MEDMERRY PRIMARY SCHOOL CELEBRATES GOOD OFSTED RATING

Selsey School Praised for Its Curriculum and Good
Quality Education

Medmerry Primary School in Selsey has secured another Good rating from Ofsted, following an inspection in December 2018. The inspector praised the friendly, welcoming and well behaved pupils and recognised the work which has been done to raise both the quality of teaching and the curriculum taught in the school since the last inspection. Medmerry has been classified as a 'Good' school since 2010.

The report noted the breadth of the curriculum taught at Medmerry, alongside the wide range of extra-curricular experiences that are included to help extend pupils' learning. It recognised the work being done in particular areas of teaching, remarking that staff have worked hard to create a 'buzz' about reading throughout the school in the last few months.

The Ofsted report also mentioned the strong standard of mathematics throughout the school. HM Inspector, Catherine Old, remarked that pupils' outcomes have been raised substantially as a result of the improvements which have been made since the last inspection.

Both Selsey RNLI lifeboats search for person in the water

UK Coastguard requested the launch of the Selsey inshore lifeboat to assist Sussex police and Coastguard units from Selsey and Littlehampton search for a person seen entering the sea at Bognor Regis.

The inshore lifeboat (ILB) launched at 8.47pm and made best speed to the area. When on scene a shore line search of the immediate area was conducted with nothing seen. At 9.12pm the ILB helmsman requested the all-weather lifeboat to assist with the search. The weather on scene was wind westerly force 2-3 sea state smooth with good visibility.

At 9.24pm the all-weather lifeboat (ALB) launched and headed to Bognor. The ILB had been joined by the Police helicopter. Shortly after the ALB arrived on scene the helicopter was tasked to another incident and both lifeboats and Coastguard units continued searching until the

UK Coastguards stood all units down at 10.30pm.

The lifeboats both returned to station at 11.00pm with the ILB being recovered straight and the ALB recovered at 00.45am after waiting for the tide to fall. Both

boats were washed down and made ready for service. The crews tonight were ALB: Coxswain Dave Lamdin, 2nd Cox Rob Archibald, Mechanic Phil Pitham, Max Wiseman, Neil Hopcraft and Jake Harnett (Trainee).

ILB: Helmsman James Albrey, Colin Pullenger and Dan Langford.

Key facts about the RNLI: The RNLI is the charity that saves lives at sea. Its volunteers provide a 24-hour search and rescue service around the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland coasts. The RNLI operates over 230 lifeboat stations in the UK and Ireland and has more than 140 lifeguard units on beaches around the UK. The RNLI is independent of Coastguard and government and depends on voluntary donations and legacies to maintain its rescue service. Since the RNLI was founded in 1824 its lifeboat crews and lifeguards have saved over 137,000 lives.

What a magnificent, almost unbelievable, start to the 2018 - 19 Poppy Appeal.

Since my last report I have received a further £344.22 from two shops that I was unable to collect from before; £150 from several organisations for their Poppy Wreaths and £192 from various donations big and small. This brings the total, as a 16 January 2019 to a fantastic £10,945.86. This, of course, is yet another all time record amount for Selsey. Well done everybody and thank you very much indeed for your generosity.

Several organisations have yet to make a donation for their Poppy Wreaths (although I must point out that they are not obliged to do so) so will we for the first time ever break through the £11,000 barrier?

The Write Zone with 7ara Wright



Welcome back to The Write Zone! Was your December as fun and festive as mine? Since consuming my own body weight in mince pies, I've been judging the Christmas writing competition along with my esteemed co-judges: renowned playwright, Gillian Plowman, and Director of Highhouse Insurance Services, Neil Kimber. I'm delighted to announce our talented winner: Amy Russell. Well done to Amy who wins a

It's been a busy few months for me publicising The Yum Yum Bazaar and preparing it for a paperback edition. If that wasn't enough to keep me occupied, I'm editing my new novel. Twelve months after writing it, I've simplified the story by removing minor characters, moved chapters to create a better flow, and re-written dialogue that's poetic but doesn't help the reader or serve my story. This vicious editing is called 'killing your darlings'. Let me explain this point.

If you're a road-user, you may have encountered horse riders who wear a tabard bearing the words: 'CAUTION - HORSE AND RIDER.' You'll have noted the warning and responded by slowing and moving out wide; you may even have given yourself a congratulatory pat on the back for being so sensible before you put your foot down. Now, let me ask you this: who are the words, 'horse and rider', actually for? The visually impaired? Low-flying aircraft? Extra-terrestrial lifeforms on a cataloguing expedition?

'Over-description' or 'over-writing' can distract your reader, or complicate what you're trying to convey. In the same way that the rider's tabard really only needs to read 'caution' or 'slow-down', if how you've described something adds length but not value, you should consider changing or removing it. This can be one of the most challenging aspects of writing, and it's the reason most writers employ editors. As writers, we can get carried away with our 'darlings', so the tips is this: write, cogitate, edit ruthlessly by 'killing your darlings', repeat. Ridding your manuscript of over-description or poetic adjectives, flowery dialogue and

meandering prose will bring your writing into sharper focus, and your characters will be better able to propel your story towards its stunning conclusion.



HENRY BENSTEAD 1865 – 1938

We have already 'met' Fanny Farne Arnell Benstead so it seems appropriate to take a look at her husband.

Henry Benstead was born on 14th March 1865, second son (but the 5th child) of James Benstead and Mary Ann Styles. James was a Gamekeeper in Winkfield in 1851 and 1861. By the time Henry was 6 years old, the family lived at Great Park, Manor Hill, Old Windsor. This is a prestigious address as Manor Hill is still used to this day when referring to the complex of buildings in and around the Manor Lodge enclosure. The Lodge had been a Royal residence for three centuries or more.

By 1881 James was a Royal Game Keeper and Henry was a Pupil Teacher. In order to achieve this, Henry had to fulfil certain scholastic, moral and physical conditions. He was apprenticed to the Head Teacher of Sunningdale National School, George William Gray, for 5 years receiving £10 pa during the first year. He taught throughout the school day and was himself taught before and after school hours by Mr Gray. He was also examined once a year by Her Majesty's Inspectorate. He studied Euclid (Geometry), Latin, Algebra, Mensuration (which is to do with estimating and measuring plane surfaces), Elementary Physiography (Geography) and Drawing.

Once he had completed his apprenticeship he received a certificate which enabled him to sit the examination for the Queen's Scholarship which qualified him for a place in a training college with a maintenance grant of £25. He also had a 1st Class Divinity Certificate.

On 30th January 1884 Henry, aged 20, was admitted to Culham College – a Church of England Training College for Schoolmasters which was founded in 1853, some 14 years after our own Bishop Otter Training College.



We are fortunate that we have Henry's college report. He appears to have been recommended by Reverend William Charles Raffles Flint of Sunningdale Vicarage, Ascot. This worthy cleric was the nephew of Sir T Stamford Raffles, the founder of Singapore and after whom the famous Raffles Hotel was named. He died in August 1884 so perhaps Henry was one of his last protégés.

Henry undertook two years' training and was awarded a 1st class Certificate in Education in both years. He also received two certificates for examinations of Archbishop's Divinity, the 4th Midsummer prize

and a first class certificate in Acoustics, the branch of Physics concerned with sound. During his stay at Culham, his Conduct was always 'Thoroughly Excellent' and his Progress was 'Very Good'.



Behind the chapel are12 cypress trees known as 'The Apostles' . And here is a modern picture of them courtesy of Culham College's webmaster , Roger Hope. Part of the 'induction' of first year students was to run the gauntlet and kick Judas Iscariot - the twelfth tree.

It is hard to imagine Henry taking part, particularly in view of the comments on his teaching practice which follow.

His Teaching Practice report of 1884 shows that he had a 'rather severe manner' and 'a military character'. It also says 'As a teacher Benstead is above the average but he exhibits no special ability. His blackboard is well used and his power of maintaining discipline is good'. By 1885 he 'takes an interest in his teaching and works well and practically but he needs more tact in dealing with big boys'.

The picture is rather grainy and is taken from the Centenary History of Culham Church of England Training College for Schoolmasters 1853 – 1953 by Leonard Naylor.

Henry left Culham College at Christmas 1885 as he had been appointed Master (to the boys only) to the first Selsey-on-Sea National School at a salary of £80. The girls and infants were taught by Miss Henrietta Morris who had been at the school since at least 1865.



The Old Practising School



On 22 February 1886 the College received a letter from Henry thanking them for the appointment with the address of High Street, Selsey. Exactly one year later, to the day, the College received another missive. It is described as 'Long and interesting... describing work at Selsey – doing well'. Sadly, this letter is not in the College archives.

Here we have a picture of The Whyte House, opposite the end of School Lane and, in the distance, the red brick 'caretaker's' house which still exists opposite Medmerry Academy. In between we see a house, similar to The Whyte House, which is no longer there. The founding of Selsey's National School is long and complicated but, with pleasing symmetry, in 1872, Henry Robinson Arnell, who had copyhold rights over the land adjoining the school, had conveyed a strip of land next to what was Yew Tree Farm to the Rector and Churchwardens for a Church of England School yard or playground. Several additional rooms were added piecemeal.





These two more modern pictures of the 'Big School' front and rear, come from the Tom Creedy Collection, currently being scanned and recorded as part of the Selsey Historic Photograph Project.

Selsey seems to have been rather lucky as both the teachers at this time were Certificated teachers.



By 1891 Henry had left Selsey and was a Certificated Master (1st Class) at Palmer School House in Wokingham. The Palmer School, built in 1875, was the last of a succession of schools created with the charitable bequest of Dr. Palmer in 1711 and of Martha Palmer in 1713.

In 1892 Henry made a return visit to Selsey to marry Fanny Farne Arnell, daughter of Henry Robinson Arnell, in St Peter's Church on 19th August. Henry was 27 years old and Fanny was 43 and a spinster. The happy couple returned to Wokingham.

1900 was not a good year for Henry. In February he was called as a character witness in a case involving one of the pupil-teachers at the Palmer School, William Allen, who had been assaulted by a parent. The parent, in turn, accused William Allen of striking his son, also called William. Henry Benstead, the headmaster, then frog-marched the parent off the premises. The son said he had been hit on January 26th, February 1st and February 2nd with the pointer. Allen said he didn't recall doing so but that he may have given him a slight tap on the fingers. The upshot was that the parent was fined 20/- (twenty shillings) with costs of 14/6d while the teacher was fined 1/- with 10/6d costs as a warning to all teachers who give punishment to pupils.

The Reading Observer of 29 September 1900 published a letter from Henry. The main thrust of the letter appears to be that an 'unbiased observer' is accusing him of refusing admission to his school to some children on account of the religion of the parents. The letter starts:

'I do not propose to enter into explanations with a correspondent who is either ashamed or afraid to give his name...' and closes with: Your 'unbiased observer's' insulting remark 'playing the proselytising game' is too contemptible to notice. 'I have neither the time nor the inclination for further newspaper correspondence with an irresponsible and nameless individual...' Henry was certainly a man who didn't mince his words!

1902, however, was better. In April the Church House in Easthampstead Road for All Saints Parish was opened for use as a church hall. There is a lengthy description of the building which was almost entirely funded by public subscription. Henry and Fanny attended the 'influential gathering'.

On 29th November an extremely long and detailed article appeared in the Berkshire Chronicle singing the praises of the Palmer School, Wokingham: 'A MODEL ELEMENTARY SCHOOL, Wonderful Record of the Palmer schools, Wokingham. The Palmer Voluntary Church Schools, Wokingham, under the enthusiastic body of fifteen managers, and the careful tuition of Mr Henry Benstead and his staff, have long been recognised as amongst the most successful Elementary Schools in the whole county. During the past year, the

prestige of the school has been thoroughly maintained, and the attendance of the children has been remarkable.

When reporting on the same day, on the same topic, the Reading Mercury included the fact that 'Tea was provided under the superintendence of Mrs. Benstead'. This event was a prize-giving in the form of medals for regular attendance and it took place again at the beginning of 1903 but this time twinned with the annual Sunday School Treat with Mrs Benstead still superintending the tea. Also in 1903 the Education Committee of the Berkshire County Council appointed Mr Archibald James Shirley as Assistant Education Secretary for Berkshire. Henry Benstead had been one of the unsuccessful applicants.

Henry was on the register of electors for 1910 showing his Place of Abode as Palmers Schools, Wokingham in a Freehold house in Lovel Road, Winkfield. In 1915 however, Henry was at West Street House, Selsey-on-Sea, Chichester but he qualified as an elector for the Parish of Sunninghill in Berkshire because he owned freehold houses, namely 1, 2 and 3 Frederick Place, Sunninghill.

Henry was also a churchwarden at St Peter's Church and was one of the signatories to the Petition for a Faculty to commission and install Selsey's War Memorial. In the bundle at West Sussex Record Office we have not only the petition but also a drawing and site plan executed by Frederick Forbes Glennie. Later, in 1922, he signed two more faculties for the installation of two stained glass windows in St Peter's Church which formed a separate article.

In 1932 Henry was the Executor of the Will of Arthur Hale Woodman of Home Farm Selsey who died on 31st December 1931. In this instance, Henry's solicitors were Blaker & Peters of 9 West Pallant.

Fanny Farne Arnell Benstead died on 6th May 1935, aged 87, and her funeral took place at Church Norton on 8th May. She was remembered in the press as having endowed a stained glass window to Selsey Church. Henry was described as 'a Head Teacher at Selsey Church School', a claim which he never appears to have made.

At the end of 1937, Henry remarried. This time he chose a woman who was 17 years his junior named Edith Mabel James but this marriage was not destined to last long as, on 24th April 1938, Henry died at The Grotto, West Street, Selsey. His effects were valued at £18419. 5s. 11d and Administration was awarded to his widow and Alice Nixey, another widow. Alice's maiden name was Alice Annie Benstead and was Henry's sister. She too was a teacher. Henry was interred at Church Norton at 12.30 pm on 5th May.

The Hampshire Telegraph was lavish in its tribute to Henry claiming that he was a 'protégé of Queen Victoria', presumably on the strength of his Queen's Scholarship. Innumerable wreaths were sent by the relatives and acquaintances including Dr. Humphrys and Mr Maidment. Rev. Robert Franklin officiated.

This is the end of Henry's story but the saga continues. Watch this space.

Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB)

From a safe distance, anti-social behaviour (ASB) might not seem serious. But if it's your home or your street, it can leave you feeling intimated, angry and frightened. It can ruin lives and make whole areas feel unsafe.

Anti-social behaviour includes:

- Threatening or 'yobbish' behaviour.
- Gangs 'hanging around'.
- Abusive, rowdy or noisy neighbours.
- People buying or selling drugs.
- Drinking in the street, aggressive begging.
- Night time noise from houses or gardens.
- Setting off fireworks late at night.
- Graffiti and fly-posting.
- Vandalism.
- Cars abandoned on the street.
- Litter and fly-tipping
- Any other behaviour that disturbs or scares you.

Some of these may be one-off events; others may happen repeatedly, so the effects add up over time.

There are many ways that Sussex residents can support their communities and help reduce anti-social behaviour:

- Join your local Neighbourhood Watch scheme or a tenants' or residents' associations.
- Discuss any issues with your local councillor, who can act on our behalf to raise concerns with the council and other organisations.
- If the anti-social behaviour is noise related then please contact your local Environmental Health Department.
- If your neighbours are private tenants then report the nuisance problem to the letting. They may be able to help you as often the tenancy agreement states that they must not cause a nuisance to neighbours.
- If your neighbours are council or housing associate tenants then report the nuisance problem to the council or relevant organisation as they may be able to help.

By playing an active role in your community you really can help make a difference. Often the councils and housing associations will only become involved after a few reports, so don't wait, report

Sleek muscular physique. Dynamic aquatic killer. Mysterious enigmatic loner. You can see why otters shared the cinema box office with James Bond in the Sixties and Seventies. Otters are natural film stars, the Sean Connery of British mammals (with a slightly hairier chest).

I remember two otter-based films from my childhood. I caught 'Tarka the Otter' at the local Odeon and the superior 'Ring of Bright Water' always won over 'Goldfinger' on the TV at Christmas. From the opening man-meets-otter sequence (both the greatest and silliest scene ever committed to celluloid) through to Val Doonican's closing credits crooning - it's a classic!

connected, wetland habitats. And what is good for the otter is good for us too. By undertaking wetland habitat improvements for wildlife such as planting floodplain woodland or creating water meadows - our countryside regains its powers as water purifier, erosion controller

Over the past years footprints, droppings and fleeting glimpses have given tantalising evidence that these mammalian movie stars are attempting a comeback in Sussex after half a century. Recently, night vision trail cameras were rolling and filmed a female otter as she made her Sussex small screen debut - possibly the first time a wild otter has ever been filmed in our county. But the real showstopper came when these cameras later captured footage of one - or possibly two - otter cubs; evidence that otters are breeding again in Sussex. With this dramatic plot twist there is plenty of potential for a sequel. The dream that one day we could Otter on ice c Derek Middleton see these incredible animals swimming in all the restored and vibrant rivers of Sussex is a step closer to becoming a reality.

Show your love of the natural world this February

It's February and the curlew's beautiful evocative call drifts across the harbour. It is an eerie, lonely call, but at this time of year may well attract the attentions of another curlew. Although they can be heard throughout the year, it is now that they start to call more frequently in preparation for the breeding season. Instantly recognisable by their long down-curved bill, these large long-legged waders will breed in uplands and moors. Despite being a common sight across our reserves of Pagham Harbour & Medmerry, the curlew is one of our most rapidly declining breeding bird species, with our changing climates effects on their breeding habitat being cited as one of the main causes.

Equally haunting is the night-time call of the tawny owl. The well-known 'twit-twoo' is actually two birds calling to one another. The male starts to proclaim his territory and court females in with a more accurate 'hooo-hooo', while the female provides the 'kee-wick' part of the duet. Like the curlew, their calls can be heard more regularly at this time of year.

Many of our resident birds will start to look for partners and pair up now, giving them a head start over migrating species. As avian minds turn to romance, so do ours with Valentine's Day. However, it is not just love for a partner that we may think about...

Tawny Owl c Ben Andrew Many people will be posting images on social media as part of the #showthelove campaign. This national campaign led by the Climate Coalition with over 130 members, including the RSPB, is dedicated to climate action. However, anyone can get involved. You could simply wear a green two-tone heart that is the campaign's logo. If you want to be more active, you can post photos online of

your favourite natural places or species that have been or may be threatened by climate change. Alternatively, you could let us know about changes in nature you have noticed, such as snowdrops flowering earlier or butterflies emerging from hibernation earlier. We have records from our Pagham Harbour reserve showing quite clearly a pattern of earlier natural sightings and our Medmerry reserve itself is a direct result of the need to take action in light of increasing winter storms and the consistent threat of flooding. There are many arguments and theories around global warming and it's causes but there is no denying our climate is changing.

The poor tree is perfectly happy, warm and cosy, sitting on top of its own little table then, all of a sudden, it finds itself outside in the freezing cold – bit of a shock to the poor thing, I would say! This obviously means protecting it from arctic like conditions, which poses a bit of a problem. We should allow ourselves to feel whatever we're feeling – there's no point in thinking that we've got to be positive all the time, it's just not realistic; we all have bad days. We should just be free to feel however we feel at any time and just go with it in the knowledge that it will always pass, because it always

According to my family, I can be a person of extremes – when everything is fine, I can't ever remember my life being any different but when things aren't going so well. I also can't remember my life being any different, that's probably not very helpful. So, I'm trying not to believe everything I think and concentrate on the knowledge that inevitably things will sort themselves out. I recently read a quote by Eckhart Tolle, a German teacher who wrote an extremely interesting book called The Power of Now, 'Life', he said, 'isn't as serious as the mind makes it out to be'. The moral of all this, I think, as my daughter would say – is just to try to chill out a bit! Easier said than done, but I'm determined to give it a go.

Not sure I'd want to be my daughter's age again, though. She's just 18 and the entire house seems to be filled with exam textbooks. Our young people have a very hard time of it, I think. There is so much more pressure on them now than there was when I was her age and social media has a lot to answer for. Now, I'll admit I am one of those people who just has to regularly check the myriad of different communication channels which we can all have these days – and I recognise that it's not always positive because I never actually totally switch off. Even when I'm supposed to be on holiday, I still find myself doing it because its more stressful to not know what's going on than to know and have to go off and deal with something. The ubiquitous, commanding 'ping' whenever a message lands has the sort of control which necessitates my immediate attention – even if it's just yet another PPI message! It's truly absurd and yet, most of us have unwittingly bought into this. Apparently, some people get a dopamine high if someone so much as 'likes' their posts! Is it any wonder that it can become addictive? Infact, it can be so addictive that the average person checks their phone up to 200 times a day and 73% of us say that we'd struggle to go an entire day without checking our smartphones or computers. The worst statistic I discovered was that 70% of youngsters between 14 and 25 actually prefer texting to talking. That is truly bizarre.

According to the Economist, digital information increases tenfold every five years and of course, with a mobile phone, we can search for practically any information we need, at whatever time. It's becoming more and more difficult to escape the virtual world, it's become as important as the real one. To be fair though, and in trying to put forward a balanced argument, it is true that social media connects people in a way we never thought possible a generation ago - I now have 'friends' who live all over the world! Although they sometimes completely forget that their daytime is our middle of the night, so it's become quite a regular occurrence for me to wake up to

a message from the other side of the world. Our conversations take longer and longer to conclude because of the problems of actually managing to contact each other when we're both awake! Absolutely mad. We also need to remember, of course, that not all information online stands up to scrutiny - 'fake' news undoubtedly exists, and we just can't believe everything we read, or indeed watch. 'Fake news' may well be one of President Trump's favourite phrases now, but it was never heard of a few years ago and yet. in 2017, it was the 'word of the year'. It's certainly becoming more and more difficult to discriminate between what's real and what is a distortion. I recently found out that some people manage to make a living from proliferating disinformation, honestly, I kid you not, as we speak there is someone out there preparing to hit 'send' and disseminate an entire stream of nonsense around the world. I decided to do a bit of my own research into this and found a guy who operates from his study in a city on the East Coast of the US. He runs an entire stream of websites specifically for the purpose of getting 'fake news' out there. Sometimes, he does it just because he likes to sit back and see the reaction, but he's also been known to do it because someone has asked him to which is worrying in the least. Just who are these people who seek to further their own agenda by peddling what are, let's be honest here, just total untruths? He starts his disinformation off by deciding which person or issue will be the subject of his attention it could be gun control, feminism, some high-ranking politician, anything which will get the unsuspecting public's attention. Then he needs to flesh it out a bit, maybe a new law or incident which justifies the issue. When he's decided the next step is always the same; he looks at his computer screen and types the following words: 'Breaking News'. He doesn't need to research anything, nothing he says has any basis in reality and within a few minutes, it's done. He can sit back and watch the 'shares' and the 'likes' come in. He merely starts the ball rolling, the rest of the work he can rely on to be taken care of by the unsuspecting millions answering the notification 'pings' on their phone. It really is as easy as that.

The proliferation of this 'fake' news also extends to You Tube, the video sharing platform that has made literally millions for some of its 'stars'. One of my claims to fame is that my step daughter's friend is actually one of these 'stars' – a fact I suspect might give me a bit of kudos amongst our young people who consider You Tube to be 'the' go-to place for entertainment. It's where the 'influencers' are to be found - or so I've been told! Trouble is, though, that anyone can upload pretty much anything and, instantaneously, you have a potential worldwide audience. I came across a stupendous bit of 'fake news' on You Tube recently. Apparently, Brexit has already caused massive food shortages and we are all rushing to buy Survival Boxes for Brexit. A guick internet search took me directly to companies specifically set up to send out boxes of dehydrated food: one particular one was retailing at almost £300. Get a bit of momentum going on You Tube, instil concern into even 1% of the people who watch the videos and an entire enterprise is set up based on a total fabrication. Very clever bit of marketing. I think the moral of the story has to be that we should all ensure a bit of discernment wherever virtual media is concerned. For my part, I'm going to try a bit of a digital de-tox. I'm going to work out a maximum length of time to spend on my phone/computer/tablet and I've heard about something called 'phone stacking' where everyone puts their phones in the middle of the table and the first one to reach for theirs, has to pay a forfeit. In the Johnson household this is either going to be taking the bins out or changing the cat litter - neither jobs I intend to ever have to do

So – and I wasn't going to mention this, but, let's face it, I've been a bit doom and gloom this month – February 14th is Valentine's Day, if you needed reminding! Mr J and I have two anniversaries, one on Valentine's day and one in October. Our first 'date' - and I use that very loosely - was at a Scout Hut in Brighton at a Valentine's party I'd organised as a fund raiser. I know, incredibly romantic, what can I say? Actually, Valentine's day goes back to the year 496! Dainty outdoor Cyclamen with their quaintly marbled leaves are Plant up any empty pots, containers and window-boxes with easiest to establish in the garden if planted now whilst they are actively growing, rather than as dormant bulbs. They should be • If you enjoy eating Mussels, save the shells to 'crock' your widely available at garden centres and nurseries at this time. Plant them into humus-rich but freely draining soil, in areas of semishade. They will provide colourful flowers over quite a long period.

Begin to have a Spring tidy-up, starting with sheds and greenhouses. Remove any remains of last year's annuals if they were kept through the Winter. Cut down perennials where necessary. Place all the foliage onto the compost heap.

Gently use a fork or narrow rake to turn over the soil surface in flower and shrub borders, mixing in some well rotted compost and slow-release fertiliser as you go. Remove any week seedlings that • For early crops of Carrots, Broad Beans, Runner Beans, have appeared.

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Tip Top Tips

- cheerful Primulas, Primroses and emerging Spring bulbs.
- Put out Slug-baits and traps to prevent damage to early flowering herbaceous plants.
- Turn compost heaps now, while they are relatively wet and cover over with sections of old carpet or polythene to help maintain the heat.
- Finish off any winter pruning of Apple and Pear trees.
- Old tennis balls placed on the tops of canes make effective
- French Beans, Marrows, Cucumbers, Tomatoes and Salads, sow the seeds in a warm greenhouse now.
- Add a splash of lemonade to the water to keep flowers fresh for longer.

Throughout the year all sections play other clubs in friendly matches and in 2018 the The Mens Section won 4, lost 4 and drew



News from Councillor Roger Barrow

District Councillor for Selsey South and Cabinet member for Residents' Services



I have a busy few months ahead with local council elections in May, and once again my colleague, John Elliott and I, will be seeking your vote.

So what is my job as a District Councillor?

My colleague, John Elliott and I are Councillors for Selsey South for Chichester District Council. Our job as Councillors is to take decisions in the best interests of the whole community, regardless of political persuasion.

What do we mean 'the best interests'?

With local elections coming up in May 2019, it will be important for you to consider what you should expect from vour District Councillors. We would define that phrase "best interests" in the form of six basic principles which guide the decisions we would



support for the the Cabinet (the executive team of senior councillors) either take or recommend to the full Council.

- Firstly, we must be financially prudent, operating within our means and recognising it is not the council's money we are spending but your money in the form of council tax or, if you run a business, the rates you are paying. Wiil tax at modest levels. We should encourage the Council to keep Council tax
- Secondly, we must make sure our 80 plus services are run efficiently and not hesitate to ask someone else to run them if they can do it more efficiently, as we did with our leisure services two years ago.
- Thirdly, we want to ensure everyone who chooses to work has the opportunity to get a job. We as the Council must help businesses to thrive and individuals to have work. That's why the 82-unit Enterprise Centre was set up by the Council for small and start-up businesses.
- Fourthly, we must help the most needy and most vulnerable in the community. We must help those made homeless to get decent accommodation and make sure the most needy pay little or no council tax which why we run the best council tax reduction pogramme for the needy in the country.

Fifthly, we must do all we can through the planning system to provide sufficient homes for all, particularly affordable homes,

in suitable places and ensure our planners take account of our historic heritage.

Sixthly, we must preserve both our fine towns and beautiful countryside and foster our sense of community, living peaceably with each other. That's why among our



initiatives is our 'Against Litter' campaign.



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The start of 2019 saw the completion of our new hedgehog acclimatisation garden, with more hedgehogs coming in this couldn't come soon enough. The hedgehog garden located outside is designed to house our larger hedgehogs who no longer need intensive care. This garden will be used to put our more established hedgehogs in before release, so that they can get familiar to cooler temperatures much like those in their natural environment. By moving hedgehogs into our outside pre-release enclosure, this will help free up some of the space in the hospital, so we can care for more hedgehogs that need more intensive care.

For now though we still have a huge number of hedgehogs in our care, so we are running out of newspapers FAST! We use newspaper to line our cages and to make bedding to keep all of our spikey friends warm. We are using 8- 10 bin liners-full every day!

Can you help by shredding some newspapers for us? I'm afraid we can ONLY use newspaper (office paper gives the hedgehogs paper cuts) and it has to be shredded into strips, not cross-cut. You can hand shred the newspaper or you can put it through a machine shredder. Again, strip cut only, not cross-cut, so if you can donate any unwanted newspapers we would be grateful.

Platinum Anniversary for Selsey Couple

Madge and Basil Lambert have recently celebrated their 70th, Platinum, wedding anniversary.

The couple are now both 95-years-old. Their first meeting was during the Burma Campaign against the Japanese in World War 2. They met in a place called Chittagong, India, in 1944.

to Chittagong.


Her future husband, Basil, had joined the Army in 1943.



In 2018 Madge was co-author on a book about their enduring love affair, 'Some Sunny Day'. The book, listed as an Amazon Books Best Seller, has already sold in it's thousands.

It tells the story of how 21-years-old newly-trained nurse Madge left her duties at Stoke Mandeville hospital in Buckinghamshire to sail on a troopship, passing through the dangerous waters of the Bay of Biscay where she celebrated her 21 st birthday.

The three week passage took them through the Mediterranean Sea, which was still home to German U-Boats, then through the Suez Canal.



'We helped to keep them company and chat to them. To cheer them up, I suppose. This sometimes only gave us two hours sleep and then we'd be up again for our shift during the day. You just got on with it,' Madge said.

In the meantime, both Basil and Brian, his younger brother, had signed up for the army in 1943 and had been on a three month journey to get to India, again under constant threat of submarine attack

Madge recalls she met Basil through her friend Mack, Basil's roommate. 'Mack and I had been out together but it wasn't going to work really,' she said.

'I needed a stamp so I asked Mack and he said he had one in his room. I went back with him and there was Basil with his feet up on a little table reading something. He didn't even acknowledge me until right at the end – it was very rude.

'On leaving I turned to Mack and said: "Who does he think he is?""

Basil said 'She was very beautiful. I heard what Madge said about me and I thought: "Well I must make up for that!" so I took her out for dinner.'

Madge added 'Yes, and he purposefully put me off Mack!'

The couple could only at most meet up once a fortnight due to duties, but they quickly grew fond of one another.

On hearing that he was being

posted to Rangoon, Basil and Madge made sure to enjoy what little time they did have together, going on trips to the cinema and the beach. On his leaving, they promised to write to each other every day, even as he moved on to Vietnam and to an island off the coast of Borneo. They were reunited in England in 1947.

Basil and Madge were married shortly afterwards at St. Mary's Church in Horsell.

'It was absolutely lovely,' Mr Lambert said. 'I can't believe that it was 70 years ago,' Mrs Lambert added.

Mrs Lambert says 'We're incredibly lucky to have got this far, I think that's what you could call it – luck, because we haven't done anything different to anyone else,'

The couple have appeared on BBC1's Strictly

Come Dancing on Remembrance Sunday in 2016. Madge

commented that they, along with others on the show, didn't know they were going to be part of a dance. The couple embraced at the end of a routine about their lives that had been performed by professional dancers AJ Pritchard and Chloe Hewitt.



'It was absolutely wonderful.' Madge.

Since their appearance on Strictly Come Dancing they have been invited to three of Her Majesty The Queen's garden parties, so is She a fan we wonder?

With her usual good humour, Mrs Lambert asserts that her meeting with Prince Harry is the reason he proposed to Meghan Markle.

They have a silver-framed picture of Madge cheek-to-cheek with the grinning Prince.

Madge said 'I told him to hurry up and get on with it, and then three weeks later they were engaged!' She laughingly continued 'I was a little annoyed about it though – I thought he would have chosen me.'



The couple now live a quiet, contented life in Selsey, and regularly meet up with their two children, Carolyn, 67, and Angela, 65 for family meals and going to swimming and gym classes on a Friday.

Madge says their secret is to take each day as it comes.

Basil says it is simply to 'listen to Madge!'.

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


