Sadly, we bid farewell to LINC this month, they were unable to get any volunteers to take it on. We wish Beryl and the others all the best for the future.





As we approach the end of 2019, The Selsey Community First Responders Scheme would like to thank all of our supporters, who have given so generously to the Scheme during the past vear

From our Corporate Partners (Bunn Leisure, S-Fabs and Trident Structures), local organisations and clubs (Selsey Open Gardens and Walking Festival, Manhood Classic Cars, The Shantymen, Gainsborough Singers, Sue Bringloe Yoga Class, Selsey Golf Ladies and Veterans, West Sussex Carpet Bowls, Crablands Bowls, Selsey Fireworks, The Lions, St Wilfrids Swimathon, The Local Business Alliance, The Seal, Brian Ridley (the busking flautist) and all of the good people of Selsey who have put a donation into our collection boxes distributed around the town. And to our own team of fundraisers for their fantastic commitment and hard work in attending Lifeboat Day, the Village Fete, numerous Table Top Sales and for organising a very successful Curry and Quiz Night and the recent Christmas Market at Selsey Town Hall.

Finally to Colin Rose (Rose Electricals) who gives his time free of charge installing the Defibrillators around the town.

Every penny received is invested back into the Scheme.

The Scheme is totally dependent upon donations to operate as we receive no financial support from either the local ambulance authority (SECAMB) or the NHS.

Whilst SECAMB are responsible for the recruitment and training and the on-going assessment of our Responders, our Scheme is responsible for providing everything else, from vehicles, uniforms and maintaining the operability of the defibrillators around the town.

The Scheme also purchases defibrillators for each of our Responder team, who are all volunteers giving up their personal time to help the Selsey community when asked to attend a medical emergency by the ambulance authority.

The base annual cost, to the Scheme, of car tax, car Insurance, vehicle maintenance and maintaining the Defibrillators is £3,500 and additionally, each Responder defibrillator costs £1,000+

To date, with the donations from the Selsey community, the Scheme has been able to purchase and install 11 Public Access Defibrillators (PADS) around the town. Given our relative remoteness on the Manhood peninsular, a combination of Responders and PADS (each defibrillator and cabinet costs in excess of £1,500) is vital in helping to save lives in the community.





#### THE BILL HOUSE **GRAFTON ROAD. SELSEY**


One of the largest and most imposing buildings in Selsey today is, without doubt, The Bill House so it seemed remiss not to investigate its history, particularly when one is allowed to copy this picture:



Here we see The Bill House and Its tower but, in the background, part of the roof and a single storey building are waiting to be completed and there is scaffolding still in place. The twenty workmen are standing in a row with their hats firmly on their heads, wearing their waistcoats, aprons and overalls.

We can almost exactly date this photograph thanks to the fact that in the 1990's The Bill House was listed by Historic England. The architect was Mackay Hugh Baillie Scott, born in 1865, and he designed this house in an Arts and Crafts vernacular revival style, L-plan with service wing to the north and main wing to the south in 1907. He also collaborated with Archibald Knox on the design of stained glass and fire-grates so he was an important man!

The roofs were constructed of 'graded slate' which was carted from the station to the house by Harry Prior with the biggest slates being placed just above the roof plate and the lightest higher up.



And here is a picture of the man himself, taken in 1934.

The stones in the courtyard were laid by Bill Lelliott, senior, who said they were taken from the beach. It is unlikely this occurred when the house was built as Bill Lelliott senior wasn't born until 1910 but perhaps the courtyard was refurbished later.

Kelly's Directory of 1909 shows that the owner of Bill House was Byron Peters and he continued to own it until at least 1917. He's a very interesting man and will be the subject of a follow-up article.

In 1918 the House was owned by Lieutenant Colonel C Smith, hotly followed in 1920 by Captain John A Hare and his wife Selina. They had been long-time residents of Selsey and had lived in East Street since 1881.

By 1927 the House had changed hands yet again and its new owner. Mr C F Chapman, was offering one of his rooms to be used as a Chess Club.

John Gibson Jarvie, Barrister, was the owner in 1930. He, at least, had a connection with Selsey as Ted (Edward Morton) Barford, son of Percy Crompe Barford MB, LRCP, one of Selsey's much loved GPs, worked in the barrister's office.

He then sold the House to Sir Felix John Morgan Brunner, Bart. Lady Elizabeth Brunner was the grand-daughter of Sir Henry Irving, the famous Victorian actor/manager. Sir Felix continued to live at Bill House and referred to it as his 'country seat'.



And now we are entering the territory of living memory so I'm looking for help from here on in. In 1950 Cecil Stone and his merry men, including a very young John Mariner, refurbished The Bill House. The main job was to install central heating. John tells me that the pipes were too long to go up the internal stairs without being cut into small sections so they scouted round the house and found ventilation holes in a gable end. They erected scaffolding, carried the pipes up and fed them through the holes. Once the major works were complete the house was painted inside and out.

In 1954 Roy Saunders owned the property. Roy was a member of the Selsey Players who played the part of a doctor in a production of 'Suspect' in November 1955. He was well gualified to do this as, in real life, he was a member of the medical profession.

Now we can take up the story of the House again because, in 1957, the League of Friends of Normansfield was formed by Lady Brain and Colonel Symmons and money was raised to provide, amongst other things, The Bill House at Selsey, Sussex as a holiday home. Normansfield was founded in May 1868 by Dr John Langdon-Down and his wife, Mary, as a private home for those with a learning disability, especially for the children of the upper classes whom they sought to educate and train to the full extent of their capabilities. Normansfield was in Kingston Road, Teddington and John Langdon-Down is the physician who first identified and described Down's Syndrome (in 1868) although the condition did not bear his name until the mid 1960's.

## past times

Standing in grounds of about one and a quarter acres there are superb sea views from many rooms and a foreshore frontage of about 245ft.

The spacious accommodation in the main residence includes six bedrooms (three of 20ft plus), two bathrooms and four reception rooms


The lofty lounge has part-panelled walls, timber studding and beams and an inglenook fireplace. Across the courtyard and archway is the annexe with two/three bedrooms, living room, kitchen and bathroom.

Leading off from the hallway is the three storey tower approached by a narrow spiral staircase and from the top floor are magnificent panoramic sea views.

There is also a detached bungalow in the grounds with two bedrooms, living room, kitchen and bathroom. Outbuildings include a detached games room and the lawns extend on all sides of the main house with ample scope for parking."

Nowadays, The Bill House is a dementia care home operated by Alexander Park Homes Limited.

And finally, here are some more pictures of The Bill House. The first two are from Historic England:

Here we can see the house with its gardens and tennis court. Perhaps the bathing huts were for family members. I'm intrigued by the fact that they seem to be divided into two groups and I wonder if this was Ladies and Gentlemen's huts. Who knows? Perhaps someone does and will let me know.

The huts are gone but the tennis court remains. You can see the extent of the coastal erosion over the preceding 20 odd years. Some sea defences have been erected by the tennis court and groynes installed. There are many more people on the beach and 8 cars are parked in the road. Some trees seem to have disappeared while the gardens have a slightly unkempt look.

#### Door-to-Door Scams

Many legitimate businesses sell products door-to-door (windows, solar, panels, cleaning products, home maintenance, tree surgeons etc.). Gas, electricity and water companies will also visit to read meters. In addition charities may visit to ask for donations or post collection bags for you to fill and leave out for collection. However, scammers also do the above to part you from your money, gain entry to your home to steal, or profit by posing as charities in order to collection donations.

#### What you should know:

Door-to-door scams involve selling goods or services that are not delivered or are very poor quality. You won't get value for money and you may get billed for work you didn't want or didn't agree to. Some scammers conduct surveys so they can obtain your personal details or disguise their real intent to sell you goods or services you don't want or need (e.g. unnecessary roofing work or patio replacement).

Door-to-door sales are normally uninvited and the people selling MUST leave if you ask them to.

Even when a genuine business and product is being sold, unscrupulous employees can sometimes still act illegally. If someone knocks at your front door claiming to be from a company also check their ID. If you are not happy then do not let them into your home.

Never ring the telephone number on the ID card. Tell them to wait outside, shut the door, and ring the genuine number from the telephone book or website.

# Sussex Wildlife Trust Blackcap

#### Home for Christmas

Sussex is no place for a warbler in winter. As daylight, temperature and their insect food dwindles, blackcaps, whitethroats, chiffchaffs, reed, sedge and willow warblers all evacuate England. Each September their fragile, feathered bodies fly to Spain and sub-Saharan Africa on the promise of warmth, food and, ultimately, life. So finding a blackcap swinging on your

birdfeeder in December will be as unlikely as seeing Santa at a midsummer barbeque. But at Christmas miracles can happen.

Blackcaps return to England in April. Cuckoos and chiffchaffs, also early migrants. broadcast their arrival with their monotonous two-note tune but

the blackcap lets loose a rich,

cheated death for another winter.

This colourful song comes from a colourless bird, yet there's something stylish and continental about the blackcap's appearance. Their two-tone grey suit and black beret pulled over dark eyes make them look like some Parisian beatnik. You'd expect to catch one sat in a willow smoking Gauloises and



muttering about Sartre. The female bird's beret is a rich chestnut brown; hardly qualifying her to use the name blackcap at all.

The laws of nature clearly state that all European blackcaps must migrate south for the winter. But in the sixties a small gang of nonconformist blackcaps in Germany started a revolution. They headed south-west instead of south, ending up in England. Mother Nature is not kind to those who disobey her rules and this suicide squad was surely

sentenced to a frozen death in our frosty winter. But instead they found a new England. A land of mild winters, ornamental berry bushes and kind people who hung balls of fat in their gardens. They didn't freeze and starve. They survived.

Not only that; the following spring's short flight home to Germany meant they arrived ahead of their law-abiding neighbours, who were still struggling back from their long-haul holiday. The returning rebels were able to claim the best territories and produce larger families. They raised more revolutionaries who returned to England each winter. Now a small population of blackcaps make our gardens their winter home; exotic apparitions of summer amongst the robins and frost. They'll be gone again by the time 'our' British blackcaps return, exhausted and oblivious, in April.

Animal migration is amazing. Each year across Europe millions of perilous journeys are undertaken as birds, bats, butterflies and other wildlife flee hostile conditions. Each year we as our own species have been forced to make dangerous migrations to survive. The paths of refugees and migrating birds will cross as both are forced on journeys over the same treacherous mountains and seas. Let's hope they all find someplace safe this Christmas.

## A flamboyance of finches!

Just as the numbers of our winter wildfowl and waders build up at this time of year, large flocks of songbirds gather in the fields around Medmerry. These mixed flocks are typically made

up of finches, pipits and buntings. Goldfinches are immediately recognisable with white cheeks, red face and yellow wing bars. Chaffinch have white shoulder patches and stripes on their wings. The males have a blue-grey head and pinkish breast.





Goldfinch - Ben Andrew Linnets, a finch of open countryside and farmland, are typically brown but the males sport crimson chests and foreheads. Corn buntings, yellowhammers and meadow pipits usually make up the other species in these mass accumulations, which

may number well in excess of a

thousand birds. Like an explosion, the air erupts in a cloud of birds signifying the arrival of a hunting peregrine or merlin hurtling onto the scene like a missile. The sight of predator and prey locked in aerial pursuit is an experience to quicken the pulse and never be forgotten. This is nature in its rawest and most fundamental form, an intense life and death battle of agility, strength and guile. It may not be the Serengeti, but these natural spectacles can be just as exhilarating.

Meanwhile, the bleaker weather draws some more unusual finches to our feeders outside the Visitor Centre. Siskins and redpolls are resident all year round, but their populations are boosted in winter with



migrants from Scandinavia and





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#### Selsey Sea Bathing Society – the story so far

I've always loved the sea. I grew up in Cornwall and my grandparents, who we'd stay with several times a year, lived along the coast of the Gower peninsula, in Wales. I felt lucky, spending summer weekends by the beach and winter months on coastal walks along some of the most awe-inspiring scenery in Britain.

But I didn't just love looking out to sea, I loved being in it too. I didn't think about it too much back then, it was just the way it was and I assumed everyone felt the same. My Dad would take me to the beach and teach me how to dive into the oncoming waves, respecting but enjoying the power of the ocean along Cornwall's Atlantic coast. And as I grew older, I continued to gravitate to the coast. My university choice was Bournemouth, lying on the equally beautiful, but rather busier, Dorset coastline. And then a few vears later, life led me to live on a big freshwater lake - Garda, in Northern Italy.

Water is in my blood, there's no doubt about it. Anything to do with swimming in the sea, lake, or a river excites me. I love vintage sea bathing scenes depicted in posters and photography. I love the recent surge in refurbing old worn out lidos. Locations which tap into this culture call out to me. Margate is one, playing host to a beautiful brand called Haekels which uses sustainable methods to gather seaweed to produce wonderful natural skincare. I adored their Kickstarter campaign to build an old-fashioned sea bathing machine -- those incredible looking huts-on-wheels that Victorian ladies used to get changed in. Haekels is the perfect example of a beautiful business built on ethics and driven by a passion for the sea.

#### Selsey comes a-calling

For the past 17 years, despite spending most of my time in, or just outside London, I've had my sea fixes from Selsey, a little seaside town near Chichester, West Sussex. Selsey is often overlooked by its neighbours, which I'm guite pleased about in a way. Crowds queue for hours to get to nearby West Wittering and pass by this little gem of a place without a second glance. Yet not only does Selsey have a rich fishing heritage, described recently in a wonderful film called Seas The Day, it's surrounded on two sides (almost four) by exceedingly good quality water. So good in fact, that Selsey Bill and The Hounds has just been made a Marine Conservation Zone. This is due to its high biodiversity and species richness which come in the form of kelp forests and the Short Snouted Sea Horses, who make it their home.

So, it's always struck me as odd that I'm usually the only one taking a dip at Selsey. I wake up and look out to sea - the sparkling water, little fishing boats bobbing up and down and an incredible view of the Isle of Wight just makes me want to dive right in. The views are to die for, but on top of that, Selsey is flanked by not one, but two RSPB nature reserves. The sea is generally pretty swimmable - if West Beach is too rough, there is always East Beach. In a relatively small area, we're totally spoilt for choice.

#### Difficult times lead to beautiful things

Then, a year and a half ago I broke almost everything possible in my knee. The pebbly shores of Selsey were too much to manage in my vulnerable state and for once, the sea scared me. So, I stayed alongside it; always near it, but not in it. And during that time, I found myself in conversations with others who, like me, longed to dive in, but for various reasons could not. Those reasons turned out to be "I'm a bit scared on my own" or "I've lost my confidence", or "I'd like to, but I've got no one to go with".

#### And so last November, and by this time back in the sea, an idea began to take shape.

I wanted to create a small society for people who are passionate about the sea but have either stopped swimming because they don't enjoy going in alone, or those who had lost their confidence, or those who just felt the need for a bit of encouragement. The idea began with celebrating the environment, but at the heart of it

all actually lay community. What I've realised it that it's in sharing a love of the sea where joy truly manifests itself.

And then one day, by chance, I saw an article in the local paper advertising for people to come forward with ideas to win funding from the local council for projects which benefitted the local community. Bingo. This would give me the structure I needed to get my idea off the starting block. But there was a problem – there was one day to go until the closing date and I was off on holiday the following morning.

#### When fate takes over

There are times, as you've no doubt experienced yourself, when something else just seems to just take over. It's almost as if you're being guided towards achieving what you most long for. I managed to get the application in on time and on my return, pestered the council enough (but not too much) to get the Selsey Sea Bathing Society project live on their crowdfunding project page. Then, I got in touch with a local councillor to explain the idea with the hope of getting her support - an important ingredient. You've got to get into full PR mode, as well as funding mode and before long, with a little financial support from my own business, friends and family, locals and a few others far and wide who'd heard about it, began financially supporting the campaign. I didn't ask for much, but enough people chipped in to mean that the council's fund pretty much matched the donations.

Marketing and more PR began at that point. Planning and designing flyers to put all around the town. Dropping them into any high street shop that would support us, chatting to locals, writing for the local magazine, giving talks to the local WI groups, visiting the Town Council and readily offering support for their existing initiatives. And of course, building the website, blog and Instagram pages.

#### Why it means so much to me

Fast forward six months and the Selsey Sea Bathing Society is flourishing. It has no lofty objectives and asks little of anyone. It just is. And each month around 30 people turn up knowing they'll

have a few hours of laughter, joy and usually a dip in the sea. And despite the initial pain it always, always, leaves them feeling a million times

better than before. The format



remains simple. We gather, I give a guick overview of what's happening and any updates and then we head off to the sea for a bathe. And if anyone doesn't feel up to it, they either paddle or watch. We always laugh and we encourage and help those into the sea who may find it challenging that day, for whatever reason. People stay in for as little or long as they like and then drift back to the house where tea and home-made cake (made by members of the group) awaits. We don't charge, it's free for anyone coming along, but we do put a pot out for small donations which we'll eventually decide on a suitable local charity to invest it in.

In the winter months, for the first time ever, I've personally decided to try and keep bathing going throughout the year. This wouldn't have happened without the enthusiasm of others in the group and I'm sure our mental, as well as physical health, will benefit as a result. But for those who understandably find that a bit much, we're arranging talks and walks and sea-related film showings to keep the community thriving throughout the winter months.

#### Why community is so important

There's so much happening in the world right now to be anxious

about. Protestors who bring London to a standstill, to raise awareness for causes they know we can't afford to ignore, ignite both passion and fury. Fake news and mis-sold political promises. A Parliament who can't work together to make their minds up. A gradual collective waking up in the knowledge that our environmental future, which even an optimist can see, looks bleak, and the move as a nation, towards individuality and away from collective decision-making. Whatever your views, we can all agree on one thing - it's an unsettling period in British, world and human history.

Yet this little community, which continues to flourish on simplicity, seems to me a brief shelter from the world. It's a genuine and authentic place because of that simplicity. Right from the outset the Selsey Sea Bathing Society has attracted the most wonderful people. People with an open, warm and encouraging mindset. We gather for ourselves, for what we each personally need, but in equal measure we are also there for each other - which is exactly

#### Selsey bathing water achieves excellent status for 2020

Bathing water at Selsey beach has achieved excellent status for the second year running.

The bathing water was awarded the classification by Defra (Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs) following monitoring by the Environment Agency between May and September.

Chichester District Council has been supporting a partnership project led by Southern Water to improve bathing water quality over the last two years.

"This is wonderful news for residents and visitors and means people can enjoy the highest bathing water standards possible," says Alison Stevens, Divisional Manager for Environmental Protection at Chichester District Council. "Selsey bathing water was previously classified as good, but it has improved significantly over recent years. This has been achieved through the partnership project with Southern Water and through our education and awareness-raising campaigns such as Yellow Fish, Only Rain Down the Drain and Against Litter.

"We are very pleased that the three monitored beaches within the Chichester District are now rated 'excellent'."

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#### iiildlife Sussex Wildlife Trust Earthworms

#### Without whom none of this would be possible

We can spend all day planting and pruning, weeding and seeding, grunting and groaning in our gardens but it's time to face the facts folks. Us gardeners aren't the ones who are doing the hard work. The real toil is in the soil - the engine room of the garden. Because down there, beneath our wellies, earthworms are wriggling, recycling and reincarnating our gardens.

They're so easily taken for granted. An earthworm isn't much to look at. A tube made of muscles with a mouth at one end and a bum at the other but he and she (they're hermaphrodites) is responsible for making your garden grow. These burrowing beauties really mix it

up in the mud. Some drag dead

leaves deep underground while their wormcasts return essential minerals back to the surface. This improves soil structure and their tiny tunnels help with drainage and allow aeration.

Cleopatra declared them to be sacred and Aristotle called earthworms 'the intestines of the soil'. Indeed, at some point every bit of your garden would have passed through a worm's belly. They munch their way through dead organic matter and make it available to even smaller decomposers - fungi and bacteria - who break it down even further. The nutrients released are



reabsorbed by our plants. What once was dead is returned to the living. It's one of those 'circle of life' things.

There's about 3000 different earthworm species worldwide with around 27 native species in Britain. There's lobs under your lawn and brandlings in your compost bin. Some species live in leaf litter others dig deep in the soil. There

could be up to 2 million worms working underground in an area the size of a football pitch.

Earthworms are part of a wildlife workforce that lives in your garden and provides an essential service for free. Birds, bees, beetles, fungi, hoverflies, woodlice and many others volunteer for us as pollinators, pest controllers, decomposers and recyclers. All we need to do is give them a home and leave them to it and they'll get on with the dirty work.

But it's the earthworm who is seen as the kingpin of the whole operation. "It may be doubted whether there are many other animals which have played so important a part in the history of the world as these lowly organised creatures". Charles Darwin said that - and I'm not going to argue with him. We just can't live without them. So it's about time we start paying earthworms some respect and attention. Because when we're all dead and buried they'll be paying a whole lot of attention to us.

# In the Garden our monthly guide to gardening - written by Giles Peare award winning broadcaster

# Jobs for **December** This is the time to move plants that are in the wrong place.

It is a good time to transplant small trees and shrubs, prepare the new planting site first, digging deeply and forking in some compost and well rotted manure. Dig up the plant with as large a rootball as possible and move it to its new home firming well in, keep well watered until it is well established.

Prune Apple and Pears at this time to control their size and shape, remove badly placed or crossing branches and any showing signs of damage or disease.

Cut out congested shoots that are growing inwards towards the centre of the crown in order to let more air and light into the heart of the tree. A small pruning saw is ideal because its short sharp blade allows you to get right into cramped areas.

Check all gutters for any collected leaves, moss or any other debris which could get down into water butts.

Brush out all the rubbish before it can reach the downpipes. Empty any water butts now and clean out any accumulated dirt in the bottom and they can then be refilled by the winter rain.

# Jobs for JANUATU

Prepare trenches for runner and broad beans this month. Dig the trench and gradually fill it with vegetable peelings and other organic matter. Cover with soil and sow the beans on top in April/ Mav.

Regularly check on fruit or vegetables that you're keeping in store. Any rot or disease can rapidly spread to neighbouring produce. Keep a look out for hungry mice.

Bring pots or glasses of Hyacinth or Daffodil bulbs into the daylight to flower. Place in a cool but bright position. Move the plants everyday to keep even growth. They won't need any feeding but make sure that the water is kept topped up in glasses and the compost slightly moist in pots.

Finish cleaning up fallen leaves on paths, patios and steps so they don't become dangerously slippery. Clear away any old plant debris which not only looks messy but also provides shelter for pests including Snails and Slugs. Diseased leaves can carry over infections from one year to the next, particularly Roses that have been infected by blackspot or rust.

Tip Top Tips

· Cover some branches of berries on Holly trees with netting or fleece to stop birds eating them and so save some for Christmas decorations.

· Leave old flower heads on Hydrangeas over winter as they will provide important frost protection for the new buds further down, cut them off in the spring

• Take care of poinsettia plants by placing in a warm bright place in the house out of draughts. Don't trap behind curtains at night, let compost dry out between watering and never leave pots standing in water, feed weekly with some houseplant fertilizer.

· Sow some onions at the end of this month to produce the biggest bulbs next summer.

 Wash all cold frames, cloches and greenhouses. Place a few tennis balls on ponds to let some air in for fish if ice

· Spread some well rotted manure over bare soils. · Reduce the harmful effects of frost by spraying water on frosted plants before the sun reaches them

· Plant up an attractive winter trough with reddish purple ornamental cabbages flanked with heathers and pots of rosy clyclamin

# Tip Top Tips

- Never plant/up a newly-dug border at once allow it to settle for a few days.
- Make sure greenhouse heaters are regularly checked.
- Never divide plants on a frosty day their roots will object.
- Do not throw away old spade and fork handles they make excellent dibbers.
- Cover Globe Atichokes in winter with straw.
- If ordering from seed catalogues this is a good time to do it.
- Work out a cropping programme for the vegetable garden.
- Tomato seeds can now been sown in a temperature of about 70° F, so as to provide early plants for the green house culture.
- The 14th January is often the coldest or wettest day of the year.

06/10/19 19:39

#### Team paged to reports of a vehicle and trailer in the sea at the

Dive Ramp, East Beach, Selsey. The team provided Safety Cover, lighting and safety advice while attempts were made to recover the vehicle.

Two recovery vehicles managed to pull the vehicle and trailer up the shingle and then lift them up off the beach, after the vehicle had slipped on the ramp and ended up

in the sea while recovering a vessel.

\*\*East Beach Dive Ramp is extremely slippery and it's really important that you don't take vehicles past the steep part where the Ramp drops off into the sea\*\*

Team stood down once all persons were away from the shoreline and the vehicle and trailer were safely out of the water.

#### 11/10/19 14:44

#### Team paged to reports of a vessel that was drifting to the east of Selsey.

The vessel had broken its moorings and had washed up on the beach; attempts were made to secure the vessel. Details and pictures of the vessel were sent to our operations centre and the owners were contacted.

#### 26/10/19 02:21

#### Team paged with Littlehampton Coastguard Team to reports of a person in the water at Bognor.

Stood down en route, with the person out of the water and in the hands of Sussex Police.

#### 01/11/19 18:31

Team paged to reports of a May Day for an 18 metre motor cruiser stuck on the Mixon Rocks and taking on water. Selsey All Weather Lifeboat and Selsey Inshore Lifeboat were

launched after the 18 metre motor cruiser on passage to Brighton ended up hitting the rocks and becoming stuck on them. Both lifeboats did an amazing job last night in tough and challenging conditions and saved two lives; after the vessel had to be abandoned due to it taking on too much water due to the damage that was caused from the rocks.

The two casualties were taken to hospital after one of them had suffered a head injury.

A huge well done goes out to all the crew for the amazing job they did last night resulting in two lives saved!

The vessel later sunk.

Returning to station at 22:30

#### 03/11/19 16:14

#### Team paged after concerns for a kayaker had been made.

The Kayaker had been seen off Clayton Road, Selsey not wearing a life jacket and appeared to be struggling with the tide, and kept stopping.

A guick search was carried out and the kayaker was found safely ashore and the kayak matched the same description as the one reported.

Team stood down to return to station.

#### 14/11/19 18:53

Team paged after a Hand Grenade had been found on the beach in Pagham by a person with a metal detector. Sussex Police were initially called, and on scene before they handed it over to the Coastguard to deal with.

The Police had filled some sandbags and surrounded the item with them to try and protect it from the incoming

tide. Unfortunately E.O.D. (Explosive Ordnance Disposal Team) were unable to attend before the tide covered it.

We stayed on scene until it was fully covered by water and were then stood down.

#### 15/11/19 04.30

#### Team re-tasked early this morning to return to Pagham Beach, for low tide.

Once again the beach was closed to the public.

Due to the position of where the Grenade was on the low tide mark, we had a very short time frame for E.O.D. to deal with the ordnance

We confirmed the sand bags were still in place but unfortunately the tide covered it again before E.O.D. arrived. So once it was safely covered by water the team were stood down.

#### 15/11/19 16.30

#### Team re-tasked this afternoon to Pagham and the Grenade on the beach.

The beach was again closed and we confirmed once the tide was low enough that the sandbags were still in place and E.O.D. were again tasked.

E.O.D. arrived on scene and confirmed the Grenade to be a Mills Grenade.

The beach was reopened later and both E.O.D. and ourselves were stood down.

Returning to station at 20:00

If you ever come across a Grenade or any ordnance on the beach, please do not touch it and dial 999 and ask for the Coastguard straight away.

Ordnance comes in all shapes and sizes and can still be extremely dangerous and highly explosive. Do not touch it and call the Coastquard.

#### **Other News**

#### On the 5th October the team were reassessed on their Mud Rescue Training and techniques.

The team were all successfully signed off and passed their training. Selsev Coastquard Rescue Team are a specialist Mud Rescue Team and are available to respond to people or dogs stuck in the mud along our coastline 24/7; along with any other emergencies out at sea, on the beach or along the coast always dial 999 and ask for the Coastguard!





On the 7th November, some of our team and crew from Selsey Lifeboat Station got together this evening and visited the National Maritime Operation Centre. t was a great opportunity o meet members of Solent Coastguard; the team who we work with regularly, to see how they

work and what happens on the other side of the radio!

It was a very useful, informative and interesting visit, thank you.

On the 10th November we wore our poppies with pride, with some of us taking part in the Remembrance Service and Parade here in Selsey. During World War One, nearly two thousand Coastguards died at sea, with 1,459 lost in one battle alone. We placed a wreath at the war memorial in Selsey to remember all those that have lost their lives in conflict.



#### Selsey Matters Comment and opinion by Bryn Edgar

I was delighted to read the letter from Councillor Mrs. Donna Johnson published in last month's issue of Selsey Life, and I am grateful for her very kind remarks. I'm sorry that she felt she needed to clarify some of my comments in last months "Selsey Matters"; if they were obscure or misleading in any way, then I can only apologise, and try not to do it again!

I agree with Councillor Johnson's comments; I've been involved with commercial property much of my working life, so I'm aware what Councils can and can't do, and where their powers start and finish. I disagree slightly when she suggests that STC and CDC have always been sufficiently flexible when it comes to "change of use" applications for commercial premises; while that may be the case since the May 2019 local elections, can I suggest she looks again at similar decisions made by both Councils in the years before those elections?

I'm probably going to please and annoy readers in equal measure this month! There have been many comments on local social media recently about the relevance of celebrating Guy Fawkes Night; and while I wouldn't want to be a killjoy by suggesting it should be stopped entirely, I have to agree with those who can't see the point in continuing to celebrate the event in the way we do.

Most of us know that "Guy Fawkes Night" commemorates an attempt to end persecution of Roman Catholics in England by blowing up the House of Lords. On the night of 4/5<sup>th</sup> November 1605, conspirators placed a large amount of gunpowder in the cellars of the House knowing that King James 1 would be at the Opening of Parliament on the 5th. The gunpowder and some of the conspirators- including Guy Fawkes, an explosives expert- were discovered in the early hours of the morning on the 5<sup>th</sup>; the rest were soon rounded up. Those who weren't killed as they were captured were tortured, then put on trial for treason. Most were sentenced to be hanged, but the chef conspirators (including Guy Fawkes) were sentenced to being hanged, drawn, and quartered- a truly ghastly and barbaric punishment that I'm not going to describe; look it up if you really must know!

Executions in those days were common, and held in public; they were looked on as a form of entertainment, rather like a circus or horse race. People flocked in their thousands to see offenders meet their fate, and bets were often taken on the way individual prisoners would react at the moment of execution! The gallows was set high, so that everyone could get a good view; the prisoner had to climb a ladder to reach the hooded Executioner waiting at the top. Guy Fawkes, however, didn't seem to fancy a prolonged and agonising death; as he reached the top, he jumped off the ladder and broke his neck- which wouldn't have gone down well with the watching multitude!

So what's this got to do with Selsey, and is it a "Selsey matter? Well, cast your mind back three paragraphs to what I told you residents were saying about fireworks; and while it seems that the noise and spectacle of fireworks is greatly enjoyed by large numbers of Selsey residents, it is hated by equally large numbers who aren't- so should it be stopped, changed, or allowed to continue in its present form?

Most complaints concern the adverse effect that these largely unannounced fireworks parties can have on people and animals. The events can start at any time of day between late afternoon and midnight; and although some last just a few minutes, many go on

Fireworks also disturb the sick, the very old, the very young, those on shift work, and those who are studying. They spoil many peoples' quiet enjoyment of their homes: and with no advance notice of when they will happen, they can't be avoided. Fireworks can be incredibly dangerous in the wrong hands; they contain high explosive, and they are certainly not the toys or playthings that too many seem to think they are! They can cause devastating, often life-changing injuries- even death. If we aren't allowed to buy and use shotgun cartridges without a license, then why should we be able to walk in to a shop and buy fireworks, which can be just as deadly? It just doesn't make sense!

Then there's the effect fireworks have on animals- not just domestic pets, but farmyard and wild animals as well. Some have suggested that pets should be trained to ignore fireworks; it's true that some animals can be trained to ignore loud noises, but most can't. Police and security dogs are assessed for suitability before being sent for training, as are animals used for ceremonial purposes. Most complaints are about terrified pets, of course, but every year there are reports of horses, farm animals and poultry being badly affected by fireworks- and try training a flock of chickens or sheep to ignore them! Wild life can also be traumatised by noise from fireworks

parties nearby- yet few seem to care, let alone complain about it.

If we are going to commemorate an event of national importance that took place over 400 years ago, then surely in the interests of safety and peace of mind we need to consider how we do it the 21<sup>st</sup> century? Do we really need to celebrate by having fireworks and bonfire parties in hundreds of thousands of gardens the length and breadth of the country?

While it would be ridiculous to claim that carbon emissions from them would add to global warming, the noise pollution level in our urban and rural environment on Fireworks Night certainly rockets!

Surely it must be better to limit fireworks celebrations solely to organised events run- or at least managed- by specialised professional fireworks display companies? Is there any logical reason why they should continue to be held on domestic premisesparticularly in urban areas- when so many people and animals are distressed or traumatised by them? For those who look on Fireworks Night as a social event for the children, wouldn't it be just as cheap (and most certainly safer) to hold a Guy Fawkes Night Barbecue? A string of flashing coloured lanterns could represent the fireworks- and the only bangers allowed would be the sausages grilling on the barby!

With Hallowe'en, Guy Fawkes Night, and the "mists and mellow fruitfulness" of autumn now well and truly over, winter and the "festive season" is upon us. I had thought about writing some sort of Christmas and New Year's Message to you all, but I suspect you've had enough of my indiscriminate foraging through the byways and back alleys of what passes for my brain (You've got that right!- Mrs E). That being so, I will do no more than follow the example of the previous author of "Selsey Matters" by wishing you a peaceful and blessed Christmas, and a very Happy New Year. I hope to be with you in the February issue of Selsey Life; until then, be nice to each other, people!



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#### Brent Lodge Briefings -Festive times

Being an all year round busy wildlife hospital means each season brings its own

challenges to wildlife. For most of us. Christmas is a time of celebrating, exchanging gifts and enjoying good food, unfortunately this does result in overflowing amounts of discarded waste, plastic packaging and wrapping paper, which could potentially be hazardous to wildlife. We urge people to dispose of or recycle their rubbish responsibly or look out for environmentally-friendly alternatives wherever possible to cut down on unnecessary waste to reduce the impact it has on wildlife. Wildlife friendly gifts are a great idea - bird feeders, bird food, hedgehog houses, or sponsor a patient for a friend or family member, can all be purchased through our website.




During the upcoming festive season we take in mainly hedgehog casualties, many juvenile hedgehogs born later in the summer are too small to survive the winter hibernation and require overwinter care at the hospital. We currently have a few very tiny hedgehogs in our

care, one that is just under 200g and is benefiting from the warmth of our incubators and frequent feeds, without our help the hoglet would have perished in the cold. By the end of the winter season, we would have cared for over 250 hedgehogs.

Our staff and volunteers are under pressure as the nights turn

laugh and call him names

darker and colder to clean out each pen, provide fresh bedding, feed and weigh all the hedgehogs each day – particularly at Christmas when many of our helpers have friends and family commitments.

We expect to take in many more hungry hedgehogs as well as other wildlife casualties over the next few months, so providing the basic needs such as making sure they are kept clean and their bellies are full makes all the difference to their recovery. With this in mind, we will be going through thousands of tins of cat/ dog food, at the peak of the



hedgehog season we can go through 100 tins a day. So if anyone would be able to donate any tinned cat/dog food, we would really appreciate it. We aren't fussy, we just ask that the food is a meat based and not fish flavoured as the hedgehogs cannot tolerate fish flavoured food.

If you are thinking of making a Christmas donation to Brent Lodge to help the hedgehogs in our care then please consider supporting our Big Give Christmas Challenge. From 3rd – 10th December your donation will be doubled to help us reach our £4,250 target. These funds will help us to provide life-saving care, new equipment and vet treatment.




