

On Saturday 7 October, from a galaxy far, far away comes an absolute must-see for fans of Star Wars and the silver screen.

One of the UK's finest collections of vintage Star Wars toys and original cinema posters is going on display in The Novium Museum,

May The Toys Be With You is both a celebration of the now highly collectable vintage toy line and of the iconic design work and art of the original Star Wars movies.

Back when the movie Star Wars broke box office records in 1977, no

one could have predicted that the merchandise would go on to earn even more than the film itself. The toys of Star Wars took the world by storm and became the must-have playthings for an entire generation. From 1977 – 1985 an estimated 300 million action figures were sold, allowing children to re-enact the adventures of Luke Skywalker, Princess Leia and Han Solo.

The exhibition features hundreds of incredible vintage toys, posters and memorabilia, including:

A 1977 movie poster by The Brothers Hildebrant. Given 36 hours to complete the poster, the twins worked collaboratively in a single non-stop session to achieve the print deadline.

A 1978 Death Star model. Rather than make a large, prohibitively expensive plastic playset, this design used cardboard pieces which slotted together to create the iconic corridors and chambers of the Empire's battle station.

1978 Millennium Falcon. Designed by Kenner engineer Mark Boudreaux. A spaceship and playset in one. Children could sit Han Solo and Chewbacca in the cockpit, and the rear lid comes off to reveal a playset environment with gunners chair, training ball, and the iconic chess set.

The first 12 Star Wars figures from 1978. The term 'action figure' was coined in 1964 to describe the 12" tall Action Man and Barbie figures. Kenner made the Star Wars figures smaller at just 3.75" because they also wanted to create accompanying spaceships and playsets. The success of the Star Wars toy line ensured that 3.75" would become a new industry standard.

Archival footage of movie trailers and interviews with the toy makers and a soundscape using soundtracks from the Star Wars films, including music performed by the London Symphony Orchestra.

Visitors can also look forward to some interactive gallery features: dress up as a Star Wars character. pose for a selfie with a Storm Trooper, trails, and an opportunity to explore other toys from the 1970's with a look through a vintage toy box.

Collector and Exhibition Curator Matt Fox says: "From X-Wing Fighters to Lightsabers, these fantastic designs have fired our imaginations and stamped their place on our cultural landscape. This exhibition has broken visitor attendance records at a host of museums around the country, and we're excited to now bring it to The Novium Museum in Chichester."

Councillor Jess Brown-Fuller, Cabinet Member for Culture and Events at Chichester District Council, says: "We're thrilled to be bringing this fascinating exhibition to Chichester, which will appeal to fans of all ages. This is an unmissable opportunity to view many rarely seen Star Wars treasures. CHES

'May The Toys Be With You' opens at The Novium Museum on Saturday, 7 October 2023 and will run until Saturday, 20 April 2024. Tickets cost £4 for adults, £2.50 for children and £12 for a family of up to five (maximum two adults).

Quiet sessions, for anyone who feels that they would benefit from a more relaxed experience, are available. Please see The Novium Museum's website for details. For more information, and to book visit www.thenovium.org/theforce.




Year 4's summer postcards

HISTORY OF CHICHESTER by Adolphus Ballard, BA LLB


Like many others in Selsey, when I have nothing better to do (or, rather, nothing that needs doing) I browse the Net looking for items of interest. This little book was just such a one – and I can hear the late, much-loved May Cole now: 'It was very nice, dear, but it wasn't Selsey was it?'- so with apologies to May I have made it my business to illustrate the saying 'Never judge a book by its cover'.

The book was published in Chichester by J W Moore in East Street in 1898 and bearing in mind it is now 125 years old it is in remarkable condition. All the pages are present and attached. The piece of tissue paper protecting the first image – a Plan of Chichester From Speed's Empire of Great Britain (1611) – is also still present and only a little discoloured.


Adolphus Ballard's name rang a bell with me and when I consulted Anne Scicluna's book 'A Chain of Mayors' published as Otter Memorial Paper Number 31, University of Chichester in 2013, my hunch proved correct. Adolphus Ballard was Mayor of Chichester twice, in 1896 and 1897. The notes accompanying the picture of a bearded Victorian Gentleman state 'Adolphus Ballard, a book keeper, was known to have presented a gas design of the City Arms to the City Council.'

I then went on to discover that Adolphus had a son, also Adolphus, who was a historian and solicitor but more of him later.

Returning to the book, the inside front cover says NO,1A and on its facing page the number 8½ is crossed through and 9 11 9 appear underneath. Further down it says pica at foot ca. ?? Pica is a typeface.



The next page appears below – Lena Ballard. Jan, 1899. The address is The Pallant, Church Walk, East Worthing.




The book is scribbled on in pencil through its entirety as you can see from the image below which shows part of the index in which the page numbers have been crossed through and amended.

A rather more interesting amendment is to be found in chapter V, page 22.



The original text concerns the building of the Cathedral and states: 'The three lower stages of the south-western tower show Bishop Ralph's work; it is almost certain that there was a similar tower at the north-west corner of the nave, which fell in the year 1210' its successor in turn fell in 1635 and has never been replaced.' The last three words have been crossed through and the phrase 'and was re-built in 1901' added.

Harnessing my inner Jack Russell, I went to West Sussex Record Office which had a copy of the book. It was the same edition as mine minus the amendments. I next called on Chichester Library where I found another copy of the book but this one was dated 1929 and published by Moore & Wingham, 89 East Street and it is this latter edition you will find on-line. When I compared the two editions it was quite clear that Lena had used her own 1898 edition as a template for the alterations required to update the proposed second edition. And, yes, I did acquire my own copy of the 1929 edition!

So who was Lena? A quick look at Ancestry revealed numerous Ballard families but no 'Lena' so I contacted one of the Ancestry Members - Chris Goodeve-Ballard. I have his permission to use this picture of Adolphus in his mayoral regalia.



Anne Scicluna's book 'A Chain of Mayors' contains a description of the gold chain and pendant"

'The chain comprises sixteen portcullises, each surmounted by a civic coronet, alternating with sixteen designs that combine together roses, thistles, and shamrocks symbols of the United Kingdom – at the time of the creation, which was 1875-76. The maker was the London clockmaker and politician, Sir John Bennett of Cheapside, London'

I have contacted Chichester University as they hold the copyright for Anne Scicluna's book which was published as Otter Memorial Paper Number 31 and am awaiting their permission to use this description as they hold the copyright. Anne herself was Mayor of Chichester three times in 1983-84, 1993-94 and 2012-13...

Alderman Adolphus was born in 1838 and married Frances Ann Stafford. Amongst the numerous children were Adolphus junior and Caroline Stafford Ballard aka Lena.

Adolphus junior was born on 27 February 1867 and was an English historian and solicitor. The eldest son of Adolphus Ballard and Frances Ann nee Stafford.

he was born in Chichester and in 1881 was being educated at University School, Hastings which he attended at the age of 14. His qualifications were BA, LLB (London), Hon. MA (Oxon). By 1891 he was articled as a solicitor in Chipping Norton, Oxfordshire before moving to take up the position of Town Clerk for Woodstock, Oxfordshire. This position was confirmed on the title page of the 1898 edition of the book and the 1901 census has him as solicitor, Town Clerk and employer at the age of 34. He married Mary Elizabeth née Henman in 1894 and studied the English medieval period, writing several treatises on the Domesday Book, author of The Domesday Boroughs and the Domesday Inquest. I'm also hopeful that he wrote The Chartulary of St Mary's Hospital, Chichester as this introduced a new word to my vocabulary. A Chartulary is a collection of title deeds copied into a register for greater security – apparently. It was included in the Sussex Archaeological Society Volume 51, pp37-64 in 1908.

He had a rather sad life as several of his children died as infants. Godfrey was born in 1895 and died in 1915, aged 20. He served as a 2nd Lieutenant in the 23rd (County of London) Battalion. He was posted missing at Loos in September 1915 and his accepted death date was 27 September 1915. His body was never recovered but he is commemorated on the Loos Memorial, panel 130-135 in France.

W. Colactall Oxford.

Mary Elizabeth was born and died in 1896, Charles Albert was born and died in 1899, Francis Edward was born in 1901 and died in 1902. He was baptised on 31 January 1901. The last child, Cecily Ruth, was born in 1905 and died in 1995.

For the last part of his life, Ballard lived in a 17th-century house at number 28, High Street, Woodstock. He died on 12 September 1915 at the early age of 48. Reports of his death tell us that he was also Registrar of Woodstock County Court, Clerk to the Oxford Board of Guardians as well as holding other public appointments.

And finally to Lena. She was born on 8 May 1879 in Chichester and we know from the 1901 census she was a Teacher Undergraduate at The Ladies College, Grassington Road, Eastbourne at the age of 21. The University of London Student Records of June 1900 further inform us that she matriculated from Beachy College, Eastbourne and here we see the studio photograph recording her success.

On 19 August 1908 she married Arthur George Linfield in Chichester. Despite her illustrious relatives I cannot find a newspaper report for it.

Arthur George Linfield was an illustrious man in his own right although his job description of Fruit Grower and Nurseryman does not seem to reflect that. Be that as it may, he was awarded an OBE in 1945 for work on Worthing Local Employment Services, a CBE in 1956 for Hospital work and a CVO in 1962.

This was followed, in 1974 by a KCVO in recognition of his services to the Royal family as an adviser to the Royal Gardens at Windsor and Sandringham. As a fruit grower, his most illustrious employee was Jomo Kenyatta, the former President of Kenya!

And here we have Lena and Arthur in later life attending a relative's wedding. They did have

children but I think her story should end here as I do not wish to invade anyone's privacy more than I already have done.

Lena died on 1 July 1941 at The Oast House, Ashington West Sussex at the age of 62. Her burial record tells us that she was 60 but perhaps this is a clerical error. There is also a note which states that she was buried on 5 July and that she had been cremated. The ashes were deposited west of the porch and south of the church.

And I repeat – you should never judge a book by its cover.

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

Home Security



Once again as we approach the time of year where the evenings are getting darker, now is an excellent time to review your home security.

Most burglars are opportunists and will always look for a soft target – a premises that appears unoccupied or one which is easy for them to break into or already insecure.

Before going out or going away, we recommend you do the following:

*Close and lock all doors and windows even if you will only be gone for a short amount of time.

*During the hours of darkness, shut the curtains and leave a light on – this can be a significant deterrent as burglars like to 'work' unseen and will tend to avoid a home that looks occupied.

* If you are out for long periods of time then consider the use of a timer switch to trigger one or more lights or a radio in the house which again will give the impression that someone is at home.

*If you have an alarm, ensure it is set.

*Keep valuables out of sight.

*Ensure all side gates, sheds and garages are kept locked.

*Don't leave car documents or ID on view.

*Keep handbags and keys away from letterboxes or cat flaps.

* Consider installing a video doorbell. This can act as a deterrent, keeping your property safe as well as helping to solve crimes.

We would always ask that should you spot something suspicious, please let us know at the time by calling 999. It could be nothing but it might well be something and this could help keep you, your neighbours and their property safe.

GETTING TO KNOW YOU - TALKING TO OUR MEMBERS

This past month I have had the pleasure of speaking for the first time to a number of Friends' supporters. I offered to help our Membership Secretary to remind a number of members that their subscriptions for the current year were now due. We are finding that emailed renewal notices frequently get overlooked and lack the immediacy of a letter in the post. However using email saves a 75p stamp per member.

Anyway the reason I'm writing is to say how much I enjoyed phoning the members and having a brief chat with them. Nobody objected to being called out of the blue, and almost everyone had just forgotten or not got round to sending in their subscription. Most people told me they thought the Friends to be a truly worthwhile cause, collecting funds to enable the Selsey Medical Practice to purchase equipment and services not normally provided by the NHS.

Amongst other projects the Friends have lately funded the installation of special film and blinds to insulate the surgery windows, saving heat in winter and keeping the building cooler in summer, as well as guaranteeing privacy for patients in the consulting rooms. Symbol of conservation success

Which stylish, black and white bird that features on the RSPB logo can you see around Pagham Harbour and Medmerry?

It is, of course, the avocet – a particularly striking and elegant wader with bold black and white wing patterns which you can fully appreciate when you see it in flight. It has a black cap which continues down its neck, and legs which have a bluish tone to them. But the most distinctive feature of the avocet is the upward curve of its long slender bill which you may see it sweeping from side to side to catch its dinner of worms and crustaceans.

So why is this bird used as the RSPB emblem? Why not a robin or a blackbird or other favourite British bird? The answer lies in a conservation success story dating back to World War II.

The avocet became extinct in the UK in the nineteenth century when hunting, egg collection and the fashion for wearing feathers were prolific. It was during World War II that the conditions for breeding avocets were accidentally recreated on the Suffolk coastal marshes when they were deliberately flooded as a defence against enemies. In 1947 when sea sluice operations were resumed, the drained land revealed reed beds, brackish pools and drainage channels – the perfect environment for waders such as the avocet. In the same year, the RSPB took over the management of this site at Minsmere and, as a result of their work, avocets began to successfully breed again in the

Nowadays, avocets are resident in various areas of the country with an estimated 1,950 breeding pairs. For a species that was extinct in the UK 75 years ago - that's pretty amazing!

At RSPB Medmerry's Stilt Pools, they have been breeding since 2014; this year 14 young birds hatched.

Back in 1970, the RSPB logo was a simple black and white image of the avocet; you will see now that it still uses the avocet but has blue and green incorporated into it - colours which represent the land, sea and sky.

Selsey Wine Interest Group (SWIG)

Continuing in August with our theme of "Summer Wines", for probably the last time this Summer we all met in my Wild Garden in the light of the Super Moon, although the temperature was a little bit more chilly than we had expected.

We kicked off with a delightful regular summer stand by - a Pinot Grigio (12%) from Italy, served nicely chilled. This 2020 Alessandro Gailici Della Venezie comes from the vineyards of Veneto, which have long been a preferred source of Pinot Grigio, and 2020 saw near perfect vintage conditions rarely found elsewhere. With its intensity of fruit and a firm structure its crisp apple and citrus character give added complexity. Can be enjoyed as an aperitif or with lighter dishes such as fresh seafood, grilled chicken or roasted vegetables.

Next up was a fruity and zesty 2021 **Sauvignon Blanc** (12%) 'Atlantique' from the heart of the South West of France produced under the cool influence of the Atlantic Ocean. Italy. We appreciated its aromas of exotic fruits and citrus, which pair perfectly with fish and seafood.

We followed up with a crisp Kiralykisasszony Kiralyleankya white wine (12%) from the Feind Winery in the Balaton region of Hungary. Dry, aromatic and fresh, this wine is perfect for a warm summer day. Intensely fragrant with notes of tropical fruit, apricot, lime, peach and citrus it is ripe and complex on the palate, with a clean, bright finish full of flavour. Incredibly versatile pairings include spicy and exotic food, especially Thai and Vietnamese dishes.

Summer being the main season for white wines, we then went on to a 2020 Chenin Blanc (12%) from the famous 'Arabella' winery in South first De Wet settler in South Africa was appointed Cellar Master of the Dutch East India Company, 'Arabella' takes its name from the beautiful

Arabian horses that grace its verdant pastures and are a passion of the De Wet family.

On to the reds, starting with a 2021 'Moonstruck' Cabernet (12%) from South Eastern Australia. Hand crafted with grapes gathered in the still of the night under a full moon, this wine is said to be made for those who like "to howl at the moon"!

Next up was a full bodied 2020 (14%) red 'Bulldog' 'Bullfrog' hailing from the bull fighting part of France. "They seek it here, they seek it there, those drinkers seek it everywhere. Its origins are secrets kept, for under the Matador's cloak they're swept. Perchance you'll find this delicious grog, that fine elusive wine - Bullfrog"

We finished with a very special 2015 'Ermita de San Lorenzo Gran Seleccion Garnacha (14.5%) from Spain. As the first winemaker in the Campo de Boria region to bottle his own wines, the founder Senor Ruberte established his cellar in 1948, nearly five centuries after his ancestors settled in the mountain area of Ermita de San Lorenzo, and he paved the way for establishing the official 'Denominacion de Origin' in 1978. His daughter Susanna continues to age this Gran Seleccion in the original barrel room with a constant temperature of 14C.

The Campo de Borja region is known as 'The Empire of Granacha', while the unique microclimate produces the Cabernet Sauvignon grapes expertly blended into a velvet smooth, long lasting voluptuous finish. Succulent lamb and fillet steak make ideal partners for this Gran Seleccion, which was easily voted our Wine of the Month.

Hoverflies

Everyone loves bees, don't they? Knowing that our bees are in decline has prompted protests and petitions and highlighted the important service these buzzing pollinators provide to our planet. Without them our crops and ecosystems would collapse. Yet many other pollinators that provide the same service don't get the same

level of public support. So today I'm waving my flag for the hoverflies.

For some reason, they're not as loveable as bees. Perhaps it's because most of the time people mistake them for wasps. This isn't totally our fault because that's exactly what the hoverflies want you to think. The 283 species of hoverfly in the UK come in many shapes, colours and sizes but most of them sport yellow and black stripes, making them easily confused for wasps, bees, hornets and bumblebees. It's a strategy called Batesian mimicry and was first proposed by Leicestershire lepidopterist Henry Bates in 1861. Hoverflies are actually have to be dangerous to deter predators – you just have to look like

harmless. They don't sting and can't bite but they have discovered you don't something that's dangerous.

Yet their devious mimicry isn't the most incredible thing about them. Their wings are the things. Hoverflies (like all flies) have just two wings (half as many wings as bees and wasps). Whereas other flies keep their wings straight, hoverflies incline theirs to create an angled downward stroke at a remarkable rate of 120 beats per second. This allows hoverflies to fly to a most amazing place: nowhere. Hoverflies have become the motionless masters of mid-air.

It's not all sitting around in the sky though. During their few days of life, hoverflies fight, fornicate and feed and while busy collecting energy-giving nectar and protein-

rich pollen they inadvertently provide that vital pollination service to our flowers and crops. And hoverflies have earned the title of 'The Gardeners Friend' because about 40% of them have a larval stage which is basically a tiny crawling stomach that roams around your flowerbed eating aphids. Pollination, pest control – next thing you know

So why not thank these friendly flies by planting some of their favourite flowers in your garden - parsley, fennel, borage, hebe, sedum and alliums - and consider putting in a pond no matter how small. Do your bit for the pollinators and they'll keep the world working for

In my role as the Secretary of State for Education, it is my first priority to ensure everyone can start the new term in a place they feel safe and ready to learn. I know, however, that many parents across Selsey may be feeling anxious following some of the recent changes to the guidance around RAAC (Reinforced Autoclaved Aerated Concrete) found in schools.

Following new evidence over the summer which led to a change in guidance, we've been working non-stop to minimise any disruption posed to education from RAAC found in schools.

The Department for Education have released the list of all sites known to have RAAC, as of the 30th August. Fewer than 1% of all schools or colleges have confirmed cases, and in each of these instances, mitigation works are either well underway or already in place. Most solutions are quick and effective and can typically be implemented within a matter of weeks. At the start of term last month, 70% of all impacted sites were able to open to all pupils.



As I write this, I'm pleased to report there have not yet been any confirmed cases of RAAC in Selsey's schools - nor the rest of Chichester, Whilst this is clearly promising news. I appreciate many will have questions over how things will work should this change in the future. I have been chairing meetings throughout much of this month with our school leaders, experts, Ministers and officials to ensure that every educational setting with RAAC - wherever they are in the country - gets the support they need. Wherever cases are confirmed, schools will receive funding to make their buildings safe, as well as a dedicated caseworker to help them through any necessary changes. As your MP, I will continue to follow the local situation extremely closely and will share any significant updates as I receive them.

I appreciate it has been an anxious situation for everyone impacted, but I would like to assure everyone in Selsey that the Government is working to remedy the situation and minimise disruption to our children's education, whilst prioritising their safety.

community news deliberations **DONNA'S DELIBERATIONS**

Medmerry Windmill stands on the coast just west of Selsey village. It can be clearly seen from the sea and is shown on Admiralty Charts as a navigational point.

There has been a mill in the area for over four centuries. The first miller recorded in 1641 was Thomas Wetheor, who is possibly buried at Selsey. He left the mill to his wife, son and daughter. At that time millers were important members of a community when grain was processed locally for local use. The original mill was a tide mill with flood gates at either end of the site which operated so water could flow through the mill and out to sea. This mill disappeared through coastal erosion and a replacement mill was constructed further inshore above the high water mark. The mill

was then a post mill dating from the 18th Century – in 1783 the miller was recorded as William Reeves. It was probably a timber structure but, as such, suffered from the severe coastal weather.

In 1827 the mill was replaced by the current structure erected by Thomas Colebrook using local red bricks. It then consisted of 5 storeys driving 2 pairs of millstones. A restoration in 1908 reduced the storeys to 4 and the mill was then fitted with a domed cap and "winded" by a fantail. The mill now has 4 sails carried on a cast iron wind shaft with an iron brake wheel. When working the mill had a grinding capacity of 10 -12 tons of wheat per week, although it also ground animal feed and peppercorns. As it was built and mounted around a single vertical post, the whole structure could be turned to maximise the effectiveness of the sails whatever the direction of the wind.

Medmerry Windmill has had a chequered history. In 1828, it and its contents were sold at auction to cover rent arrears. By 1841, Thomas Faith was the miller but he died in 1846. The next miller was Henry Arnell who died in 1879. By 1882, Fredrick Sharp was in charge until his death in 1890. The mill then fell into disrepair when the Sharp family were made bankrupt.

In 1908, the mill was repaired by James Walter Holloway, millwright of Shoreham, West Sussex; this was completed by the outbreak of

World War One. It was again auctioned in 1917 with the mill house advertised as a "superior" residence. The Chichester Observer of 7th July 1926 stated that Medmerry Windmill was still working although it was yet again up for auction scheduled for September 1926 through Stride and Son of Chichester. The holding was listed as 173 acres with an updated residence. However, a postcard of 1928 shows the mill itself as neglected and derelict with all 4 sails damaged.

By the mid 1920s. the mill was a turning point in the Schneider Trophy Air Race which started and finished on the Isle of Wight. In 1934, a French female competitor, Irene Schmeder Chapellut, crash landed near the

mill. She was subsequently arrested on behalf of the French Authorities on a charge of shooting a former lover. Held at Holloway Jail, she was transferred to France in January 1937 but acquitted at her subsequent trial. A more tragic crash occurred near the mill on 5th March 1945 when pilot Flight Lieutenant Lindsay Black DFC was killed during a practice flight with two fellow pilots. He was a member of the Royal New Zealand Air Force stationed at Tangmere Air Field on war service.

In 1959, John Bunn, owner of the White Horse Caravan Site, acquired Medmerry Windmill and undertook a full restoration. This was supervised by a Chichester architect assisted by the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings. Yet the fantail on the mill was not replaced making it inoperable as a mill. This restoration was completed in 1960 but the "Storm" of 1987 caused further damage requiring another restoration of the sails, although the rest of the mill survived virtually intact. Today the mill remains part of a well established holiday complex. Over the years there have been various suggestions of how it could be used but mainly the site is utilised as shop. However, Medmerry Windmill still remains a prominent structure on the shoreline west of Selsey visible to those on land and out at sea.

Hello my lovely fellow Selsonians! Well, the last few months have gone by in a blink, and here we are, well and truly on the 'other side'. As ever I have no idea where the time went, but here we are, back in the land of Advent Calendars, confectionery and over priced 'gift sets!' Having said that, we have Halloween to navigate first - that wonderful day when we appear to encourage tooth decay diverse as David Attenborough, Graham Norton, and Eric Idle from in our children, and consider that, at least for one day, knocking on the doors of total strangers is considered totally acceptable. I'm not, as you might guess, a great fan of Halloween.

I can practically hear people complaining that I'm miserable and a total killjoy, but actually, there's always a bowl full of sweets and a very passable pumpkin outside our door - I'm not going to disappoint the youngsters who want to take part, but it's not a day I'm particularly keen on. Rather like baby showers, and school proms, Halloween is one of those increasingly consumer driven 'events' which we appear to have 'picked up' from our friends across the pond. The saying 'America sneezes and we catch a cold' has never been more apt. Interestingly, Halloween was initially celebrated in Ireland managed perfectly well without carrying around what appears to and Scotland and it was those immigrants who took Halloween to America, but the American influence was significant, and that influence spread to other countries by the later 20th century. Over here in Blighty, whilst there's a bit of dressing up and the odd pumpkin, the amount we spend doesn't come close to the 3.3 billion dollars which they spent in 2021. It's not a holiday in the States, but it's become a festival which is practically held as sacred.

The fact is we haven't quite caught up with the magnitude of Halloween 'fever' which takes over in the US; despite their domination of digital and social media, whilst the festivities have certainly spread, we are still well behind when it comes to pumpkin carving, halloween cocktails and dressing up. However, we may soon catch up if Professor Nicholas Rogers is correct. In his book, from Pagan Ritual to Party Night, he says that Guy Fawkes has become a bit of an embarrassment, and 'burning' effigies of someone on a bonfire doesn't go down so well today. He suggests that as Halloween increases in popularity here, it may be that some of the accepted celebratory practices of November 5th, may be incorporated into Halloween, so it becomes a sort of 'smorgasboard' of a celebration. Who knows? There is probably an argument for that, however, because for all sorts of reasons, 'Bonfire Night' is certainly not 'celebrated' in the way it was when I was growing up.

The other thing is we aren't as into 'decorating' as our stateside friends are - they extravagantly decorate their homes to acknowledge the seasons and celebrations all the time. Whilst a massive witch or ghost-like figure might be pretty commonplace over there, we tend to decorate with rather less 'pazzazz', adopting a 'less is better' approach and embracing some sort of perceived austerity. In America 'more' seems to be the way forward. Realistically, we have to accept that the US of A has a tight grip on the Western cultural scene, so I won't be at all surprised if we manage to catch up with the States in the next decade or so. It remains to be seen if 'Bonfire' night is indeed usurped by 'All Hallows' Eve.' Truth to tell, though, although I'm not a fan of October 31st, I always happily embrace October - it's that transitional time from autumn to early winter, and although the weather becomes even more unpredictable, it tends to be cool and fresh which, for those of us who don't 'do' sun, is always welcome.

The trees, of course, are magically transformed from their summer 'green' to more A muted red and orange tones and mother nature finishes her work here to begin her metamorphosis of the

In the Garden

Jobs for October

Harvest evergreen Herbs including Sage, Lavender, Thyme, Rosemary, and Bay for drying the leaves for use in pot-pourri etc. Tie stems of the herbs in bunches and hang in a dry location. They can be used to make Christmas gifts.

Harvest and dry maincrop Onions for storage; brush off any soil and peel off the dirty, dry outer layers of skin; store in wooden boxes or crates and place in a cool, dry place. Shallots can also be stored in the same way. Check regularly for deterioration or rot and remove.

Leave some windfall Apples and Peas for the wildlife to enjoy. Blackbirds especially enjoy some fruit and it will discourage them from pecking at any fruit still ripening on the trees.

Tip Top Tips

Attach a rope to a skateboard, it makes an excellent trolley for shifting heavy objects around the Garden.

Mow some leaves on lawns for an excellent winter feed and as a compost.

Never place flowers near a bowl of fruit- fruit produces ethylene gas which causes flowers to die sooner.

Children's windmills make effective cat, bird and squirrel deterrents.

Over-ripe Tomatoes will become firm if they are placed in a basin of salted water for about 20 minutes.

Don't discard green Tomatoes- they make excellent chutney or

Use nut shells for drainage in pots.

House plants like the water from boiled eggs.

Lift Dahlias as soon as the growth gets blackened by frost

Raise the height on the mower and only mow every two or three



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Walk The Selsey Tram Way

The first train to travel from Chichester to Selsey on the Tramway took place at the end of August in 1897. To commemorate that occasion, on the 26th August, a group of 25 walkers set out from East Beach car park in Selsey and walked to Sidlesham, passing 8 stations along the route.

The Selsey Tram Way walking trail guide has been rewritten and updated by Dr Bill Martin and David Pearce of the Manhood

Wildlife and Heritage Group and new orange logo signage attached to footpath posts along the trail. Colourful information boards have been erected



The signs have a link to a webpage which in turn has a link to an interactive map for

Board 10 Ferry Station mobile phones and the new leaflet which is also available at the Novium Museum, RSPB, The Chichester Canal shop and Selsey Town Hall.

The original tramway was 7.5 miles long but it is not possible to walk the exact route and the total length of the new heritage trail is 11.8 miles. It can, however, be walked in sections, using the No 51 bus with stops at Hunston, The Anchor Inn in Sidlesham and the RSPB Pagham Harbour visitor centre.

Next year the Novium Museum in Chichester will stage an exhibition on The Sesley Tramway. A film is being made as part of the display which will include The Sesley Shantymen singing a song about 'The Sidlesham Snail';

In the meantime on-going maintenance and discussion about the restoration of the station at Chalder is taking place.

"Wellness Café"

At our last month's Wellness Café we were joined by Andy Horner the family, or carer an opportunity and John Hicks from Selsey Fire and

Rescue Team (pictured here) and Ben **Applin** from the WSFRS Rural Engagement Team who provided information about their Safe and Well Visits. They are keen to ensure a person with care needs can remain safely in their own home for as long as possible. Their caring approach gives them an indicator as to what hazards may impact on that person's safety and will work with

other agencies to enable solutions. Andy,

John and Ben were keen to share some of the more recent hazards that people and carers need to be aware of: use of emollients, charging of electric devices, including mobility scooters, safe storage of equipment, so not to block exits, and disposal of batteries (particularly those used in vapes).

A member of the fire crew will make a prearranged appointment with you and will always have identification with them. They will offer advice on how to make your home safer, and where appropriate fit smoke alarms or other fire detection equipment free of charge.

Herbert Protocol

HERBERT

PROTOCOL People living with dementia can live well and independently at home for many years. Families can put measures in place to ensure that person is as safe as possible. Often people are known to the wider community who keep a discrete eye on the person.

When needs change, and they can do so rapidly changes in behaviours may emerge. This can include a person having a desire to return to an area they may have grown up in, worked in or married and had children. The term "wandering" has always been used in the past, but has been replaced with "walking with purpose". The reason being, the person dependent on where they are in their dementia journey, will know in their mind where they want to go and why they want to go there. It may not seem rational to us, but for them it is a deep routed desire (their purpose). As you can imagine this can increase vulnerability for tha person. It can happen at any time of the day but may also emerge along with other signs of agitation or anxiety, during the sundowning period. NB behaviours may also change due to health care needs to (urinary tract infection UTI or change in medication, other infection or pain), and may require health care intervention.

Carers and families can sometimes feel overwhelmed by this transition, and a reassessment of care needs may be required. As the evenings draw in, and living in a relatively isolated area, with

other hazards including unlit paths, roads and the rifes, we need to be mindful of additional measures that may be needed. Some well-intended measures may increase risk to that person, such as locking a loved one in the property.

The Herbert Protocol (HP) gives to write down any areas of significance, with a photo of the person and stored with the care plan or saved on the computer for easy access. People need to



be able to guickly locate this. The police/community warden, only need it in the event of the person going missing. This will then be shared with other agencies to ensure a quick response and limit the risk. This month's 'Focus On....' Section says hello to Paul Sadler, our Environmental Educator. Grow Selsey is a project aimed at encouraging local people to get involved in community food growing and looking after their gardens to benefit wildlife. This idea was

developed by Paul who started our community garden, The Hidden Garden, in the winter of 2019 with the help of a group of fantastic volunteers.

The Hidden Garden is based at The Bridge Support Centre (behind Selsey Library) and is designed to encourage people to become involved with growing fruit, vegetables, herbs and flowers along with providing a beautiful space for wildlife to thrive. The garden is open has a little time to volunteer with us. We seeds, plants and gardening equipment



throughout the year and we have a variety of plants available for a donation. The Hidden Garden is open on Tuesday and Thursday between 10am and 4pm and Saturday from 10am until 2pm.

As part of **Grow Selsey**, Paul runs regular environmental gardening activities for young people throughout the year including holiday and after school gardening clubs along with working with several adults in Selsey who have learning disabilities, giving them a space in the garden each week. Opportunities have also been provided to young people



completing their Duke of Edinburgh Awards and youth groups such as the Brownies.

Produce from The Hidden Garden is shared with volunteers and members of the community who visit the garden as part of **Selsey** Community Forum activities. We recently provided all the ingredients for a meal to feed 40 people at the Together Time Thursday gathering in the Methodist Church Hall.

Through the enthusiasm of some of our volunteers, we successfully entered for the second year the



Chichester Allotments and Gardens Summer Show and came away with the winning Trophy for our produce.

We run many different events throughout the year including an annual Seed and Plant Swap in March, taking part in Selsey Open Gardens and being part of the National Garden Scheme Open Gardens events.

A new Grow Selsey project we have started this year is the Abundance Fruit Project. Abundance is about helping local people with fruit trees they either struggle to harvest or cannot use the fruit. We will harvest the fruit, leave some for the owners and then distribute the rest to people in Selsey who would like to use it. Please let us know if you would like our help.

New projects for this coming year will be establishing a Forest **School** to provide environmental learning opportunities for all ages and an exciting arts project using natural materials to create shelter, screens and hidden creatures!

Grow Selsey would like to hear from local people if you have ideas for community food growing projects in your part of Selsey and we would like to help match anyone looking for a growing space with anyone with garden space to share.







INSIDE THE WILDLIFE HOSPITAL IN OCTOBER HALLOWEEN SPECIAL! As October is upon us, we thought we'd focus on beautiful bats in this month's issue. Bats are fascinating creatures that use echolocation to navigate and hunt in the dark. Their

main diet is insects and some, like the tiny pipistrelle bat, can eat up to 3,000 insects in one night!

Did you know that bats usually only have one baby each year? And they can live for up to 30 years! Bat pups can weigh around a third of an adult bat's total weight and they often cling to their mother's underbelly whilst she's in flight - what a super strong bat mum! Did you also know that bats are technically more closely related to humans than they are to mice? Who knew!

PATIENT STORIES

We had a little 2-3 day old pipistrelle bat brought into us when she was only 1.2g and no bigger than a 2p coin!

We consulted with our bat specialist at the Sussex Bat Group and after 24 hours initial care with us, we transported her over to them for ongoing specialist 1-1 rehabilitation. She is doing great, is feeding well and has made friends with two other pip bats. We are hopeful that her tiny body will continue to recover and she can be released back into



the wild soon. Thank you to the finder and the Sussex Bat Group for their support, it was a real pleasure to be a part of this little bat's rehabilitation journey.



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

Harvest Thanksgiving Service at the start of October was a wonderful occasion to be 'Thankful' to God, as our creator and creator of this wonderful earth that provides for all our needs, as well as gratitude to those who work in the food supply chain.

We were thankful not only for the various crops that have been harvested successfully and contribute to our weekly shopping basket in some form, but we also used the occasion to give thanks to God for positive things that had happened to us, and healings, but it is true that not everyone feels they have something to be thankful for.



The Christian manual for life (The Bible), very clearly tells us (Thessalonians 5:16-18) to 'Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus'. A tough call.

Now how can I be thankful as well in times of trouble? It's a common question, and a quick online search will give you millions of answers. We can also get some ideas from a few people in the Bible who were thankful despite their somewhat challenging circumstances.

Take Jonah for example. He was a rebel against God, so God had him swallowed by a big fish. Can you imagine the stench - I am not sure how thankful he was to be in that stomach! Yet it took stubborn Jonah three whole days and nights to repent of his sin. Deep in that dark belly, hungry and humbled, Jonah prayed to God "with the voice of thanksgiving (Jonah 2:9a)" even though he didn't know God would command the fish to-ahem-"release" Jonah.

Then another example from the Bible was of Daniel, who in his youth was taken from his home and held captive in a foreign country where they made a law forbidding the worship of God. But Daniel was faithful, and even though he knew he was risking his life, he prayed and thanked God three times a day, just as he'd always done (Daniel 6:10).

Currently at Beacon Church, we are looking at the New Testament part of the Bible and here we have the apostle Paul, who as a prisoner under Roman guard, was on a ship with his captors when a violent storm overtook them. The men didn't eat for two whole weeks as the ship was tossed around the raging sea. When they'd given up all hope of being saved, Paul thanked God for what they believed would be their last meal—a small remnant of bread.

Do we think Jonah thankful that he was living inside a fish? Was Daniel thankful to be captive in a land where his faith put his life in danger? Was Paul thankful for starvation and stormy seas? No. no. and no.



These three men didn't thank God 'for' their circumstances; they thanked God 'in' their circumstances. Jonah thanked God because he knew God was his Saviour. Daniel had developed an unwavering discipline of thanking God for His character (Daniel 2:2-9). And Paul thanked God for His provision of their "last" meal.

The God who was worthy of Jonah's thanks, Daniel's thanks, and Paul's thanks is still worthy of thanks today. We can thank Him for who He is even if we're not thankful for the situation we're in. If you feel you are not able to thank Him, the reach out to Him in prayer - tell Him honestly how you feel and ask Him to bring you help. Rest assured; all the prayers of your heart are heard by our Godly Father. If you want someone to talk to, or pray for you, then please contact the church or call in.




