



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

Did you know?

Slum dwellings made up 20% of the houses in London in 1949.

It has been truly heartbreaking to watch the situation in Ukraine deteriorate at the hands of such naked aggression. Russia's illegal invasion has broken decades of peace in Europe.

The UK has stood beside the people of Ukraine responding by imposing the largest and most severe package of sanctions that Russia has ever seen, hitting hundreds of companies and oligarchs at the heart of the Russian economy with asset freezes worth many hundreds of billions of pounds. The Government is also bringing forward new legislation to create a register of overseas entities and other measures to better tackle corrupt elites in our own country as well as comprehensive reform of Companies House so that we can crack down those looking to use our financial systems and companies register for economic crime.

We're continuing to support Ukraine through a total of £395 million in aid, making us the largest humanitarian donor. This includes £220m of humanitarian assistance; £100m to bolster the Ukrainian economy; and £75m for the Ukrainian government budget to mitigate financial pressures created by the invasion. We're also welcoming the extended family members of Ukrainians who are settled in the UK, providing a route for those fleeing disaster, war, and persecution. Militarily, we're supporting the Ukrainian Armed Forces, training over 22,000 soldiers, and supplying a range of military aid including items like anti-tank missiles. The impact of this support has been seen in the stalwart defence that has been put up against the Russian invasion.

Closer to home, I recently visited Barfoots Farm who are an incredible success story for us on the South Coast. Starting as a small family business, Barfoots now grow high-quality fresh produce across the world including sweetcorn, beans, squashes, broccoli, but have always kept a strong presence in our area. I met with Julian, the Managing Director, to discuss key issues facing the business and wider industry, including access to Seasonal Agricultural Workers, rising inflation, and skills. I've now written to the ministers concerned to ensure the issues affecting farmers and growers in our area are taken into account.

Our location with excellent soil and high levels of sunlight makes our area exceptionally good for growing. Farming and horticulture form an incredibly important part of our local economy and I've been working consistently since becoming an MP to support our farmers and growers, including through a recent roundtable discussion with the Food and Farming Minister, as well as securing a continuation of the pilot scheme that makes 30,000 seasonal worker visas available to bring in the harvest. During my visit, I also got to see two of the forty-three new John Deere tractors Barfoots have acquired that are packed with amazing technology to make harvesting as efficient as possible.

On August 27th this year of 2022, as part of the Selsey Festival, none other than Kiki Dee and her Guitarist/Vocalist partner Carmelo Luggeri are coming to Selsey to perform their beautiful acoustic music.

This is being presented by Selsey Folk & Music Club who strive to bring some of the best musicians to our town and enhance the local music scene.

"It started out as just another studio day for producer and guitarist, Carmelo Luggeri - until pop legend Kiki Dee came in to put down a vocal He'd seen her many times on TV, but once she started singing, he was just blown away by the amazing tone of her unmistakeable voice. Little did he suspect that, from that day on, his musical career was to change for ever.

The late Steve Brown (the man who discovered Elton) told him, 'There's something special happening when you play acoustically with Kiki.. you should team up'. Possessed of a great eye for talent, Steve became their mentor.

to turn left'. And now, 25 years on from that epiphany, the synergy between the two has blossomed, firmly establishing them as one of the UK's great musical pairings.

2018 saw a year of musical consolidation for the popular duo – Bob Harris wanted them as opening act for the re-booted Whistle Test, and indeed this turned out to be a seminal moment, leading to long overdue recognition and critical acclaim.

KIKI DEE IS COMING TO SELSEY Depeche Mode & Frank Sinatra thrown in for



A large and influential TV audience was delighted to see Kiki not only looking superbly fit, but her unique voice even better than they remembered. Both performers enjoy a heritage which stretches back through decades of fine musicianship, yet in all that time Kiki Carmelo concerts never became a museum piece, a go through-themotions tribute act.

Their long-running body of work is not, nor ever will be, set in aspic. Kiki's upbeat song Carmelo admits: 'That was the day he got us 'Forward Motion' perfectly encapsulates her innate disdain for standing still, her music constantly evolving.

> As well as K&C compositions and Carmelo's beautiful acoustic arrangements of obligatory 'Kiki songs', sublime numbers by great artists are sprinkled into their concerts to great effect. Harry Manx, Leonard Cohen, Kate Bush & Lowell George are welcome additions to a KC setlist - with even a bit of

good measure.

Kiki laughs off this refreshingly cavalier approach: 'We venture all over the place musically - but I've learnt to embrace it - our live shows are very eclectic'.

Equally at home playing intimate London jazz venues or Theatres and Arts Centres in far-flung market towns, the two's freewheeling, often humorous vibe has made them a shoe-in for the flourishing Summer festival market.

On stage, Carmelo's mesmerising playing and arrangements plus loops and Asian Drones fill out the sound to great effect, with Kiki providing moody texture & subtle underscore on keys. Add to that Ms Dee's unique and distinctive voice (which surely should have a national preservation order on it!) and audiences are guaranteed one wonderful evening's entertainment.

And, following countless sell-out gigs those audiences are getting larger, and the cries of 'encore!' getting louder...

Long may it, and they, continue.

LOCKDOWN TREASURES

I wonder how many of us decided that lockdown was the perfect time to do all the sorting out we have always intended to do but never seem to have got round to. I'm pleased to say that I have been the happy recipient of some of the results which I will share with you all.

One of the first people to contact me was Barbara Jones (née King) who gave me 7 postcards written by the same lady to the same address in Berkshire. The cards were dated between the 1940's and 50's and was the correspondence from one sister to another. This one was written on 7 October 1943 and the message is incomplete but will give you a flavour if its contents.



'Propose returning on Tues. Going to Broadfield on Mon. Mr B not all well...Am not over well myself, Love N.'

I found a family tree for the Luckes family which had been researched by Jan Pearse in Melbourne, Australia who very generously shared her information with me:

'The writer was Annie Mary Davys who never married and worked as a domestic servant. Her younger sister was Frances Bessie Davys who married James Sydney Luckes and had two children, Francis and Mary'

Broadfield is near Crawley.

Other postcards were signed 'Nina' so we have deduced that Annie and Nina are one and the same.



Nina was born on 9 March 1895 in East Ham and was baptised on 21 October 1895 at St. Paul's, Haringey. Her father, Frances, was a Butcher. Nina moved around – in 1901 she was in Essex with her family. Her father was a Meat Retailer/Butcher. They then moved to Sussex and her father had changed his occupation to Farmer. By the 1921 census, Nina had left home and was working in Essex for the Barkers. Harry Barker and his wife Sarah employed Nina as a General Home Help and they had three sons, Donald, William and Thomas.

Harry Barker was a Market Gardener and by 1939 he had a holding at 69 Birdham Road, Crouchers Farm, Appledram, aged 71. He died on 27 August 1946 and, at that time, was living at Sunnyside, East Road, Selsey. If this name sounds familiar it is because it was the temporary lodgings of Selsey's GP, Percy Crompe Barford ca. 1901.

Sarah continued to live at Sunnyside and died on 31 October 1955.



Nina died on 13th May 1986 at St. lbbs, 7 Clayton Road, Selsey which was a care home in the 1990s and possibly before.

Another strand of research presented itself in the form of a previously unknown postcard publisher, Frederick Roberton Luke. At least, he was unknown to me! He came to Selsey around 1951 when he was operating from the shop occupied firstly by Sophia Woodland and then Martha Whitenstall in the High Street. He was a Newsagent and Stationer.

Sadly, Barbara died some weeks ago but I can assure her family that the cards will be kept safely and I am grateful to Barbara for the cards and for giving me the chance to find out about the writer and the recipients.

Thank you Jan for sharing your extensive research only a small portion of which is reproduced here.

The next goodies came from Jacqui Potts whom you may remember from Raycrafts in the days of John and Colin.





Both are labelled Selsey C.E. The top one is 1 while the bottom is Group 2. The pictures are taken in front of the school buildings which have been converted into bungalows behind the red brick Old School House in the High Street. The top one has 901 in the corner. I would like to think it should be 1901 but perhaps someone out there knows and will let me know. Neither postcard has been written or posted and there is no publisher to give me a clue. I think it is clear that the top one is earlier than the bottom one.

It occurred to me that the bottom one looked vaguely familiar so I took a look at the Selsey Photo Archive and found the ones overleaf which are obviously the same occasion as the second one above.

Here at Sussex Police we are committed to reducing the number of killed and seriously injured (KSI) incidents on the county's roads and making the road network safer for all road users.

There are five principal causes of KSIs on our county's roads – known as the Fatal 5:

- Inappropriate speed
- Drink and/or drug driving
- Not wearing a seatbelt
- Distraction, including use of a mobile phone or device
- Careless and/or inconsiderate driving or riding

Speeding is understandably a concern for many of our residents and if you follow us on social media, you may have seen that we regularly conduct "Speedwatch" operations and training sessions across the district.

If you are concerned about speeding in your area and would like to work with us to tackle this issue, would you be interested in becoming a Community Speedwatch Volunteer?

Community Speedwatch is a national initiative where, in partnership with the police, members of communities use detection devices to monitor local speeds.

These volunteers then report those drivers who were exceeding

the speed limit to the police with the aim of educating drivers to slow down.

If the data proves that a driver is ignoring repeated warnings, police can prosecute them.

The aim is to:

- reduce death and injury on the roads
- improve the quality of life for local communities
- reduce the speed of vehicles to the speed limit
- increase public awareness of inappropriate speed

Rampion2 - the biggest challenge to Sussex since 1066



Join us and the growing number of MPs and Councils who are opposing this inappropriate and ecologically damaging project. Just consider these points:-

-RWE have opened a **second**

consultation due to an admitted **flaw** in the 2021 consultation. You have until April 11 2022 to voice your opinion.

-the Government has a 2030 target of 40GW from offshore wind, which will be met and exceeded by plans already in place or being planned from sites in the North Sea and elsewhere, where the turbines are out of sight of land. Rampion 2 is not needed to meet this goal.


- at 8 miles from shore, the siting of Rampion 2 contradicts government guidance that new offshore windfarms should be at least 25 miles from a National Park, and in any case at least 14 miles from land

-Rampion 2 would not be in the optimal geographical area to benefit from winds that blow stronger and more constantly in other areas such as Dogger Bank in the North Sea, and where new windfarms can connect their output to a transmission network controlled by the National Grid, so not needing a stand alone cable connection to shore as would be needed for Rampion2

So, what would be the consequences of Rampion 2 being given planning a Development consent order (DCO)?

Construction phase. This will last for 3-4 years at sea and on land

At sea, this will involve large vessels capable of transporting hydraulic rams and heavy lifting equipment. The sound of the rams piling the steel foundation will be very noticeable on shore, and the whole horizon will resemble an industrial building site for years. Trenches to house the interconnectiong cables will be scoured from the sea bed disturbing both marine life and the kelp forest that conservationists are trying to restore. Indications from RWE are that the majority of materials needed will be imported from other countries in Europe, so no benefit for UK industry and jobs.



On land, the onshore cable link from Clymping cutting across the South Downs towards a substation at Bolney will have major consequences for both traffic congestion, and damage to the ecosystem on the South Downs including the "Pickering"

project to diversify and rewild that is taking place on the Duke of Norfolk's estate

Visual effects. Upon completion, the visual effects from both the shoreline and South Downs National Park will be truly appalling. No amount of mitigation can make up for replacing views now enjoyed of an open and unspoilt vista that everyone associates with Sussex, by an industrial seascape that spans the horizon east to west. The turbines will be more than twice the height of Rampion 1 and cover four times the area. At nightime, each turbine will be illuminated by a blinking red light, further adding to the discomfort and distraction of residents and visitors.

Effects on wildlife and the marine ecology. There is not enough space here to list all the damage than would result. However, you can well imagine the risk to the migratory birds and insects that flock to and fro from the wildlife sanctuaries along our coastline. The shellfish industry centred in Selsey would be at risk of terminal decline and no short term financial compensation could make up for this damage.

Effects on residents and tourists. You can make up your own minds on what appeals to you in choosing to live in Sussex. In our view, people choose to live here for the views, the peace and tranquility, and that will disappear if Rampion 2 is approved.

It is not unreasonable to be guided by a visitor survey conducted in Dorset for the Navitus Bay windfarm a few years ago. This predicted that visitor numbers would decline by 21-33% during the construction period, and there would be an ongoing reduction in tourists thereafter effecting up to a 20% decline in tourists spending and a 15% reduction in tourism related jobs. While Brighton might be less impacted due to the high number of tourist attractions in and around the City, the same is not true for areas to the west where tourists come for a typical British holiday with unspoilt coastlines and wonderful scenery.

Longevity of wind turbines. This is not a fit and forget technology. Typical predictions are for a working life of 25 years, but even this cannot be reached without a great deal of maintenance. In 2018, turbine blades at the London Array windfarm off Kent had to undergo major repairs to the blades after only 5 years. So what happens at the end of life of a windfarm? Well, unlikely for turbines to be replaced, so prospect is of a major dismantling needed taking several years, and always assuming the original energy company is still in business and willing and able to pay for this cost.

So, what can you do?

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Common Pipistrelle by Michael Blencowe of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

I spend way too much time in graveyards (especially considering that I'm going to spend an awful lot of time in one in the future). But they are great places to look for Pipistrelle bats. At this time of year, adult Pipistrelles are emerging from their winter hibernation and taking flight. Above Sussex, the night sky is a battlefield of deafening cries as Pipistrelles swoop and swirl, plummet and pounce at

their insect prey.




The acrobatic anarchy overhead goes unnoticed by us humans. Our hearing is limited and when it comes to night vision we're as blind as, well, something with really bad eyesight...in fact anything but a bat. Bats have excellent vision. But it certainly isn't their best sense.

Echolocation is one of the animal world's most incredible superpowers. A Pipistrelle shouts, the shout hits something and bounces back. This echo is instantly analysed in an amazing brain and tells the bat how far

away the object is and whether it's a mosquito, a moth or a mansion. get the maximum information from their echo, Pipistrelles yell at high frequencies (45 kHz, we can only hear up 20 kHz). And these shouts are loud; pneumatic drill or jet fighter loud. Up to 110 decibels some species. A bat would deafen itself if it heard its own shout. So Pipistrelles have to disengage their ears, then shout, then turn their hearing back on, listen for the echo, analyse, then start all over

again. All at the rate of 10-15 times a second. This gives bats an amazing, multi-layered



awareness of their surroundings. But it's tricky (and impolite) to shout when you're eating, so once a moth is in the mouth the bat has to chew-shout-listen-chew-shout-listen to avoid a collision.

There are 17 different species of bat in Sussex. Our smallest – the Common Pipistrelle – is also the one you're most likely to see around your gardens. Back in the 80's there were just four TV channels, two types of videocassette and one species of Pipistrelle in Britain. But in the 90's, scientists discovered that some Pipistrelles were echolocating at higher frequencies (55 kHz); a Montserrat Caballé to the Common Pipistrelle's Freddie Mercury. These are the Soprano Pipistrelles. There's now a third: Nathusius' Pipistrelle. By affixing lightweight metal rings to this

species' wings, researchers have discovered that these bats are migrating to Sussex from as far away as Latvia. An amazing journey for an amazing animal.

A hidden haven for wildlife

Nestled between Selsey and Bracklesham is a wild and wonderful habitat with soaring birds, panoramic views of the rolling South Downs and, on a clear day, a view the Isle of Wight.

This is RSPB Medmerry, but it hasn't always been such a haven for West Sussex wildlife. In the past, this land had been used for farming and even, in the Second World War, as a bombing range for

practising pilots.

That was until ten years ago when the RSPB and the Environment Agency (with the help of an array contactors) set out to rearrange this stretch of West Sussex Coast

Thousands of tonnes of mud were scooped out and used to make embankments, giving a real contrast between the low lying and higher ground across the land.

The shingle sea wall was breached and the sea flooded in, reclaiming the lower ground, creating intertidal habitat as it did. A new, 7km (or 4 mile) long sea wall was built either side of the breach.

The rearrangement was a huge success, with important infrastructure such as the Selsey

main road and the water treatment works no longer at risk from floods. The local community

were involved in the scheme, too, even helping with decisions on footpaths and viewpoints throughout

And, of course, the wildlife at Medmerry has flourished into a diverse and healthy ecosystem. In the springtime, you will hear skylarks singing all around you, belting out their songs as they balance in the air, furiously beating their wings. Another sound to listen out for as spring arrives is the iconic call of the cuckoo, returning from Africa to lay their eggs in the nests of unsuspecting dunnocks.

As you walk towards the Medmerry beach, take a moment to look in the fields and hedges that flank the footpaths. You might see a golden flash as a yellowhammer perches on the willow, or

the bold, apricot breast of a male stonechat on the wire fence.

If you want to see the wealthy wildlife at Medmerry for yourself, join us for one of our guided walks through the reserve.

DONNA'S DELIBERATIONS

Well, we have made it to April, traditionally seen as the month of sun and growth, but it's hard to be very upbeat about it with all that's happening in the Ukraine at the moment. It was heartening, and not surprising, that our amazing town kicked into gear with great speed with Kirsty Hammond organising collections and drop-offs with great ingenuity. A massive thank you must go to her.

Back in the day, I taught English as a second language; it was an interesting period in my life, and one which, although I enjoyed, I wouldn't repeat. I taught many different sorts of people, from Europe, the Middle East, Asia, and indeed, Russia. Two Russian students I particularly remember, always referred to Putin as their 'boss'. I don't think they were 'close' to the seat of government, but were certainly involved with 'Government' work. I had many conversations with them about the differences between our cultures, and they would say that the West had to 'wait' for Russia to catch up. The West, they said, were 50 or so years ahead in terms of their society, so we needed to be patient and wait for them. Frankly, I saw the sense in what they said - we talked around Christmas in the summer. He said the shops were full of about education, the penal system, a free economy and the way the health service worked. They always listened - and said that they wanted to move forward, and work towards a more westernised system. I was never sure that our systems would work there, there are too many cultural differences, but they embraced the principle of change and wanted to learn more about how we 'operated'.

I have been thinking about them a lot, since their country effectively declared war on Ukraine, and I truly believe that they would be horrified at what is happening now. They were, however, very well 'looked after' - we made a number of trips to Gun Wharf Quays



where they purchased designer shoes, suits, coats etc. They spent a great deal of money on western designer labels and seemed completely unconcerned at the price tags; I formed the impression that Russia is a very unequal economy, with wealth inequality very

My students stayed in touch for a long time after they left me, they went on to have a child, moved out of their apartment and into a house. The hospital their son was born in, was within their private sector. To contextualise, only some 5% (although it's up to 20% in Moscow, where my students live) of people have private cover. The country cut its health expenditure by 33% last year, and their universal healthcare system doesn't cover all procedures - salaries for nurses are often as low as 250 US dollars a month. Clearly, my students were very well paid by the Russian Government, and I honestly wonder if, whilst they may well be horrified at what is happening, they would ever express their real views. To use a very English idiom: they will 'know on which side their bread is buttered'. Let us all hope that peace is restored as soon as possible.

On matters other, our community's schools are ramping up for the first set of GCSEs for quite a while - Covid meant they were cancelled for two years running. Being married to a teacher, this is often quite the subject of conversation. Personally, I think this is a very tough year for our students - last year was incredibly disrupted, so effectively, an entire year of the two year courses was compromised. Whilst the exam boards have acknowledged this to some extent, by giving advance information of areas which are

likely to be on the exam papers, in my view it doesn't really make up for almost an entire lost year. Understandably, our young people were greatly impacted by Covid - not only did it affect their education, but it also impacted their emotional health as well; an extremely disruptive two years for them. I wish them all the best as they enter their 'revision' period - they all deserve success.

So, as I said at the beginning - here we are in April, it's spring here,

but in the southern hemisphere, they enter autumn - makes me feel just a little bit smug that we've turned the winter corner just as they are starting to get the jumpers out! Mind you, as they say - 'what goes around, comes around', so as we get our coats out, they'll be enjoying summer! Funny to think about it in that way, really. My

brother spent some years in Australia and could never get his head Christmas cards with Santa, sunbathing on the beach - very weird!

Theoretically, spring has finally 'sprung' and if we're very lucky the weather will begin to reflect that. I'm not too keen on practical jokes, so I approach April 1st with a degree of caution. The history of jokes and pranks is a bit hazy, but many historians think that the notion of April Fools Day goes back to 16th century France. Believe it or not, at that time, New Year's day was March 25th; there was a week of partying and present giving until April 1st. In 1582, the Gregorian Calendar moved New Year's Day to January 1st and those who didn't recognise the new calendar were called 'April Fool's! It may just be strange enough to be true.

Fun fact: weather folklore says: 'If it thunders on All Fools Day, it brings good crops of corn or hay'. I'm not a farner, so I have no

Fun fact number two: April 7th is National No Housework DAY No Housework Day! That may well be a 'just for fun' day but I think it's one I will adopt for the Johnson household!

A guick reminder to the gardeners amongst us....our hedgehogs are soundly asleep until March/April, so if



Barbara Robinson's (Best Ever) Diagonally Knitted Squares:

This pattern makes a stable very reproducible square with a slightly patterned edge which is easier to join with crochet. You will need: Double knitting wool 4mm (UK 8) needles

Cast on two stitches

Knit 1, then increase one stitch by knitting into front then back of

Continue increasing one stitch on every row like this until work measures 8" alongside edge and you have approximately 60 stiches depending on tension.

Knit one row without increasing

Then on next row Knit 1 and then begin to decrease by knitting 2nd and 3rd stitches together then Knit to end Continue until 1 stitch remaining. Cast off

Joining together

Squares can be sewn or crocheted together in strips and then strips joined

Finish off with a border of crochet - two rows and a row of little loops or whatever takes your fancy I

Single Blanket requires: 9 x 7 8 inch diagonally knitted squares King size /Family Blanket 9x12 8 inch diagonally knitted squares Crochet Method of joining quickly with no loose ends

Take two squares wrong side together and crochet together along top edge (hook through pull wool through) x 2 then hook through the two loops to end.

Take two more squares and using same continuous wool do the same across and continue adding pairs until 7 pairs of squares joined. (Like a washing line!) Break wool

Go back to beginning and similarly join one square to one of each of the pairs again with continuous wool.

Carry on adding rows until 9 rows altogether.

Then turning blanket 90 degrees work each join across the other way.

I usually then crochet a border/frill and include the loose ends in

please make yourself at home. I am sure you will establish your daily routines diligently and I look forward to meeting you soon. Until then - au revoir.'

I looked about. The kitchen was vast and stone-flagged. Above the range, a set of copper pans arranged by size and purpose. Next to the kitchen door, where I had entered the house only a few minutes before, a set of bells. labelled according to the room or part of the house they served. In the middle of the floor, as if comforting the leg of the wide oak table, there was a large tabby cat who regarded me with eyes the colour of citrine. It blinked slowly. For the first time in the hours since I'd awoken, I let my new situation my change in fortune - sink in.



My husband, Roger, had been a spiteful man, difficult to understand, even more difficult to love. His rages – and there had been plenty - had become intolerable and slowly but surely, it had dawned on me that to stay with him would be to concede that I would be nothing more to him than the person who sat quietly by his side during dinner parties with his loud, obnoxious friends and, later, when everyone had left, his verbal punchbag and carer. It had taken one chance meeting with a friend in the village who took meals to an elderly friend, to plant the seed. After all, if I was caring for someone who did not appreciate me, why not leave and do the same thing for someone who did? I had placed the advert in the Gazette and had received a response almost immediately. For weeks I was between despair and the most terrific excitement. I was going to leave Roger, not with dignity and an indignant toss of my head, or to the sound of his cane thumping across the parquet as he followed me, bellowing, to my car, but quietly and without

fuss. When he woke up, he would find me gone, and there would be nothing he could do to persuade me to stay. For weeks I had planned. I sorted, gave away and sold anything I could not take with me. And when the time came for me to leave, she was ready to help. Before dawn had broken today, she helped me pack the last of my belongings and my suitcases into my car, her shadowy form being swallowed by the darkness of the lane as I drove away to my new life. And now here I was, my new life only four hours old, still facing uncertainty, but ready to make up for the years that I had lost with Roger.

The cat followed me, rubbing against my ankles as I made my way through the kitchen passage into the house. I had hoped for a family to look after, but a businessman who spent a lot of his time abroad did not feel like a raw deal. At least I would have plenty of time to myself. I lost a sense of time as I wandered the elegant rooms, admiring the taste and money that had been spent in adorning this place. It started to dawn on me that I would be responsible for keeping it all in order and made a mental note to write everything in my daily planner so that my routines would become a habit. I was a creature of habit, and the habits of my new boss, and this house, would become my own. The cat mewed loudly and I looked down. It had travelled the entire length and breadth of the house with me, even through the cottage garden, and hadn't left my side. It seems I had already made a friend. I bent down to stroke it, and it purred, turning in circles. I wondered what its name was and whether its owner had left feeding instructions, so I made my way back to the kitchen. Amongst the pieces of paper left for me on the table I found what I was looking for.

'If you find a cat in the house, she is a stray. She has been coming here for years and no one in the village seems to claim her. She will eat anything you find for her and there are tins of food in the pantry - she is a good companion. Her name is Fouf.' Fouf and I looked at each other and I imagined she read

as much expectancy in my gaze as I did in hers.

'So, Fouf, I think my first job is to feed you, and then I can set about unpacking.' As if in reply, Fouf mewed loudly and ran to the pantry door. I smiled as I followed her, suddenly filled with a blaze of hope and happiness that everything was going to be just fine. This day, of all days - my seventieth birthday - would be the first day of the rest of my life.

In the Garden our monthly guide to gardening - In memory of Giles Peare

Jobs for April

The warmer weather will encourage weeds as well as plants and must be removed before they seed or they will be a big problem

Perennial weeds such as Bindweed and Ground Elder should be dug out later in the month whilst actively growing

It is a good idea to plant up hanging baskets, containers, boxes and tubs and place in a warm area so that the plants will have filled out and are making a good display when they go out in late May. Put outside on warm days but they must come in at night.

After Spring pruning shrubs, such as Buddleias and Roses, will enjoy a feed of well-rotted manure and blood, fish and bone to get them off to a good start. Rake into the soil and, if necessary, give a light watering to get them working.

Remember to ventilate greenhouses and conservatories on sunny days to prevent heat damage to recently pricked out tender seedlings.

Continue to plant potatoes and earth-up any early shoots to protect • them from frost

Mow lawns, as required, still on a high cut and remember to hand-trim the edges for best results - far better than strimmers!

Carry on with the successional planting of Gladioli in sheltered sunny spots. They will need light staking later in the month.

Provided the flowers are not open, spray Apples, Pears and Plums against scab and mildew and check new shoots for Greenfly and spray, if required.

Sow Sweet Peas in sunny and sheltered spots.



- Sow hardy annuals in borders and in rows in the vegetable garden later in the month to give a good supply of cut flowers.
- If your garden contains small fruit bushes and trees, cover with fleece to protect the blossom if frost is forecast.
- Prepare vegetable beds with well-rotted manure and blood, fish and bone for Tomatoes, Runner Beans, Marrows, Pumpkins, Cucumber and Courgettes
- Deadhead Winter Primroses and Pansies as well as Daffodils and Tulips to encourage longer flowering. Leave Daffodil and Tulip stems and leaves to die-off naturally.
- Divide and re-pot marginal Pond plants and also thin out Aquatic plants before they grow and take over the Pond. Feed
- Prune back the taller stems of Dogwoods to obtain the best colour next Winter.
- Stake tall growing perennials in good time.
- Remember to prick out or pot up seedlings before they get too
- congested and become straggly and spindly.
- Give Roses a protective spray against Blackspot.
- This is the last chance to cut down any dead growth left over from Winter before damage is caused to new shoots.

GREENING SELSEY

Creating a Sustainable Future

Last November Manhood Wildlife & Heritage Group, in partnership Promoting permeable driveways with Selsey Town Council's Climate Action Group, Selsey Flood Action Group and Grow Selsey organised a Climate Change Workshop. This was in response to the climate and biodiversity crises that we face.

The aims of the workshop were: to identify actions already being taken to tackle these issues locally; to generate ideas for new projects and to select a number of these to be taken forward in the short term in order to stimulate more comprehensive action. A cross section of community groups, businesses and other organisations were invited to attend and representatives from fourteen of these were present. Invitations had to, unfortunately, be limited at this time in order to ensure that sensible Health & Safety measures could be put in place.

It was very evident from the input of the attendees that there is considerable enthusiasm and commitment to reducing carbon footprints and helping wildlife thrive - much is already happening.

Equally impressive was the huge list of ideas that was compiled from discussion about the following six themes: Promoting Biodiversity, Energy Efficiency, Active Travel, Careful Use of Water, Shop Local and Food. Here are a few of the ideas generated:

Plant orchards

Car & taxi Sharing

Locking cycle racks

A community biodigester to produce compost and energy

Electric cycle hire

Advertising where you can refill drinking water bottles

Farmers Market/Food Fayre promoting local food

At the end of the workshop two ideas were chosen to be the first to be developed into active projects. These were:

- A Wildlife Gardening Fair to show how to make gardens the best for wildlife and sustainable – as a first step 'how to' messages are being integrated into this year's Selsey Open Gardens event.
- The development of a series of recipe cards based on local, seasonal produce.

The climate and biodiversity are both in crisis. And although much is being done to tackle this, it is not nearly enough, and time is ticking. It is widely held by climate scientists and nature conservation experts that action this decade is crucial if we are to avoid the worst consequences. Greening Selsey is our attempt to do as much as we can locally. But we need you on board! So, if you have any ideas, however large or small and/or you'd like to get involved with Greening Selsey, in any way at all, please do get in

Planting time begins in earnest around now – April is the perfect time for your hardy annuals and wildlflowers. It's also time to sow sweet peas (ensuring they are close to supports) and to transfer any seedlings sown in autumn. Keep on deadheading spring bulbs, too.

Take particular care to protect the vulnerable new shoots of delphiniums, lupins, hostas and the like from the predation of slugs and snails. Spraying the new leaves of rose bushes with fungicide is another protective measure worth taking.

Meanwhile, you can still enjoy an instant pop of colour with primulas and polyanthus - perfect for borders and planters.







Spring feels like it is arriving now, and Easter is upon us. A real opportunity at a troubling and concerning time in the world at the moment, to think of new beginnings.




Our Easter message to you on Easter Sunday is that Jesus Christ is risen today..... Hallelujah! Can you imagine where we would all be if it all
