

Good luck with this month's competition, have a lovely August, and we hope you enjoy reading the magazine. As usual we are happy to receive submissions and comments.

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
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August is the eighth month of the year in the Julian and Gregorian calendars, and the fifth of seven months to have a length of 31 days.

It was originally named Sextilis in Latin because it was the sixth month in the original ten-month Roman calendar under Romulus in 753 BC, and March was the first month of the year. About 700 BC, it became the eighth month when January and February were added to the year before March by King Numa Pompilius, who also gave it 29 days. Julius Caesar added two days when he created the Julian calendar in 46 BC (708 AUC), giving it its modern length of 31 days. In 8 BC, it was renamed in honor of Augustus. According to a Senatus consultum quoted by Macrobius, he chose this month because it was the time of several of his great triumphs, including the conquest of Egypt. Information from Wikipedia

The high lights quite rightly concentrated on the brave efforts of all our Soldiers, Sailors and Airman who took part or perished in the Normandy landings. Our thoughts in the family were somewhat concentrated on the aftermath when a member of our family died a little after. Wife Sue's Dad Micky Scammells perished at sea while serving on HMS Halstead on the 11th July. It is his story that I relate in this month's edition.

During my research I also came across another story of a Polish WW2 wartime Spitfire pilot who was lost in France shortly after Micky died. He is yet another parent of a family now living in Selsey. Warrant Officer Pilot Alex Chudek DFM died in his Spitfire while over France in June 1944. I hope to tell his story in a future edition of Selsey Life.

Micky Scammells his story:


Micky was born in Westbourne in September 1920. He was then taken for fostering by Mr and Mrs Hall living in Selsey in the old cottages that stood in the High St where the 'Rock Shop' stands now. When this was knocked down the family moved to the cottage next to Methodist Church. As other lads in 20's and 30's Micky left school at 14 and became a shop assistant at various shops around the village. It was not until July 1939 that he joined the Royal Navy (RN) on a regular 12 years engagement.

His S-459 Service Certificate states that Micky joined the RN on the 18th July 1939 for his basic training as a Seaman at HMS Victory in Portsmouth. The next significant date during his time was the passing of his basic swimming test on the 15th August. On the 28th August he was awarded a hurt certificate which must have been for some unspecified type of major injury which may have affected him later during his later RN Service. He then joined the destroyer HMS Wessex (D43) a W Class destroyer that saw service in the final months of WW1 and the early months of WW2. No record of his service here apart from that he may have been in the West Country.

From there he moved back to HMS Victory in May 1940 where he was a month at HMS Dolphin and later at the gunnery school HMS Excellent where he was rated Able Seaman on 18th July 40. From Victory barracks he then



After Beverley Micky joined HMS Saltburn in December 41 and was there till May 1943. Saltburn was a Hunt class Minesweeper built for the RN during WW1. The ship spent World War II as the tender for HMS Dryad, the Royal Navy's Navigation school. On completion of his time here Micky joined what his service certificates name as Saker BDE. Saker was apparently based just outside New York and used by crews picking up ships allocated to the Royal Navy under the provisions of Lend-Lease and also by crews sent to collect ships that had been undergoing long term repair, refitting or construction at United States dockyards. It was here that he joined his last ship HMS Halstead on the first January 44. 1st

of March that year found him back in Blighty in Halstead based at HMS Pembroke IV in Chatham.

Halstead was laid down as the U.S. Navy destroyer escort DE-91 by Bethlehem-Hingham Shipyard, Inc., in Hingham, Massachusetts, on 28 July 1943 and was launched on 14 October 1943. She was allocated to the United Kingdom and received the British name Russell, but the RN soon changed her name to Halsted (sometimes spelled Halstead). She was transferred to the United Kingdom upon completion on 3 November 1943.

Halstead served on patrol and escort duties and on 11 June 1944 after D Day was operating in the English Channel off Cherbourg, France, when German S-boats – known to the Allies as "E-boats" – and the torpedo boats Jaguar and Möwe of Nazi Germany's Kriegsmarine's 5th Torpedo Flotilla attacked her at about 0200. One torpedo struck her forward of her bridge, blowing off most of her bow and damaging her beyond economical repair. Unfortunately Micky perished along with others during this operation, never to be seen again.

Sue remembers:

Late 1941 Micky married my Mum Betty Hardy, a London girl. They subsequently had two children: myself and Danny who was born in May 44. In later years Mum Betty told me that Micky left to catch the bus but returned to say a final farewell. He seemed to have a premonition that he would not return again. Unfortunately because of this he missed the return bus to Portsmouth and arrived back on board adrift (late in RN parlance). For this crime he was deprived of his four year RN good conduct badge. Danny was born on May 17th 1944 and Micky never saw his son.

WORLD WAR 2 MISSING MEDALS MYSTERY by Mary Oliver

You never know where a casual conversation will lead and thanks to Sue Sneath, Nicola Rich and Mary Oliver at The Old Malthouse Residential Care Home in Selsey, the mystery of Bob's missing WW2 medals unravelled.

In 1939, aged 18, Albert (Bob) Walker joined the RAF's Bomber Command and served as a chef in the Mess, feeding the RAF troops around the world. Bob has particularly strong memories of Peshawar (then NW India, now Pakistan) where life under canvas meant dealing with snakes, cooking in midday heat and sleeping in contrastingly cold nights. Bob reached the

rank of Sergeant and when de-mobbed returned to family life in Bognor, as his father set him to work in their Leather Handbag and Luggage shop under the Arcade. With Joan, his wife, Bob raised their children and continued running his shop until early retirement.

his WW2 medals. Without wasting time, with the full support of the Care Home Manager, Angie Shepherd, staff acted quickly on Bob's behalf to investigate further. As Bob still knew his WW2 Service Number, the Ministry of Defence was contacted, Bob's story was relayed and his medals re-applied for.

Within weeks, to everyone's delight, there was a special delivery for Bob; his War Medal 1939-45, Defence Medal and, as a survivor, HM Armed Forces Veterans Badge. It was decided Bob deserved a surprise presentation and celebration - as soon as possible - so a flurry of phone calls followed to local TV, radio, and press, and personal local contacts were approached to help make it happen.

Selsey's Royal British Legion Steward, Mary Haustead, immediately agreed to host the event on Tuesday 9th July 2019 at 2.30pm. The RAF Association (RAFA) South East Area Welfare Office contact, Sue Smith, sent Bob a Squadron tie and, thankfully, gifted funds for his new outfit. When there wasn't enough left to

purchase shoes, 'CosyFeet' footwear company generously donated a pair for Bob. Unfortunately, Tangmere Military Aviation Museum were unable to send

a pair for Bob. Unforti were unable to send a representative, but their Director, Dudley Hooley, promised Bob a VIP visit there instead. Presenting the medals was Bognor's RAF Association's President, Ronald



Flatt, accompanied by the Secretary David Hewings and others. Local singers, Eileen Burgin, Gill Farnden, Peter and Carol Driscoll happily gave their time to don uniform costumes and perform some of Bob's favourite Glenn Miller and Big Band songs from the era.



Grateful thanks goes to them all and those who also helped with the Old Malthouse's own afternoon party, on Friday 12th July, for those unable to attend the actual presentation.

Bob's finally, and proudly, in possession of his long awaited for medals and is enjoying the accompanying attention, interviews and outings - justly deserved after all these years.

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MEMORIES OF SELSEY CARNIVAL

This time last year I produced a Picture Gallery of the Selsey Carnival which included Male's float for 1938, the Hogsnorton Fire Brigade. Following comments that 'Male's always had spectacular floats' I approached Brian Male who kindly scanned the following pictures for me to share with you.



In 1939, Male's built 'Rocket' and the Bognor Regis Observer of 6 September 1939 reported 'an extremely impressive replica of the 'Rocket' complete with smoke... A special prize was also presented to Messrs. Arnell and Male, proprietors of the 'Rocket'.'

As you can imagine, the reporting of the carnival was somewhat overshadowed by the outbreak of WWII. The headline 'Success Despite Crisis Difficulties' just about sums it up.

The Carnival was organised by the Selsey branch of the British Legion to raise money for their Benevolent Fund. The report continues as follows:

'As was to be expected in these critical times, the number of entries was considerably smaller than last year, but that is the same everywhere. A great many visitors have left Selsey but the number of entries was good.

The processions lined up near the Selsey Hotel and the judging took place. The costumes were bright and ingenious and gave the judges a difficult task...

First aid and ARP figured prominently throughout the procession, which made a tour of the town and returned to the Selsey Hotel, where the prizes were presented.

The Selsey Fire Brigade arrived with their engine and added greater pomp to the procession, while the Selsey band provided the music. A certain number of competitors were on horseback and at first the music looked as if it might upset the horses, but a restraining hand works wonders, and the procession moved off amidst showers of paper streamers.'

No doubt onlookers were remembering the carnival of 1935 when Miss B Wesley of Clayton Road was knocked off her horse by another horse which got momentarily out of control. She fell heavily and sustained a fracture of a thigh and other injuries.

Joan Florence was the carnival queen with attendants Nancy Prior, Peggy Boxall, Jessie Fidler and Rosie Butler. I hope the weather was not too warm as Joan wore an ermine cloak. The attendants were dressed in saffron. Following the parade there was a dance at the Marine Hotel which 'advanced into the early hours'.

The street collection made the princely sum of £7 9s. 8d while the overall profit was thought to be between £8 and £10. The Chichester Observer of 9 September 1939 continued the rather sombre theme with the comment that 'The Selsey British Legion members will be engaged in national defence work of great importance during these days, but it is to their credit that they decided to hold the carnival, and thus supply the benevolent fund and other charities with money which they so desperately need.'

Selsey Carnival appears to have been suspended during the War, as we might expect, but a newspaper report of 1949 mentions that 'the Selsey Horticultural Society is to launch another show this year, and hope to link with it a revival of Selsey's pre-war carnival.'

Bearing that in mind, the following pictures must be from after that date and, when time, permits I will endeavour to re-unite them with their press reports.

The first offering is Turkish Delights!

The poor soul being mangled is Vicky Smart.

In the background are, Left to Right, Ern Homer Ron Arnell, Len Lawrence and presiding over the cauldron is Tom Male.



The last picture I have may be rather contentious but I would like to make it clear that neither I nor the owners of Selsey Life condone the 'blackface' child. However, I would ask you to consider this. If we had no documentary evidence of the beheading of Charles I, the burning of Joan of Arc, The Spanish Inquisition and Hitler's Holocaust we would have little knowledge of it. This photograph is 'of its time' when different sensitivities prevailed. Without this evidence, our descendants would have little or no idea of our beliefs and social attitudes and, for that reason, I think it is important we don't airbrush things out of existence.

I think they represent children's literary characters and probably date from the 1950's. Tom the chimney sweep could well be Tom from The Water Babies by Charles Kingsley but most of the others escape me. Any suggestions would be welcomed.

Globe, 21 February 1825

On Tuesday last, a man named Thomas Penny, brought a boat to anchor, within 100 yards of the beach of Selsey, and, thinking the coast clear, threw himself into the sea, with a cask of contraband spirits on his back, and swam ashore. He had, however, scarcely reached land, when he was discovered, pursued, and overtaken, by a coast-blockade-man. A dreadful scuffle now took place. Penny was unarmed; but being possessed of great bodily strength, he defended himself with the utmost desperation against the broadsword of his assailant. He at length fell from loss of blood, having one of his arms broken, an ear completely cut through, and his body literally covered with wounds. The recovery of the unfortunate smuggler is, we understand, rather doubtful.

If I have a son, me and the Mrs will call it Joe – I'll take him down to the river like we used to do, and we'll climb trees as we used to. I love you, brother, and I hope you're happy where you are. Wait for me and I'll see you up there soon enough, best regards, Charlie.

- Cancel regular deliveries such as newspapers and milk. Avoid discussing holiday plans publically on social media



Selsey RNLI all-weather lifeboat aids motorboat with machinery failure.

At 8.30am on Friday 14 June the Uk Coastquard received an emergency call from a 52ft motorboat stating the vessel had machinery failure and were unable to continue their passage. The position of the vessel was 11 miles east of Selsey lifeboat station with three adult males and a dog on board.

The Selsey Shannon class all-weather lifeboat (ALB) was launched at 8.43am and headed towards vessel position. The weather on scene was wind south westerly force 5-6 sea state moderate in cloudy sky. At 9.06am the ALB arrived at the vessel and a line was guickly passed from the lifeboat to enable the tow rope to be hauled to the vessel.

A tow was established between the lifeboat and the casualty vessel and a course was set for Littlehampton Harbour When close to the harbour entrance the tow was shortened for the passage into the harbour. At 10.10am the motorboat

was safely berthed alongside the visitor's pontoon. The ALB

waited in the harbour till 12.00pm to allow the tide to drop away back at Selsey. This allowed for a safer recovery of the boat on to the carriage.

The Alb arrived back at station at 12.33pm and was recovered straight away. The crew today were Coxswain Rob Archibald. 2nd Cox Colin



Pullenger, Mechanic Phil Pitham , Geoff Mellett, James Albrey and Dan Langford.

Selsey RNLI Inshore lifeboat launched to assist Kite boarder

The Inshore lifeboat (ILB) launched at 7.29pm on Sunday 30 June after the UK Coastguards received a report that a Kite boarder was in difficulties off Pagham harbour.

The ILB made best speed to Pagham arriving on scene at 7.42pm .Nothing could be seen in the immediate area accept whilst on route they passed a person on the beach at Park copse at the eastern point of Selsey so went back to talk to the person. The man said he had been having problems on his Kite board and his friend helped him ashore with his paddle board. After reporting this to the Coastguard the ILB was released at 7.54pm.

The ILB was immediately tasked to conduct a search for a possible person in the water in the vicinity of Bognor pier after clothes and a mobile phone were found on the beach. The weather on scene was wind westerly force 4-5 sea state slight in good visibility. The ILB searched along the shore line gradually stepping out until they were a mile off shore. At this stage they requested the assistance of the All-weather lifeboat (ALB) which launched at 8.50pm.

At 10.08pm both lifeboats and the Selsey Coastquard team were released after the police interrogated the Mobile phone and guaranteed the male would not be in the water. Both boats returned to station the ILB beaching at 10.35pm and the ALB at 10.43pm.

The crews today were ILB Helmsman James Albrey, Andy Lee and Harry Emmence.

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European Eel

Alternating currents by Michael Blencowe

In August many of us migrate towards the sea; exchanging our familiar habitats for a few weeks in someplace sunnier and sandier. As we leave our county a mysterious creature, born in the dark depths of a distant ocean, is heading towards Sussex for a holiday of its own.

Let me take you 3500 miles west to the wide Sargasso Sea, an area of the North Atlantic known to superstitious seamen (and Barry Manilow fans) as The Bermuda Triangle. Today the once mythical Sargasso is infamous for being the North Atlantic's waste dump where surface currents deposit our non-degradable floating flotsam. But the Sargasso still holds one last mystery. Each year millions of transparent slithers, like a blizzard of tiny polythene leaves, rise from its depths. It's almost as if the seaweed and the spirits of sunken sailors have merged with the PVC and plastic to create the leptocephali; the larval stage of the European Eel.

These seethrough seafarers go with the flow and slowly drift across the North Atlantic on a three-year Gulf Stream cruise.

Upon reaching Britain's coastal

waters their appearance changes.



They are now wriggling transparent tubes with black eyes: 'glass' eels'. Riding the Rother, Ouse, Cuckmere, Arun and Adur they swim upstream. In these brackish waters their bodies darken; a tidal tan. They are now elvers. They finally make it to their Sussex holiday homes, exchanging saltwater for freshwater in the myriad of streams and brooks that feed our county's rivers. Yellow-bellied and small-eyed these are yellow eels and will holiday here for around 15 to 30 years. But, as with all holidays, the day comes when you have to return home. In the depths of the eel's mind a primeval urge is awakened. The Sargasso is calling. Their bodies harden, their eyes widen, their stomachs shrivel and yellow eels become silver eels and start their epic journey home. Nothing gets



way. Land, traditionally an nconvenient barrier for a fish, does not stop them. On dark, wet nights the silver eels crawl out of the water, slithering snakelike across fields

and back into the river system. Eel c Derek Middleton Sussex Wildlife Trust

They'll pass Rye, Shoreham, Exceat, Newhaven and Littlehampton and head out over the great Atlantic Shelf and into darkness. Here's where the silver eels vanish. Exactly where they go and how they get there is unknown. Yet each year the Sargasso will mysteriously spawn a new cloud of transparent tourists hell-bent on holidaying in Sussex by the Sea.



01/06/19 13:56

Team paged to reports of a missing 9 year old child at West Wittering Beach.

Thankfully stood down en route with child found safe and well, team returned back to station.

01/06/19 14:39

Team paged to reports of 3 missing children between the ages of 4 and 7 years old at West Wittering Beach.

One child was found safe and well en route.

Littlehampton Coastguard Rescue Team, Selsey Inshore Lifeboat and Sussex Police were also tasked to support us.

The 4 year old was found safe and well not long after we began searching.

The 7 year old was last seen in the water between the red and yellow flags and thankfully was found again safe and well around an hour and 15 minutes later by a mixed Coastguard and Police

All assets were stood down to return to station.

01/06/19 17:09

Team paged to reports of a missing 3 year old at West Wittering Beach.

Stood down as we were leaving the station with child found safe and well.

*** Thankfully all children were found safe and well today and were reunited with their families. Please remember that free children safe wristbands are available at the Lifeguard Tower on West Wittering Beach, please use them and put your contact number on them and keep an eye on your children at all times while visiting the beach!**

Team paged to reports of a 54 year old female who had slipped on the shoreline between the last rock armour and Medmerry Breach and had an ankle injury.

Littlehampton Coastguard Team were also tasked and we also requested the support of Selsey Inshore Lifeboat.

The team were able to stabilise the injury before she was then transferred to Selsey Inshore Lifeboat with a Coastguard Rescue Officer and was taken ashore at Selsey Lifeboat Station. The casualty was then taken to hospital from there.

Team paged to reports of two people cut off by the tide on Kirk Arrow off Marine Beach.

The two people had been fly fishing off the bank and hadn't realised how quickly the tide changes there and how strong the water runs. Selsey Inshore Lifeboat was also tasked and picked up the casualties and brought them both safely to the shore where we met

Safety advice was given and both casualties were extremely thankful.

We don't recommend you walk out to Kirk Arrow as the tide changes very quickly and the current is very strong. Thank you to everyone that dialled 999 and asked for the Coastguard, you did the right thing!

09/06/19 11:56

Team paged to reports of possible ordnance on Marine Beach, Selsey.

We met with the first informants who showed us where abouts the item was and were able to describe it to us; unfortunately it had been covered by the tide.

09/06/19 20:32

Team re-tasked at low tide to locate the possible ordnance.

Once the tide had gone out far enough to reveal the object the team took photos of it, which were then sent to E.O.D. (Explosive ordnance disposal team).

We were then stood down at 22:15.

09/06/19 23:40

Team tasked to meet E.O.D (Explosive ordnance disposal team) after they had received the photos of the suspected possible ordnance.

E.O.D. carried out a careful inspection of the item and were able to declare the object safe and not ordnance.

The item is likely to be an old barrel.

Stood down at 00:45

Thank you to the first informants for doing the right thing, but thankfully not ordnance this time.

If you come across something on the beach that you're not sure of or you think it maybe possible ordnance, please do not touch it and dial 999 and ask for the Coastquard straight away. Ordnance found in our area before has been found to be highly Explosive so please do not touch it. Ordnance comes in all shapes and sizes.

11/06/19 23:22

Team paged to reports of a person in the water 150 metres East of Bognor Pier.

Littlehampton Coastguard Team and both Littlehampton Lifeboats were also tasked with Sussex Police and the Ambulance Service. The casualty was rescued by the lifeboat and passed to Coastguard Rescue Officers and brought to shore where they were transferred into a stretcher and taken to the awaiting ambulance. Once the casualty was safely in the ambulance we were stood down leaving the casualty in the care of the ambulance service and the police.

Returning to station at 1am.

22/06/19 17:00

Team paged to reports of clothes floating in the River Arun 300 metres north of the bridge on the A259.

The team commenced a search of the river and located the clothes, taking a closer look at the various items of clothing we believed no one was in danger and the clothes had been stolen and dumped as some still had hangers and tags on them.

The clothes were gathered up and photos were taken and sent to our Operations Room and the Police have been informed. The team were then stood down to return to station.

29/06/19 13:14

Team paged to Bracklesham Beach, to reports of a person in difficulty in the water after they had fallen from their vessel.

Hayling Lifeboat and Chichester District Councils Safety boat were also both on scene.

Thankfully the person managed to get back aboard his vessel and was all ok, Hayling Lifeboat requested the casualty to see us on the beach where safety advice was given.

The team were then stood down to return to station.

29/06/19 16:27

Team paged to West Wittering Beach, to reports of a missing child; en route we were informed another two children were missing.

Thankfully all children were found shortly after arriving on scene. FREE child safe wristbands are available at the Lifeguard Tower at West Wittering Beach. Please make sure you use them and keep an eye on your children at all times when visiting the beach. The team were then stood down to return to station.

29/06/19

As the team were just leaving the car park at West Wittering Beach after looking for missing children, we were flagged down by staff members from the Estate to return immediately to the Lifeguard Tower due to a sand hole collapse on the

A 9 year old child had become trapped in the sand after she had

been digging a hole and the sand giving way covering her.

The parents of the child, lifequards and the team would like to thank the guick thinking of the members of the public that were on the beach for helping the child and digging her out with their hands. The child was checked over by Lifeguards and a Coastguard Rescue Officer and thankfully the child was ok although a little sandy and shocked.

Sand hole digging dangers:

Why digging deep holes in the sand can be dangerous.

Sandhole collapses are rare but can be lethal if you become trapped in one. There's nothing wrong with digging holes at the beach and filling them with water for your kids to play in. But if you dig a hole so deep that your head is barely poking out or burrow into a sand dune then you could be putting your life at risk. If it's taken you three hours to dig your hole - that's how long it might take someone to dig you out.

These deeper types of holes are highly unstable. The wet harder sand that you dig out will dry out in the sun making it loose and the deeper you dig the more danger there is of the hole collapsing inwards and potentially trapping you inside.

The best way to rescue someone is to create a circle of people digging with their hands, then another outer circle will do the same while also removing the sand from the first circle, more circles of people digging will be added as they become available. This will then create a wider shallow hole with no risk of any further sand hole collapse.

We want you to enjoy yourselves at the beach - that's what it's there for - just take extra care when digging large holes that could trap you if they collapse.

Let's share this and tell as many people as we can in time for the school holidays.

Stay safe folks and remember to call 999 and ask for the coastguard if you see someone in difficulty.

In an emergency out at sea, on the beach, or along the coast dial 999 and ask for the Coastguard!

30/06/19 19:23

Team paged with Selsey Inshore Lifeboat to a kite surfer down

and in possible difficulty between Park Copse and **Pagham Harbour** entrance.

Thankfully the kite surfer had made it ashore safely and all was well the call was made with good intent.



All assets were then stood down to return to station.

30/06/19 20:00

As we were stood down from the previous incident and returning to station we were tasked to a

possible missing person from Bognor Seafront after personal items had been found on the beach.

Selsey Inshore Lifeboat were also tasked followed by Selsey All Weather Lifeboat later on to join the search, with two Coastguard Search Teams searching from the shore, and Sussex Police making further enquiries inland as well.

With no further information at this time and a full search pattern carried out with the information we had been given all assets were stood down and the incident was left with Sussex Police returning to station just before 23.00.

our chosen charity the Selsey Community First Responders. Gary Sharp from the First Responders gives an overview below on what this money will help to provide.

The Selsey Community First Responders (SCFR) Scheme wish to say a huge thank you to the Selsey Walking and Outdoor Festival/ Open Gardens team for their organisation of a fantastic event and to all the garden owners who chose to present their gardens in such a fabulous way to be enjoyed by all those who visited on

the day of the Selsey Open Gardens event. Everyone's hard work culminated in SCFR being presented with a cheque for a magnificent £3,136.

Whilst South East Coast Ambulance (SECAMB) recruit and provide the initial and on-going training for our Responders ensuring that they are always compliant with best practise. CFR are responsible for ensuring that the Responders are fully supported to fulfil their

roles, which are given on a voluntary basis.

We supply our Responders with a defibrillator, medical supplies, a uniform and the transport to respond when assigned to a 999

emergency call by SECAMB.

SCFR has a fleet of 3 cars at present bought from contributions made by Selsey Town Council, local businesses and the people of Selsey. Each vehicle has to be taxed, insured and serviced, as required.

In addition, SCFR has over the past 2 to 3 years procured and installed defibrillators in eleven locations throughout Selsey.

It is hoped that with the continued generosity of the Selsey community,

the installations of the defibrillators will be extended in the coming years but our first priority will always be to keep our Responders on the road helping to save lives in the community......every second

Comment and opinion by Bryn Edgar

For those of us who value the natural environment, we are so lucky to live in Selsey; although we have gradually become a largely urban community over the past 75 years, we still retain much of the feel and heritage of the rural and coastal village that we once were, where fishing and agriculture were the main activities. While we no longer have working farms and riding stables in our midst, as was the case until the 1970s, we still have an active community based fishing industry; and we are still surrounded by agricultural and horticultural land producing crops- though sadly we have lost the dairy, pig and poultry farming activity. The up-side is that we have lost the occasional whiffs of farm and stable aroma, and the annual "muck-spreading" pong we once experienced. The smell of rotten fish may still assail us from time to time, though- but if that is the price for keeping our fishing industry, then I for one am willing to pay it!

With the expansion of the "built environment" in our town, wildlife in all its forms has to a great extent been displaced to the outer fringes of the community and beyond; though some pockets of undeveloped land remain where wildlife can still retain a foothold, and there are plenty of parks and managed amenity areas in the town where wildlife can still be found. This creates a problem for residents and wildlife alike, as too many of us are unaware how they should behave when they are in contact with wildlife living among us.

Those who have grown up in a rural or coastal community learned to live with wildlife in all its manifestations and know how to co-exist with nature without intruding on it. Those who come from an urban background have little opportunity to absorb such knowledge in the same way as their "country cousins"- and while an hour or two of nature study for our young people in the class-room each week at our "Academies", with a couple of "field trips" into the countryside or along the beach each year are better than nothing, they will not of themselves close the knowledge gap. The fact that many adults who now live in Selsey were brought up and educated in an urban environment also adds to the problem.

The clue to the problem lies in the word "wildlife"; these are wild creatures, to be admired and studied by us from a distance, but otherwise allowed to live out their natural lives without interference or intervention from us. By seeking to "prettify" their natural habitat as so often happens because "it spoils the view from our window", we are in effect denying them the right to live as nature intended. If we compound this by treating them as a slightly more nomadic version of domesticated animals, then again we do them no favours.

Leaving out human food- particularly processed food- for the "top" predators such as foxes is not good for their health or their digestive systems. It dulls their hunting instincts, as they will naturally seek out the easy pickings. Likewise, throwing out vast quantities of bread and similar items to wild birds in our gardens, or to waterfowl at the East Beach pond, has a similar effect.

Put out suitable bird-seed (or grain for the waterfowl) in the depths of winter by all means, as that will cause no long term harm; but going beyond that will. Over-provision of food- even suitable food-will cause over-population of their habitat, and destroy the natural balance. Whether it is in the wild undeveloped areas of our town, or in the managed amenity areas, there is a natural limit to the number of creatures that can be supported. Too many wild birds being fed the wrong food creates pollution, as happened at East Beach not so long ago, killing off their natural food and leading to a collapse in bird numbers. By leaving them to their own devices, and allowing them to live off their natural environment- rather than supplementing their diet with unnecessary and possibly harmful human food- things do eventually return to normal.

The same applies to the predator wild animals and birds, such as foxes, crows, and gulls; by feeding them when it is not necessary, they overbreed and over-predate; left to their own devices, they will find the natural balance that can be sustained in their habitat. If there isn't enough food for them here, they will soon move on to pastures (or woods and copses) new, re-establishing the natural order of things.

A good illustration of the whole problem is the way so many of us reacted to the recent incursion onto our beaches by a seal. Seals have been a part of Selsey's (and the wider Solent area's) wildlife scene for centuries; the very name of our town derives from "seal's lea", or seal's meadow. Seals used the marshy meadows around Selsey, Medmerry, and Chichester Harbour as "haul out" areas, where they could rest, bask in the sun- and perhaps breed. Seals often turn up around our beaches, but are not always as visible as this year.

Unfortunately, instead of just walking past the seal, or observing it from a distance (100 metres away is quite close enough), too many of us could not resist treating the animal who came ashore last month like an exhibit in a zoo; it was even given a pet name, as if it was a domestic or farm animal to be stroked or petted. It is a wild animal; and while most people had the sense to remain above the high water mark and didn't try to get near it, or touch it, they still remained too close and for prolonged periods. This gave the animal no chance to rest and bask, as it was constantly on the lookout for people trying to get even closer. In fact one young couple who had seen the seal bobbing about just off the beach, making sure that the coast was clear (sorry!)- then sat on a groyne near the water's edge, waiting for it to come ashore- not a chance with them there!

Seals are very inquisitive by nature; there's many a time when someone swimming at East Beach has been frightened out of their wits by a seal suddenly popping its head out of the water right next to them, just to see what's going on. As soon as it's obvious that no harm's going to be done to them, they can be quite happy to frolic around the swimmer all the time they remain in the water-just don't try to get closer, AND DON'T TRY TO TOUCH THEM!

Seals weren't always too popular among the fishermen, though, as they often robbed the lobster pots of their contents; on occasion they would decide that an unattended dinghy on a mooring was the ideal platform to haul out for rest and recuperation- and 100-150 kgs of seal trying to get aboard a small boat afloat on the water can cause quite a bit of damage! They weren't always popular with the Lifeboat crew either, as they seemed to think that the old off-shore boathouse slipway was a good spot to haul out..... Seals also make a sound easily mistaken for the human voice when they are calling to each other at sea; this is especially disconcerting when it is misty, as the noise they make is very much like a human crying out for help- so much so that a member of the lifeboat crew was genuinely taken in by this one misty morning, and called out the inshore lifeboat. I hear he did live it down- eventually!

I think we all have to understand that if we are to sustain wildlife in our midst, then we must treat it as such, and not treat it as we do our domestic animals- beyond providing emergency rations and fresh water for the birds in the depths of winter. It may seem cruel and heartless, but so is nature. These are creatures of nature living in their natural environment; if we treat them as such, no matter how cruel that may seem, then natural selection will enable them to survive and thrive.





Pagham Harbour

Our new wildflower area in our Discovery Zone is proving a magnet for bees, butterflies and a host of other insects of all shapes and sizes. Taking a moment to stand still and just look, I quickly loose count of the variety of bees and wasps busily going about their frenetic lives. There are tiny ones maybe 2 mm in length, large round bumble bees and all manner of sizes in between, gathering pollen from the daisies and thistles gently swaying in the light summer breeze.

In the UK there are approximately 270 species of bee and 9000 species of wasp. Of these only 9 species of wasp and 20 species of bee are social, nesting and living in colonies. The rest are solitary and generally harmless. Many are fantastic pollinators while others hunt and predate other insects, often controlling pests in our gardens and allotments.

On the bee bank digger wasps and mining bees make short work of burrowing into the sand where they will lay their eggs left with a food provision of pollen, or prey if they are predatory.


Mason and leafcutter bees have moved into our bee hotels. Like the miners, they deposit a cache of pollen before laying an egg and sealing the chamber. Mason bees seal each chamber with




Orange Vented Mason Bee

mud, while the leafcutter bees, as their name suggests, use leaves which they also like to line the nest with. They then start the process again, making many chambers in one nest hole. In the autumn the larvae will spin a cocoon in which they will overwinter eventually emerging as adults in spring and summer the following year.

Moving from flower to flower collecting pollen, they vie for space with the hoverflies and beetles, while grasshoppers chirrup below and butterflies flit among the stems and dance above the blooms. Resting in a clearing in the sunshine. I spot one of my favourite butterflies. A small copper. When open, the forewings of this small pretty butterfly are bright orange with dark edges and spots, while the hindwings are dark with an orange edge. All these insects are just a tiny part of this flourishing ecosystem, which in turn supports other wildlife. Now is the time to take a summers walk in the countryside and see what you can discover among the wild



Brent Lodge Briefing -It's heating up at the hospital

It's been a busy summer already in the hospital, with an abundance of wildlife in need. The staff have truly been run off their feet, at this time of year


we always see an influx of young wildlife, who are all very needy requiring several feeds around the clock. We have seen everything from herring gulls to the tiniest of garden birds and not forgetting our baby mammals.

The staff have already become fond of a few of our patients including this tiny pipistrelle bat, believed to be caught by a cat. We have also seen a very high number of dehydrated wildlife brought to us which



is due to the extreme heat. As a result of the influx of patients, we are desperately in need of extra help from more volunteers. Our hospital staff always need help to clean and feed the many wildlife patients in our care, this is something we are eternally grateful for on any day of the week.

Whilst most of us have been enjoying the warm weather of late, please do remember your wildlife friends who can find it increasingly difficult to find water for drinking and bathing, during this very hot period. Providing regular bowls of clean water in your garden can help birds, hedgehogs and their young survive these very testing times.



This swan was brought to us with a fishing hook in its mouth it is now receiving treatment by our vet. An important message for people to tidy up after themselves when fishing, we receive many sea birds that have either ingested or become entangled in fishing lines or hooks. We have now raised enough funds to purchase 6 new swan bags to help with transportation to and from vet appointments.

The mobility of swans should be restricted during transportation; they should ideally be unable to stand or "flap", and this can be easily achieved with purpose made swan transportation bags. We are currently using large IKEA shopping bags but as you could imagine these do not restrict their movement enough.

We hope to see you at our Supporters Day on Saturday 17th August 11am to 4pm. The day will be focused on our work, our mission as well as a chance to see our future plans as we move towards our 50th anniversary in 2021.




It has been hard to find the words that do such an amazing man justice. Dennis was a selfless. larger than life man who dedicated his life to
