Selsey inshore lifeboat tows angling boat.

Uk Coastguard requested the Selsey RNLI inshore be launched after a report of a 13ft angling boat with 3 people aboard who were having trouble starting their engine.

The boat was reported to be 200m off the beach at the end of West Street Selsey. The inshore lifeboat (ILB) launched at 7.35pm with 3 volunteer crew and were quickly on scene at 7.40pm. A line was passed to the vessel and they recovered their anchor before the ILB towed them back to their moorings at East beach Selsey.



At 8.25pm the angling boat was secured to its moorings and the 3 people made their own way ashore and were met by the Selsey Coastguard team. The ILB returned to station at 8.30pm and was washed down refuelled and ready for service by 8.45pm.

The weather was Calm and very hot in sunshine and the crew today were Helmsman Will Moir, Andy Lee and Harry Emmence.

Uk Coastguard (Dover) paged the Selsey lifeboat crew at 11.18pm on Tuesday 20 June to search for a 22ft Yacht Merlin with two persons aboard which had called the Coastguards by mobile phone saying they had suffered machinery failure and their sail was jammed. The crew of the yacht believed their position was somewhere between Bognor and Pagham close inshore. The D-class inshore lifeboat (ILB) launched at 11.30pm and proceeded to the Pagham area to conduct a search and at 11.50pm they found the yacht almost in the surf line off Aldwick. A crewman from the ILB went aboard the Merlin and a tow was quickly established between the ILB and the Merlin and the yacht was towed out of danger into clear water. The weather on scene was wind calm sea state smooth in

clear skies

The Merlin was on passage from Rye Harbour to Portsmouth and had no radio, flares or lifejackets. The ILB continued towing the vessel to the south and at 12.06am requested the all-weather (ALB) lifeboat to take over the tow to Sparkes marina in Chichester Harbour. The ALB left the moorings at 12.20am and rendezvoused with the ILB at 12.34am. The ILB dropped the tow and a tow was established between the ALB and the Merlin before the ILB exchanged their crewman for one from the ALB. The ILB returned to station at 1.15am and was rehoused and made ready for service at 1.30am.

The ALB continued towing the Merlin to Chichester Harbour arriving at the entrance at 3.00am .The Merlin was safely berthed alongside in Sparkes marina at 3.10am before the ALB departed at 3.15am to return to Selsey arriving at the moorings at 4.00am and was ready for service at 4.15am.

Selsey RNLI lifeboat responds to distress call

The all-weather lifeboat (ALB) at Selsey had been requested by the UK (Solent) Coastguards after they received an emergency call from the crew of the 10m yacht *Mandrella* reporting that they had water ingress and their bilge pumps had failed.

The Mandrella had two persons aboard and gave their position as 2 miles South of Selsey Bill. The ALB slipped the moorings at 9.53pm on Monday 26 June and made best speed to the position. The angling boat Sarah Jane had responded to the emergency call and was alongside the yacht when

the ALB arrived on scene at 22.05pm.

The weather on scene was wind South East force 3-4 sea state moderate in clear skies. The *Sarah Jane* moved away from the yacht and was released to continue their passage with thanks. The ALB transferred the 2nd Coxswain to the yacht to assess the



ingress. After checking the water level and speaking with the skipper of the *Mandrella* the 2nd Coxswain reported that the salvage pump would not be needed as the water ingress seemed stable but the vessel required a tow to safety.

The 2nd Coxswain remained aboard the yacht to assist with establishing a tow between the lifeboat and the yacht. At 22.30pm the tow commenced towards Chichester harbour. The entrance to the harbour was reached at 12.30am and at 12.55am the *Mandrell* was safely berthed alongside at Sparkes marina.

The ALB departed Sparkes marina at 1.05am to return to Selsey. A 2.10am the lifeboat was secured on the moorings. The crew tonight were Coxswain Martin Rudwick, 2nd Coxswain Colin Pullenger, Mechanic Phil Pitham, Max Gilligan, Dave Lamdin, Craig Sergeant, Andy Lee and Harry Emmence.

The Selsey ALB slipped her moorings at 11.57pm on Sunday 2 July



with a crew of seven volunteers aboard. At 12.25am the ALB was on scene in a position four miles south west of Selsey Bill and started an Expanding box search. The weather on scene was wind south westerly force 3-4 sea state slight visibility good.

Selsey inshore lifeboat launches twice to guard torpedo and rescue swimmer

UK Coastguard (Solent) paged the Selsey RNLI volunteer crew at 7.46am on Thursday 5 July. The commercial fishing vessel Jenny D had found what they described as a type of torpedo four miles south of Selsey Bill. The



Coastguard had been in contact with the Royal Navy E.O.D (Explosive Ordnance Disposal) who was mustering a team to recover the item.



The inshore lifeboat (ILB) was requested to act as a guard vessel and monitor the object until the arrival of the E.O.D. releasing the fishing boat. The ILB launched at 8.03am and headed to the position arriving at 8.30am. The weather

on scene was Calm

Sea in bright sunshine with good visibility. When the E.O.D arrived at 11.00am they confirmed the item



was a training device .The ILB departed the scene and returned to

station at 11.50am. The crew of the ILB were

The second call came at 9.54pm when the UK Coastguard paged for the immediate launch of the ILB.

They had reports of a person in the sea off Hillfield Rd Selsey. The ILB launched at 10.01pm and made best speed to the casualty and quickly located the person with the help of Selsey Coastguard team.

The person was recovered to the ILB and taken ashore to the CG team who cared for the person until the arrival of an ambulance. The weather was a calm warm night with good visibility. At 10.09pm the ILB departed the scene and returned to the station at 10.14pm and was washed down and made ready for service again by 10.30pm. The crew tonight were Helmsman Colin Pullenger, Will Moir and Harry Emmence.

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Bringing Selsey Pavilion back to life

A historic theatre and cinema in Selsey has been awarded a grant to help restore it to its former glory. Selsey Pavilion on the High Street was built in 1913, but has fallen into disrepair since closing its doors to the public in the 1960s. It will receive £35,000 from Selsey Town Council's Community Fund. This is the first milestone in a proposed restoration programme spearheaded by Selsey Pavilion Trust.

The trustees plan to revitalise the Pavilion as a modern multi-functional space. Trustee and local resident Neil Kimber says, 'The Pavilion is part of Selsey's cultural heritage. There's a real sense of community with local people, but with the arrival of Asda, we're keen to keep the High Street as a community hub.'

Plans involve restoring the Pavilion so the people of Selsey can enjoy and take pride in it. The trustees are aiming for the venue to be an asset to Selsey. Some of the original features have been retained, and a time capsule has been unearthed dating back to the 1930s.

Selsey Pavilion Trust has a Facebook page, and a website is in production. Both will give updates as the project progresses.

MEMORY OF AN INCIDENT

It was a day in September, or was it October? I had been sent home from Selsey because The Battle of Britain was getting dangerous. I was fifteen and enjoying it. But it was home again, and unfortunately just in time for the London Blitz! You can work out the dates for yourselves.

There had been an air raid on the south parts of London, and Chessington, in Surbiton, had had its small share.

Standing in a side-street, just off the Hook Road, near The North Star pub, opposite the recreation ground, a small crowd was watching a smaller crowd of soldiers digging in a garden. People were leaning on the low garden fence, watching. There was a pick-up truck parked by a damaged house, and an unexploded German bomb being lifted out of the ground. It was marked 50K. We youngsters knew about these things, that it weighed about a hundredweight.

A muscular sergeant picked it up and threw it onto the back of the truck, where it rolled about. The Army men climbed aboard; the sergeant sat on the bomb, perhaps to stop it rolling off the back of the truck. The truck drove away.

> The crowd was quiet. Somebody coughed. A few murmured. We walked away. It was nearly teatime.

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Calling all long term residents of Selsey – here is your chance to shine!

As you doubtless know, a car was driven into the office window on the corner of East Street, opposite the Crown Pub. On discussing this with a local I discovered that this wasn't the first time it had happened and the excuse was the same both times, as was the cause of the accident, despite the accidents being decades apart.



So here is the office as we currently see it and, of course, being the curious soul I am, I wondered what else had been on this same site.

As you can see, there is no shop at all on this postcard of 1910.

It is addressed to Miss H Pullen, 4 Highton Terrace, Elizabeth Road, Worthing and reads as follows:

'DD – Very many thanks for your letter and also for the songs. It was very kind of you to copy them out for me. Glad to hear such good news of my Dad. Weather very dull here but warm. Glad you liked Card, this one is a view of the Village where my Dad and I had a shop. near Chichester. Love to all and vourself EHP'



The only Pullen I can find is someone connected to the Selsey Hotel which can hardly be called a shop. Does anyone recall their parents or grandparents talking about a father and son with a shop in Selsey? It's tempting to think their name is Pullen too but, of course, that doesn't have to be the case.

On 27 October 1920, one Joseph Gale found himself in the Observer and West Sussex Recorder.

Without Dog Collar.

Joseph Gale, Selsey, was fined 5s. for allowing a dog on the highway without a collar bearing the name and address of the owner, and also 5s. for being the owner of a dog not under effective control. on October 6th.

There is no knowing whether or not this is Joseph the chemist but a later newspaper cutting indicates that he had been in Selsey for many years and had been a practising chemist for something like 20 years, so it seems likely that this is he.

In 1930 Joseph was still in Selsey and here is his advert from the Observer and West Sussex Recorder of 30 July 1930. He also appears in Kelly's Directory for that year.

We know that he occupied the same shop as the next chemist even though I have no photograph of Joseph's establishment as they both have the telephone number Selsey 49.

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By 1931 H Schofield had become Selsey's chemist as his advertisement in the Observer and West Sussex Recorder of 13 May of that year proves. He did, however, take pains to ensure that the residents of Selsey knew where to find him by stating the hierarchy of ownership in the top left hand corner and remained here through 1933 and 1934 as he appears in Kelly's Directory. It is uncertain exactly when Mr Schofield departed.



Around 1936, Woodlands the Chemist was established in West Wittering and also opened a branch in Selsey.

The pole with the word 'Chemist' hanging from it enabled some likely lads to play a trick on one of their number by hanging his brand new Raleigh bicycle on it while he was taking some refreshment. He, of course, thought it had been stolen but, eventually, they took pity on him and showed him where it was. He started to climb up a wooden ladder to retrieve it only to be unceremoniously dumped in the middle of the High Street as the rungs broke. Thankfully he was only three or four rungs from the ground but you can imagine the mirth that ensued.

The gentleman about to step off the pavement on the left hand side is Toby Lee, so Tania Savitsky tells me.

The Chemists sold everything you could possibly want - Cremolia Sun Cream for Face and Hands, Aerated Waters in Siphons, Brushes, Soaps Sponges, etc. All at Store Prices.

It is difficult to try and reconstruct the exact time frame for these various enterprises but Freda Walker was certainly in Selsey in 1942 as her house, Homelands in Peachey Road was very close to houses which were bombed on 3 September.

On 7 December 1946, in the Chichester Observer, Freda advertised:

Freda Walker

Exclusive Gowns by expert Court Dressmaker, late of Bradleys and Jays. Clients' own material made up from 4 guineas. Weddings a Speciality. Millinery remodelled from 30/-.



And by 11 January 1947 she was looking for help: 'EXPERIENCED dressmakers required, also out-knitters; high grade work. - Apply, Freda Walker, High Street, Selsey.'

On 18th September 1948 Freda had organised 'at the Marine Hotel... another Manneguin Parade'. Apparently, it was a crowded house.



The last advert I can find for Freda was as follows and dates from 17 September 1949.



Admission by ticket, Apply-FREDA WALKER, High Street, SELSEY. There was something new for Xmas on 20 November 1948.

It is thought that the white car on the right-hand side is a Vauxhall Cresta and that it belonged to Freda. The registration number is 7005 BP.



Where did Freda go? There is a Freda Walker in Motherwell, Lanarkshire, Scotland from 1953 onwards following much the same line of business with her speciality being Gor-Ray Skirts. The last entry for this Freda is 8 March 1957. Did you know Freda? Did she go to Scotland?

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BOB HOARE, PHOTOGRAPHER EXTRAORDINAIRE - OR NOT!

The official date that photography became commercial was 1839, although it had been experimented with before that. And, just for those who know me, I wasn't around then. I was actually born in 1942 and was introduced to the camera as a young lad.

Dad, whilst in the RAF during and after WW11, purchased a Voigtlander 35mm bellows camera from Germany. I was allowed to use it whilst holidaying in Brightlingsea, and it was pretty obvious from the start that I was a natural. I actually managed to include heads of my subjects in some of my pictures – a sure sign of my genius. To further my photographic career I decided to invest in my own camera. I went for a top of the range Brownie box camera, the first rung on my ladder to success. I have to admit at this point that this was not only the cheapest camera on the market, but also the most basic. However, someone must have felt that it had some value because it was stolen from me whilst returning from a holiday in 1963 with my pregnant wife, or soon to be my wife -how did that happen? On that camera was all 12 of my outstanding, (I expect), holiday snaps.

Marcus, my first son, was born in March 1964 and, at the time, I was not in possession of a camera. Luckily, a friend lent me one, allowing me to capture those all important early memories. Having a little baby and an attractive wife is a great incentive to further one's photographic ambitions, so I bought a Russian Cosmic 35 for the princely sum of £6. With the improvement of my photographic skills it exposed the limitations of my Russian gem. However, after much scrimping and saving I was able to invest in a Zenith E - now I was on my way! That's about the time my bathroom acquired a double function, it became a dark room for developing my own photographs – I definitely had arrived! I enjoyed taking photographs but there was very little variety in my masterpieces. Just the family or holiday snaps, when we were able to afford a holiday.

For a period from 1969 to 1974, my wife, Val, had a lot of success as a beauty queen; more reasons to exploit the camera. For a while I joined a camera club due mainly to the fact that Val was modelling for them, not, I have to reluctantly admit, because of my photographic skills. Over the years I have had several cameras, improving every time until, just prior to the digital era, my final film camera was a Minolta Dynax 7, with interchangeable lenses. Then it was on to digital, and because of the lenses I possessed, I started with yet another Minolta. Minolta was taken over by Sony, so my next camera was a Sony. By this time, changes in my life dictated the path I was to

Joining the club has made a big difference to my photography, I have actually learnt how to use my camera. I have also expanded my subject matter, due mainly to the variety of the club competitions. However, entering club competitions has not brought me the expected success. The judges still seem to have difficulty in appreciating my artistic ability, (I was a caricaturist for 50 years), how can they not realise that blur and out-of-focus is intentional. And, could it also be that they are not interested in pictures of a little girl growing up or photos of the local cricket ground, (I will have to try including players in my pictures – that might work!).

Having now moved into the realms of serious photography, that is serious to me, I became a Canon camera owner because that seemed to be what proper photographers were using, (or Nikon perhaps). Nowadays, my bathroom no longer has a dual purpose, all my processing is done on my computer. I don't have to rely on

others to mess up my photos, I'm quite capable of doing that myself. Nevertheless I will continue to plod on, blissfully unaware of the true quality of my photographs, and in my own little bubble, which is where Tig and Kyra think I am, and where I am obviously comfortable. I live in my Victorian bungalow with Tig and Kyra, and I have been there since 1992. I am still with the Selsey Camera Club where new members would be warmly welcomed.


Our latest two meetings have included our Print and PDI images of the year, and following our AGM we displayed our Panel boards. The Panel boards contain images which are related or tell a story.

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Vehicle crime

We'd like to take this opportunity to highlight some important car crime prevention tips.

The majority of this type of crime is opportunistic, and occurs because valuables have been left on view or the vehicle left insecure. If a vehicle is left insecure it only takes 10 seconds for your valuables to be stolen. Close your windows and sunroof, lock all doors and activate any security devices when leaving the vehicle even for a few minutes. Check your doors manually as automatic locking devices can sometimes be affected by electronic interference.

- Take all valuables including sunglasses with you if you can. If you are unable to take them from the vehicle, lock them in the boot or place them out of view.
- Remove parking permits, radio face plates and portable satellite navigation systems including their cradle ensuring to wipe the window where the satellite navigation holder may have left a visible mark.
- Consider getting a steering lock or gearstick lock and pedal box to improve security of your unattended vehicle.
- Park with care, particularly at night or if you are leaving the vehicle for some time. If possible always park in a busy, well
- Never leave your keys in the vehicle, even if you are just leaving it for a few seconds. Try to avoid leaving car keys close to your front door or in a visible location. A thief can reach in using a hand or device and steal the keys to your vehicle. Fitting a plate to the rear of the letterbox opening can
- If a vehicle is left insecure it only take 10 seconds for your valuables to be stolen.

Advice for van owners

- If you are staying in a hotel, where possible remove your tools from your van and keep them in your room overnight.
- Don't assume your vehicle has locked properly using a key fob lock. Criminals can use devices which block the signal. Always check your doors are locked before leaving your vehicle unattended.
- Consider alarming the vehicle or fitting an internal security cage when tools and equipment are not being used, ensure they are kept securely in a lockable store rather than in your vehicle.
- Consider whether the storage area can be alarmed. If the equipment is portable, take it with you.
- Don't leave tools in vehicles unattended or overnight, and place a sign in the window stating they have been removed.
- Lock/immobilise vehicles and equipment when not in use.
- Visibly mark your machinery and tools using an engraving or chemical etching kit or use a forensic marking kit. Place a sticker in your window to say you have done so - the signage alone, can be a very effective deterrent.
- Keep a list of tools, together with serial numbers and any identifying marks. You can do this at www.immobilise.com. This will help to trace them back to you if they are recovered.

Butterflies sunbathe and flit across the meadows chasing after mates as beetles scurry hurriedly across the paths. Dragonflies patrol their ponds in a flash of colour, while their more delicate cousins the damselflies pair up daintily in flight. The air hums with the continuous buzz of bees





grasshoppers and crickets chirruping from the sun-bleached grassland, adding to the natural rhythm of the season. The lazy summer days are an ideal time to grab a picnic and relax on our reserves of RSPB Pagham Harbour & Medmerry. It's one of the best times to go bug hunting and

we have a full family programme of organised activities that also includes pond-dipping and mud-sifting, as well as other self-led fun ways to experience the outdoors. For details on all our events check out our website www.rspb.org.uk/paghamharbour or pick up a leaflet from our Visitor Centre on the B2145 between Selsey and

As the season moves on our terns will have nearly all fledged and the whole colony will start to leave for their wintering grounds. Summer migrants begin to move through our reserves as they embark on their journeys south, making August and September a great time for the bird watcher as you never know what might turn up. Common sandpipers have already been seen habitually bobbing along the water's edge and whinchats can be found

perched on bushes and wires. The Severals at Church Norton traditionally turn up a wryneck or two. These small sparrow sized woodpeckers are superbly camouflaged with grey, brown and buff mottling and none of the bright colours associated with our resident woodpeckers.

They are often seen hopping on the ground feeding on ants, grasshoppers and other insects. Little stints, as the name suggests

are tiny waders and along with sandpipers can be found on Breech Pool, Ferry Pool and the Stilt Pools. Ospreys are also one the move. These spectacular fish-eating birds of prev can be seen fishing in both Pagham Harbour and Medmerry reserves before crossing the Channel. Flying above the water they target their quarry before folding up their wings and hurtling into the



water, legs outstretched to grab their prey. Once airborne again it carries the fish, head first to limit air resistance, off to a guiet place to eat.

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

Marsh Frogs: Laughing all the way to the riverbank by Michael Blencowe of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

A summer evening stroll past the damper areas in the east of our county is not for the paranoid or insecure. You could be mistaken for thinking that the very marshes, ditches and ponds are mocking you as an incredible quacking, cackling chorus fills the air growing more and more hysterical. This is the song of the marsh frog.

The frogs, hidden from sight, inflate two vocal sacs making them look like they are blowing bubble-gum out of their ears. Guttural guffaws are amplified by these sacs and broadcast. Their loud laughter is contagious. Once one frog



proudly proclaims his place in the pond with a raucous whoa-aa-aa-aa his neighbour is compelled to respond and soon the entire marsh is whoaaa-aa-aa-ing like a bawdy

comedy night at a working man's club. Holding the title of Europe's largest frog the marsh frog is 50% bigger than Britain's native common frogs. Full grown adults are a reassuringly Kermit-like green.

Unlike our native frogs they never stray too far from water. Marsh frogs are either in it, on it or sat close to it. They are alert and wary and, as you approach, these acrobatic amphibians will launch themselves into the air and belly flop with a plop into the water. But sit still by the water's edge and inquisitive

bulging eyes will soon reappear at the surface. Their wariness is warranted. Herons, earets and grass snakes prowl the ditches hoping for a frog in their throat.

Marsh frogs are only found in a few places in

Britain and East Sussex is a hot spot for this cold-blooded animal. But they shouldn't be here. These green-skinned aliens have been introduced by man. Or, to be more precise, Mr E.P Smith of Stone-in-Oxney, Kent. Mr Smith, Conservative MP for Ashford, seems to have had

a very tolerant and progressive view towards immigration and released twelve of these Hungarian marsh frogs into his garden pond in 1935. It wasn't long before the warty dozen had multiplied and, by the 1960s, all of neighbouring Romney Marsh rang with the sound of laughter.

From there it was just a short hop into Sussex and over the decades the march of the marsh frog has continued, sometimes 'helpfully' assisted by humans. One Sussex herpetologist, in order to study them closer, moved some marsh frogs one Friday afternoon from Lewes to his suburban Burgess Hill garden pond. On Monday morning he was served a noise abatement order by the council. They don't tolerate laughter in Burgess Hill. Marsh frogs will also respond to human laughter so, if you fancy a laugh, head to the marshes. Smile and the world smiles with you. Laugh and a marsh frog laughs at you.

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

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

Suguru puzzles are quite different than Sudoku, so you'll want to read these rules carefully: You'll see that the grid is subdivided into containers or cages, each of which is 1 to 5 cells in size. You need to fill each container with unique digits, counting up from 1. So for example a 2-square container contains the numbers 1 and 2. A 5-square container contains the numbers from 1 to 5.

Adjacent (touching) cells may never contain the same number, and this includes diagonally adjacent cells. That's it!

DONNA'S DELIBERATIONS

Christmas goodies start appearing in the shops. (Thought I'd get the bad news out of the way first!) I don't intend to dwell on that -I'll just leave it there.

So, I have to say we're having a pretty good summer, infact I understand that the few excessively hot days we had at the end of June were pretty similar to the temperatures we 'enjoyed' during the heat wave of 1976. It was actually my 'O' level year and how I managed to pass anything at all is total mystery to me.

Heat and I don't get on – infact we have a very volitile relationship. I dislike heat with a passion and heat appears to dislike me just as much. I only have to be in heat's company for ten minutes and my face will start to resemble a beetroot however much factor 50 I apply. Whilst my family goes a healthy shade of brown, I just end up with skin resembling neopolitan ice cream; minimal chocolate (brown) a bit of strawberry (red) with plenty of vanilla (white.) I would rather become nocturnal during the summer and I'm really not joking.

For the first couple of weeks of July my daughter's friends from Spain came over to visit, which is always good fun. When I was teaching English as a Foreign Language (brilliant 'job' but totally exhausting) I taught their parents and the girls all became firm riends. While they were here, we got to chatting about stereotypes and whether or not there is any truth to the rather widely held and fixed ideas we have about other nationalities. To be honest, I'd have to say I think there is - the ideas may be a bit over simplified, sometimes even rather crude assumptions, but there is an element

of truth in them....maybe? I've taught pretty much every nationality and my students have been lovely, but it's true that I learnt, broadly, to expect certain things from certain nationalities. For example, I knew that my Northern European students would be up and ready to work by the dot of 9am, in total contrast with students from Southern Europe who would invariably prefer a later start so, I was interested to hear what Spanish nationals think our view of them actually is. This is what my daughter's friend said: 'People from England think that we don't work, we're always on the beach, having fun or sleeping. We complain about the economic crisis but do nothing about it (presumably because we're too busy sleeping on the beach). We like to kill bulls and we only eat ham and paella!' To be fair, they did find that rather funny. On the one hand, it might be quite amusing but it's also a little shocking, I thought – do they really think we believe things are that simple?

The next obvious question, of course, was what do the Spanish think of us. the Brits? This was a slightly scary question to ask. In order to get a broader view there was a fair amount of texting going on with one of my Spanish guests garnering opinions from her friends and parents. Apparently, we Brits are always in a hurry, we never relax, (probably true) time is always of the essence. (The Spanish have a saying: 'tenemos tiempo' - 'we have time.') The weather is appalling (again, compared with Spain, I'm not arguing with that) We are hardworking, (totally agree) and we are powered almost entirely by tea (yes, I'll go with that, too.) Interestingly, we appear to have a lot of 'quiz nights' when we shut ourselves in pubs

(what?) and we eat a lot of peas (again, what?) In short, the Spaniards think that we Brits run about like headless chickens, whilst, paradoxically, we think the Spanish are lazy. Both of which are about as true as the stereotype of the French wearing berets and riding bicycles with baskets full of baguettes or onions (we all know that no self-respecting Fenchman would wear a beret these days.)

If we take all stereotypes and put them together, Utopia would be assembled something like this: All the cooking would be done by the French, the police would be British, our mechanics would be German and everything would be organised by the Swiss. In some

ways the fact that these stereotypes still exist at all is surprising So, here we are....August already – just one more month before the promotes diversity and tolerance, people are still defined according to their nationalities; we just shouldn't take those definitions too seriously.

> One of the lessons I used to give my overseas students concerned 'British Problems' – the sort of everyday situations which cause us Brits some consternation but have become so entrenched within our culture that we no longer see the absurdity in them and expect everyone else to understand them. Here's a few of my favourite ones: We're a bit sensitive, we Brits and quite often say things we don't really mean in order to save someone's feelings which would work if it weren't for the fact that we all know the sub text. Here's an example: 'Well, I'll let you get on' really means 'OK, we're finished!". A common derivation of this is 'I'll let you get some rest', roughly translated what we're really saying is 'I've had enough now!'

Queuing is another one, we're obsessed with it and can't understand why anyone would 'queue jump'. I think it all comes down to our traditional sense of 'fair play' - if you 'push-in' you do so at your peril and I always told my students that this would be a very dangerous thing to do – practically guaranteed to incurr our wrath!

My students sometimes stayed with other families and often ate with them - this posed its own problems and was something I was always careful to address. Most of us are incapable of being honest when someone prepares us something we don't like and in order to avoid upsetting or embarrassing the host we use certain phrases - we don't say 'urgh, that's horrible' we say 'It's certainly different' or maybe 'It's not what I expected,' but, as a rule, what we'll usually say is 'that was lovely, thank you'. Most of my students were totally puzzled by this and it was inevitably chalked up as being yet another peculiarity of the obsession we have with politeness. Apparently, we say the word 'sorry' multiple times a day - sometimes even to inanimate objects (have to say I do recognise that one!) Teaching English to overseas students, I discovered, is a great deal more than just 'words'. Not only do they have to navigate their way through our constant use of phrasal verbs (which by the way, linguistically, are total nonsense!) and idioms, but they also have to work out what we mean when our words say something else. I truly sympathise with them!

We can't deny that cultural differences exist - of course they do these differences are real but they can add richness and humour to life and people everywhere have much in common. My years teaching all nationalities taught me that actually, when the exterior is peeled back, there are not so many differences after all. The need for relationships, participation and contribution are pretty much the same and they're what's important - what do you think? As ever, I love hearing from you and would like to know your views.

So, the summer hols are well and truly here and the Selsey Festival has been underway for a few days. Let's hope for some good weather for Screen on the Green this year! We have the Full Monty to look forward to (maybe!) and children's favourites like The Pirates and 'The Goonies'. Not, I'm sad to say, my personal favourites, The Smurfs Movie, or one of the Toy Stories but you because the weather is so bad that we have to find something to do can't have everything! (Note to our Town Co-ordinator...'maybe next year?') If you haven't got a Festival booklet, there should still be some at the Town Hall.

> So, enjoy what's left of the summer and, whether a visitor or a resident, make the most of our wonderful seaside town at the bottom of the long and winding road.



August is the traditional month for a well-earned break but do make sure, before leaving, that the garden can cope with the Summer heat and lack of attention while you are away. Keep ahead with the routine jobs such as weeding, dead-heading and watering (when and where possible). Don't cut the lawn shorter than usual as it will, in fact, grow faster should there be any rainy periods.

For those of us who can't get away, August brings the compensation of Summer flowers and harvest of home-grown salads, vegetables and fruits, and certainly a great chance for some outdoor armchair gardening whilst enjoying at leisure the fruits of ones labour.

The birds are comparatively quiet and unobtrusive in August apart from the House Martins and Swallows which are still very busy dealing with their second or third broods. August is, in fact, insect time. The hotter the hour the faster the whirr of their wings. The stronger the sun, the louder the shrilling of the male Grasshoppers as they scrape their legs on their wings. The air vibrates with insect hum and many beautifully coloured Butterflies can be seen competing with Honey Bees and Bumble Bees for all the available flowers and blossom. Dragonflies, with their shimmering wings, hover over rivers and ponds. Man has existed on earth only an hour in comparison to the long history of insects. They were pioneers in our brave new world. Don't forget to take home some Ribbon Seaweed to forecast the weather - hard and dry for sun, soft and damp for rain.

August is nigh - time will fly!

lobs for August

Perennials planted now such as Crocosmia, Dhalias, Chrysanthemums, Cosmos, Osteospermum, Rudbeckia, Verbena and Penstemons can provide instant and long lasting colour and wil provide an even more spectacular display next year

Train and prune Wisteria, Honeysuckle and Clematis before the shoots get out of control.

If there's been a spell of hot and dry weather, set the mower on a slightly higher cut and mow less frequently.

Old Raspberry and Loganberry canes should now be cut back after the fruit has been harvested. Reduce the new shoots to a few of the strongest, healthiest ones.

Weed and clean Ponds regularly and keep surrounding plants wel trimmed. Remove dead leaves and stalks. Thin out oxygenating plants, making sure not to harm or disturb the fish too much. Keep Ponds well topped up but don't overfeed the fish as any uneaten food will rot and pollute the pond.

Cut back perennials such as Campanulas, Lupins, Santolinas and Delphiniums as soon as they finish flowering. Apply a good mulch Some ideas for glorious, beguiling, alluring and romantic evening such as well-rotted Horse Manure and also some Blood, Fish & scents:-Bone Meal and water well in. There is every chance of another flush of flowers in the Autumn.

Dead-head Roses on a regular basis. Rather than snipping off individual blooms, cut off the flower heads to three or four buds further down the stem, and also apply some feed to encourage later

Spray Runner Beans with a fine mist in evenings to encourage better fertilization. Spray Tomatoes mid-morning on sunny days.

Pick early Pears and Apples and so avoid them falling off the tree and bruising.

Houseplants will benefit from a spell in the open air. Place them in a semi-shaded area.

Dead-head Hanging Baskets, Window Boxes and Containers regularly and feed weekly. Replace gaps with summer bedding They should provide continuous colour well into October/ November.

Cut Sweet Peas regularly for wonderful colour and scent in the house. Faded blooms will become seed pods and prevent further flowers developing.

Fuchsias are very worthwhile for any gaps in shadier areas of the garden. They will bloom for many months and will usually rise again

Give hedges a last clipping for the season and remove all dead flowers and stalks from summer flowering shrubs except those that bear attractive berries.

- Honeysuckle fragrance day and night but is at it's best during the evening
- Nicotiana (Tobacco Plant) is unobtrusive but effective
- Night-scented Stock (Matthiola bicornis) small but powerful and potent
- Evening Primrose (Oenothera biennis) yellow moon-like flowers with a delicate and sweet scent at dusk
- Border Phlax (Paniculata 'Eventide') lilac, pink and white with a most evocative and arousing fragrance
- Sweet Rocket (Hesperis matronalis) tall lilac or white flowers which are alluring and highly perfumed.

Make cheap kneelers or knee-pads with rolled strips of bubble plastic.

Along with Selsey Works we are producing an Information Pack for GP's- "From Diagnosis to Support" – we plan to meet with GP's to get their input on this, and a pack will be developed with a view to launching this at the Selsey Showcase in September. This will be a useful pack for GP's to share with their patients and specific to Selsey along with wider support and is based on the prospect of GP's prescribing socially.

Planting the seed:

One of my key ambitions has been to encourage younger people to look at social care as a career, and getting to know the sector a little more when making their course choices. I will be working with young people to encourage them not only to become a Dementia Friend, but also to develop a useful tool for communicating with people with dementia or other complex needs. Other intergenerational activities have taken place within Selsey before and have proven very popular, and this may provide another excellent opportunity to do this again. It will hopefully also tie in nicely with WSCC Recruitment and Retention Campaign in Selsey in October, which is working closely with the residential and domiciliary care sector.

Other Activities in the pipeline:

- With the support of the Selsey Watch and other agencies and carers, Sitting and Befriending Service is being developed. This will be available in the Autumn.



Off they went, they knew I was on call for any concerns they might have, they said the shed was huge, and they tried crawling under to have a chat with the cat but she was too shy, but saw the three kittens, but they were very scared, and hid right at the back under the floor of the shed there was no way they could be reached. The kind they set up a trap and put some of the pilchards in. So begins the waiting, hiding behind some shrubbery holding the string on the trap. The trap was loaded with pilchards (I did say if there were any left I am partial to them!). Finally the kittens came out and one went into the trap and started eating, they guickly pulled the string and caught him, he was scared but safe. They managed to get the Mum when she came to see her kittens. The first kitten caught spent the night at the Centre being looked after, then the next day, very early they were back hiding, and waited for some hours with a huge tin of pilchards and then both kittens were in the trap! Brent Lodge Briefings - All in a flap!

It has certainly been a busy time at the wildlife hospital here in Sidlesham over these last few weeks. This month has seen us completely inundated with an abundance of baby birds, who all sadly need care around the clock. Our extended care hours of 8:30-20:30 has certainly not seen our staff twiddling their thumbs with nothing to do, the hospital is almost at capacity with young fluffy herring gulls. The hospital is receiving gulls daily through the doors or, if not as inpatients, at least a dozen phone calls a day

seeking advice. The staff are doing their best where possible to advise people on the best ways to reunite any young birds found on the ground, with their parents. If truly abandoned, then advising them to bring their feathered friends down to the lodge for further inspection.



We are very limited for space this year in the hospital due to the sheer number of patients, so although we would never turn any vulnerable birds or wild animals away, we are desperately trying to save our space for those that are very sick or injured, who really do need our help. With this in mind, please ensure you give us a call (01243 641672) if you need further advice before unnecessary intervention. We always say if the animal is not in immediate danger, clearly injured or totally abandoned, then it can be left alone in the wild and will most likely have a greater chance of survival in its



Due to the high number of herring gulls with us, this means we can now also use fish flavoured tinned pet food as well as meat based. Despite already receiving an overwhelming response to recent appeals, we are still in desperate need for more tins of pet food. So, if you

can help us and our feathered friends out with a tin (or two) then we would be so grateful. Unfortunately as with all anatomies, feathered included, what goes in must come out. The staff have found using puppy training pads to line the cages has been a huge life saver, using these has dramatically cut down on washing loads and saved so much time. Again if you think you are kindly able to donate any packs of training pads, it would make such a difference we are currently getting through between 50-80 pads a day.

We have successfully released a number of patients already this season, including several batches of garden birds, a few ducklings and we are also making preparations to release our fox cubs in the next months, which is absolutely great.

As the hospital expands and develops with your continuing support. we hope to see you at our next open weekendl in Cow Lane on Saturday 26th and Sunday 27th August (10am-4pm). There will be plenty of stalls including our famous bric-a-brac and book barn, tombola and other ways for you can help raise funds in aid of

Brent Lodge and the work we do for wildlife. Our CCTV room proved to be a real hit last time where visitors could view our playful foxes enjoying themselves, there will be plenty more CCTV fun for the next weekend so come and take a look. For now though, thank you for support and look forward to catching up again very soon.







SELSEY VENTURE CLUB

As I expect you have all seen or heard Selsey Venture Club is 50 this year. We were the first community transport club / charity in the UK. We were started by a few devoted people in 1967. They were worried that the elderly & disabled residents were becoming isolated in their own homes.

Since then the club has flourished to where we are today, and as we have better transport links and also mobility scooters our clients aren't so housebound. We still have over 350 members and a team of over 60 helpers, drivers and office staff. We are a big family sharing the outlook that people needn't be trapped at home lonely.

As you are probably aware the buses are out 7 days a week taking people to various clubs, lunches, shopping, church or on our big monthly outings.

Last year we lost 2 very important members of our team, Jeff Donnely President (former Chairman) and Peter Kench Chairman (former Transport Manager). We were looking for ways to remember them. We were already planning to replace our two older minibuses this year for our 50th. It was suggested that we have their initials as the number plate on the new ones HN17 PJK and HN17 JMD - these were purchased from DVLA.

We were able to have these buses here for the party, thanks to some very fast work by Ginger Signs - they were signwritten on the Friday when we also came up with the idea to have Jeff and Peter's names across the bonnet.

As people have heard, unfortunately due to an error by DVLA we have not been able to use these new buses.

Our coachbuilders in Essex had lent us 2 replacement vehicles, a

Fiat Doblo wheelchair car and a large white Mercedes Executive bus.
