All West Sussex libraries closed until further notice

Following the latest Government advice, all 36 libraries in West Sussex are now closed until further notice.

Based on yesterday's announcement by the

Prime Minister (Monday 16 March), asking for people to implement social distancing measures to reduce the transmission of coronavirus (COVID-19), a decision was taken by West Sussex County Council to close all of their libraries until further notice.

The following procedures have been put in place whilst the libraries are closed:

Library staff will automatically renew everything that is currently on loan from today and will continue to do so during the closures.

No fines and charges will be incurred during the closures.

Individuals do not need to call the renewals line to stop books and other items from going overdue.

Anyone who is currently not a member of their local library, but wants to join, can do so online by visiting www.westsussex.gov.uk and searching 'join the library'.

Once registered, they will have instant access to the e-library service, where there are a range of downloadable books, audiobooks, magazines, comics and newspapers.

Duncan Crow, Cabinet Member for Fire and Rescue and Communities, said: "We appreciate that the closures happened quickly and came as a shock to some of our current users, but the decision to close all libraries was not taken lightly and the health of our staff and the residents of West Sussex is paramount.

"The library service is working on ways to mitigate some of the issues that our regular users are experiencing, but we do apologise for any inconvenience this will no doubt cause and further updates will be issued in due course."

The Write Zone with Jara Wright



In a world gone a little mad over the new Coronavirus, I was pondering the half-empty shelves in the local supermarket and wondering if Hollywood has spent years subtly preparing us for this kind of situation.

For decades (and I mean from the first King Kong onwards) we've been fed one imagined disaster after another: alien invasions, dinosaur carnage, exploding mega-volcanoes and more than one iteration of a zombie apocalypse. Hollywood's classic

protagonists mirror typical human responses in times of crisis: characters with a bunker mentality who hole themselves up in a cellar, praying that it'll all just go away, the sceptics who try their darndest to navigate a new set of rules and in spite of their effort get eaten or vaporised in the final denouement, and the opportunists who make like bandits, blasting their way to safety in the final scene, driving away, battered, into the sun-set. We know how the story goes; we've seen the blue-print for dealing with the unexpected. But, clearly, when the unexpected arises, the human race deviates from the script. To my recollection, no one in a Hollywood disaster movie ever decided that, over and above every other looming crisis, they should panic-buy toilet rolls.

I shouldn't judge. Just a couple of weeks ago I was a sceptic, pooh-poohing the doom-merchant tabloids for blowing the whole thing out of all proportion. Surely this Coronavirus-thingy was no more serious than any other flu-bug? For a time, I remained buoyant, confident that it would quickly blow over, but my scepticism faded as the virus, and its effect on the global socioeconomic system, swelled as quickly and as painfully as a flu-victim's glands.

Finding the local supermarket shelves sadly depleted of the usual provisions turned rumour into sour fact and set my perceptions on a new, shocking trajectory: self-preservation. I made a plan. I set

I attempted a crude form of buyer-analysis. Then, feeling more than a little clever (and, dare I say it, devious) I went straight for buying substitute goods: polenta rather than pasta, baby-wipes rather than toilet rolls, just to stay ahead of the curve. You get the idea. I'm sure you've had more than a few good ones yourself as you've pondered the state of the baked beans aisle and wondered what you're going to put on your toast. And I've got a suspicion that, once my pantry starts to look a little depleted, my family are going to be confronted with some very strange meal combinations indeed.

And so we wait for a complete melt-down when pubs are shut, theatres are empty and roads feels like New Zealand in the 1950s. The upside to all the omni-panic is that it's provided a distraction from a new and rather worrying personal best.

A few months ago, I developed a little game at the supermarket self-serve check-out called, 'how fast can I bag my items?' There's only one rule: when I scan an item, I have to put it in my bag faster than the self-serve machine can thank me and tell me 'that's scanned, please place it in the bagging area.' It started as a bit of fun based on my speed and packing acuity, but soon escalated into an irrational battle of wits. I started to race the machine, utilising timing and posture to get my item in the bag before the machine could fully get a sentence out. Compelled to hit a home-run, I started getting my scanned item in the bag before the machine could even utter a full 'thank you.' I cut it off so fast it was in danger of developing a lisp. Scanning my shopping ultra-fast has, I'm ashamed to admit, now become the highlight of visiting the supermarket at a time of option-crisis and looming menudespondency. And I reckon my Ninja-like skills are going to stand me in good stead if and when it comes to outrunning a hoard of slack-eyed zombies or beating my fellow shoppers to the last pack of toilet-rolls.

So apologies if I sound crude some folk must think bog rolls are food and with panic the norm any port in a storm yet their uses have been misconstrued


As guick as the shelves are refilled there are takers with mountains to build and the vultures descend, with no pride to defend their prowess becoming guite skilled

10p a week council tax rise is agreed to protect vital services across Chichester District

Chichester District Councillors have agreed to increase the average council tax bill by around 🥥 ten pence a week for a Band D property in order Which Co to protect vital services across the district.



This was considered at Chichester District Council's Full Council meeting on Tuesday 3 March, where a £5 (3.1%) rise was agreed. This means that the average Band D council tax payer will pay just over £3 a week for their council services.

"Because of the amount of savings we have managed to achieve over the last few years, Chichester District Council remains one of the lowest charging authorities in the country," says Councillor Peter Wilding, Cabinet Member for Finance, Corporate Services and Revenues and Benefits at Chichester District Council. "Our priority has always been to keep your council tax as low as possible, while still providing quality services for residents, and to ensure that we are able to continue providing support to people in our community who need it the most.

"Like many councils, we have had to make significant savings over the last few years in order to cope with cuts to our Government funding, and our deficit reduction plan is still being delivered. This aims to generate further income and savings over the next few years, which we hope will keep any future council tax increases to a minimum for our residents.

"As a council, we always look to ensure that we are proactive when examining our finances, and that we put in place robust financial plans. This approach has put us in a good position to withstand changes to Government funding.

"We are also maintaining our council tax support scheme so that those who are most vulnerable in our communities will not receive any increase.

"People may not realise, but we provide more than 80 different services across the district and we feel that just over £3 a week is still excellent value for money."

Services provided include:

- emptving bins
- checking food hygiene standards
- cleaning streets
- dealing with planning applications
- looking after the coastline, and
- caring for parks and open spaces.

Chichester District Council collects all of the council tax, but only keeps a 9% share of this. The other 91% is then distributed to the following public services:

West Sussex County Council (around 77%) The Police and Crime Commissioner (around 11%), and parish councils (3% on average).

Each of these public service providers makes decisions about its council tax increases independently, and will finalise their amounts for the next financial year in the coming weeks.

Our aim is to ensure that we can continue providing specialist end of life care services both now and in the future. We need our local community to continue supporting us.


SELSEY IN 1672

To paraphrase the Bard of Avon, some are born lucky, some acquire luck and some have luck thrust upon them.

When I was lucky enough to acquire the photographs of the 1909 mammoth and my research led to its being the earliest steppe mammoth found in the world, I considered myself a most fortunate woman and would have died happy.

This story started in December 2018/January 2019 when, on a whim, I decided to find out if the original 1672 Map of Selsey was still in existence. To this end I contacted the Cambridge University Library; The National Library of Scotland; The Bodleian Library, Oxford; The British Library and The Ordnance Survey Office at Southampton. I knew that The Ordnance Survey Office had disseminated many of it's records to safer places during WWII and also that they had been bombed, thus losing some of their records. Every organisation replied that they didn't have the 1672 map. The Heron-Allen Society had no information either. So it looked as though I had drawn a blank.

Then I acquired Mollie Tupper's archives. Among her treasures I found a copy of Edward Heron-Allen's Selsey Bill 1911 complete with its three maps. This is a well-known and well-used tome by those of us interested in the History of Selsey. We know that the Rev. John Cavis-Brown carried out most of the research during the course of which he made a copy of the 1672 map which, from time immemorial, had hung on the wall of James Clayton's abode, High House in West Street. Cavis-Brown wrote a pamphlet, in 1906, entitled 'MAPS of SELSEY, In the County of Sussex, In the Years 1672 and 1901 with Notes on Coast Erosion and Some Features of the Manor.' It cost 2/6d (half-a-crown) and was published in Chichester by Charles Knight of East Street.



Cavis-Brown went on to 'sophisticate' the map by adding the coastlines of 1820 and 1905 and, as you can see from the inscription at the top, he gave a copy of his pamphlet 'With the Writer's Compliments' to EHA. We know this is the Reverend Gentleman's writing as his capital letter 'C' is very distinctive and also appears on a Public Record Office request ticket in my possession.

The second signature, of course, is that of M. Tupper.

EHA issued a reprint of this map as a folding plate to Selsey Bill 1911.


In 1926, an article written by Edward Heron-Allen appeared in Sussex Archaeological Collections vol. 67 stating that neither he nor Cavis-Brown had ever been 'able to discover anything about the original 'survey' (of Selsey). He described the map as being '...131/2 x 151/2 inches square, drawn in pen and ink, and coloured by hand.'

EHA went on to say that according to an expert from Ordnance Survey the Clayton map would date between 1720 and 1730. We know from a later article (SAC Vol. 75, pp200-206 of 1934) that this expert, Mr O S G Crawford, visited Selsey in 1925 and 'had managed with my assistance to carry off James Clayton's copy and he then had a full-sized photograph made of it.' The negative, which would have been on a glass plate, was smashed before any prints could be made from it.

The article also indicated that the original 1672 map had been discovered in the garret of an old-established solicitor's office in Chichester in November 1925, that EHA had received 'a clue as to the whereabouts of the original Map' which he duly followed up, rescuing it from the 'shop of a furniture dealer in Chichester'.

The Map is 'drawn by hand (and coloured) on a sheet five feet square, formed by the sewing together of five oddly-shaped 'skins' of vellum, 1/32nd of an inch in thickness. The Sea and Pagham Harbour - showing the 'arm' extending to the sea on the west side of the Bill, which converted Selsey into an island at high tide - are coloured green.'

EHA then presented the original map to be preserved in the Office of the Ordnance Survey at Southampton. His own copy of his article was housed in a custom-made cover on which EHA had written:



(One of three copies to which James Clayton's 'reduced' copy has been added. To this copy a 'reduction' from Yeakell & Gardner's map has been added, and also 'reproduction' of the same, as annotated by Cavis-Brown and published in 1906)'.

(Also the reproduction of the Ordnance Survey map, issued with my book 'Selsey Bill', Historic and Prehistoric, London 1911)'. August 1934.

This, too, was found in the Tupper Archives.

Stuck inside the cover was a letter dated 8 August 1934 from the Ordnance Survey Office:

'Dear Heron Allen.

Very many thanks for the offprint on the old map which we are very glad to have, and which will be filed with the map itself. Yours sincerely, O S G Crawford

A further letter dated 11 April 1935, also from Mr Crawford, is transcribed as follows:

'Dear Heron Allen.

I am desired by the Director General to inform you that a bromide print of the 1672 map is being sent to you free of charge in consideration of your gift of it to this Office. I hope it will be what you require.'

And there, in a blue slip cover, with gold lettering was the bromide print expertly mounted on linen. It is in pristine condition. Rather unfortunately it is huge so I cannot reproduce it here! But it is beautiful!


It has been divided into a series of separate 'pages' and is mounted with small spaces round the edge of each image which allows it to be folded easily without damaging it.

The label says:

London

EDWARD STANDFORD LTD Cartographers to the King AGENTS FOR THE ORDNANCE SURVEY 12, 13 and 14 Long Acre W C 2 And 43 Whitehall, S W 1

I have checked with the current incarnation of Edward Stanford Ltd and they tell me they have no archives.





The picture underneath is The Old Church ca. 1865. This raises a query or two as The Gentleman's Magazine of 1797 and 1798 quite clearly shows a church without a tower but with a wooden steeple.

To further muddy the waters, the Bill of Presentment made by Churchwardens William Goble and William Man to the Bishop in 1662-3 states '...there was never any steeple belonging to the Church, but a tower, formerly belonging to a ruined castle, somewhat remote from the Church, where the bells hunge, but it is latelie fallen downe, the bells preserved, and a newe steeple now annexed to the Church is almost the fourth parte finished'. By 1865 it had obviously disappeared again! But this conundrum will have to wait a while before it is solved!




Heron-Allen wanted to research the list of names which include Woodland, Shepherd, Downer, Mitchell and Poe (thought to be the ancestors of Edgar Allan Poe, a branch of the family going from Selsey to Ireland) but has left it to 'some future historian of Selsey, if such there shall be, to deal with the huge mass of material to which it was only possible merely to refer in 1911 '.

And I'm afraid that won't be me either.

He has, however, organised his list so that it strongly resembles the modern Kelly's Street Directory of Selsey and includes references to many of the documents he consulted.

The title panel on the map was written by William Weekes, the cartographer, a transcription of which appears below. I have modernised the spelling and abbreviations have been expanded where necessary to aid clarity:

The True Plot and Content of all and Singular the Lands lying or being within the Manor of Selsey in the County of Sussex as it is now Butted and Bounded with the main Sea on the East and South pts (points?) thereof and the ferry on the North and West parte thereof together with the Commons or Waste of the said Manor belonging to the right Worshipful Sir William Morley, Knight of the Bath, and also the true Plot of Certain other parcels of Land Which is intermingled within the Lands of the aforesaid Manor Belonging to Or holden of

Mr Bernard, of Petworth and others All which said Manor of Selsey was surveyed with the help and by the consent of the tenants belonging to the said manor in the Year of our Lord God 1672 By me William Weekes.

It would be lovely to think that William was a local lad and, in fact, there was a William Weekes christened at Donnington at an appropriate time but documents from this era are rare and notoriously difficult to decipher. It would explain, however, why he was so grateful to the tenants for their help and support. Perhaps somewhere someone knows and will tell me.

By the time you read this, the two pamphlets and the map will be safely housed in West Sussex Record Office with Accession Number 19667 and will be available to view. The condition of deposit is that it is on permanent loan from me so should the need arise - I can get it back. Through the kind offices of the Assistant County Archivist, Jenny Mason, I have been given a full size copy of the map which will stay with me.

I have been liaising with Joe Savill of the Selsey Wildlife and Heritage Group to see if we can organise a small exhibition so Selsey residents can see what we have been so excited about but, in the light of the current Corvid 19 infection, I think it would be prudent if this were delayed until the crisis is over. So watch this space.

I wish this write-up could convey just how excited I was - I was trembling and my heart was in my mouth. I showed the map to two like-minded people just to confirm that I hadn't lost the plot entirely and that I really did have what I thought I had!

Outside Selsey, of course, this map and its documents are merely a curiosity. To Selsey, of course, it is PRICELESS! Now all we have to do is find the original.

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

Orange-tip Butterfly by Michael Blencowe of the Sussex Wildlife Trust The future's bright

At this time of year I'm often asked "What's that butterfly with the orange tips on the end of its wings called?" "Well," I reply "its scientific name is Anthocharis meaning 'flower grace'; probably

because this beautiful butterfly lends a certain grace to the flowers it frequents. In the 18th century it was 'The Lady of the Woods' -a seductive title well deserved by the best-looking butterfly of the spring. The Germans celebrate its beauty in the name Aurotafalter; the sunrise butterfly. The French honour it with the poetic title L'Auroré - the rising sun." "So what do the British call it?" "Well, we call it the Orange-



Orange-tip Male c Bob Eade It?" "Well, we call it the Orange-tip – because it has orange tips on the end of its wings."

Whoever gave this exquisite insect such an unimaginative name should be ashamed. It's more than just a pair of orange tips. Forget your Bluebells and Skylarks, the emergence of the Orange-tip is nature's confirmation that spring has officially sprung.

Only the male Orange-tip has those road cone orange wing-tips that visually scream "Look at me! Look at me!" as he cruises the countryside's hedges and edges. You'd think this flamboyant display would land him on the menu for any passing bird - but he has an unsavoury secret. He tastes absolutely disgusting. His orange tips make birds recoil when they recall last eating something that colour. To predators he is a flying pot of lime pickle; if you've eaten it once, you'll never eat it again.

The grey-tipped females are more secretive. Once mated they search the hedgerows for their food plants; Cuckooflower and

Garlic Mustard. They tap-dance on the plants and identify them with taste buds in their feet. Once their six soles are satisfied they lay a single, tiny, orange, rugby ball shaped egg. The egg's shell emits a pheromone which deters other females from laying here because the cute little caterpillar, which hatches out a week or so later, is a cannibal.

This caterpillar gets to work eating the flower's seed pods, and it eats so many that it starts to look like one (my Mum once warned me a similar phenomenon would happen with me and Monster Munch crisps). Disguised as its diet, it merrily munches throughout May and the plant toxins it ingests will help to flavour the bitter butterfly it will become. In July, the caterpillar constructs a curious chrysalis, a bizarre bit of angular architecture attached to a stem by a single string. Inside this postmodern pupa the caterpillar melts into a cellular soup. And then the natural world's greatest regeneration takes place. This biological broth builds a butterfly and the April sunshine encourages the Orange-tip to emerge; that simple flash of orange signalling that an even greater regeneration has

finally taken place. Winter has turned to spring



When a call comes in to Selsev Coastguard Rescue Team for an incident at Medmerry Beach, they're reasonably sure what it will be: a rather dangerous leftover from World War Two.



During the Second World War Selsey had a bombing range for air to ground attack practice. The area has also suffered from flooding and erosion by the sea which - in 2011 - led to the Environment Agency constructing a flood bank. This created an amazing new wetland – but also flooded the old bombing range which means these days it's quite common for World War Two bombs to appear on the beach or be washed up.

Ashley Pledger from the CRT says there have been a few interesting moments: 'Last October we were called to our largest piece of ordnance - a 500lb depth charge bomb which was probably dropped from a plane during the war.


'It ended up being a 21 hour job for us. We had to close the beach and stay through the night until the Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) team was able to carry out a controlled explosion. It's always exciting to see the EOD do this - although from a safe distance,

'It's scarv the amount of ordnance that's out there. How much there is, we might never know. At the beginning of June we were called to reports of an old sea mine washed up on the beach. While we were there waiting for EOD, we also found a depth charge, several bombs and multiple amounts of ordnance which meant we had to extend our safety cordon even further.'

Because it is so dangerous, it's really important that if you do come across anything you think might be a bomb or other ordnance that you shouldn't touch it and you should call 999 and ask for the Coastguard.'

Are you interested in joining the Coastguard Rescue Service (CRS)?

The volunteers at Selsey Coastguard Team are trained and available to respond 24/7 to various incidents as a front line 999 emergency service.



Alerted by 999 call or a Mayday/urgency call on VHF the Coastguard Operations Centres will task assets of which the CRS is one of to attend by 4x4 rescue vehicle and gather information for the Ops room and if necessary attempt rescue which would be in the form of a Water Rescue from dry land, Rope Rescue and Cliff Rescue, Mud Rescue, First Aid/Stretcher, Searching along the coast or indeed on land, working with helicopters and Lifeboats and the other emergency services or making safe time expired pyrotechnics.

We also will perform safety and accident prevention work including PR and the local knowledge of the Coastguard Rescue Officers (CRO's) is vital to the overall Search and Rescue framework locally for HM Coastguard.

CRO's are alerted by a dedicated tasking & alerting platform and can be expected to drop everything to attend an incident and we require a group of individuals who together make up each teams capability around the coast at any given time and are volunteers.

The current requirement at Selsey Coastguard is that you are largely within a short distance of the station when responding and can complement the availability of the team by being able to respond daytime on a weekday on most occasions.

You would be expected to undertake extensive training and assessment under the Senior Coastal Operations Officers to fulfil the role and therefore a big commitment is required as well as a good degree of fitness.

our monthly guide to gardening - written by Giles Peare award winning broadcaster

April was known as 'Aperire' because in this month the earth begins to bring forth fruits.

The buds are now bursting out on the trees and shrubs, and they are looking wonderful with their fresh green appearance. The birds are singing with great gusto as they busily prepare their nests.

Easter Sunday (April 12th) is when our churches are adorned with fresh Spring flowers (especially Lilies) to give thanks to Jesus for overcoming death and giving us hope for the future.

The pink and white Cherry blossom is eye-catching and profuse in the streets, hedges and gardens.

April is here let us enjoy Nature at its finest, as it unfolds it's great array of colour and activity. Try to get out in your garden in order to enjoy the wonderful sights and scents.

Jobs for AnTIL

Magnolias and Camellias look particularly good at this time of year, if you have one to plant choose it's position with great care - allow it plenty of space as it will strongly resist being moved later. Prepare the soil well with plenty of leaf-mould, cocoa shells or a proprietary soil conditioner/tree planting compost. Water regularly over the coming months as the roots get established.

Favourite Rhododendrons can be propagated by 'layering'. Peg down low-growing branches with a stone or wire hook so that part of the stem is resting on the soil surface. It will develop roots over the coming months and can be separated from the parent plant this time next year. This technique also works with other shrubs including Eleanous Syringa, Skimmia and Magnolia. Making a slight wound in the stem (by nicking the bark) where it is to lay on the ground, and adding a touch of hormone rooting powder to it helps the process

April is the ideal time to sow Tomato seeds in an unheated greenhouse. By the time the plants are large enough to go outside, the danger of frost will have passed. You can then keep a few plants to grow on in the greenhouse and plant the rest outside.

Tip Top Tips

Continue to watch weather forecasts for night temperatures and give vulnerable plants some covering protection with horticultural fleece or old net curtains when frost is expected. When potting on, first push the old, smaller pot into the compost in the larger pot to make a hole the right size for the plant's root-ball. Then settle the plant into the perfectly fitting new hole.

Dead-head faded Spring flowers such as Daffodils as soon as they fade so they don't waste their energy.

- If lawn repairs are needed, do them now with new turves or seed
- To stop any more mole hills appearing in the garden, place half a raw onion face down on the hill opening.
- Always harden-off seedlings before placing outside otherwise they will die from shock!
- Seeds of Broad Beans, Broccoli, Brussels Sprouts, Cabbage, Cauliflower, Carrots, Leeks and early Peas can be sown now. Thin out Gooseberry bushes - small boughs are not productive



Hello everybody! It's me Markus the office cat bringing you all the news from The Cat and Rabbit Rescue.

Firstly, I would like to start my article with some much needed good news. If you remember Fizz who I featured last month, she had been at the centre for 6 months. Well happily she has found her forever home, I hope she will be very happy and loved again.

I couldn't believe it when the staff told me but it seems like kitten season has already started this year. It's been a quiet winter really as we have had less cats than normal, but this could be the start of the centre being full by summer time. Our first litter of kittens were born at the Centre after we took in their mother. But our second litter of kittens were brought into us by a local veterinary surgery after the mother was not well enough to feed them. These kittens were not even 2 weeks old and will need round the clock care by my staff. They have to be hand fed every 3 hours which is hard work for my staff but so worth it when you see the little kittens grow up and find their forever homes.

The centre only has a limited capacity of kittens we can look after in our mother and baby unit and we are always full in the summer months. Last year we had over 260 kittens come through the centre, yet people still breed their cats thinking they can make some money. I really hope this year more people get their cats spayed. Did you know if you're struggling to afford getting your cats neutered or spayed the centre can help with the cost. Just give my staff a call to find out more about out neuter vouchers.

BRENT LODGE BRIEFINGS -KEEP CALM AND CARRY ON

In light of the ever-changing situation with Coronavirus we have put some precautions into place to minimise unnecessary social contact.

We ask that anyone who has a wildlife casualty in need of our help please call us on 01243 641672 (ext 1) before bringing it in.

Sadly we will not be taking on any new volunteers at the moment. We hope that 'normal service will resume' soon, as volunteer support is invaluable. We have a responsibility to keep the animal care staff fit and healthy as well as anyone involved in keeping Brent Lodge functioning.

These will be testing times for wildlife rescue centres across the country as we move into one of our busiest seasons. Thankfully we have had a slow start to the season with hardly any babies being brought in, the animal care staff believe this could be down to many nests or habitats destroyed due to the recent flooding. When the hospital does begin to get busy with thousands of wildlife summer casualties our resources will be stretched but we must do what is best for our patients and carry on caring for them. We will continue to do our best to keep the charity running as smoothly as possible and update everyone as soon as anything changes.

If you are staying at home at the moment, then there is a great opportunity for you to spend some time in the garden. Here are some tips written by Ash one of our supporters and keen gardener. To attract and keep wildlife, a garden doesn't just need all the right features in it, it needs an owner who is committed to caring and respectful practices. Certain things like log piles- for insects, reptiles and amphibians – should be left undisturbed long-term or during critical periods like bird nesting season. Avoid cutting hedges during the summer, leave a small margin of long grass in front of them. Should a baby bird fall from the nest or first venture out, they are less likely to be spotted by predators. Leave "decoy branches" on the ground for rabbits to chew if you live in rural areas, which distracts them from the plants or vegetable patches you would rather they avoid – all species deserve equal treatment and care.

Some good news to share... you may remember in the last issue we cared for a swan rescued from Chichester Canal believed to be covered in petroleum based oil. After a short appeal to fund a recovery shed, we are pleased to announce that we have received enough funding to begin construction. This shed will be used as a clean holding pen to help large birds and mammals whilst they gain condition. Once they are well enough, they will be transferred to our outside enclosures to prepare for their release back to the wild.


