



Sunday 6th May dawned clear and bright, holding out the promise of a beautiful, warm, sunny day to come. Indeed, it gave all the appearance of shaping up to be a perfect



day for taking a walk along Selsey's promenade and exploring the local countryside. It was a cheering thought – because this was the day that the Selsey RNLI was holding their annual Sponsored Walk around the Manhood Peninsula, and my, how people did respond to the weather's invitation! So very different to the cold blustery weather in which the event took place last year.

The 10-mile round trip takes in some of the Peninsula's pleasantest scenery including fabulous sea views, open fields, and Pagham Harbour Nature Reserve, so it should come as no surprise that many people get great pleasure from doing the walk. The additional bonus of raising funds for a very worthy cause means this pleasure can only be enhanced by happening on a lovely sunny day such as 6th May turned out to be.

With an advertised start time of 8am, the walk marshals and registration team gathered at the Lifeboat Station at 7.30am to prepare for the event only to find people already milling around the apron eager to get started. There followed a steady stream of registrations and it wasn't long before the number of walkers exceeded that of last year. By the time registration closed at 10am, 113 people (more than 50% up on last year's number), and quite a few dogs, were making their way around the route – and the first 'walker' had arrived back at the Boathouse having jogged all the way round!

Many of the walkers were 'late deciders', inasmuchas they had not planned their participation in advance and so had not arranged any sponsorship, but, encouraged by the weather, were eager to get involved and more than happy to make a donation to secure their place on the walk. The boosted numbers resulted in donations more than double that of last year. As said earlier, the invitation of the weather was great and I'm sure it played a massive part in encouraging people to turn out to support the RNLI.

This year's favourite moment for me was when a couple who were visiting from Norfolk returned to the Boathouse waving a plastic carrier bag. They explained to me that they often go walking in their local area and always take reusable bags with them in which to put any rubbish that they find along the way, a very commendable act. Anyway, the contents of the bag, it was barely a quarter full, was the sum total of all that they found on their walk and so they were very complimentary about the cleanliness of the area – a great testament to the residents of, and visitors to, Selsey, and the pride they have in their local environment.

Many thanks to all the walkers and their sponsors, the marshalling team and everyone who supported the event. The fundraising team look forward to doing it all over again next year so put the date in your diaries now – Sunday May 5th 2019. There's no guarantee the weather will be as kind next year as it was this, but you will certainly be assured of a warm welcome.

Team paged to reports of a missing 4 year old at West Wittering Beach with Coastguard Helicopter Rescue 175, Hayling Lifeboats and Sussex Police.

The 4 year old was found and reunited with her mother.

07/05/18 14:07

Team paged to reports of multiple missing children at West Wittering Beach once on scene coastguard search teams carried out extensive searches looking for missing children as young as years old to 9 years old. With more and more reports of children missing we stayed



on scene and continued with our searches and requested back up from our flank team at Littlehampton who supported us as well as both Hayling Lifeboats. Happily all children throughout the day were found safe and well. Returning to station at 19.30.

Free Wrist bands are available at the Lifeguard Tower on West Wittering Beach where you can write your phone number on them. so if your child is separated from you, you can easily and quickly be reunited.

Team paged to reports of a dolphin stranded on the beach at Bracklesham. British Divers Marine Life Rescue were also tasked by Solent Coastguard.

Two Coastguard search teams were deployed to try and locate the dolphin however it is believed a member of the public had pushed the dolphin back out to sea.

If the dolphin makes another appearance please do not touch it as it may be carrying diseases and call the Coastguard straight away. Interesting fact - Dolphins, porpoises and whales are all protected under the Royal Fish laws of the United Kingdom and HM Coastguard undertakes duties on behalf of the Receiver of a Wreck to record details of Royal Fish washed ashore

14/05/18 17:58

Team paged to reports of a dead Porpoise washed up on the beach at Bracklesham.

The team located the Porpoise and took relevant measurements and details which have been sent to the Natural History Museum.

If you come across a Royal Fish in trouble, washed up or dead on the beach please call the Coastguard.

HM Coastguard worked with Sussex Police and a military explosives and ordnance team after a WW2 sea mine was discovered below the high water mark at Elmer Beach near Bognor. Coastguard rescue teams from Littlehampton and Selsey along with Sussex Police operated a cordon around the area that day, overnight and the next day in order to prevent danger to the public.



HM Coastquard were broadcasting t vessels in the area to avoid the immediate vicinity of Elmer Beach

while the operation to dispose of the sea mine happened.

The sea mine was carefully floated and towed a mile out to sea and a controlled explosion was carried out late afternoon on the 16/05/18 and could be heard from as far as Bracklesham!

Coastguard Helicopter Rescue 175 transferred a diver with suspected decompression sickness.

27/05/18 20:39

Team paged to reports of 3 people and in an inflatable toy in possible danger out at sea at West Wittering.

Thankfully they were alright and were able to get back ashore and safety advice was given to them.

Blow up boats and toys are great fun in the swimming pool, but we do not recommend their use at the seaside. This is because they can easily be blown out to sea.

29/05/18 19:10

Team paged to East Head, West Wittering to a possible swimmer in difficulty.

Hayling Lifeboat also tasked, all assets stood down with swimmer reported to be safe and well.

It's always better to be safe than sorry and the first informants did the right thing by dialling 999 straight away and asking for the Coastguard.

THOMAS EDWARD BONNAR

27 September 1853 - 15 January 1940

Many locals will have heard of this man and even more recent arrivals will have heard of Bonnar Road or the building firm of Bonnar and Bonnar.


Thomas Edward Bonnar was born in Dunfermline, Fife, third son of Thomas and Ellen/Helen Bonnar whose father was a Minister of Religion. Thomas was a Master Builder and, very helpfully, on the 1861 census there is a note that his men were on strike, perhaps to explain why he was home during the day.

In the 1861 Census the Bonnar Family, including Thomas E lived in Scotland Street Lane, Edinburgh and he was a scholar, aged 7, but in 1862 Thomas Bonnar senior died.

By 1871 Ellen was a widow living on 'Interest of Money' at 28 Scotland Street and Thomas E was a builder's apprentice. Two boarders also lived with them but they were still able to afford a servant.

Thomas E appears to have been something of an entrepreneur. At the age of 19 as well as continuing his apprenticeship, he advertised 'Washing Machines – Bonnar's Patent Improved. A Day's Washing done in Four Hours with Ease. Prices £3. 3s. 0d and £3. ?s. 0d (possibly 15/-) in the 16 September 1873 issue of The Scotsman.

The following year, under the heading of 'Specific Articles for Sale' he continued to advertise in the Scotsman 'Lathe Ready for Use. Apply T E Bonnar 28 Scotland Road.'



And one month later, under the same heading, 'Lathe (First-Class Amateur)'

The 1881 Census for the family is missing, perhaps because Ellen died on 5 January 1879 having lived at Esk Bank, Dalkeith, Edinburgh but we find Thomas Edward as a Visitor at High House, Selsey with the family of James Clayton by which time he is the Foreman of Works for the Admiralty. James Clayton was a Farmer with 285 Acres employing 10 Labourers and 3 Boys. Perhaps it should come as no surprise that a successful 27 year-old man should become romantically involved with a daughter of the house and in 1882 Thomas E

married 25 year-old Anne Newell Clayton in Chichester.

This is the original High House, in West Street, Selsey, possibly built around 1808, and demolished in 1937

So what was Thomas E doing in Selsey? His obituary tells us that he was the Officer in Charge of the Construction of the Danner Coastguard Station and, presumably, The Coastguard Cottages of that Station in West Street. These are listed as mid-19th century and local folk-lore says he came to Selsey to build them.

The 1891 Census shows Anne and her family (James Edward, Jessie Ellen Newell, Thomas William Sidmouth and Ronald Clayton) with one servant, Frances S Lee, living at St. Arthans, Duffus, Morayshire. Thomas E, on the other hand, was boarding

in Argyle Square, Pulteneytown, Caithness and was still Foreman of Works, Admiralty. And yes – Thomas William was born in Sidmouth in Dovent

3 February 1894 the York Herald reported on a new RNR Battery for Scarborough. 'Eventually the work was commenced in May last under the direction of Mr T E Bonnar'. This was a huge construction 'Each of the batteries is 50 feet long, by 20 feet wide constituted of massive framing, trussed and stayed to withstand the shock of the firing...' and the York Herald devoted a whole column to it. If anyone is interested in the whole article please let me know.

In the 1901 Census the family was reunited and living at 63 Mill Lane, Cromer, Suffield, Erpingham, Norfolk with an additional son – David Murray. This census very neatly demonstrates the peripatetic nature of the work undertaken by Thomas Edward. Jessie was born in Elie in Scotland, Ronald in Plymouth and David in Scarborough. According to his epitaph, T E Bonnar settled in Selsey around 1905. He was certainly building houses around 1907.

Thomas Edward seems to have been a very gregarious man much given to singing at events. In 1907 there was a smoking concert at the Fishermans Joy and in 1910 he contributed to the musical programme at the Football Club Dinner held at the Crown Inn. Perhaps I should digress and describe a smoking concert. 'They were live performances, usually of music, before an audience of men only...At these functions men would smoke and speak of politics while listening.'. (courtesy of Wikipedia).

Thomas was firmly entrenched in Selsey and this is confirmed by his entry in the 1909 and 1911 Kelly's Directories when Thomas E Bonnar, builder is listed at Danefield.

However, the 1911 Census shows Thomas, Anne, and three of the offspring at Bruce Mains.

One cannot write about the history of Selsey without Edward Heron-Allen getting in on the Act and, in June 1912, the Bishop of Chichester dedicated the organ at St Peter's Church which was gifted by EHA. The Organ was built by Messrs. J W Walker & Sons, London and the organ chamber by Mr T E Bonnar of Selsey. Details of the ceremony, which are too many to be recorded here, may be found in the Bognor Regis Observer of 12 June 1912.

Selsey's Bowling Club was started in June 1912 and in November of that year it held its first annual dinner where T E Bonnar was one of the vocalists. By 1913 he was one of the committee members of the Bowling Club.

1913 was also a sad year for the Bonnar family as the funeral of Mrs Clayton, T E Bonnar's mother-in law, was held at Norton. She was in her 95th year.

At the end of that year, though, there was more singing at the Bowling Club when it is recorded that on Christmas Eve, T E Bonnar, the joint Hon. Sec. proposed the toast to 'The Visitors' and again contributed to 'a capital music programme'. In March 1914, he was re-elected to the Committee.

The records show that for the next two years Thomas E took part in another smoking concert held by the Birdham Unionists, the Bowls Ladies Day at Selsey (the report of which is far too patronising for these modern times), and yet another unidentified smoking concert at the Scouts hall (despite wretched weather) all containing musical performances.

Mrs Bonnar also joined in with supporting local events and subscribed £2 2s. 0d (two guineas for those of us old enough to remember) to the Royal West Sussex Hospital.

The Business seemed to be going well as in1918 Kelly's Directory Thomas E Bonnar, builder was not only at Danefield but was also an estate agent in Clayton Road. By 1920 the estate agent enterprise had been moved to New Road, now Hillfield Road.

At the monthly meeting of the Westhampnett Council, reported in the Chichester Observer of 24 September 1919 and within the report of Sanitary Committee: 'A letter from Captain Wilkinson was read, stating that the Selsey Utilities Company was now in

course of formation, and that the tank referred to in his previous communication had been ordered, and that the Company proposed to commence operations on its delivery. A letter from Mr T E Bonnar, of Selsey, was read, upon the subject of the drainage arrangements connected with certain property at Selsey, and requesting the consent of the Council to the execution of the works connected therewith, mentioned by him.

29 June 1921 Westhampnett Council meeting report appeared in the Bognor Regis Observer: 'Letter from Mr T E Bonnar was read, enclosing plan of land at Selsey, which he was prepared to sell to the Council as a site for the erection of houses for the working classes. Resolved that Mr Bonner (sic) be thanked for his offer and informed the Committee were not prepared to consider the offer of any site where the roads fronting same had not been made up.'

By 1924, Kelly's Directory listed Thomas E Bonnar, builder, New Road TN13. A modern man indeed having the new-fangled gadget we know as a telephone!

On 8 February 1928 The funeral of Mrs S M Charge took place and was reported in the Chichester Observer. Her husband was connected with 'the well known and long-established Chichester drapery firm of Messrs. Charge and Co.' Mr & Mrs T E Bonnar and family sent a wreath. There was obviously a connection between the Charge and Bonnar families as in 1929 Thomas William Bonnar, one of T E Bonnar's sons, married Ellen Charge and he then became known as Thomas William Bonnar Charge.

1930 Kelly's Directory recorded that Thomas Edward Bonnar, Brucemains, Clayton Road was now a Private Resident rather than Commercial while Bonnar & Bonnar, builders were at Hillfield Road, TN 13. The directories for 1933 and 1934 also reflect this entry.

1936 was another sad year as on 21 February the funeral of Mr Ronald Clayton Bonnar of Overstrand, Selsey was held at Norton. He was 45 years old. Just 7 days before, his uncle, James Clayton of High House, West Street, was buried also at Norton.

Furthermore, Anne Newell Bonnar died 11 April 1936, aged 80. She was born in Selsey and the Hampshire Telegraph of 17 April 1936 reports that her father was 'one of a family of yeoman farmers who trace their connexion unbroken with Selsey since the Norman Conquest. She was an ardent Churchwoman, and has done much good in the parish in a quiet unobtrusive manner.'

Harriett Warner Clayton died in September 1937. It was she who presented the Church with a handsome stone boundary wall which was awaiting dedication. This was appropriately built from stone removed from the walls of High House, the Clayton's old home, which had recently been demolished..

Although the 1938 Kelly's Directory shows Thomas Edward Bonnar at Brucemains, Clayton Road and Bonnar & Bonnar builders Hillfield Road TN13, the 1939 Register shows him at Stornoway, Bonnar Road living with Jessie and a servant named Doris M Baldwin. Her occupation is Servant Maid (Paid). Rather touchingly, Thomas Edward considers himself married and he has obviously retired as he is living on private means.

He died 15 January 1940 at Stornoway, Bonnar Road, aged 86and his death was reported in the Chichester Observer of 20 January 1940.

'THE LATE MR E T BONNAR (sic)

The death of Mr Thomas Edward Bonnar, aged 86, of Stornoway, Bonnar Road, Selsey, took place at his home on Monday. Mr. Bonnar, who gave his name to the road in which he lived, first came to Selsey when working for the Admiralty. He was the Officer in Charge of the construction of the Danner Coastguard Station. After a spell in Sunderland, where he also worked under the Admiralty, Mr Bonnar came to permanently reside in Selsey some thirty-five years ago. He established a firm reputation as an architect and estate agent, and was a member of most of the clubs in the town. Mr Bonnar led a quiet life but as firmly entrenched in the respect and good opinion of all with whom he came into contact. There survive a daughter and three sons.'

The funeral took place at Church Norton on Wednesday and was conducted by the Rev. R Franklin. There followed a list of family and other mourners.

But what of Thomas Edward Bonnar's houses? Here are a couple of examples.

This postcard jumped out at me for several reasons, the first being that Tamarisk is still here. The second was that it had been the home of Air Vice-Marshal Edward John Corbally and his wife Alfreda whom I knew well. Both he and his wife were very kind to me at a difficult time in my life. The third reason was that I had never seen a similar postcard. And I had certainly never heard of Pilchers' "Stoprot".

It appears that the manufacturers of Pilchers' "Stoprot" produced a series of cards from around the country which builders could buy in bulk and add their own name and address.



And here is a John Valentine card showing *Tamarisk* in the far distance, facing down Clayton Road.

The second card is also something of a conundrum. It is a Morey card and we know that it was the fashion for photographers to take pictures of newly built houses to sell to

the proud new owners. This card is, quite clearly, labelled The Lilacs. The signature bottle ends in the gables are evident and I recognised it immediately.



The reverse of the card, however, tells a different story. A lady called Alice sent it to Mr Charles Weekley with the following message:

'Dalmorton', Selsey, Sussex.

This is a picture of our bungalow, the outside does not make a good photo but thought you might be interested in it Dear...'

It is now known as The Ark – just one more spanner in the works for the would-be historian!

The use of the word 'bungalow' is interesting because its usage then is not the same as now. After investigation I found several alternative definitions and I think the closest one in this case is: A small house or cottage usually of one storey and an attic especially for country or seaside residences.

And here ends the story of Thomas Edward Bonnar.
Unless, of course, there are descendants who would like

to add to it. However, it may not be the end of the story for his houses. So watch this space!

Update from the Arun Prevention Team

Did you know that in the UK, a bicycle is stolen every minute and fewer than 5% of those are returned to their owners? Our guidance below tells you how to keep your bike safe as well as what to do if it is stolen.

Securing your bicycle

- When not using your bike always secure it using a sturdy bike lock. Double D locks are the most effective and we recommend that you spend a quarter of the bike's value on a decent lock or chain.
- If leaving your bike in public, lock it to something secure like a bike rack or lamppost. If there are no bike racks, contact your local council to ask if they can put some in. If you chain it to railings, make sure it's not causing an obstruction for pedestrians or other road users. If you can, lock your bike at recognised secure cycle parking - it should be well lit and covered by CCTV.
- If possible, lock the frame and both wheels to the cycle parking stand.
- Make the lock and bike difficult to manoeuvre when parked - keep the lock away from the ground and keep the gap between the bike and lock small. This makes it much harder to cut through.
- When parking your bike at home try to keep it out of public view in a secure shed or garage.
- Any removable items such as lights or pumps should be taken with you when you park your bike.

Bicycle marking and insurance

- Most bikes are engraved with a serial or frame number.
 This is often found beneath their bottom bracket but can sometimes be found in other places on the frame.
 When purchasing a bike, always take a note of the serial number. This could help us return it to you if it is stolen and then recovered.
- Consider paying for an ImmobiTag. This is a radio frequency identification tag (RFID) that is embedded into the frame of the bike. This allows the police to view the registered owner's details and the bike's status on our systems. For more information on ImmobiTags visit the ImmobiTag website - www.immobitag.com
- Take out insurance, either by extending your home contents insurance or through a separate policy.

There are occasions when the council may remove a bicycle that has been left static for a long period of time and reported as abandoned by local residents. If a bike is removed by the council without any security markings or tags it may be disposed of or donated to charity.




The shop works with local community groups, churches, businesses and statutory organisations - it is open from Monday to Saturday, 9.30am until 4pm.

A ROSE BY ANY OTHER NAME

"What's in a name? That which we call a rose by any other name would smell as sweet". Romeo & Juliet (II, ii, 1-2) Fossil evidence dates the Rosa genus to 35 million years ago. There are over 150 different species spread throughout the Northern Hemisphere from Alaska to Mexico. The cultivation of garden roses began over 5,000 years ago in China, and rose gardens were particularly popular throughout the Roman Empire.

For hundreds of years the rose was used as both a symbol of love and war. Petals were used as confetti and rose oil produced perfume medicinal tinctures and teas. In the 15th Century civil war raged in England between the Houses of Lancaster and York. York adopted the white rose on its coat of arms and Lancaster the red, which led to the 32 year war known as the War of the Roses. In 1461 the first Yorkist King, Edward IV, united the two sides and founded the Tudor dynasty whose symbol was the red and

white Tudor Rose. 📞

In the 17th Century roses were in such high demand that rose water became legal tender amongst royal households.

Josephine, was first to import
the scented tea rose from
China and established the

worlds largest and most extensive collection of roses on her estate west of Paris. Her head gardener, Andre du Pont, went on to develop nearly 200 new rose varieties and became the first noted Cultivator or

the new hybrids needed names

Cultivating roses became more popular in the $20^{\rm th}$ century, both in England and around the world.

Charles Perkins, together with his father-in-law Alfred Jackson, founded the world famous Jackson and Perkins nursery in Newark NY, in 1870. Charles bred a rose for his grand daughter and called it Dorothy Perkins, breaking with the tradition of naming roses. The vibrant red Abraham Lincoln followed. Roses began to appear in household gardens and growers started to breed roses to commemorate special

occasions and events. The beautiful, bold and fragrant, Golden Anniversary Rose is one of the most popular selling roses in UK nurseries.

David Austin's name is synonymous with rose cultivation in Britain today. As a teenager David Austin became fascinated by roses and released his first rose, *Constance Spry*, in 1961. Since then he has released over 200 new roses. He is still passionate about creating beautiful roses and this year won his 24th Gold Medal at Chelsea Flower show.

Roses vary from the tiny miniature roses popular in planted gift baskets, to rambling climbers that rise to over seven metres and come in a wide variety of colours, and range from lightly to highly scented.








Summertime at Pagham Harbour & Medmerry

It's summer, a time of halcyon days. Skylarks pour out their songs from far above, like a musical cascade, swallows skim low over the fields catching insects, chattering as they go and terns dive into the harbour's languid waters for small fish. Dragonflies patrol the freshwater ponds, zipping around with ease, while daintier damselflies seem to float through the air rather than fly. On the water's surface whirligig beetles

Mute swans by Michael Blencowe of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

I'm going to come right out and say it. I don't like swans. Never have done. Just seeing them smugly swanning around acting all hoighty-toighty annoys me. And back in the spring I took a particular dislike to a pair of them.

2018 is the 50th anniversary of the opening of Woods Mill. Sussex Wildlife Trust's nature reserve and headquarters near Henfield. We've been getting the place all ship-shape, ready to welcome visitors for celebrations throughout the summer. I turned up for work one Monday to find a pair of swans had inconsiderately started building their huge woven nest right in the middle of the main path. I thought I may try and heave the heap back into the pond but you can't disturb nesting birds during the breeding season and I'm sure I once read that the Queen legally owns all the swans in Britain. I certainly didn't want Her Royal Highness leaping out of



the undergrowth and bopping me with her sceptre. So the nest was here to stay and our visitors would have to take a small diversion. Perhaps it's this royal association which give swans their snooty attitude but I would like to remind any swans reading this article that the reason that they were once bestowed this protection was because the Royal Family enjoyed eating them and didn't want us common folk depriving them of their swan supper.

One morning I checked on the swans and found five whopping great eggs in their obstructive haystack nest. But the parents were elsewhere, arrogantly gliding about on the pond. Had they abandoned the nest? Surely the eggs would perish in the cold? I suddenly became uncharacteristically concerned. I was half tempted to hop on the eggs myself to keep them warm until I noticed the swans heading towards me, their wings halfraised behind their back (a posture called 'busking' which despite being the archetypal swan pose is actually an aggressive threat). Before I knew it they were upon me, hissing and raising their mighty wings. When you're being attacked by a swan you really

appreciate what formidable creatures they are. Weighing up to 13kg, mute swans are one of the

world's heaviest flying birds. The story that they can break your arm with their wings is nonsense but I didn't hang around, just in case. After giving me some evil stares Lord and Lady Muck settled back to incubating and guarding their future family. For another few weeks they sat on their throne in the middle of the path, being photographed by crowds of admiring visitors

while I stood ankle deep in the mud, muttering curses under my breath and begrudgingly hammering in a fence to keep them safe. It's obvious who rules the roost here at Woods Mill. Last month those eggs hatched - and now there's seven swans a-swimmin' round the pond. If you want to see the swans and lots of other wildlife, take a trip to Woods Mill this summer. Directions are on the Sussex Wildlife Trust website (sussexwildlifetrust.org.uk) and in the 'What's On' section you'll find details of loads of free events being held on the reserve - thanks to generous support from the ScottishPower Foundation - as we celebrate our half century.

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
























our monthly guide to gardening - written by Giles Peare award winning broadcaster

July is the time of year when nature is in full flow. It is time to spend awhile relaxing on a garden seat or in a hammock and enjoy the benefits of all your work in the garden.

Try to find some time to go visiting the gems of gardens that are open to the public. There is usually lots to see and learn. Hampton Court Flower Show takes place from July 3rd to 8th and is well worth attending, with the wonderful back-drop of Hampton Court Palace, lakes and the River Thames plus marvellous exhibits to enjoy and savour.

July is the heyday of Summer with everything voluptuously in growth. This is the time to marvel at the beauty of nature in garden and countryside.

Jobs for July

Trim winter-flowering Heathers, using shears or secateurs, to maintain their shape and remove faded flowers. But don't cut into old wood as it will not regrow, instead prune just below the spent flowers to encourage bushiness.

Cut back Spring and early Summer flowering shrubs such as Forsythia and Flowering Currant after the final flowers have faded. Cut back all stems that carried blooms to promote new growth which will carry flowers next year. Cut back overgrown specimens to keep their size under control.

Keep Potatoes well watered in dry weather to ensure even growth and good crops. Earth-up maincrop varieties to prevent greening and also to help protect against Potato Blight. Eat and enjoy early Potatoes with butter and mint sauce.

Tip Top Tips

- Remember that some Forgetme-nots make a beautiful carpet for various bulbs.
- Never water plant foliage in the sun - leaves are sensitive.
- Give wall trees and shrubs plenty of water as their sites are often very dry.
- Cut and dry Herbs this month otherwise the essential oils will vanish, also remember that Herbs drying in the sun will need to be covered at night.
- Net Currants and leave fruit to hang on the bushes as long as possible to increase the sugar content.
- Give Hanging Baskets and Window Boxes a weekly feed from now on and water morning and evening.
- Always remove dead flowers seed production lessens blooms.
- Keep Spinach well-watered in dry weather otherwise it will go to seed.
- Stop cutting edible shoots of Asparagus this month in order to allow the crowns to build up strength for next season's crop.





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News from Councillor Roger Barrow

District Councillor for Selsey South and Cabinet member for Residents' Service

It has been a busy month at the District Council. Perhaps the most important issue to be dealt with was the Council's approach to possible improvements to the A27.

Which Route?

At an important Council meeting, the Cabinet recommended the full Council to support the Mitigated North and Full South Concepts equally. My own instinct is that a Southern Route would not be the best solution for

those of us living on the Manhood peninsula with the risk of huge disruption, especially during the several years of engineering works. We have yet to see full details of the proposals for the south, so the final decision will come later.

However, I decided to go against the Cabinet recommendation and I proposed an amendment to back the County Council's decision to support the Mitigated North Concept as a preference, with the Full South Concept as a reasonable alternative. There was a long and well-argued debate at the Council meeting where I was also supported by Selsey Councillors John Elliot, Darren Wakeham and Carol Purnell and in the end my amendment was accepted 22 votes to 17.

Universal Credit Roll out

Universal Credit is being introduced across the Chichester District from July 2018. It is a new working-age benefit being introduced across the country as part of the government's welfare reforms. If you receive any of the benefits listed below, they will eventually be replaced by Universal Credit.

- Income Based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Housing Benefit
- Working Tax Credit
- Child Tax Credit
- Income Related Employment and Support Allowance
- Income Support

You'll only move onto Universal Credit when you need to make a new claim for any of the benefits and tax credits it replaces and you will still be able to claim current benefits and tax credits until Universal Credit is fully introduced to the area.

If your circumstances don't change, you'll continue to get your current benefits and tax credits for the time being. Any help you get with your rent will be included with your Universal Credit payment and you will then pay the landlord yourself. Your claim will be managed by the Department for Work and Pensions and not by the Local Authority.

If you have difficulty making an application online the Council may be able to assist please contact the benefits team for further information benefits@chichester.gov.uk. I have asked the council, depending on demand, to consider setting up an

arrangement for claimants to seek advice and support locally.

Against Litter

The Against Litter campaign I launched last year is gathering pace, with over 100 sign-ups to 'Adopt an Area' I had planned to adopt Marine Beach, but I subsequently learned another group has already adopted that area, and an excellent job they are doing too. So I am on the search for another area to adopt.

Our road signs and other activities are having a great effect, and we are seeing a significant reduction in litter, but there is still more to do. You can still adopt an area, go to www.chichester.gov.uk/adoptanarea and sign up.

Now to go back in to the History of the Club.

1894-1895

The newspaper of 4th July 1894 reported a match between Hunston and Selsey and, again, the recurring theme of difficulty in assembling full teams arose.

'Played at Hunston on Thursday, Selsey won by an innings and 22 runs. Hunston played two short and Selsey one short.'

The Portfield Club announced, in the press of 18th July 1894, that 'This club has arranged matches to be played on their ground, with the Pitsham, Selsey and Funtington Clubs. Mr Edwards, the Captain, has been kind enough to provide a pitch for the Club. Rev W H Firth is the Hon. Treasurer and Mr Hart the Hon Sec.'

Whether or not the Portfield v Selsey match took place in 1894 is unclear as there is no report of any match between them until 12th June 1895.

'This match was played on Thursday last, at Selsey. Portfield, although losing the match by the narrow margin of one on the 1st innings, had at the close a very decided advantage, being one run behind and still having eight wickets to fall when time for drawing stumps arrived, which was rigidly adhered to. The closing part of the game was anxiously followed by both clubs to see whether Portfield or 'Time' would win; watches were eagerly scanned by those most interested in the game'.

Nearly a month later, reported on 10th July, the match Selsey v Littlehampton took place:

'This match was played at Selsey, on Monday last, Littlehampton winning on the first innings by two runs. It was unfortunate for the home team that the Littlehampton men had to leave at 5.30 to catch their train as had time permitted the game to be played out the former stood a good chance of retrieving their loss on the first innings.'

18th September 1895 was a field day for Selsey Cricket Club with two of its matches reported. It should also be noted that this is the first mention of the identities of the umpires, at least for Selsey.

'Selsey v Rumboldswhyke – Played at Selsey yesterday week, the former won by nine wickets. Mr Graves bowled well for the winners, and Major Todd made the winning hit. Messrs. Allen and Pate were the umpires'

A return match between Portfield v Selsey, 'played at Portfield, resulted in a win for Selsey by 27 runs on the first innings. The 2nd innings of Portfield shewing 'more the proper' expected from a well-

selected team, but too late to avert defeat. The matches between these two clubs this season have been very evenly contested, the first played at Selsey, Portfield losing by one run with several wickets in hand. The scores were: Portfield, 1st Innings, 54; 2nd Innings, 86 for six wickets. Selsey, 81'.

1896

1896 looked as though it was going to be a very good year for Selsey Cricket with several matches being scheduled.

The first of these was reported on 20th May 1896 and involved Portfield v Selsey.

'These Teams met at Portfield on Friday last when the home team won an easy victory.'

The next match was reported on 27th May 1896 when Selsey played Hunston.

'This match was played at Selsey on Thursday last the home team winning on the first innings by 15 runs. For the winners, Messrs. Todd, Kensington and Chitty batted best, bowling honours being divided between Messrs. Bridger and Dewey, whilst for the losers Mr C A Hodson signalized his reappearance in the field after an absence of three seasons by obtaining nine wickets in the second innings at a small cost.'

It is beginning to become clear that either Selsey Cricket Club matches were not reported or the Newspaper Editor declined to print them when they were, perhaps due to space constraints.


None of these planned fixtures was reported so, sadly, we have no results.

What the newspaper did have space for however, on 30th September 1896, was the news that Master Archie Northeast of 'New Inn' (now the Neptune) planted a small potato and grew a 'monster edible weighing 2lbs 12oz., ten inches in length, and 12 inches in girth. One can quite believe it is the biggest grown in Selsey'

You will, of course, remember that James Northeast was Mine Host of the 'New Inn', HQ of SCC.

Certainly, the Cricket Club declined partly due to the inability of Selsey to field a team.


I decided not to take part in the festival activities because last year my performance was not listed in the program and I received no apology for the omission.




