#### **Seeley Copse Visit**

The children in Years 1 and 2 were learning about the Enchanted Forest this term. ## Selsey inshore lifeboat called to Kayak with two people aboard.

The inshore lifeboat was requested to launch by the UK Coastguard after they received a report that an inflatable Kayak with two people on board appeared to be struggling in the tide and wind.

The D class lifeboat with a crew of three volunteers launched at 3.29pm on Saturday 30 June and best speed to the area between West Street and Hillfield road. When the lifeboat arrived on scene they found the craft had made it safely ashore and was with the Selsey Coastguard team. The weather on scene was wind easterly force 4 sea state slight in sunshine.

The lifeboat was released and returned to station rehousing at 3.46pm. The crew today were Helmsman Gary Pearce, Will Moir and James Albery.

#### Selsey RNLI inshore lifeboat responds to hoax call.

Uk Coastguard received an emergency phone call reporting a 14 year old boy on an inflatable was drifting out to sea.

The D class lifeboat launched at 6.30pm on Saturday 30 June and made best speed to the Bill point. The weather on scene was wind easterly force 4-5 sea state slight in sun shine. The Selsey Coastguard team were also tasked and on arrival at the beach were approached by a youth who said his brother and friends had called the Coastguards for a joke.

The inshore lifeboat was released and returned to station at 6.46pm. The crew of the lifeboat were Helmsman James Albery, Max Wiseman and Jake Harnett.

# Both Selsey RNLI lifeboats conduct search for missing person off Bognor Regis

Uk Coastguard requested the launch of both the Selsey lifeboats to search the waters off Bognor Regis for a 24yr old male swimmer last seen at 3.00pm in the water off Aldwick.

The two lifeboats launched at 10.28pm on Monday 2 July and proceeded to the area. The inshore lifeboat (ILB) commenced a shoreline search from Pagham Harbour to Bognor sailing club. The all-weather lifeboat (ALB) started a creeping line ahead search half a mile offshore. The Coastguard helicopter rescue 175 was also tasked and joined the search at 10.55pm.

The weather on scene was wind North Easterly force 5-6, sea state slight to moderate in clear sky. At 12.45am the ILB was released to return to station. The helicopter and the ALB were given new search instructions by UK Coastguard which took the ALB to a position 5 miles off shore and working back towards Pagham harbour. At 2.52am the ALB completed the search area given and was released from the incident. The Helicopter was released earlier after completing the search area they were given.

The ALB returned to station at 3.05am and was rehoused and made ready for service by 4.25am. The crews tonight were ALB: Coxswain Dave Lamdin 2<sup>nd</sup> Coxswain Colin Pullenger, Mechanic Phil Pitham, Andy Lee, Dan Langford and Pip Skeet. ILB: Helmsman Will Moir, Craig Sergeant and Neil Hopcraft.

The UK Coastguards informed the station that the man returned home shortly after the search was called off momentarily but was again missing the following morning.

Selsey inshore lifeboat conducts search after finding lilo during exercise.

The inshore lifeboat launched on exercise at 6.30pm on Thursday 5 July. During the exercise they came across a clam shaped lilo off Park Lane Selsey.

After informing the UK Coastguard the inshore lifeboat crew were asked to conduct a search in the immediate area for anyone that might have been on the lilo. A comprehensive search of the area and moorings off Selsey was completed before the inshore lifeboat dropped the recovered lilo at the station before continuing with the exercise. Weather on scene was wind Westerly force 2-3, sea state slight in light cloud. The crew tonight were Acting Helmsman Sam Troughton-Smith, James Albery, Harry Emmence and Neil Hopcraft.

## Selsey inshore lifeboat crew save the life of youth struggling in the sea.

The Selsey RNLI inshore lifeboat was requested to launch after the UK Coastguard had received an emergency phone call saying a youth was clinging to the breakwater marker pole. A second youth was in the water swimming out to help the first youth. At the time the tide was flowing westerly at approximately 4 knots.

The D class inshore lifeboat (ILB) Betty and Thomas Moore was launched at 4.46pm on Thursday 19 July and made best speed to the location close to the East beach launching ramp. At 4.48pm the ILB arrived on scene and the Volunteer crewmen saw the second youth struggling in the tide and disappear under the surface; they quickly made towards him and with only half his arm showing were able to grab him and bring him into the ILB. While casualty care was being administered to this casualty the other youth was recovered to the safety of the ILB.

The ILB made best speed back to lifeboat station where an ambulance had been requested to attend by the ILB crew. Both casualties were landed at the boathouse at 5.00pm where casualty care continued until the arrival of the SECAmbulance.

The crew aboard the ILB today were Helmsman Rob Archibald, James Albrey and Jake Harnett (trainee)

#### A PICTURE GALLERY OF THE SELSEY CARNIVAL

It all started so simply. 'Look what I found!' the young man said. 'We could put it in Selsey Life for August. It would be good publicity!' And then the rug was pulled out from under our feet by the cancellation of said Carnival for this year. This is not the first, nor even the second time, that this has happened in Selsey so be of good cheer! I'm sure it will be back.



This image is from the 1890's. There are a great many sailing ships at sea, a young lady on the left sitting on the sand with her picnic basket at her side and two separate boats and groups of people. I cannot guarantee that this is the same event, but the Bognor Regis Observer of 27 August 1890 records the Selsey Regatta during which there was the usual Galley Race.

'An interesting feature was the rowing match in salvage galleys between eleven fishermen and twenty-two cricketers... (here follows a list of the gentlemen involved) This was a good race, though it was evident throughout that the fishermen, who pulled much more evenly than their opponents, would be the victors. This proved correct, the sons of Neptune beating the cricketers by several lengths.'



By 26 August 1908 the newspaper was reporting on 'Regatta and Carnival at Selsev'.

'The Committee and promoters of the Selsey Regatta seem particularly unfortunate in selecting their date for the annual regatta. Last year it clashed with a big political meeting, and this year it had to be postponed from last Thursday to Saturday, there being rain and a high south-east wind blowing, which caused a heavy 'slop' preventing small boats from going out.'

The sports were held on the Friday 'as the weather was all that could be desired, and the sports, including running races, egg and spoon races, high jumps, etc. were successfully carried through, each child receiving a prize of present of some description'.

And so the Carnival progressed through 1912 and 1913 with the weather playing an important part in what was held and where and what was cancelled or postponed but, eventually, the procession of 1912 was held one week later. The Chichester Observer of 27 August 1913 offered excursion fares on the Selsey Tram:

'From Chichester to Selsey at 9d return fare on the trams leaving Chichester at 2.20, 3.20, 4.20, 5.20, 6.40 and 7.35. A special late tram will leave Selsey at 10 o'clock for all stations to Chichester'.

The Carnival of 1913 was a somewhat hastily devised event but 'In spite of the short period of preparation the Selsey Carnival on Wednesday evening proved a big success, and, favoured with fine weather, it was witnessed by a large concourse of people. The entries reached the gratifying number of seventy, and many of the fancy costumes and decorated motor cars were most artistic.'



And now we jump to 1935 when the newspapers reported 'the annual mounted carnival was held at Selsey. The procession formed outside the Selsey hotel and paraded some of the principal streets before arriving at the field in East Street to be judged'.

This picture is thought to be either 1935 or 1936 and certainly a great many horses followed a similar route.

This picture is thought to be around 1930 and is, quite clearly, taken as they turn into West Street.



On 12 August 1936 the Chichester Observer told us of:

'Selsey Carnival Queen. Crowned at Church Fete'

'Brilliant weather greeted a brilliant ceremony on Wednesday last, when with a background of blue sky and glistening waves, the most beautiful young lady, according to popular vote, in Selsey, was crowned Queen of Carnival in Selsey for 1936. Surrounded by her maids of honour, the Queen, Miss Iris Fox, made a radiant picture, cloaked with Royal purple and wearing a simple white gown.'

Any future Carnival Queens might like to know that Mr W A Thornton presented Iris with a 'beautiful diamond clip' while Lady Felix Brunner presented her with a trinket set. The Maids of Honour were Miss Freda Mould, Miss Doris Henstridge, Miss Lina Langford and Miss Pamela Purchase.



And this is one of those rare occasions when we have both the photograph and the newspaper report to go with it.

This is Male's float for 1938 when the Hogsnorton Fire Brigade took to the road. Several people have commented to me that Male's always had spectacular floats and I think we can see that here. It won Class K, tableaux, motor or horse-drawn. This year Doris Henstridge went one better and became the Carnival Queen, receiving a basket of fruit. Attendants were Dorothy Mariner, Jose Francis, Joyce Hawkins and Winifred Glew.

Apparently they 'combined nicely the virtues of modesty and graciousness.'

I have, however, refrained from including the picture of them all to avoid embarrassing them.


The picture quality from my scanner isn't the best but those of you who were there will recognise the float. I'm sure.



#### Wildlife on the Doorstep: Results of our Selsey Centre Bioblitz

On 13th June MWHG held a day of wildlife discovery at Manor Green Park next to the Selsey Centre. With help from wildlife experts we recorded a grand total of 109 species. Within this total, 8 butterfly species were recorded, 9 species of bee and a further 13 species of invertebrate, including various true-bugs, crustaceans, molluscs, crickets, grasshoppers, a beetle and a dragonfly. The highlight was an Essex Skipper butterfly, which has no previous Selsey record! In the meadows we identified 74 species of plant and FLOW Project Manager Jane was delighted to find a short-tailed field vole and a wood mouse in the Longworth traps. After showing the vole and mouse to excited volunteers, Jane released them back into the meadows.

We found lots of slow-worms under the reptile tins

We were pleased to meet some very enthusiastic locals at the event and also several parents, who stopped to take part in activities with their children, including barn owl pellet dissection. Overall it was a successful bioblitz, blessed by beautiful weather, during which we collected many valuable records to highlight the wildlife using the site, much of which is often hidden, but is all around us!

Are you concerned with speeding vehicles in your community?

Do you want to calm vehicle speed on your local roads?

Community Speedwatch (CSW) is a national initiative where active members of local communities join with the support of Sussex Police to monitor speeds of vehicles using speed detection devices

Vehicles exceeding the speed limit are referred to the Police with the aim of educating drivers to reduce their speeds. In cases where education is ignored and evidence of repeat or excessive offences is collated, enforcement and prosecution follow. Volunteers receive appropriate training and are supported by neighbourhood policing teams. The scheme aims to cater for the problem of real or perceived speed related offending and through partnership with the community, it is to be used in circumstances that are necessary, justifiable and proportionate in order to:

- Reduce death and injury on the roads
- Improve the quality of life for local communities Reduce the speed of vehicles to the speed limit
  - Increase public awareness of inappropriate speed.

#### **FULL STEAM AHEAD**

The use of steam to power engines was developed over a period of 100 years. The first steam engine was developed by Thomas Savery in 1698. It was a rather crude machine, designed to pump water from coal and tin mines. It had no moving parts and used a great deal of coal to pump out a small amount of water. However, it paved the way for the invention of using steam to power machines to do useful work.



Thomas Newcomen realised that there must be a more efficient way of using steam and he designed an improved water pump whereby steam pushed a single piston. Both Newcomen and Savery were solely concerned with the problem of pumping water out of the coal and tin mines in England. It was not until 1753 when a Scottish engineer called James Watt, developed an engine that would push a piston backwards and forwards, which in turn drove a wheel and produced circular motion.

The invention of machines, powered by steam, grew and

the Industrial Revolution changed the way in which people worked and lived.



Basic principles of steam driven power.

Many cottage industries became mechanised. For example, in 1809 the first woolen mill was opened. Previously preparing wool for cloth making had been done in rural homes across the country. Steam now powered engines that washed, picked, carded, spun and wound wool. Machines could run 24 hours a day; people left the land and headed for factories instead.

At the same time Richard Trevithick developed the first steam driven locomotive in 1804. By 1813 George Stevenson invented the famous Rocket, the first commercial steam train and by 1825 this was carrying passengers and goods between Stockton and Darlington. Steam was here to stay.

The growth in industry and changing lifestyles with the development of towns and cities, led to a demand for more and more power. It was not practical for every home to have its own steam powered machine. Fueled by coal or timber, the first steam-electric

power station was built in 1882. Water was heated and the resulting steam was forced under pressure to spin massive turbines that powered an electric generator. What had started as a way of pumping water out of privately owned small mines, came full circle as hundreds of thousands of tons of coal were needed every year to power the growing number of steam machines and electric generators.

Eventually demand stripped supply and sources of energy needed to be found. The science of nuclear fission was developed from 1895-1945. Between 1939-1945 research and development focused on the atomic bomb. After 1945 the emphasis changed to searching for a way of harnessing atomic energy to produce electricity. The most effective way was found to be using the heat generated from nuclear fission to produce steam to feed turbines which generate electricity.

Today; 86% of the worlds' electricity is generated by steam. The once familiar sight of lumbering great steam locomotives may have disappeared but steam has played a vital role in both the Industrial and Technological revolutions, and it is still 'full steam ahead' today.

#### Passing through Pagham Harbour and Medmerry

For the majority of our birds, the breeding season is drawing to an end. Many of our migrant species have already started to head to their wintering grounds. Our tern colony will be dispersing and many of our warblers will be joining them on their journeys south. Now is the time to keep an eye out for our summer visitors that have bred in upland areas such as common sandpipers and greenshanks.


The common sandpiper is a medium sized wader with brown upperparts, white underparts, greenish legs and a distinctive white shoulder. It has a curious habit of bobbing up and down, known as 'teetering'.



Larger than the common sandpiper, with longer legs and a longer, slightly upturned bill, the greenshanks upperparts are grey and underparts white. At this time of year both often turn up on the Ferry and Breech Pools on Pagham Harbour and also the Stilt Pools on Medmerry.

These areas are also good places to search for the diminutive little stint which starts to move through our reserves at the end of this month into September. A tiny wader, smaller than a house sparrow, it feeds rapidly with a shuffling movement, pecking quickly at the surface of the mud and hardly ever looking up. Most little stints we

above with two pale stripes or braces down the back. It may not sound like a particularly pretty bird, but if you are fortunate enough to get a good view of one through a telescope, you will discover the brown is actually a delicate mottled patterning and quite beautiful.





Later in the month it is worth checking Glebe Meadow and the churchyard at Church Norton for flycatchers. Male pied flycatchers are smart little birds in spring with black upperparts and white underparts and a characteristic white wing patch. Now they resemble the females as their black plumage moults into brown. Spotted flycatchers are much less dapper with simple brown upperparts, off white underparts and streaky breasts. Both species live up to their name by darting out from a perch.

see at this time of year are juveniles and look white below and brown

erratically catching flying insects mid-air, but unlike the pied flycatcher, the spotted flycatcher tends to return to the same perch.

Going for gold - the Silver-spotted skipper by Michael Blencowe of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

Am I the only one not interested at all in the World Cup? I can't think of anything duller than watching a bunch of over-paid men kicking a bag of gas up and down a field. By the time you read this we'll have already worked out which country is the best at kicking a ball and we can forget about it all for another four years. Meanwhile, I'll be spending my July and August in pursuit of my favourite sport - butterfly watching - and I'll be sat on the turf watching a tiny orange butterfly racing around and fighting.

When it comes to sports, the Silver-spotted skipper is a true Olympian and stands on all levels of the podium. Their wings are golden and bronze with shining silver panels on the underside. It's one of our

smallest butterflies and it gymnastically zips, twists and flips around the downland turf at incredible speeds. Dave Sadler Sussex Wildlife Trust The males are vicious little blighters too. They defend a territory and will attack any other insect that dares wander into their arena.

And the one thing they love more than racing and fighting is sunbathing. In Sussex you'll only find them on the hottest slopes of the South Downs where they seek out their favourite hotspots - the bare ground created by grazing animals. This bare earth heats up and forms a microclimate much warmer than the surrounding grass - and to a tiny butterfly that's the difference between Iceland and Ibiza.

These butterflies were doing fine for centuries but back when England last won the World Cup in 1966 the world above their hot hoof-print havens had begun to shift. Changes in economics and agricultural policies took the sheep off the Downs and the cold shadows of tall grasses, brambles and thorns took over. With their habitat cooling, the future looked dark for our sun-loving skipper and by the tense semi-finals of the 1990 World Cup it was facing extinction in Britain. In Sussex it held on at a few colonies on the far eastern edge of the South Downs. But the world has started to change again; we're getting hotter! As the global temperatures rise, people and polar bears are panicking but this little butterfly has kept its cool. It is finding that there are now more of those nice hot microclimates available.

Meanwhile, conservation groups across the South Downs have brought back grazing to conserve our precious chalk downland habitat. Up on Malling Down near Lewes you'll see my woolly colleagues, the hungry Herdwick sheep, at work on the Sussex Wildlife Trust's

reserve. It's one of the hotspots for this skipper in Sussex. With the sheep creating the perfect habitat and the thermometers rocketing each summer the stage is set for a Silver-spotted comeback! And here he comes! Off to a flying start in the eastern South Downs! Passing Alfriston and Firle! Overtaking Lewes on the inside! Vaulting past Ditchling and Wolstonbury and, with a hop, skip and jump, he's made it to Storrington! Re-conquering the South Downs - 42 miles in 28 years - surely that's worthy of a medal!

Head out for a walk on the South Downs in August and you may be in with a sporting chance of spotting this skipper – as well as many other beautiful chalk downland butterflies.

# Selsey Coastguard

In an emergency out at sea or along the coast Dial 999 and ask for the Coastguard

#### Recent Callouts

#### 02/06/18 11:28

Team paged to East Head. West Wittering to 2 adults and a child stuck in the mud with an incoming tide.

Hayling Lifeboat and Portsmouth Coastguard Rescue team were also tasked with Portsmouth Coastguard Team being stood down on route as Hayling Inshore Lifeboat was able to recover all three people due to the rising tide.

The three casualties were then handed over to us and safety advice was given, no medical assistance was needed.

If you become stuck in mud try to spread your weight as much as possible. Avoid moving and stay as calm as possible. Discourage others from attempting to rescue you, since without the proper rescue equipment they may become stuck too.

#### 02/06/18 18:39

Team paged to the Lifeboat Station to get eyes on a vessel that appeared to be in difficulty with 3 persons on board.

Once on scene and we had eyes on the casualty we requested the immediate launch of the Inshore Lifeboat as they appeared to be in an inflatable boat and were struggling with the tide and the offshore winds.



Selsey Inshore Lifeboat launched and was quickly on scene and took the casualties aboard and towed the inflatable boat back to East Beach Dive Ramp where we were waiting for them.

Safety advice was given as they had no lifejackets or a radio and had been out fishing all afternoon.

We then gave them a lift back to their car which was at Church Norton where they launched from.

Blow up boats and toys are great fun in the swimming pool, but we do not recommend their use at the seaside. This is because they can easily be blown out to sea.

We strongly recommend that blow up boats and toys are not used in an offshore wind – that is when the wind blows from the land out to sea – because they can quickly be swept out to sea. Go to a lifeguarded beach if possible and heed the lifeguards' advice. If people do find themselves being swept out to sea, our advice is to stay with the boat or toy and shout for help, waving arms if possible. Do not attempt to swim for shore if out of depth. Ideally make sure that someone ashore is keeping an eye on you.

Thank you to the first informant that had been keeping an eve on them all afternoon.

#### 03/06/18 17:27

Team paged to reports of a missing 2 year old child at West Wittering Beach.

Stood down on route to West Wittering with the child found safe and well.

FREE Child Safe Wrist Bands are available at the Lifequard Tower on West Wittering Beach please use them, and write your mobile contact number on it.

When visiting the beach please keep an eye on your children at all

If you lose your child on the beach or in an emergency out at sea or along the coast dial 999 and ask for the Coastguard straight away!

#### 08/06/18 17:12

Team paged to reports of a vessel washed up on the shoreline opposite Gill Way, East Beach.

Two Coastguard Rescue Officers recovered the Fishing Punt from the water, to the top of the beach, details and photos were sent to Solent Coastguard.

A quick shoreline search was carried out with nothing else found.

#### 16/06/18 08:40

Team paged to reports of ordnance at Medmerry Beach a search of the beach was carried out and several pieces of ordnance were found, the beach was closed, photos were taken and sent to E.O.D (Explosive Ordnance Disposal Team) who confirmed the items as ordnance and a controlled explosion was carried out.



Team stood down at 12.10 to return to station.

If you come across any ordnance on the beach please do not touch it and dial 999 and ask for the Coastguard straight away. Ordnance found on this beach before has been found to be highly explosive so please do not touch it and call the Coastguard straight away!

#### 16/06/18 12:10

As we were returning to station from our previous tasking the team were paged to assist Chichester District Councils Foreshore Team after five Jet Skis had launched from the dive ramp at East Beach Car Park. (Jet Skis are not permitted to launch from this ramp). With one jet ski continuously over turning in the swell and one person in the water we requested the launch of the Selsey Inshore Lifeboat.

We requested the lifeboat to stand off for safety cover until all jet skis and persons had been recovered and were safely out of the water due to the conditions of the tide and swell. Safety advice was also given.

\*\* Jet Skis are not permitted to launch or be recovered from any of the ramps in or around Selsev. \*\*

Bunn Leisure Owners are able to launch their Jet Skis at Bunn

You may also launch jet skis from Bognor and Itchenor.

#### 23/06/18 16:07

Team paged to reports of a missing 5 year old child last seen heading into the water at West Wittering Beach.

Team stood down on route to West Wittering with the child found safe and well.

Hayling Lifeboat were also tasked and stood down.

Team paged to reports of 2 people stuck in the mud with an inflatable kavak at Birdham Pool.

On arrival the two people had made it back to firm ground after they managed to get free and crawl back to the shore.

No first aid treatment was needed and safety advice was given! Portsmouth Coastquard Team we're also tasked but stood down on route.

In an emergency out at sea or along the coast or if you're stuck in the mud dial 999 and ask for the Coastquard!

Getting stuck in mud and guicksand is a favourite plotline in films and books, but it can really happen, especially in wide, flat estuaries and bays. Never try to cross a bay – the ground can look firm and safe, but be incredibly treacherous.

Walking over (and through) mud is difficult and tiring and there can be hidden channels of fast-flowing water. You can get trapped in the mud, which is frightening at the best of times but potentially fatal if the tide comes in. If you get stuck in mud or quicksand:

- try to spread your weight as evenly as possible across the surface be funny to call us!
- avoid moving and stay as calm as you can
- discourage other people from attempting to rescue you, since without the proper equipment they could become stuck too
- if you have a mobile phone, call 999 and ask for the Coastguard. If you don't, shout for help.

#### 25/06/18 16:20

Team paged to reports of a person that had capsized in a Kayak off Marine Car Park and was in difficulty.

The person had managed to get back to shore ok with half a paddle If you ever hear of anyone being involved in a hoax call please let as his paddle had also snapped while he was in trouble. Selsey Inshore Lifeboat was also tasked but was stood down before it was launched.

No first aid was needed and Safety advice was given.

#### 28/06/18 15:03

Team paged to reports of two persons in the water and vessel aground in Chichester Marina.

After a sudden gust of wind in Chichester Harbour the vessel went aground throwing two persons onboard into the water, thankfully both people were wearing lifejackets which deployed themselves. Chichester Harbour Patrol also responded, and recovered both casualties from the water, no first aid was needed or given and the vessel was towed back to its mooring at Dell Quay. Team stood down to return to station.

#### 30/06/18 13.37

Team paged to reports of a young missing child last seen in the water at West Wittering Beach.

Coastguard Rescue search teams were deployed to the East and West, both Hayling Lifeboats were tasked and Coastguard Helicopter Rescue 175 was also in attendance with Sussex



The young girl was found safe and well about half a mile away as she had got herself disorientated and just kept walking. The girl was brought back to West Wittering Beach and reunited with her parents.

#### 30/06/18 15:20

As we were returning back to station from our previous job we were tasked to two people in an inflatable kayak off Clayton Road, Selsey that were being taken out to sea by the wind and tide. Selsev Inshore Lifeboat was also tasked.

Once the inflatable kayak was ashore safety advice was given. Neither persons had lifeiackets on and were also drinking.

Our advice for blow up boats and toys is the same as for the 2nd June incident.

#### 30/06/18 15:56

Just as we had left the station to go home from our previous job we were paged to reports of a missing 6 year old child at West Wittering Beach.

Stood down as we were leaving the station with the child found safe and well.

#### 30/06/18 18.25

Team paged to reports of a 14 year old boy drifting out to sea on an inflatable toy by the Oval Playing Field, Selsey.

Selsey Inshore Lifeboat was also tasked and launched to carry out a search.

While on scene and looking for the boy in danger on the inflatable tov we were approached by a member of the public, who informed us this was a hoax and that his brother and a group of friends thought it would

Hoax calls are a dangerous waste of resources!

Hoax calls will always be treated as real until confirmed otherwise. This ties up valuable resources, potentially leaving areas uncovered until teams can be diverted.

Those who volunteer and risk their own safety to rescue others should also not be put at needless risk in responding to hoax distress calls!





August still sees our gardens bursting with produce and flowers. The main occupation this month is harvesting and enjoying our produce and cutting the flowers to fill our house with beauty and scent. Bird song is not so loud now as the birds are relaxing for a while as the majority of broods have now fledged and left the nest.

The corn in the fields is now golden and the trees are at the height of their greenery. Young Pheasants and Rabbits are very noticeable in the courntryside. On hill-sides blue Harebells can be seen nodding their bell-like heads in the gentle breeze and blue Cornflowers can be spotted in the fields. Butterflies and Bees are at their busiest collecting their nectar from the many flowers and shrubs.

August is holiday time so just recline, enjoy some wine and have a great time.

## Jobs for August

If the flowering performance of Perennials such as Campanular, Delphiniums, Sedum or Cardoon is somewhat declining it is best to lift and divide them. Re-plant in soil with some added compost and 

To prevent birds from pecking fruit on trees tie a bag of moth make sure it is well watered. Plant in groups of 3, 5 or 7 rather than dotting them around. They will provide an impressive display next

This is the time to cut down old Raspberry canes and thin

Keep grapevines well watered and ventilated - thin out some leaves if necessary. Nip out all unwanted shoots after they have produced one leaf to concentrate the efforts of the plant into producing grapes and replacement shoots for next year's harvest.

Pinch our any sideshoots on Tomatoes. Tap the flowers regularly and mist-spray in the mornings to encourage fruit set. Give regular feeds using a high potash Tomato food, preferably with added calcium. Never allow plants to wilt or blossom end rot will result. Support the plants securely, tying as necessary. Remove lower • leaves gradually as they start yellowing but do not expose fruit to strong sunlight. Make sure the Tomatoes in greenhouses are well ventilated or mildew will be a problem.

#### The Selsey Birder -A Welcome and a Royal Visitor

You've probably seen us if you've ever wandered down to the beach at Selsey Bill! Mostly men of a certain age - though we do count an increasing

number of ladies amongst our ranks - we are usually dressed in dull green or brown anoraks, huddled against a wall near our base beside Bill House, in a comfortable position sheltered from the prevailing wind. We are the Selsey Birding group, counting and logging bird numbers as they pass on their spring and autumn migration or spend the winter months off our coastline. Summer is the quietest time by far for us anoraks, which is probably just as well, for this of course is when most 'normal' people head for the

Selsey Bill is a nationally famous site for recording bird migration, due to its geographical position as a prominent headland on the Channel coast. In spring, many seabirds are observed moving up-Channel, heading towards their breeding grounds, whilst other species arrive from the sea, often near exhaustion and desperate to feed up and rest in the trees and vegetation at the Bill-tip before moving on. Some that breed locally may remain to feed through the summer, but in autumn migrant birds need to feed and put on weight, vital to prepare them for their return migration, whilst seabirds in winter may remain awhile before heading for their wintering grounds; in short then, Selsey Bill is actually an important site all year round.

Continuous observations have been made at this site since 1959, by a succession of volunteers and observers, and all bird records are forwarded to the Sussex Ornithological Society (SOS) which in turn liaises with the Sussex Biodiversity Centre, to ensure this important information is fully documented. I have been a regular watcher there for the last 45 years (since 1973) and have witnessed a good many changes in that time. One of the biggest changes has been the loss of natural habitat due to the continual spread of housing development over the years, to the point where what little green space now remains there is of critical importance to wildlife. The long, vegetated gardens adjoining the beach fall into this category and we are always most grateful to the householders who tolerate us looking into their private gardens, whilst the understanding of the Bill House staff deserves a special mention!

Another important area of green space is the Oval Field, although apart from a stand of Elm trees on the west side, it is basically just a rather barren open field. There is surely a bit of scope here to enhance the area by planting a small amount of more colourful habitat to make things more interesting for everyone - visitors, dogwalkers and birders alike, not to mention the wildlife, so watch this

Whilst on the subject of habitat, I've heard some folks complain that the beach margins in front of the field are sometimes a bit untidy or 'just weeds' – but in fact these are part of the vegetated shingle, a very rare habitat nationally, and an area holding scarce plant and insect life. It may not seem like it to some, but we are lucky indeed to have it, so do please try to love it just a bit more now!

So now you know a little about us, let me say that although we may sometimes look a bit odd, or even intimidating if in groups, we are not, so don't be frightened to ask the green army what's around. And a special plea...if you have a strange bird in your garden, don't wait until it's gone, come and tell us as soon as you can, or at least get a photo, and hopefully we'll identify it. On the late afternoon of 19th June a birder at Pagham Harbour was viewing the Church Norton colony of breeding terns when he spotted a slightly larger one with a thick orange beak. A couple of photos were obtained and after a bit of detective work and a second opinion it was established that the bird was in fact an American Royal Tern – a mega indeed – being the first for Sussex and only the fourth record for Britain. As the news spread, keen birders started to make for the area, and 100+ managed to get there before dark. Sadly, only a few very early risers saw it next day at about 0420 a.m. before it upped and flew off 15 minutes later, leaving behind a squadron of very disappointed twitchers who arrived just too late. Ah, the joys of birding!





Now on to the History of the Club 1897-1898

A meeting was held on the evening of Monday, 5th April 1897 at the Anchor Inn, Selsey (now, of course, it is in Sidlesham).

'Mr G Humphry CC in the chair. It was decided that the Cricket Clubs of Selsey and Hunston should be amalgamated 'Union is strength,' and the players from this district may reasonably be expected to give neighbourly rivals a good game.'

This looks very much like an attempt to address the issue of a lack of players.

Sure enough, 2nd June 1897 reported a match – Littlehampton v Hunston & Selsey.

'This match was played on Thursday, at Littlehampton, and resulted in a draw. At the call of time, the visitors had two wickets to fall and were 57 runs behind." Skills, Techniques & Tactics in Rounders

14th July 1897 saw Littlehampton v Selsey at Selsey. It seems as though the Hunston merger was very short-lived.

'This match was played on Friday. Wadham took eight wickets for 36 runs.'

The Priory Park Cricket Club Letter Book offers us a tantalizing glimpse of the

On 9th March 1898 W D Rasell (William Duke Rasell - Priory Park Secretary)

wrote to Mr F Fogden, Hon. Sec. of Selsey Cricket Club. The Selsey Cricket Club had obviously challenged Priory Park as the letter reads as follows:

#### 'Dear Sir

Mr Harris our late Hon. Sec. has handed me your letter of the 7th instant re matches for the coming season. My Committee meet in a few days when I will place your challenge before them and write you again with their decision.'

This was not too long in coming as on 17th March 1898 Mr Rasell again wrote to Mr Fogden:

#### 'Dear Sir

I am directed by the Committee of the Priory Park C.C. to say they have with regret decided to decline your invitation for two matches during this coming season as their programme has been completed for some weeks otherwise they would have been pleased to have met your club. In the event of your wishing to play us next season (1899) kindly write not later than January."

As we can see, Selsey missed the boat!

The following interesting snippet of information must have put the cat among the pigeons in Selsey Cricket circles as Newton Clayton Senior was an Estate Agent of some renown in Selsey. although born in Oswaldtwistle, Lancs. Rather confusingly, his son is Newton James Haworth Clayton, (born in Selsey), and both gentlemen were of a suitable age to play cricket.

'9th April 1898 Newton Clayton Selsey

Dear Sir

Priory Park Cricket Club

I beg to inform you that at a Meeting of the Committee you were proposed by Mr H W Harris and unanimously elected as member of this above club. I enclose you a copy of the Rules and a list of

Yours faithfully

W D Rasell'

However, things looked brighter later in the year at least in terms of matches played. On 25th May, reported on 1st June 1898, Selsey played Littlehampton at Littlehampton.

"...the game resulting in a win for the home team by 156 runs with several wickets to spare.'

Reported on 15th June 1898, Selsey v Goodwood

'Played at Selsey June 9th, the home team being poorly represented, resulted in a win for Goodwood'

Reported in the same paper was the following:

'Selsey v A E Cosens XI

This match was played at Selsey on Monday June 6th, rain prevented an early start being made and the game resulted in a

A E Cosens was Alfred Ernest Cosens born in Hunston in 1868 and baptised there on 10 May of that year. He inherited Church Farm, Hunston, from his father while he was still a young man and married Mary Elizabeth Oliver on 12th November 1893. His mother was Emma Jane Fogden.

It became obvious that Selsev was severely limited in the opposition it had. Priory Park had pointed out that Mr Fogden needed to get his requests in earlier but even Portfield did not often feature.

Selsey played Littlehampton (again) and the match was reported on 22nd June 1898.

'Played at Selsey June 16, the bowling of Messrs Arbury and Holland proved too good for the home team's score.'

Here the style of reporting cricket matches changed. A report on 27th July 1898 reads as follows:

'A match was played here on Friday last (22 July) between eleven of the Selsey CC and twenty-two Selsey fishermen resulting in an easy win for the Club. Score: Fishermen 43, Club 129 for seven wickets. W Lambeth 55, H Penfold 28, W Goode 20 not out and F Fogden 11, being the principal scorers. On Monday, August 1st, the Club play the visitors at Selsey and an interesting game should result."

This, of course, mirrored the Benedicts vs Bachelors match of earlier days. On 10th August 1898 this match was reported:

'A Cricket match was played on Monday by the visitors v Selsey CC, which resulted in an easy win for the latter, who made 122 runs for five wickets, of which Charles Harding made 32 not out. The visitors making 117 in the two innings, Mr Goode having the highest score (22). The game was witnessed by a large company. Refreshments were supplied on this occasion by Mr

James Northeast.

3rd September 1898 was the last match of the season.

'It was between the Club and eleven of Selsey visitors selected by Mr H A Smith ending in favour of the Club. For the winners Messrs. Todd, Penfold, Harris, Clayton and Humphry's bowling being very effective, for the losers Messrs. Watts, Mallison and Trotman rendered good service.

On Thursday several visitors with the help of a few residents arranged a concert in aid of the Cricket Club, when a capital programme was gone through to an appreciative audience, encores being numerous. Mr N Clayton presided and at Conclusion of Concert proposed a vote of thanks to all those performers who had so generously given their services to aid the CC and hoped that it was but the beginning of what would now be an annual institution, viz; Club v Visitors at Cricket followed by Concert in aid of Club funds given by Visitors. The two secretaries Messrs Fogden and Dewey are to be congratulated upon their success in bringing the Cricket season to such a successful end. Thanks are also due to Mr Fogden who generously lends his meadow for the matches.



The weather is super hot again at the moment, so hot in fact, that I have instructed my staff to put bottles of frozen water covered with a pillow case or tea-towel, in with the bunnies and guinea pigs. 

#### Brent Lodge Briefing's -It's heating up at the hospital

It's been a busy summer already in the hospital, with an abundance of wildlife in need. The staff have truly been run off their feet, as at this time of year we always see an influx of young wildlife, who are all very needy requiring several feeds around the clock. We have seen everything from herring gulls to the tiniest of garden birds and not forgetting our baby mammals that will melt your hearts.

The staff have already become fond of a few of our patients including our baby barn owl siblings, 2 young kestrels, bunnies and of course the many hoglets we are currently caring for. We have also seen a very high number of injured woodpigeons which is due



to a successful breeding season. As a result of the influx of patients we are desperately in need of extra help from more volunteers. Our hospital staff always need help to clean and feed the many wildlife patients in our care, this is something we are eternally grateful for on any day of the week.

At this time of the year we are also absolutely DESPERATE for tinned cat/dog food (especially as we start coming into hedgehog season). Due to the high numbers of baby herring gulls we have in, we are able to use meat as well as fish flavoured food. This summer we have found that puppy toilet training pads have been a complete life-saver, helping to dramatically cut down our washing loads saving the staff so much time. We are currently using 50-80 puppy pads a day, so if anyone can donate any of these items, we will be very grateful.

Whilst most of us have been enjoying the warm weather of late, please do remember your wildlife friends who can find it increasingly difficult to find water for drinking and bathing, during this very hot period. Providing regular bowls of clean water in your garden can help birds, hedgehogs and their young survive these very testing times.


