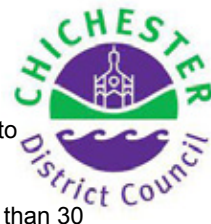

### Selsey launches new online shopping service with support from Chichester District Council



Residents and visitors to Selsey will be able to browse, book and buy products online, from local businesses and shops, thanks to a new online platform provided by ShopAppy. More than 30 Selsey businesses have already signed up for the service and more are expected to join over the coming months.

Chichester District Council has partnered with ShopAppy to support local businesses and encourage people to shop locally and is paying for local businesses to join the platform until March 2023, using a government grant. ShopAppy has already launched in Chichester and East Wittering and in future will also be launching in Midhurst and Petworth. Businesses across the district are being actively encouraged to join the free scheme.

The ShopAppy platform gives local shops and businesses the chance to be part of a local business community, establish an online presence if they don't already have one and offer a range of services including 'click and collect' and home deliveries.

Dawn Alvarez, owner of Village Flowers which has been trading in Selsey for the past 40 years says: "Over the years we've diversified from just flowers, to balloons, cards and gifts, to offer a wider range of products to attract more customers. Business is quiet now, as people have less money to spend, and we are mainly reliant on locals and holidaymakers visiting the shop. We hope being part of ShopAppy will help us with the technology aspects of running a business and increase the numbers of online orders which currently make up less than 10% of our sales".

Councillor Tony Dignum, Cabinet Member for Growth, Place and Regeneration at Chichester District Council, said, "We all know how important local businesses and shops are to our communities. As we emerge from the pandemic and businesses start to pick up, we hope that this platform will provide Selsey shops and businesses with another outlet to promote their goods and services.

"One of the key benefits of the ShopAppy scheme is that it allows businesses to set up a click and collect service where people can buy online and then collect their goods later on. This helps bring footfall to areas and encourages people to use local shops."

"Selsey is one of the few remaining towns in the south coast where you can see fishermen bringing in their daily catch. If you're visiting the beach to swim in the highly rated bathing waters, visiting the lifeboat station or enjoying one of Selsey's wonderful walks this autumn, it's well worth visiting some of the individual shops, cafes, restaurants, and pubs in the village. We hope this initiative will encourage both visitors to Selsey and residents to spend local and support the local economy."

In response to the rising cost of living, the Government has also set up several non-repayable payments to help those who are affected the most. These include a Winter Fuel Payment; Pensioner Cost of Living Payment; Disability Cost of Living Payment and an Energy Discount. Other available benefits include Low Income Benefits, Tax Credits; Universal Credit, Jobseeker's Allowance, Employment and Support Allowance, Income Support, Pension Credit, Child Tax Credit and Working Tax Credit.

Service user Kathleen, who is partially sighted and lives with anxiety and has dyslexia, commented, "4Sight Vision Support's adviser Tara took the time to read and explain the form, wrote out the answers and read these back to check I was happy. It's enabled me to overcome the previous barriers I had trying to complete this form and means I now have access to financial support."

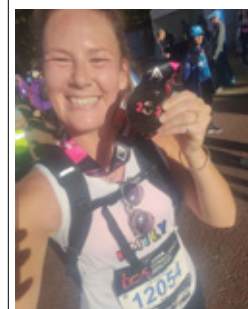
### Miss Taylor's marathon and inspiring the next generation of runners.

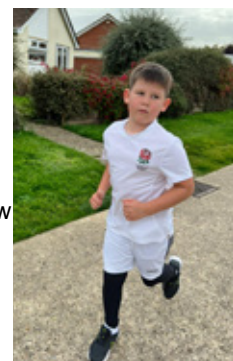

LESLIE AUBREY GOLDING (born Goldstein)  
27 August 1892 – 30 June 1970

This item is something of a disappointment to me as I had hoped to show you a beautiful For Sale advertisement for Birdham House, Selsey, Sussex in 1954. It contains fantastic pictures of the interior and the information that there was an entrance hall, main hall, dining room, spacious lounge, sun parlour, 5 bedrooms (3 facing sea), dressing room, 3 bathrooms, staff sitting room, downstairs cloakroom, 2 verandahs facing sea (leading off best bedrooms). Sadly this was not to be as it appeared in Country Life of 22 July 1954 and I could not afford the fee they wanted me to pay. Birdham House, at this time, was the property of the Goldings with whom many of you will be acquainted. Should any of you have a burning desire to see the advert in person, then please let me know. I'll be happy to oblige.



Leslie Aubrey Goldstein was born on 27 August 1892 in Hendon, Middlesex. His parents were Walter and Rosina (aka Rose) and in 1901, when Leslie was 9 years old, they lived at 37 Brondesbury Road, Willesden, London. It was a considerable family consisting of Ethel, Ruby, Hettie (aka Henrietta), Marguerite (aka Madge), Fannie and, finally, Leslie. There were also two servants – a cook and a general domestic. Walter was a Jeweller, Ethel was a dressmaker while both Ruby and Hettie were teachers and governesses.

On 9 September 1901, Leslie started school at St Augustine's Church of England School as a private pupil whose parents still lived in Brondesbury Road.

By 1911 they had moved to 8 Exeter Road, Brondesbury and Walter was a Jeweller with a shop where Madge and Leslie (now aged 18) worked. The electoral register for 1913 is more detailed than the others and Leslie was a lodger and had a furnished room, (first floor back) for which he was paying 7/6d per week. Mr W Goldstein (presumably his father) was at the same address. Hattie was a Governess while Madge and Leslie were jeweller's shop assistants.

Leslie joined up as a Corporal in the Royal Field Artillery, service no. 40192 and on 26 July 1915 he was sent to join the fighting in France. On 20 April 1916 he was promoted from NCO to 2<sup>nd</sup> Lieutenant in the 12<sup>th</sup> Divisional Trench

Mortar Battery. His War Medal Rolls Index card shows that his addresses were 130 Fordwych Road, Brondesbury and c/o The Regent Jewellery Co, 99 Regent Street, W1. A prestigious address if ever I saw one!

On 30 March 1917 he was admitted to Queen Alexandra's Military Hospital at Millbank suffering from gun shot wounds to right leg and hand.

He was then shipped back to France because on 30 November 1917 he was posted as missing. In fact he had been captured by the German Army. There is some difficulty with the records here. The record shows it was Boncrois and it is quite legible on the original document. It has been transcribed as Bonerois. Neither of these places appears to exist. I'm therefore going to hazard a guess that it should be Beauvois-en-Cambresis. This is based on the fact that the record shows his 'Previous Camp' as Le Cateau which is in the same region of France. The first battle of Le Cateau took place on 26 August 1914 which is too early for Lieut. Goldstein but a second battle occurred between 5 and 11 October 1918 which, of course, is too late. However, The British Expeditionary Force maintained a presence in the region between these dates.



Another theory is that these 'unknown' names could have been given by either the Germans or the British as the positions of the gun batteries, farms or other locations indicating the place where the troops were at the time of capture, which would help the Germans to pinpoint the enemy.

This picture is of English and French POWs boarding the train at Cambrai for onward shipment to Heidelberg in the region of Karlsruhe where there was a prison camp for officers. Records show that Leslie was at Karlsruhe on 17 December 1917.

One month later, on 19 January 1918, he was moved from Karlsruhe to Heidelberg – a distance of approximately 56 kms further North up the River Rhine. He appears to have stayed there for about 8 months and was then taken to Stralsund, Danholm. Danholm is a small island in the Baltic Sea just off the coast of Northern Germany, near the island of Rugen. He remained there until his release on 18 December 1918.

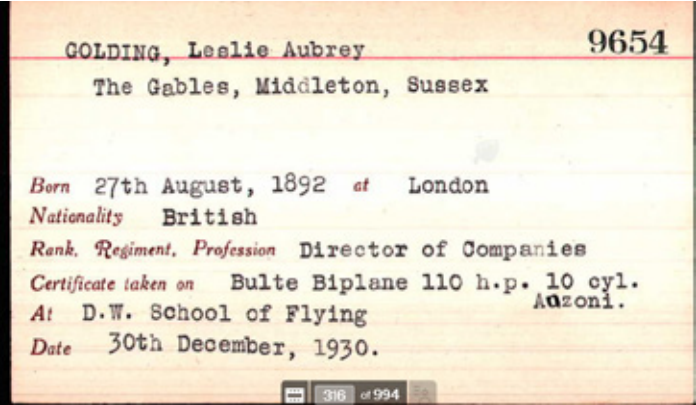
This imprisonment meant that Leslie's WW1 Medal Rolls Index Card describes him as an 'exonerated officer'. This was important as the explanation of what this means is 'An exonerated officer is one that was a prisoner of war and, on being released, was found not to have contributed to his capture'. This was a condition of being entitled to campaign war medals.

The London Gazette of 25 February 1919, Issue 31201, Page 2787 carried a rather emotional item in which both Leslie and his father changed their names; his father, Wolf Goldstein became Walter Golding while Leslie retained his first names but also adopted Golding as a surname. They were in good company as, in 1917, King George V, a cousin of Kaiser Wilhelm II, was compelled to change the British royal family name to Windsor from the historic but German name of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha.

At the beginning of 1921 Leslie married Beatrice Alice Birtwistle and in the census of that year (taken in June) the couple were to be found at a Brighton boarding house run by one Thomas Trattles.

Leslie applied for his war medals on 4 May 1921 and was awarded the Victory Medal, the British War Medal and the 1914/15 Star.

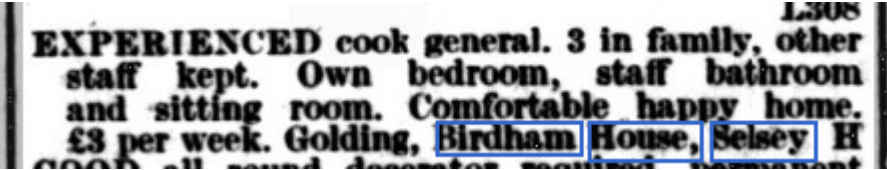
In 1922 Leslie and Beatrice lived at 130 Fordwych Road, Hampstead with their son Anthony G Golding who, sadly, did not live to see his 1<sup>st</sup> birthday. They then moved to Brydwestle, North Circular Road, Hendon where their second son John Winston Golding was born in 1925. Leslie and Beatrice separated in 1926 and divorced several years later.



On 30<sup>th</sup> December 1930 Leslie gained a Royal Aero Club Aviators' Certificate having flown a Bulte Biplane (of Belgian Manufacture) with 110 Hp and 10 cylinder Anzani Engine. This certificate records his address as 'the Gables, Middleton, Sussex.

By 1932, Leslie had moved again to 54-56 Jermyn St. in the City of Westminster. In 1936 he was living at 2 de Walden Court, New Cavendish Street, Marylebone and was still there in 1940. He continued moving house during the next few years.

In 1944 he married Betty Golding, in Hove, and their son, Stephen Robert Golding, was born there the following year. By July 1947 the Goldings were advertising in the Observer for staff – a resident or daily cook and a part-time gardener - as they had moved to Birdham House in Clayton Road, Selsey. In December 1947 they advertised:



The same advert appeared in January 1948.





Here is a picture of Betty with her great-grand-daughter Charlie taken in 1990.

Originally, Leslie had planned to have a house built on a plot of land he had bought at Birdham; however, he spotted Birdham House which was designated as Bomb Damaged and was, therefore, being sold for a good price and he changed his mind.

We learn from the Bognor Regis Observer of 28 August 1948 that Major L A Golding of Birdham House, Selsey took part in the first ever Small Crafts Rally at Itchenor which was given extensive coverage in the press.

The first paragraph is predictable (given that in this neck of the woods almost any regatta, rally or carnival is beset by storms almost every year). *'There is an old saying that a bad dress rehearsal means a good opening night. This is not a very good analogy with a small crafts rally at Itchenor where, after what might be termed a disastrous night, the rally was an undoubted success. Ideally suited for the purpose, Itchenor harbour was crowded with yachts and motor launches on Sunday afternoon, and many were dressed overall for the occasion.'*

The rally was organised by the Director of Small Crafts Disposals (Admiralty) and its object was *'to determine the most praiseworthy conversion to civilian use of a craft purchased from D.S.C.D.'*

During a sitting of the House of Commons questions were asked about the success of the DSCD scheme. A 75ft type cost £5000 while a 40ft type, with engines, cost £2,450. The craft were obviously 'left-overs' from WWII as they are described as having been idle for 2 years. It appears to have been a remarkably effective scheme as the total of small craft sold up to 26 June 1947 was 7,486 and they realised the sum of £3,298,402.

Leslie's contribution to the rally was a former 60 foot air sea rescue launch which he named 'Silver Ghost'. Light entertainment was provided not only by the rally but also by the *'DSCD office – a floating motor launch – sprang a leak Saturday night. This was the first time that the boat had let water in, and within a very short time the whole floor was under water and the boat was sinking fast. Due to wet sparking plugs, one pump could not be started, while the other had to be turned off because it got over-heated. As a finale, the local NFS (National Fire Service) had to be called in to pump the water out'*.

On Christmas Day 1948 the Goldings were again advertising for staff – a Chauffeur (Rolls experience) and a house parlourmaid, Own quarters. The chauffeur who responded to the advert. was Reg Summers – husband of Mollie and father of Malcolm.

Between 1951 and 1958 the Goldings travelled widely (Colombo, South Africa and Madeira to name but a few destinations) living first at Birdham House and subsequently at Gates Garth in Vincent Road. Betty entered enthusiastically into the social life of Selsey and is still remembered for her success at the Selsey Horticultural Shows. In 1959 she won 1<sup>st</sup> prize for decorative chrysanthemums and another for incurred chrysanthemums. Her roses also won 1<sup>st</sup> prize as did the leeks, celery and white potatoes along with the Christmas Table Decoration.

Also in 1959, Betty raised the alarm when Rock Bridge, a thatched house in Warner Road, caught fire.

Throughout the records, Leslie has been described as a Company Director but on 15 July 1966 the London Gazette published a notice regarding a company known as L A B Investments (Sussex) Limited (a property holding company registered in Regent Street, London). A further notice requested the Creditors to submit their names and addresses, with particulars of their debts or claims, to Leslie and a third notice reported an Extraordinary General Meeting of the Members of the above-named Company convened to pass a Special Resolution to voluntarily wind-up the company.

Sadly, Leslie and Betty's son Stephen Robert died on 20 December 1967 in London.

Leslie died on 20 June 1970 at Selsey, aged 77 and Betty died on 18 January 2002.

Leslie's son, John, was a chartered consulting electrical and mechanical engineer and farmer and he and his wife, Ann, lived in Africa for many years before returning to live in Selsey in 1975. John died on 5 May 2013. Ann still lives in the village.

PS: Tish Golding writes: *'This pic has made me realise (belatedly!) that there isn't anything here about Leslie's service during the WW2. He served in France, was evacuated after the fall of France (after the main evacuation from Dunkirk) and also served in the desert in North Africa. I believe he was at the Battle of El-Alamein as my brother has some mementos from a reunion in the 50s.'* and, indeed, I have found no evidence of it either so just watch this space. We could be producing Chapter 2! .

As we approach the time of year where the evenings are getting darker it is a good time to review your home security.

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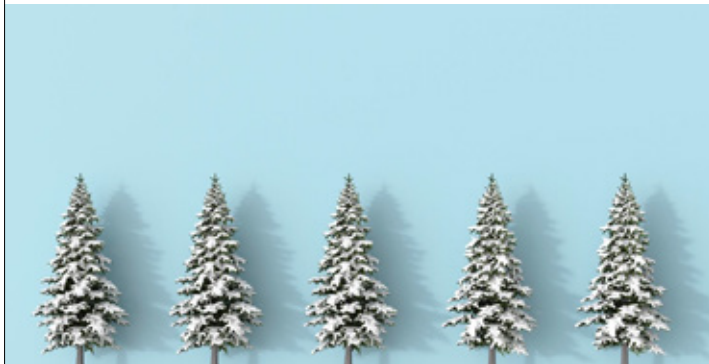

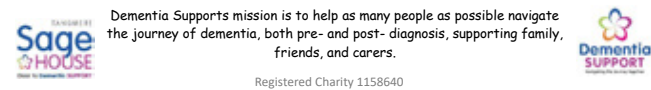

## The Eagle Has Landed

If you go out for a walk today, you may be in for a big surprise. These days, we're starting to see more white-tailed eagles over our RSPB reserves along the coast, and further inland in West Sussex. And that's thanks to the Isle of Wight White-tailed Eagle Project.

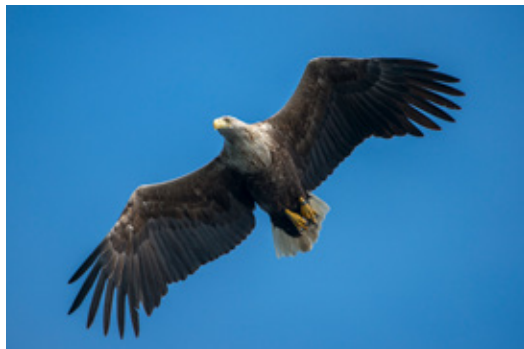
Each summer since 2019, a group of young eagles have been collected under licence from nests in Scotland and translocated to the Isle of Wight, where they're released when they're ready to fledge. This method of release ensures they stay fairly faithful to the area throughout their life. The aim of the reintroduction programme – which is being run by a partnership between Forestry England, the Roy Dennis Wildlife Foundation and other conservation and stakeholder bodies – is to release a total of 60 young white-tailed eagles over five years and establish an initial population of six to eight breeding pairs on the Isle of Wight and surrounding areas on the South coast of England.

But why here, you might ask? Don't these eagles belong instead to the rugged northern coasts of Scotland and Scandinavia? Well, from historical accounts, archaeology and palaeontology, we know they were here in southern England until the last birds bred, on Culver Cliff on the Isle of Wight, in 1780, and young white-tailed eagles were still visiting Sussex in the early 19th century. Even local place names provide evidence they were here – the village of Earnley which sits next to the RSPB Medmerry reserve is named after them. 'Erne' is the Old English for 'eagle' (and 'ley' means 'clearing'). And successful and growing populations in France, Denmark and the Netherlands show that there is plenty for them to eat – mainly fish and water birds – on similar lowland landscapes and coastlines to ours. Young eagles roam far and wide, but several of the released birds seem to be staying in the region, including settling on the Isle of Wight, in Sussex and in Dorset as well.

The eagles will take about five years to reach sexual maturity, when they will also acquire their full adult plumage – which includes the white tail of their names, together with a white head and a bright yellow beak – but then, you never know, perhaps before the end of this decade, we may even see breeding white-tailed eagles here in Sussex! It would certainly be wonderful to see these magnificent birds regularly in our skies again, back where they belong.

## Polecat

For most of us, our only encounters with British mammals are spotting them on the roadside as we hurtle past at 55mph. I'm sure many people these days believe that lying motionless on a road verge with its feet in the air is natural behaviour for a Badger. Our road trips may be macabre safaris but roadkill can tell us a lot about the state of our island's mammalian fauna. Hedgehogs, a squashed staple on the roadkill menu a few decades ago, are now hard to find flattened on the highway, reflecting their dramatic fall in numbers in the wider countryside. And recently an unfamiliar corpse has appeared on the tarmac: the Polecat.

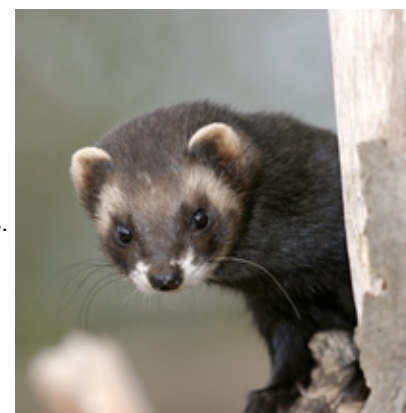

Before being killed by cars, Polecats already had a long history of persecution in England – mainly for eating poultry and notoriously stinking to high heaven. To Shakespeare, and many others since, 'Polecat' was an insult. The species was exterminated from Sussex around 1890. Indeed, the entire English population was banished to the wilderness of Wales. Yet we were happy to welcome their watered-down, domesticated form – the Ferret – as cuddly pets and ruthless Rabbit hunters.

After a century in exile, purebred Polecats are making a comeback. This re-colonisation was the basis for a recent investigation by the Vincent Wildlife Trust who requested roadkill Polecat corpses for DNA testing to verify their pure Polecat lineage (as opposed to Polecat/Ferret hybrids). I was soon dodging traffic on the Steyning by-pass and excitedly picking up a dead Polecat. Being mustelids, Polecats naturally smell but, take my word for it, they smell a lot worse when they've been dead for a few days. Despite discharging a whole can of Glade, my wife smelt that something was up seconds after I set foot in the house.

Putting a dead Polecat in your freezer will test even the strongest of marriages.

Thankfully, after some smooth talking, my marriage is still intact but there are still some fish fingers that neither of us are brave enough to eat. Next morning a package arrived from the Vincent Wildlife Trust containing heavy duty bags, some cool BIOHAZARD stickers and printed instructions for posting Polecats.

After an interesting exchange at the post office counter, my roadkill casualty was posted. A few days later, it was declared 100% Polecat; further evidence that Polecats have returned to Sussex. It's great to have them back and many farmers are welcoming them too, as they do a great job of dispatching Rats and Rabbits. Look out for them in your headlights.

Naila sighed despairingly. 'I wish my family was less traditional. They want me to marry a nice traditional boy when I finish traditional education and have nice traditional

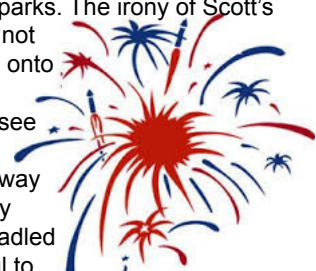


babies. But if they found out about us, anything could happen. They may not even let me finish college.'

#### WHAT DO 'THE FRIENDS' DO?

Some readers may wonder who joins the 'Friends of Selsey Medical Centre' and why. So here's what we're about. We are a group of local people who care passionately about the health and well-being of our friends and neighbours in Selsey.

We collect contributions in the form of Membership fees (upwards from £5 per annum) from our local community, together with income from activities such as the recent Tombola. This income goes towards the purchase of equipment which is not normally provided by the NHS. In this way the Friends assist the Practice to maintain the best service for their patients and our community.

You may have noticed that the windows in the Medical Centre are now fitted with reflective solar film. This ensures privacy for patients visiting the consulting rooms. The "one-way" film has been fitted because the old blinds were removed to comply with clinical hygiene regulations. The film also helps to control heat levels (warmer in winter, cooler in summer) in the building. Be reassured that, although the windows look clear from inside, nobody can look in. If you need a full examination, the couches still have privacy curtains/screens.

Bordeaux is the world's largest fine wine region. Some of its well known districts are Medoc and Graves where Cabernet Sauvignon is the main grape variety, and St. Emilion where Merlot dominates.

The red wines of Bordeaux, (or clarets as we have called them in Britain for over 4 centuries), have long been synonymous with the popular image of fine wine. Any major auction of vintage wines is likely to be dominated by aged bottles and cases of Bordeaux, since that is where most of the attention of investors tends to be concentrated. In this respect, the profile of Bordeaux has always been higher than that of France's other classic red wine region, Burgundy, partly because the finest clarets enjoy considerably longer life than most Burgundy wines, and partly because the annual production volume of the Bordeaux region is incomparably larger.

At their best the red wines of Bordeaux remain one of the most irresistibly succulent of red wines. When young, they tend to be strong in texture and tight with tannin. They can begin to soften up after 5 or 6 years, and then start more readily to display some of the blackcurrant or plum fruit flavours of the Cabernet Sauvignon or Merlot grapes.

In the Bordeaux region there are well over 50 official Appellations, which is the official classification formulated for the Paris Exhibition in 1855, and which remains the principal determining factor in the pricing of these fine wines.

Burgundy's vinous history dates back for centuries, but the annual production volume of fine Burgundy is quite small compared with the output of Bordeaux. Its premium wines come almost entirely from the narrow limestone ridge of the Cote d'Or, measuring less than 30 miles from North to South and only 5 miles across at its widest. The region stretches southwards from Dijon to Lyon, and used to be dominated by large merchant houses called negociants who simply buy up from the growers lots of wine (or even just harvested Pinot Noir and /or Chardonnay grapes) and blend what they have bought to produce their own bottlings.

Now however, the smaller proprietaires-viticultiers (or go it alone operators) who emerged after World War 2 make smaller quantities of the wine from their own vineyards and sell it independently. Whilst many of these are unquestionably excellent and can justifiably claim to be some of the region's best wines, others can be rather mediocre because of the lack of the up to date technology that the quality conscious negociants heavily invest in.

Trivia: Villages with double barrelled names are the key to some of Burgundy's best wines, simply because these villages hi-jacked the names of some of the most famous local vineyards so that humble village wines could be sold on the back of the finest grands crus. For example the village of Chevrey was the first to do this in 1848 when it took the name of the celebrated Chambertin vineyard to become Gevrey-Chambertin !

Another little piece of trivia is that the French love to cook eggs in Burgundy wine: oeufs en murette are eggs poached in a thick reduction of red burgundy, onion, garlic butter and salt pork.

Hello all, and welcome to November's Selsey Life - and autumn! The leaves are definitely falling now and gardens are being carefully put to bed. Another growing cycle has been completed, and soon, summer will be a distant memory (unless, of course, you are reading this in Australia, in which case you will be heading into what I hope, for you, will be a wonderful spring!) I always find that hard to get my head around, to be honest, especially the idea that our friends in Australasia barbeque on the beach in December - very weird, but scientifically, perfectly normal, of course.



I hope some of you managed to attend what was the last Selsey Firework display last month; it was a seriously impressive finale to the last forty odd years. I sometimes think that it would be rather comforting to preserve Selsey in aspic, and homogeneously seal us from the outside world so everything stays the same - but, of course, we just can't do that. Everything changes, nothing stays the same. As my dad used to say 'everything has a season' - and I think he was right. Circumstances change, situations change, and we have to adapt and evolve with them, but for many of us the ending of the fireworks, such an iconic event for Selsey, was very sad. The contribution they have made, both financially, and to the community in general for literally decades, has been nothing short of incredible. I know, from experience, just how labour intensive organising events can be, and for an event like the fireworks, it was literally a labour of love. Thank you all - committee members and volunteers, past and present, for your invaluable contribution to the life of our little town at the bottom of the long and winding road. Many of us have laid down wonderful memories because of your work and it has been enormously appreciated.

The proceeds from the fireworks, of course, went to help some of our local Selsey charities and community groups. All of our groups work very hard for our little town/village and they are all to be applauded for the work they do. Often there is no financial reward, they just get on and 'do it'. Everyone has their own interest areas, of course, some work with the elderly, some our younger people, some with a mixture of both, but whatever they do, contributes to the resilience and compassion of our town/village. They are likely to feel the pinch this winter, however, as are the vast majority of us. I try to keep my monthly deliberations positive and this will be no different, but be aware that if you need help, it does exist, and the most difficult thing to do is to ask. The first step, as they say, is always the hardest because it's the one we fear most - it's the one that begins the process of change - and however difficult the current situation may be, change is always hard for us humans to embrace. Asking for help means stepping into the unknown, because we don't always know how it will turn out.

On the front of one of my notebooks are the words: 'The first step to success is always the hardest, and the first step to failure is always the easiest'. Sometimes, when I have to push myself through a difficult situation, I think of that saying and it spurs me on to do what I know I need to do, because it's the right thing to do. So, please don't hesitate, if you need help, just ask. A good starting point is the Supporting YOU Help with cost of living pressures You campaign

being run by Chichester District Council. It's in the process of being properly developed but already a wealth of information exists. [www.chichester.gov.uk/supportingyoucampaign](http://www.chichester.gov.uk/supportingyoucampaign) is the web address, but the Town Hall has leaflets. Another good resource is the Community Hub which is available 7 days a week, and is run by West Sussex County Council. If they can't help, they will be able to direct you to someone who can. Like Chichester, they work closely with more local groups who may be able to provide the help you need. Their phone number is **03302227980**. I've popped into Selsey's Foodbank a couple of times recently, and I've been very impressed, but not surprised, at the generosity of our community,

which means that Selsey's Foodbank is practically self sufficient. When supplies were running low, a shout out to local residents meant that things were back on track fairly quickly. Thank you to everyone who helped out, with food donations, fundraiser days or collections, it was appreciated by so many members of our community.

We talk a lot about 'resilience' these days: 'the ability for a community to still function, despite the disturbance, and sometimes chaos, which it may have to contend with'. Selsey, I think, is evolving into a very 'resilient' community. It's a compassionate community, which is adaptable to change. The challenges we have faced, particularly since Covid, are dynamic and our adaptation is still happening. Communities need courage to face up to the challenges which present themselves, particularly during times of upheaval, but Selsey always seems to find a way through. We harness resources and expertise, we learn how to cope, even thrive when times are testing. We do our best to help where we can.

As a joke (or was it?) someone once said to me that we should pull up the drawbridge at the Causeway and declare independence! It's a nice thought, but perhaps living in such isolation wouldn't be a good idea! Although, in 1970, the Isle of Dogs in London blockaded roads and announced that it was, infact, actually unilaterally proclaiming independence. It was never going to happen of course, but it did highlight some of the problems the Isle of Dogs was experiencing at the time. I was reminded of this when driving through Cuckfield recently -they apparently declared themselves to be an Independent State in 1966 following issues with land on which to stage the annual Donkey Grand National. Being the radical community it is known to be, Cuckfield proclaimed itself independent and elected its first mayor. It is unashamedly corrupt, with candidates for the mayoralty blatantly 'buying' votes! The motive, of course, is a positive one - the point is that money raised goes to the various groups and organisations which work within Cuckfield to benefit the local community, and the local environment. Like us, Cuckfield is doing what it can to ensure its resilience and perhaps having a bit of fun on the way! I think there could be some merit to this idea.....

Moving on - my regular two readers will know that one of my favourite subjects is hedgehogs; I could quite happily talk about them all day. We are quite fortunate in that we have a fairly healthy population in Selsey if my area is anything to go by - hedgehog highways help. We have a hedgehog highway between my garden and that of my neighbours', enabling the hogs to travel between gardens during their overnight meanderings. This is always a difficult time for them, particularly as we have had a rise in later born hoglets who may struggle a bit over the winter. The rising temperatures are confusing the hogs' normal reproduction pattern and sometimes they don't have the time to put on enough weight to safely survive over the winter months. We can help a bit by leaving out some food (cat food is fine.) We have an upturned storage box with a small area cut into it meaning that only the hedgehogs can go in and feed - it also gives them a bit of protection from the bad weather. Our hedgehog house is often used, but also ignored in favour of sacks of garden leaves or, on one occasion, what remained of a sack of grass seed! Messy log or leaf piles may look unsightly to us, but are a veritable dream for a hedgehog! Even if they don't nest in them, they can gather some up and use them to form a nest elsewhere. They are prone to nesting in inconvenient places, though - so if you are tidying the garden this autumn, please keep an eye out for signs of hedgehog activity - or even a hoggie having a slumber!

Take care all, and remember, if you need help or advice, reach out - no judgement - we all need a helping hand sometimes.

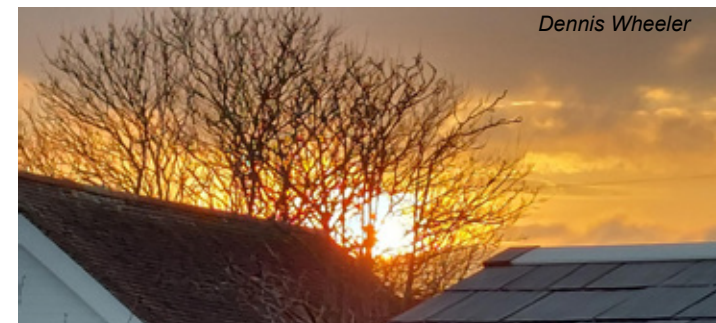

# In the Garden

our monthly guide to gardening - In memory of Giles Peare

## Jobs for November

Hard-prune overgrown deciduous Hedges using a pruning saw or loppers to cut through any thick stems. Extremely overgrown Hedges should be renovated:- to limit shock to the plants, cut the top and only one side hard, prune the other side next year. After trimming, feed with a slow-release, phosphorous rich fertiliser such as sterilised bone meal.

To save time in spring, sharpen up lawn edges now with a flat, half-moon iron designed for the job. Repair worn patches, laying new turfs as soon as they arrive: cut out the worn sections of turf, lightly fork over the soil underneath and add some sharp sand to help aerate the soil. Dress the soil surface with Blood, Fish and Bone mixture or a general slow-release fertiliser. Lay new turf, firming it down gently and ensuring the new surface is level with the old.

Take leaf cuttings of African Violets by using a sharp knife to cut off a healthy, full sized leaf as close to the stalk base as possible. Trim the leaf stalk to about 1½" (8cm) long and insert 1" (2.5cm) of it into ordinary potting compost mixed half-and-half with vermiculite to improve drainage.

## Tip Top Tips

Prune Blackcurrant bushes, taking out the oldest branches (those that are three years old or more) at the base. If you wish you can select a few healthy 10" (25cm) long shoots of this year's growth for hardwood cuttings.

Bury grass clippings, soft prunings and vegetable rubbish (but **not** weeds) around the garden. The worms will do the work, saving the need for an unsightly compost heap in smaller gardens.

When planning next year's garden don't place any plants or vegetables needing lots of attention far back in a border.

Don't lift Parsnips, leeks or pick Brussels Sprouts before frost has touched them - the flavour is better.

Don't forget Horseradish is good with beef - this is the time to plant some good roots.

Sow some early round varieties of Peas this month for a nice early crop next year, also Aquadulce Broad Beans.

November is the time to clear out your Summer garden beds and compost the remains or burn anything that is in any way diseased.

To keep Cacti dust-free, brush gently every week with a pastry brush.

Hello everybody! It's me Markus the office cat bringing you all the latest news from The Cat and Rabbit Rescue.

Sadly, last month's pet of the month the lovely cat Everleigh is still here waiting to find her forever home.

This month I wanted to tell you about a very gorgeous cat that was brought into The Centre called Hawaii. Hawaii arrived here a few months ago as part of a family of animals that arrived from one home, including her two kittens. Quite quickly, my staff noticed she had a lump on the side of her face and she was seen by our vet who discovered it was an abscess, possibly caused by another cat or her own kittens. Luckily, it was easily treatable and after a course of antibiotics and lots of time spent by my staff keeping it clean, it did heal well. Hawaii was now ready to be spayed and to find her new home but when the vet checked her over they realised she was pregnant, again! My staff kept a close eye on her while she grew her kittens, but they could not help but notice how huge Hawaii got, it looked like she was carrying a watermelon inside of her! Finally, she gave birth to eight beautiful, healthy kittens all by herself. The average number of kittens a cat will usually have is around 4-6, so eight is a big litter and one of the biggest we have had at The Centre. A cats gestation period is around 2 months so my staff were able to work back to see when she would of got pregnant, which would have been when her previous kittens were about 10 weeks old. This is just another reason why it is so important to get your cats spayed, female cats can come into heat and get pregnant again when there previous litter are as young as 8 weeks old.

Hawaii's eight kittens are all growing well, with such a big litter it is a lot of work for her to keep their bellies full so my staff have been helping to top them up with kitten milk. I can't wait to see this lovely family all find their forever homes in the future.

## Winter Wildlife

### Inside the wildlife hospital in November

The hospital team are now caring for a ward full of hedgehogs, extra staff and volunteers are recruited to help feed and clean hundreds of these hedgehogs and hoglets. Many are too small, ill or injured to survive the winter without support. We will also be admitting a variety of birds, as the harsh weather can take its toll on them. Many will be undergoing their summer to winter moult and as a result could be admitted into our care due to being out of condition. Moulting can be a drain on a bird's resources which can leave them weak and vulnerable to predator attacks. It takes energy to grow new feathers, there may also be heat loss when feathers are shed, leaving birds exposed to strong winds or rain. As a result, birds can be found weak, malnourished or injured which can lead to them being susceptible to infections and respiratory issues. Once in our care birds will need vet treatment, food, medicines and a place to rest and recuperate in before being fit for release.

### Patient Story

We recently admitted an adult female buzzard who was found very submissive and unresponsive. On arrival she was found to be incredibly thin and had white plaques on her tongue, which is a symptom of Frounce (Trichomoniasis). This is a nasty disease of the upper digestive tract found in birds of prey, causing accumulation of necrotic material in the mouth. On further inspection we also found that she was heavily burdened with roundworm.



Following a few weeks in our care and receiving a combination of medications to treat the two conditions, she started to show positive signs of improvement. Once the team were happy with her condition, flight strength and all signs of the diseases had cleared she was released to a suitable location.

### Helping Brent Lodge

With so many hedgehogs in our care we will need a regular supply of newspapers this winter. If you would like to help by donating newspapers or tearing your papers into 1-2 inch strips before donating, then this will be very helpful. We kindly ask that you **do not** donate office paper, glossy magazines, and newspapers with staples. Please **do not** shred them using a cross cutter. Thank you in advance. ### Big boost to Selsey Pavilion Trust

A big boost to the Selsey Pavilion Trust has been given by the Architectural Heritage Fund, which has just confirmed its Project Development Grant award of over £35,000.

The grant is a significant step forward on the road to restoring the former theatre and cinema in the heart of Selsey High Street. It will enable fundraising support and further development of the Trusts' plans, building on the successes of last year's project viability study.

In recent years, dozens of historic buildings have been successfully adapted into economically sustainable entertainment hubs for the 2020s and beyond. With the vision and determination of the very committed Trustees, this is precisely what's in store for Selsey!

SPT chairman Christian Skelton stresses the significance of this latest AHF grant for the long-term aspirations of the Trust and the benefits the Pavilion can bring to Selsey:

"The AHF has been instrumental in saving hundreds of community projects like ours from the brink. To receive their continued support demonstrates the incredible potential that a restored Selsey Pavilion can bring to the community and our High Street. There is much to do with considerable fundraising, but this is the start of the Selsey Pavilion revival.

Having a vibrant entertainment venue in the heart of Selsey can only bring positive benefits to the town. It will encourage locals and tourists back into the High Street during the day and extend business hours in the evenings while cutting car journeys on the B2145 to Chichester.

And how many towns can boast a hundred-year-old art deco theatre on their doorstep? Once restored, the Pavilion will be one of only a handful of pre-Great War cinemas still in cultural use throughout the UK."

Gavin Richards, Programme Manager, Architectural Heritage Fund, added:

"The Selsey Pavilion is exactly the sort of project that the Architectural Heritage Fund's [Transforming Places through Heritage](#) programme was designed to support. We have been impressed with the work Selsey Pavilion Trust has done with the help of our project viability grant, and this second grant award will enable the Trust to develop its exciting plans for the building. We hope this will lead to a successful bid to the Community Ownership Fund. Bringing this wonderful old building back into use and community ownership will have a hugely positive impact on Selsey's High Street."

The next step for the Trust is to apply for the Government's Community Ownership Fund (COF) at the end of this year following a successful pre-application in June. The COF will support 50% of the purchase price of the Pavilion if successful giving the Trust a fantastic opportunity to purchase the Pavilion.

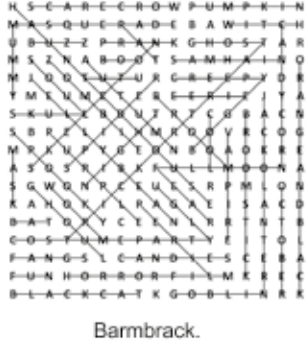

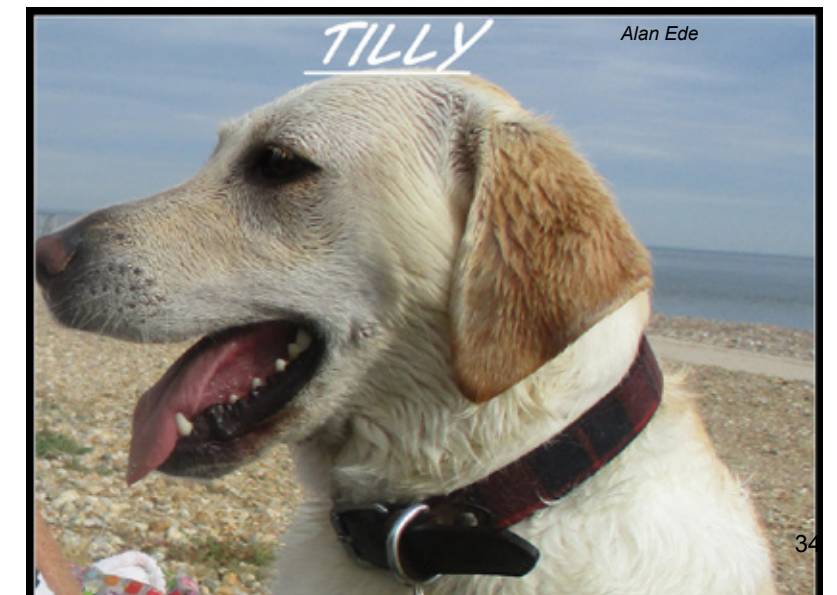
