




A willing and dedicated volunteer is required to take over the running and full organisation of L.I.N.C.



#### **THE GALES OF DECEMBER 1929**

1929 started fairly predictably in Selsey. Mine Host of the Fisherman's Joy advertised for a married couple to live in and act as handyman and cook, an aeroplane from Tangmere crashed into the water near Church Norton, The Hon. Mrs Melville Portal mislaid her hat box containing furs worth £150 all because she hadn't removed her old Selsey address label after her stay in the summer of 1928 and the Selsey Tram was labelled a 'death trap' as at various points the tram crossed the Selsey Road.

Of greater import was the report from the Hampshire Telegraph of 1 March announcing that Selsey's Old Galley Boat was to be broken up for firewood.



Alas! The inevitable ending has come. That Gallant old galley-boat, The Queen, which has given an air of romance to the Fishermen's Beach at Selsey for so many years, is to be broken up for Its twenty-one cars have already gone. Its fate was decreed by the owners last week, after a brief consultation. Visitors to this most interesting part of Selsey will miss the sight of that quaint tessellated old craft, lying on the edge of the cliff, and the children will regret the passing of their favourite playground.

The remainder of the article is as follows: 'The Queen' was the remaining one of the two galley boats which the fishermen in past times relied upon for their living during the winter months. About 20 fishermen had shares in her, and before the advent of the lifeboat, they could generally depend upon two or three stranded vessels to bring them in quite a considerable amount of salvage money.

She was 40 feet long, and was pulled by 21 oars. Previous to the existence of the lifeboat she always carried two Trinity House pilots, who claimed double shares.

Many and thrilling are stories of the adventures of these galleys, given by the older fishermen. One especially remembered event was when the galley developed a huge split about four miles from shore, and the crew hastily tore of their 'monkey' jackets and stuffed them in the crack, then took off their sea boots and bailed out the water with them so kept her afloat until they reached the beach. The boat was given the name of 'The Queen' after the rescue of the Brighton passenger boat, called 'the Queen' which grounded on the outer shoals in August, 1906, and a race ensued between the lifeboat and the galley to the aid of the stranded vessel. The galley reached her first, and placed a pilot on deck, much to the relief of the terror-stricken passengers: then the lifeboat took off the passengers the next morning

The launching of the galley was guite an exciting business, twenty to thirty of the fishermen running and pushing the long frail-looking craft down the beach and the crew wading well out to sea and jumping in whilst she was moving off. Years ago when the fishery could boast of 80 to 90 fishermen a regatta was held every year, and the principal race of the day was that between the two galley boats. The fishery has now dwindled to between twenty and thirty fishermen."

But this peaceful state of affairs was not to last.

According to the website: https://premium. weatherweb.net/weather-in-history-1900-to-1949-ad:

'December 1929 was a month of excessive RAINFALL and repeated or persistent GALES. The GALES were associated with the frequent passage of depressions and secondary depressions. They were felt most severely in coastal districts of the south and west of England & Wales and the south of Ireland, particularly between the 5th & 7th but again on the 12th and from the 20th to the 29th. On the morning of the 5th, Pendennis Castle (Cornwall) recorded an hourly mean WIND of 61 kn. The strongest GUSTS

were reported in the Isles of Scilly (96 kn) and Falmouth (89 kn), both on the 7th. [HS/23]'

I can do no better than to quote the Chichester Observer & West Sussex Recorder dated 11 December 1929:

#### **'SELSEY AND DISTRICT**

Great anxiety was felt for the crew of the Selsey lifeboat when it became known that they had received a call at 10 pm on Friday evening and had gone out in what experienced fisherman considered to be the worst seas they had ever known. One of the crew was acting as MC at a dance when the summons came and dashing down to the station he put his oilskins over his evening dress suit and took his place in the boat.

The Hungarian vessel, 'Honved' had signalled that she was in distress and drifting towards Littlehampton. The Shoreham lifeboat also put out. The Selsey craft – which is a handsome motor-driven one that has been given to the Institution by the Canadian Pacific Railway, a fact that the Prince of Wales commented upon recently - maintained her search in spite of blinding rain, almost impenetrable gloom, and tremendous seas, and it is understood that they had nearly drawn up to the vessel believed to be the 'Honved', when that craft caught the wind and made away faster than the lifeboat could follow, until she vanished from sight. After some time the lifeboat returned. but, although she reached the station at about 3 am, she could not be moored until nearly 8 am, owing to the heavy seas, and so the weary and exhausted crew had to remain on board.

Coast Erosion Intensified

The Bill suffered tremendously, isolated as it is. For some time past erosion by the sea has assumed serious proportions, and the prolonged gale advanced matters to an alarming extent. Several yards of the picturesque Fisherman's Beach were swept away and all along the shore big inroads were made. There is already one house which is partially wrecked and overhanging the beach, and near the lifeboat slipway are two houses of comparatively recent build which, with the sea within a few feet of them, have already received much damage and are obviously doomed.

Many small huts and bungalows were overturned by the gale and one of the latter was completely destroyed, its contents being blown in all directions

Two of the huge trees in Selsey Churchyard crashed to the ground, one on either side of the War Memorial, which missed destruction by a very narrow margin.

On Saturday, the Bill was cut off from telephonic communication, poles and wires being down.

A chimney stack crashed through the roof of a house at Sidlesham.

On the Selsey-Chichester road, a Naval lorry went into the ditch and received much damage, but no one was hurt.'



The storm was so bad it even made the American Press! There must have been photos of the 1929 storm but they seem to be few and far between. One that did surface, however, was of the cypress trees at St Peter's Church.

On the left is the 'before' picture.

Coincidentally, I acquired a small book which just happened to tie in with the pictures

EXTRACT FROM By Christien Parolini 1914

SELSEY JOTTINGS FOR VISITORS Illustrated by M. Ball-Johnstone, NBA Printed by J W Moore, 39 East Street, Chichester

'These cupressus macrocarpa make an imposing avenue, though a short one, from the gate to the Church door. From the girth and height of these cypress one would take them to be very old; they are not so, having been planted as shrubs, for protection to the Church, when the latter was removed from its former site at Church Norton, two miles away. They are not loved by the authorities, their roots spreading and intruding where they should not, and taking unto themselves all the moisture from the ground.'

And, underneath, we have the 'after'. This second picture is a newspaper cutting which I bought online. The vendor told me he thought it came from The Illustrated Times Weekly Newspaper which was published every Friday and usually sent to ex-pats working abroad.



in their fall. Our picture shows the undamaged memorial with the fallen trees on either side.

At Ferry, a foot of water covered the road for some distance owing to the increase in the flooded areas, and a considerable portion of the metalled portion collapsed. Cars and a bus were held up for some time owing to engine trouble.




#### **SEAL ISLAND WI**



#### Selsey Matters Comment and opinion by Bryn Edgar

Do you ever get the feeling that your thoughts are being monitored and acted on before you've even expressed them? Am I paranoid, or simply "away with the fairies"? Should I be waiting for the men in white coats to come and collect me? I ask because I've been using this column (as promised) to comment on such varied matters as "Selsey's wildlife and environment", "policing locally and nationally", and last month "shops on our High St"; yet before each month's Selsey Life had even been published- let alone put out in the shops- those very subjects were being discussed and commented on in the press and on-line!

Obviously it's a complete coincidence; either that, or I really have "lost the plot" (as members of the Edgar family are frequently telling me!). No-one could possibly know what I am going to write each month- I rarely know myself exactly what my subject will be when I sit down at the keyboard to start the column. It must be "just one of those things"- a "senior moment" that's best forgotten, I suppose. Unless, of course, you know different.....!

OK; on to my mental meanderings for November. After my comments concerning the likely "take-up" of empty commercial premises in the town centre, I was delighted to see that at least two of the vacant premises were now open or about to re-open, and was encouraged to learn that businesses (in at least one instance) are trying to offer something other than the "same old, same old" offering we've seen too often in recent years. I wish both ventures well; it's good to see them- and even better to have something really innovative!

Whether it's a good thing to start any new business at the fag-end of the visitor season is debatable, and a matter for personal judgement; only time will tell if you've got it right. I've done both over the years, with mixed outcomes- so I'm certainly not the bloke to ask for advice on the matter! However, If you have a good business plan, and you've got your finances robust and prepared enough, then you should be all right; the problem is that while you may have allowed for the unexpected, you almost certainly won't have allowed for the once in a life-time disaster if and when it hits you! Best of luck to them, anyway.

It was also pleasing (but spooky!) to read in the Chichester Observer that (as I suggested they should in last month's article) members of CDC's Planning Committee have decided that planning policy for commercial premises need not be sacrosanct, as was previously the case. It now seems that if circumstances warrant it, planning policy can be regarded as guidance rather than as an unbreakable rule. I hope the same pragmatism will be extended (where appropriate) to Selsey when applications for change of use of commercial premises in the town come before the committee.

My attention was recently caught by a comment from "Mrs G" of the "Selsey Grapevine" who was "venting her spleen" (I love that phrase- it conjures up a wonderful picture of the 3 witches round their cauldron, casting evil spells on people who've hacked them off!) about things that really niggle her. This resonated with me, as there are so many things that infuriate me, as well- often to the point of near apoplexy! The trouble is there are so many things that totally p\*\*\* me off that it would take an entire issue of Selsey life to list them all- and there'd still be a few that I couldn't squeeze in!

Something that really winds me up is people who are late for appointments, or have a casual attitude to time keeping. I may have many faults (Mrs E keeps a long list of them, and reminds me of them quite frequently) but poor timekeeping isn't one of them. I'd rather arrive an hour early, and have to hang around until the appointed time than be late; it's the height of rudeness to my mind. I know things can go wrong, and we can all be delayed by problems beyond our control; but (particularly in these days of instant communication) is it really too much trouble to pick up a

mobile phone and let those waiting for you know that you will be late- and if you're going to be really late, ask if they would rather reschedule the meeting? After all, courtesy costs nothing.

Another pet hate is the way people mangle the English language these days; yes, I know I'm a bit pedantic when it comes to these things (a bit pedantic? I'm "King of the Pedants", according to my long suffering family), I also know that I'm a long way from perfect in this respect, and I don't always get it right- but I do at least try! (*True-you're very trying- Mrs E*). A particular hate is people who say "would of" or "should of" when they mean "would have" or "should have"; and why do so many use "your" when they mean "you are" or "you're"?

The newspapers- local and national- have a lot to answer for, as well; the standard of writing in so many newspapers is truly shameful; and it's much the same on radio and TV, especially in news bulletins. Even those newscasters who have become household names are often guilty of sloppy grammar- though that's probably because they are reading from badly written and hastily assembled auto-cue scripts!

"Does this really matter?" I hear you ask; well yes, I think it does. By misspelling a word, or using a word that sounds the same but means something different, the whole intent and meaning of the message that's being conveyed can be changed- and not always for the better.

OK, spleen duly vented, and rant over! Moving on, I've just realised that in the 2019 edition of a Local Business Directory (other business directories are available!) there are no less than 5 photos of the old offshore lifeboat boathouse. There's also a photo of the catwalk that led out to it; this has the caption "In memory of our Lifeboat Station". I'm sorry, but what's that all about? The Lifeboat Station hasn't gone away; it's still there, at the RNLI Lifeboat Compound in Kingsway. The old boathouses (both offshore and inshore) may have gone for good; but in case the photographer hasn't noticed they've been replaced by a brand new boathouse complex containing two brand new lifeboats, with proper crew facilities and a visitor centre- and a super new souvenir shop to replace the converted shipping container that was being used previously!

I know some people were very upset when the old boathouse was demolished; but it was never intended to be there for ever. It was designed in a different era (the early 1950s), and had an expected operational life of fifty years or so- in fact, it managed to last out for 56 years. By the time it was dismantled it was well past its "use by" date; it certainly didn't comply with current health and safety and work space regulations. For example, there were no separate changing rooms or other facilities for female crew members- in fact, there were no changing room or other facilities for anyone, full stop! There was just one lavatory stall that everyone had to use, with a single hand wash basin- which was used for everything from hand washing to housing all the lifeboat "wash-down" and cleaning equipment!

I also know that a lot of people became sentimentally attached to the old boathouse, and to some extent I can understand that- but we now have an exciting new and properly equipped boathouse with two brand new state-of-the-art-lifeboats in the RNLI compound. Most important of all, we have (as we have always had) a lifeboat crew and support team of dedicated volunteers- every one of them a member of our community. Let's celebrate that, and allow the old offshore boathouse to become just a pleasant but distant memory.

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#### Dear Selsey Life,

First and foremost I'd like to say how much I enjoy reading Mr Bryn Edgar's Comment and Opinion; it's very interesting to hear views about our town.

However, with respect to Mr Edgar's comments last month, the spirit of which I largely agree with, I think some clarification may be positive.

I sit on Planning at both Selsey Town Council and Chichester District and I can assure everyone that we take the health and vitality of our retail areas very seriously. When applications come in to STC they are looked at very carefully and we take our decision based on what we think is in the best interests of the town, taking into consideration the fact that any objection we make must be on material planning grounds, however, we can comment on any application. In the case of the Crab Pot, STC felt that as the old premises would be returned to retail and the new premises, being set back from the road, were ideal for the Crab Pot, we would not object. This application ended up with CDC's Planning Committee who also decided that it would be contrary to the health and vitality of the High Street to refuse permission. A new shop was actually ready and waiting to open up in the original premises. We are aware that there is a fine line to be drawn between protecting the potential for diverse retail offerings and encouraging foot fall.

Councils cannot dictate which sort of shops go onto our High Streets. We can seek to create the conditions which make our retail areas attractive to prospective traders as Mr Edgar points out, but we cannot force anyone to open any specific sort of establishment. Yes, there are designated retail areas but better to have a shop used than stay empty and fall into disrepair - that isn't good for anyone.

We have to use the Chichester District Local Plan to guide us when making decisions. This divides areas into, for example, residential, leisure, retail and employment. But, CDC Planning Committee can deviate from these designations if they consider that an alternative would be beneficial for the High Street. This is exactly what happened in the case of the Crab Pot. Officers will advise Committee members as to policy but Committee is at liberty, and often does, decide that flexibility is required in the interests of the area and community; committee is there to make these judgements and encourage diversity. The Local Plan is being reviewed and soon will be out for consultation, I would encourage everyone to have input into this and have your say with regards to policy.

I completely understand Mr Edgar's viewpoint but I would assert that there is already capacity for the flexibility he requires and which I would endorse.



#### Waxwing

#### Hold onto your berries

Once there was a time when people believed that the rare appearance of a flock of waxwings was an evil omen; a portent of disaster, war or pestilence. Well, if Armageddon is the price I have to pay for a glimpse of one of these beautiful birds - then bring it on.

Waxwings are dumpy, starling-sized birds which look like something from a Beryl Cook painting - all silky curves, coiffured crests and heavy makeup. Imagine an orangey-brown hand grenade wearing eye shadow and you're almost there. Add to it black, white and yellow wings jazzed up with a row of shiny, scarlet teardrops. These waxy red feather tips, which give the bird its name, are believed to be used in courtship; the biggest and best wing-bling belonging to the older males

Waxwings roam in gangs - you're more likely to see twelve than one. To be next to a berry-laden bush when a flock descends is akin to being sat in a quiet pub when a drunken hen party bursts through the door. Waxwings announce their arrival with high-pitched chattering and excited trills,

and greedily squabbleover berries as if they were fighting over half-price handbags in the January sales.

Waxwings love berries. They can eat their own bodyweight in just a few hours. Once this flock of feathered Pac-Men have chomped their way through one berry bush they fly off to ransack another. Their reliance on berries is the cause of their irregular migrations or 'irruptions'.

Every few years a failure in the berry crop in their eastern Scandinavian and northern Russian homeland sparks a winterlong, Europe-wide berry guzzling rampage which eventually leads them to our island. British 'waxwing winters' are by no means an annual event and we may go for years without seeing any waxwings in Sussex.

During some winters though, we hit the jackpot. At the start of November 2012 thousands of them arrived on the Northern Isles and throughout December the advancing waxwing tsunami surged south, binging on berries in Banff then Bolton then Birmingham then Bracknell. By mid-December they hit Sussex and flocks of the birds were reported all over the county. They're not fussy about where they dine; industrial estates, petrol station forecourts, parks and gardens - anywhere that can lay on a decent berry buffet. Out of town supermarkets have a habit of planting decorative berry bushes which attract waxwings. So look out for them over the coming weeks while you're shopping – you may find yourself an early Christmas present.

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## nature The state of our nature

Of 8431 UK species assessed, one in seven is at risk of extinction. This frightening statistic is just one of the startling and alarming, facts to come out of the 2019 State of Nature Report released last month.

The RSPB, Marine Conservation Society, World Wildlife Fund, Wildlife Trusts and Plantlife are among over 70 wildlife organisations, plus government agencies that have joined forces to pool data and expertise, giving the clearest picture to date of the status of our species.

Since rigorous scientific monitoring began in the 1970s, there has been a 13% decline in average abundance across wildlife studied and the declines are continuing unabated. The main causes are well documented - changes in the way we manage our land for agriculture, climate change, urbanisation, pollution, how we manage our woodlands and freshwater, invasive non-native species and overfishing.

Similarly, the solutions, both at government level and what we can do as individuals, have been much discussed and I make no apologies for also suggesting becoming a member and, or volunteering for one or more of the many wildlife charities that contributed to the report. The underlying message is clear. We as a species, are affecting the environment around us to detriment of the natural world, and only we can change this. Introducing our new Responder Nigel Allfrey

Nigel has very recently become operational, here is his experience to date ....


It takes an ambulance 18 minutes to get to Selsey from Chichester - if an ambulance is available and the single road isn't blocked.



On average it has taken me 8m12s from receiving an alert to being at the patient's address over the past month of calls. On each of the 20 calls I have received in that time. I have been there ahead of the ambulance, sometimes by 20 minutes. We also know that every minute over 4 minutes decreases a patient's chances of recovering fully from heart failure by 10%. If the brain can be kept oxygenated. 18 minutes is the accepted time to be able to restart a heart. So, we're looking at fine margins.

The geographical challenge of emergency access to the town as well as the reality of a large relatively elderly population is why I applied for the voluntary role of Community First Responder in Selsey. Before moving here I was a Samaritan for 5 years and was looking for something a little different when we came in 2017.

It's a role that requires commitment – a 5-day intensive training course is only one of the many steps that need to be passed to even start out on a 'mentored' time. As well as continuous professional development and team meetings, there's the time 'logged on' - at any moment being alerted by a text message to go to the help of a patient with only very limited information as to their state of health. The role is flexible in relation to when you 'log on' with a minimum amount of time required (which is not exacting) to deliver. Personally I have been able to be available for 110 hours



It is true that all calls are not an immediate danger to life, however being there with the equipment should things take a turn for the worse reassures patients and their worried families. On many occasions, taking observations enables stressed people to be calm and practical steps can make the wait endurable as well as making the ambulance crews' jobs easier when they arrive.

In Selsey we are really lucky in that the community really appreciates the CFR service. People contribute to the funds to enable us to have the best equipment as well as installing 'Public Access Defibrillators' all around the town (we are a charity and have to self-fund our activities). We also train as many people as possible how to use a defibrillator and to have the confidence to step IN when there's a crisis rather than walking away. The number of people who have said 'Thank goodness, a First Responder's here!' is wonderful appreciation of the work we do and definitely makes it worthwhile. Attending charity events, it's also heartening how many people willingly dive into their purses when they see our banners rather than steering around the stall!

We are also actively promoting the 'GoodSam' App through which people with some first aid training are alerted to emergency events in their immediate vicinity.

There is a gap, though....

We really want to be able to staff a 24/7 service in Selsev but that will take more volunteers to be trained up, so if you feel you have the energy, time and inclination to join our team and embark on a rewarding new venture with a huge learning curve or for more information about the Charity and how you help to support the Selsey Community First Responders go to:

#### 1/09/19 21:53

Team paged to support Sussex Police and Littlehampton Coastguard Team with a search for a missing person in Bognor, along with Selsey Inshore Lifeboat.

Two Coastguard Rescue search teams were deployed East and West along the beach.

Thankfully we located the missing person on the beach and provided casualty care until the police arrived; the casualty was then left in the care of Sussex Police.

All assets were then stood down returning to station at 00:12.

#### 03/09/19 15:01

#### Team paged to reports of an inflatable toy drifting out to sea off Pagham.

The team managed to get eyes on the Keep Inflatable inflatable toy which was now drifting off Dark Lane, Bognor; when we then had information from Selsey Lifeboat Station that a grandmother had just spoken to them, saying that her grandchildren had lost an inflatable toy that matched the same description.

The team were then stood down to return to station, knowing no one was on it and all persons were safely ashore.

Blow-up boats, lilos and toys are great fun in the swimming pool, but they're best avoided at the seaside. They can easily drift out to sea and you may not notice until you're a long way from shore and out of your depth.

If you do find yourself being swept out to sea, stay with your inflatable and shout for help, waving your arms if possible. Don't attempt to swim for shore if you are out of your depth.

#### 03/09/19 19:42

Team paged to Langstone Harbour, Mill Rithe Holiday Village, Hayling Island; to a person stuck in the mud right up to his waist.

Selsey Coastguard Team were paged with Hayling and Portsmouth Coastguard Rescue Teams to a person stuck in the mud in Langstone Harbour. Hampshire Fire Rescue, Hampshire Police and the HART Team were all on scene.

Portsmouth and Selsey Coastguard Mud Rescue Teams both deployed a mud technician on to the mud with a couple of Firefighters.

The mud team successfully extracted the casualty safely out of the mud and transferred him into our stretcher and brought him to dry land where he was assessed by the ambulance service.

Once the casualty was safe all assets were able to stand down.

This was a great Multi agency job with all assets working closely together to get the best outcome and for a safe rescue.

Information later came into our Operation Room that someone had lost their kayak earlier in the day which matched the details of the one that had been found.

All assets were stood down to return to stations.

We would like to thank Selsey Lifeboat Crew for their assistance this evening.

#### 16/09/19 09:20

Team paged to support Hampshire Police in Gosport with an incident.

We joined Portsmouth and Hillhead Coastguard Teams, Hampshire Search and Rescue. Hampshire Police, and various Lifeboats and other assets in a search.

#### 16/09/19 17:24

While still on the previous tasking the team were re-tasked to two casualties stuck on the mud in a vessel at Prinstead.

Selsey Mud Rescue Team deployed two mud technicians on to the mud and recovered the two casualties safely to shore.

The casualties were ok although scared and cold, but no medical assistance was needed.

We then recovered their vessel to prevent a further callout.

With the owner and the board accounted for and no medical assistance needed the team were stood down to return to station.







#### **Brent Lodge Briefing's**

Patients change constantly throughout the year and there is a pattern to our seasons at the

hospital. The spring and summer months bringing us young or orphaned babies whilst the autumn and winter brings us a huge number of hedgehogs too small to survive the winter and birds struggling to find enough food to cope. At the end of summer into autumn we use this time of year to release our last summer babies. We managed to release a large number of our animals to prepare for the next season of patients. We have released a lot of our garden birds, ducks, foxes and we have also started to release a large number of our healthy hedgehogs (despite still having so many on site). We also recently released 2 of our tawny owls to a local site where they will be closely monitored while they become aware of their surroundings.

Where possible we try to release rehabilitated wildlife back to where they were found as quickly as possible, as they may hold a territory in the area, or be part of a family group. Releasing wildlife back to the wild not only depends on when the animal is considered fit and healthy for release, but it also depends on the time of year. Our staff are trained to know what release site is most appropriate and sites are carefully chosen to

# In the Garden

our monthly guide to gardening - written by Giles Peare award winning broadcaster

Towards the end of this month growth in the main will cease. Dormancy starts and there is not a lot of brightness in the sky. Squirrels and Hedgehogs feast on nuts before winter starts.

Asters, Chrysanthemums, Escallonia, Michaelmas Daisies, and late flowering roses.

Elm and then the Oak and young Beeches which retain their withered leaves 'till pushed off by their new ones in spring.

At this time of the year we can have fresh winds and bright moonlit nights alternating with soft days and damp and hazy mists.

Take the time this month to witness the absolutely beautiful sunsets on a clear evening especially by the sea.

## Jobs for November

Provided the ground is not frozen or waterlogged, this is a good time to plant bare rooted Roses, Shrubs and Trees. Dig a substantial hole for each plant and work in well rotted manure or compost with some slow release fertilizer or bone meal to aid root establishment. Soaking the roots for an hour or so in a solution of organic seaweed fertilizer immediately before planting is beneficial. Ensure plants are set firmly in the ground at the original soil level.

Hard prune overgrown deciduous hedges using a pruning saw or loppers to cut through thick stems. To limit shock to the plant cut the top and only one side hard back and prune the other side next year. After trimming feed with slow- release phosphorous-rich fertilizer, such as sterilized bone meal.

Wrap all outdoor pipes and taps with protective lagging to help prevent them from freezing up, drain off and store hose pipes and bring automatic watering timers indoors and also water pumps.

Most gladioli are not fully hardy so corms can be killed by wet and cold conditions. Dig up the corms, clean off any soil and cut away the stems about 2" above the corms. Spread out in trays to dry out before removing the remaining stems. Store in dry frost free conditions.

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


