feel.

It is fact though, that we all need light, not just to make plants grow and to see where we are, but on a deeper level we seem to need it to feel safe and secure. It seems that more and more people are decorating their houses with creative festive light displays! There is something in us that wants to make this world lighter. The warmth, the brightness, the glow in the blackness, the direction it brings......we all are drawn

The theme of light and dark runs right through the Bible as well. In writing about the birth and life of Jesus Christ an Old Testament prophet wrote: 'The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of darkness a light has dawned." Elsewhere an Old Testament writer says: 'Your Word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path.' Jesus Christ himself says: 'I am the light of the world.' Another Bible writer says: 'God is light, in Him there is no darkness'

It's truly a dark world still today. Not just because it's winter and the nights have been drawing in, but much more than that. Watch the news at night and you will see the spiritual darkness that surrounds us as we stumble around in this world. It hasn't changed at all since that writer said 'the people walking in great darkness...' There is still

great darkness today, but it need not be that way with us stumbling around. The blacker the darkness, the more powerful the effect of the light. Jesus said 'I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life' (John 8:12). As the nights do draw in and inevitably the Christmas lights come out, ask yourself if you really know where you are going. Can you really see clearly? Can you see the path to follow in your life? Or is it all darkness and stumbling in the night? Are you sure that you are even on the right path at all? The invitation of Jesus still stands... 'Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness'. His promise is still true, and at

Christmas, we celebrate Jesus's arrival here on earth, coming as a

human, bringing God's open-armed message of hope. There is no need to be without Jesus as your friend, and Christmas offers no better time to find out more about Him. To this end. on Monday 19th December at 7pm, we are screening the new docudrama film released only this month, 'Why the Nativity?' In our culture today, it is common for people to forget the true meaning of Christmas—and its significance. The occasion has become less spiritual and more materialistic over the years, and many might not even fully know the original story of Christmas. But this celebration is much



bigger than a secularized holiday. Christmas is about God's plan of salvation, which He set in motion before time began.

In 'Why the Nativity?', the film looks in detail at the people and events that surround the Christmas story and why each of them was chosen for their specific purpose. Why not come along and watch the Docudrama film. It is free as too are the refreshments!


