

Since 2015 Selsey Community Forum, with a many supportive partners, has been seeking to construct a commuter cycle route from Selsey to Chichester.

The progress is as follows:

> The section from Medmerry to RSPB is built with safe access to Sidlesham lanes.

> The path to Ham is being resurfaced.

> RSPB is exploring the feasibility of a bike hire scheme.

> West Sussex County Council has agreed to fund, design and construct the section from Golf Links Lane to Medmerry, with landowner support. The aim is to construct in the summer so by the end of the year it should be possible to ride from Selsey High Street to RSPB.

> Chichester District Council has provided substantial funding to complete the environmental impact assessments along the route within a year.

> Landowner agreements are being developed in Sidlesham and Hunston up to the A27.

So a complete route is becoming possible. In Sidlesham the original route west of the B2145 is now preferred and we are attempting to turn East along Keynor Lane and find an access into the playing field, since this will provide community focus and local access to the route. From there permissions exist onto Paddock Straight. In Hunston the Free School is being very cooperative towards a mutually beneficial project.

Much work remains to be done but through the valued cooperation and support of many partners good days lie ahead.

At the same time RSPB and Sustrans are considering an extension of routes from Medmerry to Earnley. Further aspiration will open up the possibility of a link to Salterns Way and a circular cycling and walking route around the Peninsula and links through North Mundham and Chichester.

Appropriate provision for horses is part of our aspiration.

The hardworking social and find raising committee decided to reach out into the community in Selsey and put together a team of swimmers to obtain sponsors and swim for a new boiler at St Wilfrid's or for Selsey Community First Responders or 50/50. Each sponsor had three choices.

The response was very positive and thirteen swimmers of all age groups turned out, swimming a grand total of 776 x25 metre engths (12 miles) in just two and a half hours. The team comprised St Wilfrid's parishioners, friends and families and supporters of Selsey Community First Responders.

Worthy hosts for the event were as usual the owners and staff of 'The Oasis' at Bunn Leisure, West Sands, Selsey who, once nore, welcomed the team and generously allowed them to swim completely free of charge, giving over three swimming lanes for the duration.

group of scorers and supporters also turned up and each swimmer received a certificate stating the number of lengths completed.

The result of the event can be summed up in two ways.

Firstly, there was a tremendous community spirit between everyone involved and secondly a grand total of £2,000.00 was raised with £1230.00 going to Selsey First Responders and £670 to St Wilfrid's Church Building Maintenance Fund.

Simple tips to secure your home and garden

With the clocks having gone forward on 31st March and lighter evenings approaching, here are some simple tips to secure your home and garden.

Property mark your valuables with your postcode and house Secure all windows, paying particular attention to those on the number. Keep a look out for our free tool marketing events that ground floor or above any flat roof areas. Use locks and bolts and our advertised regularly on our Chichester Police and Arun Police keep all keys, including car keys, out of sight and out of reach. Facebook accounts and bring your tools along.

Use an automatic time switch on an internal light, either in a room that can't be looked into from the road or an upstairs room.

Regularly change the time settings.

You could also put a time switch on a radio; this will give the impression that the property is occupied. Again, regularly change the time settings.

Intruder alarms are an effective deterrent against burglars. Before choosing a system, ensure it is the one most suitable for your

Selsey all-weather lifeboat launched to assist Yacht.

The Selsey RNLI all-weather Shannon class lifeboat launched at 5.26pm on Tuesday 26 February after the 35ft Yacht *Haven Star* reported they had engine failure and were unable to sail.

The *Haven Star* had three persons aboard and gave their position as 3 miles east of Selsey Bill. The lifeboat arrived on scene with the yacht at 5.36pm and after confirming all on board were well a line was passed to the vessel. A tow was established between the lifeboat and the yacht



and course was set for Littlehampton Harbour. The weather on scene was wind east south east force 3 sea state smooth in sunshine.

The entrance to the Harbour was reached at 6.50pm and at 7.10pm the Haven Star was safely berthed alongside. The lifeboat departed Littlehampton and made the journey back to Selsey arriving at 8.10pm and rehoused straight away. The crew today were Coxswain Martin Rudwick, 2nd Coxswain Rob Archibald, Mechanic Colin Pullenger, Andy Lee, Dan Langford and Steve Somner.

Date: 7 March 2019

Selsey all-weather lifeboat joins search for person in the water

At 2.15am on Thursday 7 March the UK Coastguard requested the launch of the Selsey RNLI all-weather lifeboat (ALB). This was to conduct a search at Bognor Regis for a female believed to have entered the water close to the pier.

The Selsey ALB launched at 2.35am and proceeded at best speed to the search area joining the Littlehampton RNLI Atlantic 85. The Coastguard helicopter Rescue 175 was also requested along with Littlehampton and Selsey Coastguard rescue teams. The weather on scene was wind westerly force 6-7 sea state moderate with good visibility.

At 3.03am the Selsey lifeboat started searching an area given by the CG joined shortly afterwards by the Helicopter while Littlehampton lifeboat conducted a shoreline search. At 4.55am Littlehampton lifeboat located the casualty in the water and quickly recovered her into the lifeboat. The helicopter was immediately tasked to winch the casualty from the lifeboat and transport to Hospital.

At 5.10am both Selsey and Littlehampton lifeboats were stood down. Selsey lifeboat rendezvoused with Littlehampton lifeboat outside Littlehampton harbour and supplied them with hot drinks as they were unable to enter the harbour for about an hour due

to low tide. At 6.00am Selsey lifeboat departed Littlehampton and returned to Selsey rehousing at 6.55am. The crew today were Coxswain Colin Pullenger, Mechanic Geoff Mellett, Max Wiseman, Kristina Dolan, Harry Emmence and Jake Harnett.



Sadly the casualty never regained consciousness. Our thoughts are with her family and friends.







MEDMERRY MILL. SELSEY PART 2

Following on from last month's Selsey Life, here is the second half of the Mill Story.

The Chichester Observer of 7 July 1926 contained an article about Vanishing Sussex Windmills stating that 'There is a working mill at Selsey...'. And on 8 September of the same year, the Mill and Farm were again up for auction, this time by Stride & Son.

The estate had only 173³/₄ acres but Mill House had been updated. It still had its sitting rooms and bedrooms (two of which now had fireplaces), bathroom with bath and lavatory basin, both having hot and cold supplies, WC, Kitchen with range and cupboards, scullery with copper and sink (h & c tapes) and a large pantry fitted with shelves. The John Valentine image to the left has a date of 1928 shows that the mill is partly derelict and all four sails are damaged.


This photograph, with geese and a horse, showing that at least Mill Farm was still in operation, is dated ca. 1930 and is by Photocrom.



From early days, the Mill had been shown on Admiralty Charts to aid navigation at sea and, as you can see from this modern chart, it still is, indicated here by the blue arrow.

In the 1925 Schneider Trophy Air Race it was used to indicate the turning point of the triangular course, indicated by the red arrow.

All the British winning aircraft were designed by R J Mitchell. He then went on to design the Spitfire.



In 1936, life got very exciting for the Mill - if only these buildings could talk! While greater authorities than I assert that the mill was derelict and the fan and sails had gone, Mill Farm and, by extension, Medmerry Mill, was still the centre of attention with months and many column inches of newspapers across the country reporting the 'French Woman Flier Crashes in England'. Not only was she French but she was beautiful. Her name was Madame Irene Schmeder Chapellut and she was 32 years old. The plane crashed in a nearby field just as dusk was falling, on a Sunday night, buckling its undercarriage and smashing the propeller before embedding itself in the 'sodden clay of a field near the beach'. She was taken to Mill Farm suffering with shock and cuts and was left in the tender care of Miss Ellen Hannah Linkhorn & Mr Douglas John Wakely. The police quickly established that the French authorities had issued a summons for her arrest and extradition as she was suspected of shooting Pierre L'Allemant (a lover who had rejected her) and they liaised with New Scotland Yard and the Air Ministry. She appeared at Bow Street Police Court and was remanded for a week in

Holloway Prison. She returned to France on 25 January 1937.

In 1938 a follow-up report told us 'Acquitted Airwoman to see 'hosts' wed'. She had remained in touch with the couple and, indeed, they had been witnesses at her trial in Paris. And she did attend their wedding.

With WWII well underway, Medmerry Mill was the silent witness to a tragedy when Flight Lieutenant Lindsay Stuart Black DFC crashed his plane on the beach on 5 March 1945. He was stationed at Tangmere and was a member of the Royal New Zealand Airforce. A group of three, of which he was the leader, were undertaking strafing and dive bombing practice over Selsey Ranges. The practice was aborted due to an unserviceable radio, the board of enquiry concluding that he had pulled out too low and too fast and had probably lost consciousness. He was 30 vears old.



English Heritage granted Grade II Listed Status to Medmerry Mill on 5 June 1958 and, in 1959 John Bunn, of the White Horse Caravan site, bought it. During 1960 and 1961 it was completely restored and a large observation window inserted on the seaward side. The fan stage was removed.

Again, the press went wild. Was it going to be an office? A shop? A café?

Some internal pictures give us a clue to the answer.



This is a picture of the spouts with some of the contents of the shop. They look like beach balls to me but I am willing to stand corrected if anyone knows better.

crown wheel, layshaft and pulley and the cap interior. Such wonderful terminology!





In 1977/8, new sweeps were installed by, among others, Willam Arnell-Smith (known to all as Zonaker -if that is the correct spelling). I can recall his wife, Nellie, standing in my lounge worrying herself silly about him. In those days I could see right across to the Mill and even the hills of the Isle of Wight.

According to the Sussex Mills Group, in 1999 there was talk of a complete and full restoration. I'm going to end with Meryn Woodland's stunning picture of the Mill as it was just a few weeks ago. Thanks, Meryn, for sharing so willingly.



Selsey Venture Club's dire need for volunteer drivers for its fleet of minibuses. The licence requirement is to have a category B to drive our smallest bus or a category D1 which entitles persons to drive any of our larger three minibuses. All buses have manual transmission and are fully belted to latest standards. Driving time varies with local pick-ups taking about 45 minutes with the 14 seater buses and similar time taken to return members to their homes; in between times drivers are free to go home or join in events where appropriate. About once a month we have longer excursions out of the area and on these occasions we plan the trips to ensure that the driver is not at the wheel for more than two hours. On occasions we carry members in wheelchairs for which all four vehicles have been specially adapted; training will be given to show new drivers how this is done correctly. Some of those in wheelchairs travel with their carers who are there to help the driver getting the person concerned on and off of the vehicle. Medicals are necessary to ensure drivers meet the legal requirements to drive the larger vehicles at age 70; the Selsey Venture Club is able to arrange for these when the time comes.



In addition to drivers the Club requires volunteer staff to man its office in Elm Grove, taking calls from members wishing to go to the various events we cover or to take messages. We currently need help on Tuesdays from 2.30 pm until 4.00 pm and on Thursdays between 9.30 am and 11.30 am.






the newsroom.

in the Wright household. It started with an itchy demand that the detritus steadily filling the corners of our garage had got to go, so I set to it. Our workbench, lost for so long beneath an accumulation of ephemera was reclaimed. Rusting tins containing no more than a rubbery skin of paint were binned, loose screws were corralled, lengths of wood that would have constructed nothing but more than an ugly set of shelves were sent to the

log-store. A few hours well spent whetted my appetite for the next job and my beadies soon turned to the overgrown borders at the front of the house. As a rule, I don't like pulling up plants but, suddenly, gardening was on par with ejecting party guests who had long outstayed their welcome. 'Do it tomorrow' wasn't soon enough. The landscapers moved in; the crumbing wall and gate was knocked down and replaced. 'Bedroom make-over in a day!' I cried. storming to Homebase. My mutinous children were galvanised with bin-liners and cleaning utensils. Wardrobes and drawers were debrided. The volunteers in the village charity shops said they were grateful for my contribution, but something about their wariness told me I was pushing their goodwill to the limit. I clocked up mileage between Selsey and the Westhampnett recycling centre equivalent to the Paris to Dakar rally.

Spring fever didn't stop with the house. A few weeks ago I was fortunate enough to join friends on a ski-break. A few of us in the too-novice-to-be-safe category had planned to engage in alternative, healthy Alpine activities like walking, shopping, and comparing the relative merits of French beer, and yet, on the spur of the moment, and faced with the choice of sitting in a bar or sitting on a chair lift, my sense of adventure unleashed itself. How hard could it be to regain my ski-legs, I asked myself? I was determined to find out. So, with what amounted to only three days tuition seven years previously, and zero common sense, I hit the slopes of Morzine – literally, as it turns out. A gentle 'pootle' was the way my friends had described it. I had forgotten what travelling on skis at anything above two miles an hour felt like. In a nutshell: out of control. There was a comedic, if not disconcerting, moment when, bent double as if I had severe abdominal issues, I skied backwards past a queue of onlookers queuing for the chair-lift. My friends were patient with me, but eventually became unsettled. As I started to fall further and further back, animal instinct took over: leave the weakest behind. But I soldiered on and, eventually, so did they, at my breathless insistence that I was holding them up. I stood at the edge of the piste, watching them sail gaily away into the distance

and realised I faced a choice: stagger uphill to the cable-car in boots the weight of a small car and with my ambition in tatters, or Spring arrived on a wintery January day start a long solo run down the mountain on my own. I don't mind admitting this: I was scared, but giving up is rarely an option for me, so mustering what remained of my cool, I set off.

> A short while later I was having serious regrets. Frustrated that I couldn't remain perpendicular to the snow for more than a minute, tiredness and a sense of failure started to set in like a cold wind. I received periodic texts from my concerned buddies. 'Where are you?' they gueried. 'I don't know,' I replied. I hailed a snowboarder. 'Where am I?' I asked him. 'Here,' he told me unhelpfully. Ask a silly question, I chided myself. Skiers and snowboarders buzzed past me. Children who appeared to have been raised pointing downhill were mere blurs. Navigating this intimidating piste-life was like dodging through an asteroid storm. Gaining a modicum of confidence, I'd round a level bend only to face a gradient that no honest blue-run should have. Eventually, I wondered if the piste had beaten me, so I sat down and considered my options, which were limited at best. Not willing to face a slow trudge to the bottom, I gave my ailing willpower a good talking to. And I don't mean a reassuring word. The camp-commandant in me came raging to the fore and amidst enough expletives to melt the snow, I hauled myself back on to my skis and plunged on. I reminded myself to breathe. I started to relax. There were even a couple of moments when I felt, with a sudden exhilaration, like I'd got the hang of it. I even started to enjoy myself. Eventually, like the proverbial oasis, the bottom of the piste careered into view and I snow-ploughed to the bottom. I practically sank to my knees and kissed the snow in gratitude that I'd not killed anyone or injured myself. Then, with the swagger of one who has accomplished something rather audacious, I shouldered my skis, rode the cable-car back up the mountain and met my friends for lunch where I got enough pats on the back to dislocate my vertebrae. Basking in my achievement and the after-glow of a near-death experience, I drank too much strong beer and felt regenerated. An unlikely association I know, but as it turns out, it wasn't just the house that needed a spring-clean and makeover.

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

The team met up with the first informant who showed us what he had found and photos were sent to our Operations Room

A cordon was put in place and the beach was closed.

E.O.D. (Explosive Ordnance Disposal Team) were called and checked out the item on the beach, thankfully this time what was found wasn't ordnance and the team were stood down to return to station and E.O.D. took the item back with them for safe disposal.

7/2/19 19:28

Team paged to reports of possible ordnance on Medmerry Beach.

The team were tasked to locate and assess the reported ordnance last night.

We managed to locate it and were able to confirm with our Operations Room that it was ordnance and measurements and photos were sent to E.O.D. (Explosive Ordnance Disposal Team). Speaking with E.O.D. and our Operations Room a decision was made to return first thing in the morning.

The team were stood down and returned to station at 22.00.

8/02/19 06.00

The team were re tasked to the ordnance this morning and were able confirm that the ordnance was still there.

A phone call to the Navy E.O.D. Team was made and the beach was closed.

Once E.O.D. were on scene they assessed the situation and carried out a controlled explosion at approximately 8.30am this mornina.

The piece of ordnance found was highly explosive and we would like to remind everyone that ordnance comes in all shapes and sizes and this piece and previous ordnance found on this beach have been found to be highly explosive so please do not touch it and dial 999 and ask for the Coastguard straight away.

8/2/19 09:11

Team paged to reports of a Seal on the beach in possible distress.

On arrival we met up with the first informant and the seal had returned to the sea.

A guick shoreline search was carried out with nothing found before being stood down to return to station.

The first informant did the right thing and the call was made with good intent.

Information from the British Divers Marine Life Rescue: If you find a live seal

Watch it from a distance. Do not approach the animal. Seals regularly haul out on our coasts - it is part of their normal behaviour and in fact they spend more time out of the water, digesting their food and resting. Therefore, finding a seal on the beach does not mean there is necessarily a problem and they should not be chased back into the sea as this may stop them from doing what they need to do - rest. A healthy seal should be left well alone.



After stormy weather and high tides, seals will haul out onto beaches to rest and regain their strength. Many do not need first aid, but we will always try to find someone to check them out just in case.

However, if there is a problem, there are a number of things you may see:

Abandoned: If you see a seal with a white, long-haired coat in the autumn/winter, or you see a small seal (less than 3 feet in length) alone between June and August, then it is probably still suckling from its mother. Check the sea regularly for any sign of an adult seal. Thin: Signs of malnutrition include visible ribs, hips and neck and perhaps a rather baggy, wrinkled skin. Sick: Signs of ill health include : coughing, sneezing or noisy, rapid breathing and possibly thick mucus coming from the nose, wounds or swellings, particularly on the flippers, and possibly favouring one flipper when moving (although remember that healthy seals will often lie and 'hunch along' on their sides), cloudy eyes, or thick mucus around them, or possibly one eye kept closed most of the time, a seal showing little response to any disturbance going on around it (although remember they could be soundly asleep).

If you see a seal that may be abandoned, thin or ill, then call for advice and assistance.





'Well fancy that,' said Albert.



In the Garden

our monthly guide to gardening - written by Giles Peare award winning broadcaster

April is the time of year when nature moves along at a great rate, Swallows, Swifts and House Martins all start to arrive here in Selsev. Seagulls start nesting on the roofs of many houses and can sometimes become very aggressive towards people walking nearby, a plastic owl placed high up outside the house can help deter them.

Chestnut trees look very attractive with their glorious expanding large buds. In the countryside wild anemones, wood violets, primroses, daisies, buttercups and dandelions are out in profusion. Bright yellow is profuse in hedges and heath lands and has a nice scent after a shower. Apple, pear and plum trees in the orchards now have an exuberance of eye catching blossom. This is the month of

sunshine, showers and beautiful rainbows. Water beetles, newts, minnows and sticklebacks are becoming active in sun warmed ponds and streams. Lambs, hares and rabbits are enjoying life to the full and pheasants hatching rapidly.

Wild Arums also known as Lords and Ladies, Cuckoo-pint and Wake-Robin are now appearing. The Lords are the purple pokers and the Ladies are the paler ones.

Hawthorns have red twigs and Blackthorn have black twigs and produce Sloes in the autumn.

Easter - time comes during this month when we thank our "Maker" for the rebirth of nature that surrounds us to such great effect.

If plants are looking sickly or dying for no obvious reason check the rootball for any sign of plump, white vine-weevil grub which should

be destroyed at once. Primulas, Fuchsias, Begonias, various succulents and evergreens are especially vulnerable as are plants in pots (especially in the warmth of the greenhouse).


Sprinkle a high potash feed in the soil around the base of fruit trees, cane fruit and strawberries. Sulphate of potash comes as a powder that is scattered over the surface and then hoed in or left for the rain to wash down if hoeing is too difficult.

If you would like you Bluebells or Snowdrops to naturalize over some area of the garden, don't dead-head, allow them to form seed pods now. Let all the top growth turn yellow and die down naturally so any seed is released onto the soil. Once the foliage has died back and dried up, rake it away to help settle the seeds down into the soil surface where they will germinate. These seeds will form flowering bulbs within a few years.

Lift, divide and replant overgrown Water Lilies and other aquation plants so their performance doesn't decline. When dividing, discard the older central part and select vigorous outer pieces within the roots. Plant these back into their baskets using good aquatic compost.



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- Fruit refuse can be piled up and allowed to decay and then dug into the soil
- Apply a Nitrogen feed to lawns

Tip Top Tips

- Sow some lettuce and salads every fortnight and you will have a continuous supply throughout the summer
- Plant Dhalia tubers outside once the soil has warmed up
- Sow Tomatoes, aubergines, cucumbers, peppers, pumpki
- melons in the greenhouse. ns and
- Plant up hanging baskets and keep under cover to establish before moving out in late May

Apply moss killer to lawns then scarify or rake out the dead moss.

Pressure wash paths, patios and driveways

If Ash blooms before Oak wet summer - Oak before Ash lots of sun.

The fox cubs opened their eyes within a few days, and they are both taking their bottles well and growing very quickly. This will keep our staff very busy over the next few weeks with the regular feeding day and night.

Fortunately, a kind member of the stopped and bought the rabbit Their 24-hour nursing team warming him up, giving him were pleased to report he recovery, he was then his rehabilitation. We will

continue to keep him warm, fed, and provide any care needed but rabbits do not do well when kept in constant contact with humans, so we will have to keep an eye on his stress.



We have also been able to put one of our new incubators to use. This tiny Pipistrelle bat came to us after being found in a watering can. Sadly, there was another one that had already passed away. This little guy is now much brighter and will hopefully be well enough to return to the wild very soon. These incubators will mean we can keep young and newly born birds and mammals warm



during the first few days which will dramatically enhance their chances of surviving, we can also use the incubators to transport patients to and from necessary vet appointments.

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

Sights and sounds of spring arrivals

Surrounded by urban sprawl on either side, like a pair of green oases, free of light pollution and jutting out into nature rspb a home the English Channel on the Manhood Peninsula, our reserves of Pagham Harbour and Medmerry are migration hotspots. April sees the majority of our summer visitors arriving. Some birds will stay all summer while others will rest and feed before continuing their journeys further inland.



The male redstart is a stunning bird, with blue-grey upperparts, black face and throat, white forehead and orange breast. It constantly quivers its bright orange tail up and down. The pied flycatcher lives up to its name, darting from a perch to catch a flying insect. It is dark on top and white underneath, with a bold white patch on the fold of its wing. Both can often be found stopping off behind Church Norton hide and around the churchyard before heading north to breed in our uplands.

By contrast warblers are far less showy. Generally, they are small, often drab and hard to tell apart, that is until they start to sing. 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Herdwick sheep by Michael Blencowe of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

Out, standing in their field

For sheep, life is like one long festival. They're either stood crowded together in a muddy field in the rain or running around in the sun trying to find the best grass. Next time you're walking around Lewes town centre look up at Sussex Wildlife Trust's Malling Down nature reserve and you'll see my woolly colleagues living the good life. But don't be fooled. They're actually hard at work on the most important construction job in Sussex; making perfect chalk downland.

You can keep your tropical rainforests and your underwater reefs, for me chalk downland is the world's number one natural wonder. This rare habitat supports an



extraordinary diversity of wildlife and it's right on our doorstep.

county's iconic downland landscape. The short, sheep-nibbled turf is perfect for Adonis blue butterflies, burnt orchids and a multitude of other wonderful wildlife. But, like rainforests and reefs, it's under threat; one of the main issues being neglect. Turn your back on downland and it mutates into long grass, brambles and thorn bushes and the butterflies and orchids vanish under the cold shadows.

Herwick sheep at Levin Down

Sheep are our best defence against this prickly invasion. Every bite and every hoof print creates downland with an ideal varied structure - impossible to create by uniform mowing. We have various rare sheep breeds in our grazing army stationed near Lewes at Southerham: Hebrideans, Wiltshire Horns, Southdowns, but my favourite sheep, baa none, are the



Herdwicks.

Like all heroes, the Herdwick's origins are shrouded in mystery. Some folk say they came to Britain with marauding Vikings. There's some that say that the Herdwicks swam ashore after escaping the sinking Spanish Armada. Their ancestral home is the Lake District - it's claimed that 95% of the world's Herdwicks live within 15 miles of Coniston.

They're tough sheep; hard grazin' hell-raisers who are at home in harsh, hilly landscapes. If you

like your sheep white and fluffy then you've come to the wrong field. Herdwicks are born black Herdwick sheep c Mark Monk-Terry and develop white heads and legs as they mature. Their grey, wiry wool has an insulating undercoat - perfect attire for English hilltops. Feeding amongst thorns and thickets can leave their coats looking torn and tatty but this isn't a cause for concern, just proof that they're hard at work. For Herdwicks, grazing is a passion - not a fashion show.







