Lifeboats

Date: 31 May 2017

Selsey RNLI lifeboat responds to Mayday call.

UK Coastguard (Solent) received the Mayday distress call from the

42ft Belgian Yacht Yxilium which had been dismasted approximately 5 miles south west of Selsey Bill. The yacht with two crew aboard and was on passage from Belgium to Ireland.




The volunteer crew were paged at 3.39pm on Tuesday 30 May



2017 and the lifeboat cleared the moorings at 4.00pm and headed at best speed towards the yacht.
The Royal Navy frigate HMS
Westminster had also responded

to the distress call and launched their sea boat with a crew of four to offer assistance to the Yxilium. The weather on scene was wind south westerly 4-5 sea state moderate in sunshine.

At 4.25pm the lifeboat arrived on scene and two crewmembers were transferred from the lifeboat to the yacht by the Navy sea boat. The mast had fractured close to deck so there were at least 19 -20 meters over the side of the yacht with the sail still



The Navy supplied some other tools which were successful in cutting

cutters and knife.

the last two stays allowing the mast and sail to fall away for the yacht. At 5.45pm the Navy personnel returned to their



ship and as the yacht was able to motor at 6-7 Knots the lifeboat escorted them to Sparkes



The Marina was reached at 7.25pm and the yacht was safely berthed alongside. The lifeboat departed Sparkes at 7.50pm and was on the moorings at Selsey at 8.50pm.

Date: 9 June 2017

Selsey inshore lifeboat called to assist windsurfer.

Uk Coastguard (Dover) paged the volunteer crew at Selsey RNLI a 12.01pm on Friday 9 June. The inshore lifeboat was requested to launch and go to the assistance of a windsurfer reported to be in difficulty off Felpham near Bognor Regis. The wind was South Westerly force 5 in sunshine.

With the lifeboat at the water's edge and the crew about to board the Coastguards reported the windsurfer was ok and stood the lifeboat and crew down.

Date: 10 June 2017

Selsey inshore lifeboat launches to children in difficulties.

Uk Coastguard (Dover) requested the launch of the Selsey RNLI inshore lifeboat after a report of four children struggling in the tide.

The inshore lifeboat launched at 2.58pm on Saturday 10 June with two volunteer crewmembers and was quickly at the position given, approximately 400 metres east of the lifeboat station.

The Coastguards reported that Chichester District Council safety patrol had thrown a lifeline to the children who used it to get to shore. The inshore lifeboat was released at 3.01pm to return to station and was rehoused, washed down and refuelled by 3.30pm. The weather on scene was wind southerly force 3 in sunshine.

The crew today were Helmsman Gary Pearce and Andy Lee.

Date 14th June 2017

Selsey inshore lifeboat helps girl to safety

Both lifeboats had been exercising on Wednesday 14 June. The all-weather Lifeboat was on the moorings closing down and the inshore lifeboat (ILB) had just been washed down.

The UK Coastguards called the lifeboat on the radio after they had a report that a young girl was cut off by tide at the Medmery retreat and requested the ILB launch. At 8.39pm the ILB launched with a crew of three volunteers and made best speed to the retreat.

At 8.46pm the ILB arrived on scene but were unable to enter the retreat due to low water so two crewmen went ashore to locate the girl. After finding the girl safe and well it was decided to carry her across the water to safety.

The Selsey Coastguard team had been paged and were with the father of the girl so the lifeboat crew walked her towards them. The ILB was released from the incident at 9.07pm and returned to station at 9.17pm and was washed down and refuelled.

The ILB crew tonight were Helmsman Colin Pullenger, Will Moir and Neil Hopcraft.

Date: 17 June 2017

Selsey RNLI inshore lifeboat called out to persons cut off by the tide.

Uk Coastguard (Dover) paged the volunteer crew at Selsey at 3.38pm on Saturday 17 June. They had received a report of 4 persons trapped on an island near Pagham Harbour entrance.

The D Class lifeboat launched at 3.49pm and was on scene at the entrance at 3.53pm. The weather was wind South West force 2-3 sea state smooth in sunshine.

The crew of the lifeboat found one person cut off with the other three safely making ashore by their own means. The casualty was taken aboard the inshore lifeboat and taken to the Pagham side of the harbour.

After checking the other three persons were ok the lifeboat was released by the Coastguards at 4.15pm and returned to station at 4.25pm. The crew today were Helmsman Rob Archibald, James Albery and Sam Troughton-Smith

04/05/17 15:16

Team paged to reports of ordnance at Medmerry Beach - Selsey. Team located the reported ordnance and carried out a further search finding more. Photos were taken and forwarded to our Ops Room and a cordon was put in place. We spoke with the Explosive Ordnance Disposal Team (E.O.D) who were on another tasking at the time and were unable to get to us before the items were covered by the tide. Once the items were covered by the tide we were stood down to return the next day at low tide.

05/05/17 12:30

Team returned with E.O.D who carried out a controlled explosion which was successful and the cordon was then lifted and the beach was re-opened.

If you find anything suspicious on the beach please **DO NOT TOUCH** and call 999 and ask for the Coastguard, ordnance comes in all shapes and sizes and can be dangerous!

07/05/17 09:00

Team paged to Bracklesham after two paddle boarders hadn't returned to their car after going paddle boarding yesterday evening. Two search teams were deployed and a shoreline search was carried out of the area including Medmerry Retreat with nothing found, as the search was about to be heightened to the next stage the two paddle boarders were found returning to their car after staying at a house nearby, thankfully safe and well.

All resources were stood down returning to station at 12:05.

07/05/17 16:53

Second callout for the day!

Team paged to reports of a car stuck on the beach off Danefield Road. The car and its occupants were found well above the high tide mark; also well above the sea wall. They were not on the beach so were safe although stuck in the shingle.

Advice was given and a nearby home owner was kind enough to tow the vehicle out of the shingle for them.

25/05/17 10:03

Team paged to Aldwick Beach with Littlehampton Coastguard Team and Selsey Inshore Lifeboat to do a shoreline search and carry out investigations regarding two Kayaks that had been found and left on the shore line.

With a thorough search of the area conducted out at sea and along the shoreline with nothing found and further investigations carried out, all assets were stood down at 12.32.

25/05/17 12.40

Second callout for the day!
On the way back from the previous incident in Aldwick the team were re-tasked, to reports of a paddle boarder who looked like he was in difficulty off Pagham.



The team made their way to Pagham and found the Paddle boarder and spoke with him, all was well and he was in no difficulty. False alarm this time, - but better safe than sorry. Team stood down to return to station.

26/05/17 19:41

Team paged to reports of two persons cut off by the tide on the sand bar at West Wittering beach with the tide coming in and the water up to their waists.

Hayling Lifeboat had been launched and the Coastguard Helicopter Rescue 175 was also on scene as well as the local West Wittering Estate Lifeguards.

The two casualties were fine and needed no medical treatment once safely on dry land.

All assets were stood down returning to station at 20:40.

Please check the tide before heading to the beach and be aware of your surroundings at all times, if you see anyone in trouble on the beach or if you get into any difficulties out at sea or along the coast dial 999 and ask for the Coastguard.

29/05/17 07:00

Team paged to reports of possible ordnance on the beach between West Street and Warner Road.

Photos were taken and sent to the Ops Room of the object once located and then passed to E.O.D (Explosive Ordnance Department).

The beach was closed until E.O.D arrived, the suspected piece of ordnance turned out to be an old concrete lawn roller that had become partially uncovered by the tide, the beach was then reopened and the team was stood down at 9.25am.



Summer crackdown on drink and drug driving

At the beginning of June Operation Dragonfly was launched. Approximately 300 officers across the force are now fully qualified to test motorists for drugs on the roadside. This is in addition to the hundreds more already able to test suspected drink drivers, making it even harder for motorists to get away with offences.

Superintendent Chris Moon, Head of Surrey and Sussex Roads Policing Unit, said: "In the summer months when the weather tends to be nicer people will often stay out drinking later into the evening. There are some who find the temptation of driving home after a few drinks all too appealing and we want to share the message that his is not acceptable and drink or drug driving of any kind won't be olerated in Sussex. Our advice is simple - go cold turkey or do not

Driving with drink or drugs in your system impairs your judgement and ability to drive safely. Not only can you cause injury or death to others, being caught drink or drug driving can also have other consequences such as a criminal record, a heavy fine, losing your ob and licence and an increase in insurance premiums. It's also worth remembering that it's not just about planning your journey home, you may still be over the limit the following morning.

"Passengers should not accept lifts from drivers who they know have drunk alcohol or taken drugs. We also ask that you refrain from offering an alcoholic drink or drugs to someone you know is planning to drive."

Anyone caught drink or drug-driving will be dealt with robustly offenders face a minimum 12-month disqualification, up to six months imprisonment and a fine of up to £5000. If a death is caused through dangerous driving while over the limit, a sentence of up to 14 years behind bars can result.

People in Sussex can text officers on 65999 with the details of people they suspect of drink or drug driving. If you know someone is driving while over the limit through drink or drugs, call 999.

DVLA vehicle tax refund fraud

Police are warning residents in Sussex not to be taken in by 'cold caller' text messages suggesting they are due a DVLA vehicle tax refund. An unsuccessful attempt was made in Worthing late last month but police are aware that that there have been some similar reports elsewhere in the county. The resident had a text message which claimed he was owed a DVLA vehicle tax refund. The bogus link site was tax-disc.gov.uk.dvla.mal.pw, which takes you to an equally bogus **UK Gov** looking site. This site asks for your bank details so they can refund your money direct in to that bank account. The man although capable and astute, only just managed to stop himself pressing Send with all his bank details.

Genuine organisations, including the DLVA, will never approach you in this way. Never give personal information to unexpected callers. If you or someone you know has received such a text, and are at all vulnerable, please report it.

Tonight at the Pavilion - two plays!

I have been writing one-act plays for a number of years. To explore characters, to have that beginning, middle and end that is the essence of a good story, to engross an audience, all in forty-five minutes, is a unique form of dramatic art.

Tonight's plays are very different, one from the other. And yet they take place on the same stage, in the same space. The magic of the theatre begins! An attic flat in busy London becomes a secluded holiday house by the sea. The sounds of traffic become the sounds of the waves. Streetlights become sunshine and storms. The skill of the set design and the lighting and sound design becomes paramount.

As does the quality of the actors. The cast of a one-act play is usually small as there isn't time for a lot of characters to each have a meaningful role to play. The actors in Tonight's plays have the responsibility of not only telling a tale with truth and conviction, but of exploring the shifts and balances of their characters' emotions, and of asking that most important question - is it worth watching? I am lucky to be working with a very talented group of young actors, all of who are forging a career in the theatre.

The Ox and the Ass has only two characters – a two-hander. Jeremy Forr-Favell, well educated and from a privileged background, has embraced life as a cat burglar, spending time behind bars as a result. Now, leaving prison once again and suffering pain from a fall, he is given houseroom by his Maths teacher son, Henry, who will let his father stay as long as he goes straight.

In Spindrift we meet four characters. Beth hopes that two quiet months in the quaint little house by the sea will help her recover from the turmoil of her life. But the locals won't leave her alone. Daphne, who lives on the beach, Nadine, the holiday letting agent, Charlie, the bean grower and ... a ghost ... all keep turning up!

I hope, as you leave the iconic Pavilion theatre after the show, that your answer will be yes. It was worth watching!

AN APPRECIATION OF JOE RODDIS 30 May 1921 – 19 April 2017

On 23 May 2017, at 2pm, friends, family and dignitaries gathered to celebrate the life of Joe Roddis. It was 'standing room only' for a quiet, private man with a Boultbees Spitfire flypast and a display by a Harvard at the Selsey Club afterwards. Carolyn Grace attended the funeral. She is the owner of Spitfire ML407, Mark IX, code OU-V. Not only was it this plane which shot down the first German Raider over the Channel on D-Day but also the machine with which Joe was VERY familiar, having been ground crew during its time at RAF Selsey. He's also flown in it with Carolyn.

Joe was a proud Yorkshire man who joined the RAF on 20 February 1939. He worked on every sort of aeroplane from Gladiator bi-planes to the Vickers Valiant, the first of the V Bombers, his career spanning 30 years.

In 2006 Joe and the late Tom Creedy met to discuss RAF Selsey and the thorny problem of the number of runways installed there. Joe wrote a piece for Selsey Life which appeared in the September 2006 issue, some of which I reproduce here now.

The construction of RAF Selsey (aka Selsey Advanced Landing Ground) was started on 16 February 1943 and the RAF arrived at the end of May of that year. Shortly after the end of the war the land was de-requisitioned, the road into Church Norton re-opened and the Sommerfeld metal Tracking and 'Blister' hangars were removed.

Joe was serving with Number 485 (New Zealand) Spitfire Squadron and he and the Squadron had arrived at Selsey ALG on 7 April 1944.

Joe stated 'I'd heard of Selsey Bill, and knew from my school atlas that it was on the south coast near Portsmouth and on a piece of land jutting out in the sea.

When we arrived at Selsey ALG...we came through Chichester and down to the airfield, but no sign of the sea! We turned at Church Norton corner and on our left was our destination – Selsey ALG!

Our aircraft were due to arrive from Hornchurch later that day. We started unloading our trucks and transport and setting up a typical squadron dispersal area: large marquees for the messes, same again for admin people etc., and finally our own six man tents for the ground crew to live in. Tents were

erected at Church Norton, near the little red roofed church and graveyard. Other Squadrons had obviously been there before... but to us it was then a huge flat field with a Pierced Steel Plate tracking runway running from the Church end of the field and out to the sea end'.

It was some years later when talking to one of our pilot's by 'phone in NZ that I learned how close we were to the sea! It became obvious that there was a village called Selsey, and Selsey Bill was the name of the piece that stuck out into the sea. Whenever we got time off, and that was rarely, we'd turn right out of our tent lines, down to the main road and right again to Chichester. If we'd known that a lovely village with shops was so close we would definitely have turned left when leaving the base!

We soon settled into our routine of keeping Spitfires flying from dawn to dusk. They were all parked near to our tent lines which made life a lot easier. No long rides in the back of a truck to dispersal, just a steady few minutes' walk and you were at your Spitfire and preparing it for the day's flying. We were on the offensive now, and the squadron would be escorting bombers, mainly American, on daylight raids on chosen targets, or just going over France and Belgium to cause as much upheaval as they could by shooting-up or bombing anything that moved with black crosses on.

We did a lot of flying from Selsey, involving a lot of work for ground-crews, but we were a very happy and friendly Squadron and enjoyed every minute of it. I was an Engine Fitter Sergeant and one of my lesser duties was to drive the CO's Fordson staff car whenever the squadron moved anywhere. He allowed me to use it, about once a week, to take the pilots to Tangmere for a shower or bath. We'd had no such luxuries at Selsey and it was normally a good strip-wash with a five gallon drum of water heated on a fire outside the tent. So I was lucky to be taking the pilots to Tangmere as I also managed to get a shower.

Suddenly things took on a more earnest commitment. Flying times were more often. More 500lb bombs were being dropped on special targets and, in general, activity was such that we knew something was in the air. We were all issued with funny money (invasion money for France) and the intelligence officers kept darting about full of information for the CO's ears only.

Through the 'grape-vine' we learned that the Squadron would be in Normandy a short while after the beach-heads had been established and a suitable air-strip was available. Things were really humming, the atmosphere was fantastic. Everybody was working flat-out for long hours with little rest, but it was all worthwhile now and for a purpose. Then, things started getting even more interesting towards the end of May. The CO and his Flight Commanders would be away to 2nd RAF Headquarters and, finally, on the evening of 5 June 1944 it all started to happen. The evening sky was filled with hundreds of large aircraft: Stirlings, Halifax's, Dakotas; all towing gliders full of troops heading for France...'

'That night we were told that the invasion of Europe was under way and we'd be doing a lot of flying, preventing the Luftwaffe from shooting and bombing our troops going ashore. These Beachhead patrols were on all day, every day, now...'

Joe and the squadron moved to Coolham and then Funtington where 'the Doodlebugs had appeared and the squadron was knocking hell out of their launch sites with 500lb bombs. One Doodlebug actually landed right on our dispersal area. We didn't take too much notice if you could hear the engine running, but this one stopped right above us and it dived into a huge stack of plywood and metal overload fuel tanks, we used to fit these tanks to the Spits when they were going either on a long escort with Bombers, or penetrating deeper into France and Belgium. It just blew them to pieces, covered some tents with earth and left a huge crater about 100 yards from the 'planes and tents.'

...'within a month we were on the move again. Where to? Where else – Selsey! On 7 August we went back to dear old Selsey and carried on as if we'd never been away. We were continually kept up to date by the Intelligence Officers on how things were progressing in France. Our Spits used to land in France to refuel and sometimes re-arm, which meant they didn't have to fly all the way back to

I'm sure the photographs of the chaps could be instrumental in triggering a few memories in Selsey. If no-one recognises them, then the pictures might be of Funtington.

Selsey and could, therefore, play their large part in helping the advance inland.

We heard the British had got inland away from their three beachheads but could not get past Caen to get to and capture the port of Antwerp, to land all the supplies needed to keep them going. It was then we found out why we'd been stuck in Sussex for so long, instead of being in Normandy.

Our place, chosen on D-day for us to operate from was Caen airport, Carpiquet. The place should have been taken in the first week of the invasion, but nothing could shift the fanatical SS and Nazi troops that were instructed to hold it. It was bombed by Lancasters, shelled by warships, day after day, but they held on until July. Then the airport had to be made fit for 'planes to land and to fly from, which took about three weeks.

The day came when we had to say goodbye to Selsey. I went off with the advance party to Tangmere and flew out in a Dakota and landed at Carpiquet at midday, 26 August. The rest of the ground crew followed on by boat.'

When Joe left the RAF in 1965 he worked for Rolls Royce in Derby.

In 2004, as a result of his friendship with Carolyn Grace, Joe was asked to take part in a documentary called 'Spitfire Ace' as the intention was to make a film about the Battle of Britain from not only the pilot's point of view but also that of the ground crew. It was shown on Channel 4 and resulted in Joe being re-united with Betty, (whom he had met at Biggin Hill) 61 years after their last meeting. Joe's wife, Mary had died as had Betty's husband so after a series of phone calls and visits Joe finally moved to Selsey in September 2004 and he and Betty lived very happily together until her death in 2012.

Joe also appeared in another documentary about the Battle of Britain with David Jason and one on the Spitfire with John Sergeant.

In 2008 Joe met Mark Hillier at Tangmere Aviation Museum and in 2013 they published 'In Support of The Few', Joe's biography based on his own reminiscences.

I met Joe shortly after the publication of the book and spent a very pleasant few hours with him. I remember this with much pleasure - his warmth and enthusiasm were very infectious!.

Having checked, it seems that the book was a sell-out so if this piece whets your appetite you will need to look at the Net or second-hand bookshops to obtain it.





DONNA'S DELIBERATIONS

So, it's finally here....July, in all it's glory. This is the time of year bur children have been waiting for because they finally get their freedom - or they think they do! Anyone (me) remember the Pink Floyd song, 'School's out?' Brilliant song - one of the favourite tunes of my youth epitomising the way most of us felt by the niddle of July. Exams over, scuffed shoes, blazers, shirts etc thrown away or 'handed down' - wonderful time. I know our young people feel exactly the same these days – well done for getting through another academic year!

Not that it's just the children, of course – teachers need a break as well. Teaching is a rewarding but hard profession. We were terrified of our teachers; all of a certain age and all female who had been teaching for at least 100 years. We were particularly terrified of our Headmistress, a tall, rather foreboding looking lady who had very short hair and always wore tweed suits; I believe I exchanged no more than half a dozen words with her during the 7 years I was at Grammar school. I had no desire to come within her radar, so I made a point of not getting into trouble; I was probably very boring. school was equally dull and compared with schools these days, it undoubtedly was. Honestly, I cannot describe the excitement we felt when the teacher wheeled in an exceedingly antiquated projector and put on a film. It was almost like Christmas – it was that infequent! Times certainly change.

Comprehensive schools were just arriving as I went into 6th form they were strange establishments of both sexes! Mixed schools. whatever next! My all girls school was a definite 'no go' zone for the opposite gender. Our Headmistress even told the Ice cream man that he wasn't allowed to sell his wares outside the school pates and when we occasionally spotted the Boys' School using our playing fields – well it generated excitement which lasted for

Compared with today's young people we probably appeared very compliant – and we were - but just occasionally we kicked back. One day, we went on strike (well, for about 20 minutes) We decided that we absolutely hated school uniform. This had been brought about by the refusal to allow us to remove our ties even though it was 1976 and we were in the grip of one of the hottest summers ever. Anyone remember? We couldn't understand why the girls from another local school had a summer uniform and yet ours was heat stroke so, we staged a sit down strike in the playground. Sadly, it wasn't very successful. Looking back I realise that our Headmistress was quite an astute lady. She didn't come out to talk us round, oh no, she sent out her deputy who just so happened to be the bestest teacher in absolutely the entire world; we all loved her and couldn't possibly see her fail in talking us round because she might have left or even, we thought, be given the sack! So, the conversation went something like this: Teacher: 'Come on girls, what's going on?' Nominated spokesperson: Ahh, it's you, Miss, okay.' At which point we just calmly walked back into our respective classes and as far as I know it was never mentioned again. Needless to say, that was the first and last time we mutinied!

We also had a seriously eccentric English teacher. She took a particular interest in me believing that I had a talent for writing which needed to be nurtured and nurture it she did – in her own unique way. This is a real example of something she wrote on one of my English papers: "Two things: firstly, there is no 'e' in the middle of 'separate' - so write it down 100 times and make sure you remember in future. (Trust me, I did!) Secondly, this is really just a random assemblage of sentences which appear to have been kidnapped during the night and forced, completely arbitrarily, onto the pages totally against their will. Reading this was like watching a group of unconnected people at a party, desperately trying to connect with each other, wishing all the time that they were somewhere else"

As I said, she had a very unique interpretation of the word 'nurture!' She was, however, guite brilliant and my enthusiasm for the written word is, in large part, down to her.

I didn't, unfortunately, excel in all subjects - my father being devastated at the realisation that I was practically mathematically illiterate. Strangely, I was (and still am) pretty good at numbers, Actually, I suspect most students nowadays would consider that my (mental arithmetic in particular) but give me a page of equations or anything geometric and I'm afraid the fog will just descend. I wasn't that good at chemistry either; faced with the question 'compared with large hydrocarbons, how would you describe small hydrocarbons?' I would have probably answered 'they're smaller!' Not my bag at all, I'm afraid. We just can't be good at everything.

> Our children are so fortunate these days; the world is wide open to them courtesy of omnipotent Google. Anything they want to know is available, instantaneously, without having to spend hours in a library, looking through books so large you have to go into training to be able to pick them up. Although, of course, it's not just our young people who benefit from the world wide web. anvone of any age can log in and go exploring. I was speaking with one of Selsey's large band of carers this week who told me that her father never gets bored indoors as he says that with the click of a mouse he can be on any street in any country in the world. I'd never really thought about it like that, but he's right. How things have changed since the days of my school's old projector!

The excitement our young people will feel this month when 'school's out' will be the same, though - that never changes. The summer holiday will last for ever, the weather will be sunny for the entire six weeks and they will all have an 'awesome' time - or at the same whether we were freezing to death or passing out through least that's how they will remember it in the years to come – even if it pours with rain and they have spent most of the time on Facebook!

> So. to any students reading this - not long to go now - enjoy your summer. I hope you have a brilliant time. To any parents reading this, take a deep breath, you know you can do it! Just try to remember that feeling of excitement you had when the last bell rang - it just might make next few weeks a bit easier!



Summer fun at Pagham Harbour

Its summer and the perfect time for pond dipping and bug hunting! On the surface of our ponds, pond skaters skim lazily across the surface contrasting with the crazy frantic circular dances of whirligig beetles. Just below water boatmen scull like tiny upside-down



rowers avoiding the newts basking in the upper waters warmed by the sun. Further down water beetles dash from the cover of one weed to another while dragonfly and damselfly nymph prowl like big cats on the savannah looking for their next meal. Above the pond the adult dragonflies and damselflies chase each other in a flash of colour competing for territory and mates.

Meanwhile, peering in amongst the nettles and vegetation reveals ladybird larvae hunting aphids and weird looking ladybird pupae. Scorpion flies seek out dead insects and the bravest steal a meal from the spider's web. Frothy cuckoo spit hides developing froghoppers. Disturb the adult and this champion jumper will

leap into the air up to 70cm - that's the equivalent of a human jumping over a tower block! Amorous soldier beetles are found on flower heads along with shiny green thick-kneed beetles feeding on the nectar.



Fluttering over them all are butterflies. Blues, meadow browns, small coppers, skippers and many more share the flowers with the beetles and bees. From July 14 to August 6 you can join in the Big Butterfly Count and we have identification sheets available in our Visitor Centre. If you would like to learn more about butterflies, their ecology and identification of species and sexes, we have a Butterflies for Beginners Workshop on Saturday 22 July.

Throughout the summer holidays we will of course be running a full program of family events from pond dipping and bug hunting to mud sifting and arts & crafts and for those grown-ups that would like to have a go too, we also have some special adult only bug hunting and pond dipping events. Mine's a Pint

by Michael Blencowe of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

Let me see. I've written about cuckoos and cuckoo spit. What's next? Ah, Arum maculatum or cuckoo pint; the most evil plant in the British Isles. Never mind its highly toxic berries, this plant has the power to steer the most pure-thinking botanist down the path to innuendo and obscenity. It's a tiny hybrid of Benny Hill and a triffid hiding in the hedgerow. Each spring a most bizarre plant appears in our countryside. Above shiny, speckled, trowel-shaped leaves arises a pale hood (the spathe). The spathe cloaks a purple poker-shaped flower-head (the spadix). This

structure is a stinking beacon which gives off that sweet smell of decay so irresistible to insects. Flies are hypnotically drawn into the plant and are imprisoned by stiff bristles forcing them deep inside the hood where they pollinate the female flowers. After this pollination the male flowers develop, coating the insects with their pollen before the guard bristles wilt, releasing their prisoners to pollinate another plant. In the autumn the pale hood drops to reveal the fertilised female flowers which have now developed into striking orange and red berries; a poisonous, lumpy lollypop. What is even more fascinating than this complex performance is the huge array of common colloquial names that have been given to this plant. A few refer to its unusual appearance; 'parson in the pulpit', 'soldier in the sentry box' - but it seems that most people when they are confronted with the plant see something altogether more obscene. Over the centuries botanists have stared at this floral Rorschach test and have likened the appearance of its reproductive structures to our own

and the plant has earned itself a lewd lexicon of local names. 'mens and womens', 'Adam and Eve', 'cows and bulls' - names which have all given rise to its most commonly known title; 'Lords and Ladies'. I wonder how many people use this name not knowing that they have been lured in by the plant's vulgar charms? There are plenty of other 'colourful' titles for this plant too - some not befitting a classy publication such as this parish magazine (although I wonder if 'Willy Lily' gets past the editor?).

I'm just proud that I haven't been perverted by this plant. I've always referred to it as cuckoo pint - a wonderful evocative name, recalling the Green Lords and Ladies berries proud, lustful cry of the cuckoo and pint which means, well, I'm not sure.

Strangely I've always pronounced it as 'pint' to rhyme with 'squint' not pint as

in 'of Harveys'. I wonder why? Ah, here it is. "Pint. An abbreviation of the Old English vulgar slang word pintle meaning.....". Oh crikey!

So today, I'm reaching out to all crafters and artists with a simple question.....

Why do YOU do it?

What is it about the craft that you do that excites you.... It's it for relaxation, hobby, business? All of those things?

I'm going to share with you just a little of my history, which I hope will ring true with those of you passionate about your crafts and art forms and the benefits they bring.

Life is full of beautiful things, our world is full of wonder and colour but there are times when we just don't see it. I spent 15years of my career working with young people who had found themselves on the wrong side of the law. For many for them, they had lacked the guided up bringing that many so us experience – my point of telling you this is that I'm a firm believer in 'finding the THING'.....

What makes you tick? How did you find that out? You we're maybe inspired by a family member, and time in your life or perhaps and want to learn a new skill – whatever it is I'm certain there's

a craft out there for everyone – one that will make you tick..... a passion – a hobby – once you've found it..... Cherish it! Crafts and arts can be a real therapy – time to share with friends or be on your own, time to reflect and great means to get a message out through the medium of arts – use colour to express feelings and emotions – Use it to tell and story, use sound, use movement, use paint, glue, paper, wool or fabric. However you use it – find the THING and make it yours.

Craft groups all over our area meet regularly and can be an excellent way to meet new people, share experiences and ideas and get support. Arts and Crafts bring people together, people that maybe otherwise would never meet.

Whilst working with young offenders – I taught a class on mask making – the class was actually about expressing emotions – now If my opening gambit to ten 16 year old boys was that we were going to talk about emotions – I would have be greeted with amusements or possibly anger but using crafts over come those issues and I promptly had the whole group opening talking (whilst sticking and gluing) about issues that they would not normally have spoken so freely about.

So my plea to my fellows crafters is to encourage others – my plea for you non-crafters..... give it a go..... Find your THING!!!


A super proud moment for Brent



July is the time gardeners can relax a while and use their garden as an additional living space. The long balmy evenings are a great time to enjoy the sights, sounds, wonderful scents and wild-life of Summer, and do some social entertaining in the garden.

The garden should be at its peak, full of colour, and the vegetable patch producing bountiful crops to adorn the table. The scents from flowers such as Roses. Honeysuckle and Sweet Peas fill the air, especially on the warm evenings. This is also a good month to go garden visiting. So much can be learnt and enjoyed by strolling through some of the local gems of gardens that are open to the public on just one or two afternoons a year for charity. A delicious home-made cream tea can add considerably to the occasion.

July is the main month for the wild Red Poppies - their sensitive buds droop miserably in rain, sheltering their heads and the stalks straighten rapidly with the onset of sunshine. As soon as the Bees visit the flowers the paper-thin petals spiral down to earth but they appear every year as each seed pod contains more than 30,000 seeds!

July is often called the 'silent month' because so many birds have stopped singing. Yet the fields, woodlands and hedgerows are actually alive with birds - parents and off-spring excitably foraging together. July is a great time for wild Heather and attracts bees by the thousand - hence the production of delicious Heather Honey. Do watch out for baby Rabbits and Pheasants on the country roads and lanes - so prolific at this time.

July is nigh - relax and enjoy.

Jobs for Tulu

This is a good time for taking softwood cuttings from your favourite. Prune Blackcurrant bushes straight after harvesting the fruit. all buds and leaves except for a few at the end. Space cuttings out old growth to encourage new shoots for next year. in pots of cutting compost having already applied softwood rooting Provide ponds with oxygen tables and keep well clear of algae and powder. Place in a shady spot and water well. After a few weeks the blanket weed in order to avoid topping-up so often with fresh water.

Plant late flowering Clematis varieties where they can climb Summer possible flowering shrubs. They will provide flowers well into Autumn after the Apply a food mulch to Dahlias and other border perennials to help shrub flowers have faded.

Plant some perennials now for instant colour and they will produce

Thin out Apples that are crowded on branches - the crop will be even better colour next year. Varieties include Achillea, Dahlia, Crocosmia and Rudbeckia.

This is an excellent time to sow seeds of Violas, Primroses and winter-flowering Pansies. They will be well-established by the Autumn and will then flower profusely throughout the Winter and

Mow lawns less frequently in hot weather, especially bearing in mind any water restrictions, as the longer grass will retain any available Plants that don't need much water for sunny and shady areas:







AS Awareness Event

NASS is the charity for people who have AS.

The event was to raise awareness of AS and help partients manage their condition. All the speakers agreed that the

best treatment was exercise and they recommended patients to join their local NASS branch, where they could not only exercise under the supervision of qualified physiotherapists but also find mutual support from fellow

Guest speakers included Dr Sanjeev Menon (Consultant Rheumatologist at St Richard's Hospital.Chichester). Claire Davey (Physiotherapist at Worthing Hospital) and Sally Dickinson (NASS). Local NASS members also spoke about the benefits they had received from NASS.

AS is Ankylosing Spondylitis, a painful, progressive form of inflammatory arthritis, and an estimated 200,000 have it in the UK -- that's twice the number who have Parkinson's Disease or multiple sclerosis (MS).

AS sometimes leads to irreversible fusing of the spine and it can affect other joints, tendons and ligaments. Eyes, bowel, skin, lungs and heart may also be affected.

There is currently no cure for AS. It is managed by a combination of pain relief and stretching exercises.

AS patients, mainly in the Bognor/Chichester area, meet for gym and hydrotherapy exercise at 6.00 p.m. every Wednesday at the Bognor Regis War Memorial Hospital.

Those in the Worthing area meet at 6.00 p.m. every other Tuesday for the same at Worthing Hospital
