


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in the yellow pots please

SELSEY WINE INTEREST GROUP (SWIG)

Our May meeting and wine tasting in my garden was a Bring Your Own (BYO) evening, whereby each member brings one of their favourite wines and - while we enjoy each one - gives the rest of us a brief talk on why it is special to them.



Starting as usual with the white wines and in ascending order of ABV, the first tasting was a 2022 Yealands Reserve Sauvignon Blanc (12.5% ABV), from the renowned Marlborough area of New Zealand. We found this coastal home produced white wine was bursting with an abundance of fruity flavours. The beautiful label with colourful butterflies and bees reflected our surroundings in warm sunshine in my wild garden.

We continued with a lovely Alsace 2021 Gewurztraumer (13%). This delicious, exceptional wine is by top winery Cave de Turckheim in the picturesque and beautiful region of Alsace in Eastern France. Excellent as an aperitif, this wine exudes exotic aromas of lychees, rose petals and notes of Turkish Delight ! It is said to be a perfect match for spicy Thai curries.

Our third white was a Classico 2022 Verdicchio Dei Castelli Di Jesi (13.5%) from the Marche, south east coast region of Italy, where the verdicchio grape comes from. Complex and elegant with citrus and floral notes and with a very slight tannin finish, this delicious, crisp wine, said to be Italy's answer to Muscadet, is great with all seafood and pasta dishes.

On to our reds, starting with a specially selected 2020 Fete des Flaveurs Merlot from Bordeaux, (13.5%). With flavours and aromas of plums and lingering notes of chocolate, this full bodied red is recommended to be a good match for steak, roast lamb and nut roast.

We followed on with a 2021 Trivento Malbec Reserve from the Mendoza region of Argentina (13.5%). The name Trivento comes from three winds (Polar, Zonda and Sudestada). It is said to be these winds which make Mendoza such a successful and distinctive wine growing region. This bright, crimson red whose plum and raspberry aromas mingle elegantly with the vanilla notes from the six months spent in French oak, is well balanced with sweet tannins and a velvety finish. Trivento Malbec Reserve is ideal with meats and tomato dishes.

We finished, as always, with a flourish ! From the deepest Douro region in Portugal, this decadent, expertly blended dark red, aged in Port barrels, rich with ripe forest fruit flavours, and layered over a long, velvet smooth finish, it is rightly named "The Beast" (2020,14%).

Not surprisingly, The Beast was voted our wine of the month, closely followed by the NZ Sauvignon Blanc.

LUT Lifeboats

The Selsey all-weather lifeboat (ALB) launched at 12.24pm Sunday 11th June after the UK Coastguard received a call from the skipper of a 33ft motor boat reporting the engine had failed 8NM south east of Selsey Bill

After launching the ALB headed to the given position of the vessel and arrived on scene at 12.45pm. The weather on scene was wind westerly force 2-3 sea state smooth in sunshine. The ALB closed the casualty and spoke to the two persons aboard to confirm all was well with them before a line was passed to the vessel and a tow was established between the lifeboat and the casualty vessel. A course was set for Littlehampton harbour the nearest safe haven.

Littlehampton Harbour was reached at 3.00pm and the vessel was safely berthed alongside at 3.20pm. The lifeboat left Littlehampton shortly after to return to station arriving back at 4.11pm. The crew of the lifeboat today were Coxswain James Albrey, Mechanic Phil Pitham, Will Moir, Sam Corcoran-Smith, Harry Emmence, Chris Bowling. And the Shore crew were Head Launcher Max Wiseman, Driver Richard Wiseman, Frank Corby, Mark Penny, Richard Brady.

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
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PILOT JAMES LAWRENCE AND THE STEAMER 'GLENESK' **CHAPTER 2**



Pilot Lawrence in Albion Road

At this juncture I feel it is incumbent upon me to discuss the galley and the lifeboat. The following two pictures are of the galley and come from Mollie Tupper's archives.



It took me a while to find the three-masted galley in this picture! It is the long black boat lurking behind the pale one in the centre. It was rowed by 22 men although there are records of it attending groundings with only 11 on board.

The galley was jointly owned and operated by the fishermen and the 'pilot' of the galley would bargain with the captain of the damaged or stranded vessel and agree the cost of piloting her to a safe harbour. According to Mollie 'at the coronation of George the galley was carried by 22 fishermen, cocked on end with pots around. It was then burnt by way of celebration on the beach on 'Dick's Ditch'.'



The Lifeboat was the 'Lucy Newbon' with Coxswain Thomas Sparshott and here it is pictured on its slipway.

She was placed at Selsey by the RNLI as a result of a legacy of R A Newbon Esq.

Below is the record of the grounding of the Glenesk:. The involvement was classed as 'No Service' which means they went out but did not perform any rescue activity.

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The transcription is as follows:

The expense seems quite high but the manpower consisted of 15 men, 26 helpers, signalman, 2 skidmen and a Hd. Launcher.

The Glenesk was a steel screw steamship of 3,524 tons gross and 2,274 tons net register, and was bound from London to the East, laden with general cargo.

The Scotsman of 11 February 1910 reported the award of £3440.

SALVAGE OF A GLASGOW STEAME £3440 AWARDED.

In the Admiralty Court yesterday, Mr Justi Bargrave Deane concluded the hearing of t claims made by the owners and crews of the tu Mars, Hector, Ajax, and Triton, and twenty Selse boatmen for salvage remuneration in respect services rendered to the Glasgow steamship Gle esk, off Selsey Bill and in Southampton Water December last. While bound down-channel the Glenesk ran aground off Selsey Bill and remained fast. From that position she was, it was stated rescued by the efforts of the Hector, Mars, and Triton, the boatmen assisting. Subsequently, who making for Southampton, she again went agroun off the Brambles, when she was not off with the off the Brambles, when she was got off with the a of the Hector, Triton, and Ajax.

His Lordship awarded the Hector £1200, t Triton £800, Mars and Ajax £700 each, and t twenty boatmen £40 between them.

Back to Lloyds List.

'an agreement was made between her master and the pilot and boatmen to get the ship into deep water for the sum of £300'.

....The surf-boat Queen was at once launched and the plaintiff boatmen proceeded to the steamship taking with them the pilot James Lawrence. The Glenesk was found to be lying in a dangerous position, heading to the westward, on the east side of the Pullar Rocks...' the boatmen proceeded to lay out a kedge anchor and on the flood tide it was hove on, but the vessel did not move. The weather, meanwhile, had become worse, with heavy squalls of rain and hail..' The tugs were called into action but failed to float the Glenesk at that attempt (6th December) although on the morning of the 7th they got her into deep water. They then left with the Glenesk bound for Southampton Water. Unfortunately, the Glenesk went aground again. Again the tugs were called into action and floated her on December 8th. They considered that they had 'rescued the Glenesk from a position of very great danger'. The Selsey men considered

that the 'services rendered by the tugs were extremely easy, and were performed in very fine weather... Regarding the claim of the boatmen, it was contended that they rendered no service of value, and could not and did not perform their agreement.' Verbal mud appears to have been thrown with each side contending that the other had done nothing useful. Furthermore, there was no explanation as to why the Glenesk was where she was when she grounded.

The tugs were awarded £3400. The 20 boatmen got £2 each making a total award of £3440.

Perhaps it is just as well there appears to be no record of what the boatmen thought of that!







Stinging Nettle by Michael Blencowe of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

In the shadows under the Oak trees my enemy awaits. There are hundreds of them, huddled together in a silent, ferocious mob. With

their drab green leaves and insignificant flowers, the Stinging Nettle is a joyless plant infamous only for its ability to inflict pain. I can almost hear these nettles straining at their roots, desperately trying to reach me because I am in possession of something they crave: a pair of bare legs. When I started writing this article, I realised that I hadn't been stung by a Stinging Nettle for so long that I had forgotten what it felt like. So, dear reader, just for you I am wading into a nettle patch in a pair of shorts.

As my leas brush the underside of the nettles' leaves. I break the fragile tips off hundreds of hollow hairs, and I'm injected with histamine, serotonin



and acetylcholine, with a splash of formic acid. This volatile cocktail acts like napalm on my knees – my skin itches and blisters and that familiar fiery, tingling, pulsing pain sears up my spinal cord. The plant does not inflict this



agony as some sadistic vendetta against schoolchildren and Stinging Nettle c Dave Kilbey Sussex Wildlife Trust writers. The nettle's hairy, hurtful suit of armour is a defence mechanism against hungry herbivores.

Despite our hatred for the Stinging Nettle, we have found many uses for it over the centuries as cloth, medicine, and food. Seventeenth century Sussex herbalist Nicholas Culpeper claimed nettles - which "can be found by feeling in the darkest night" - cured everything from nosebleeds to leprosy. Celebrity chefs extol the virtues of vitamin-packed nettle soups, risottos and spanakopita. And the caterpillars of our most impressive butterflies enjoy munching on nettles too. Red Admirals, Peacocks, Commas and Small

c Sussex Wildlife Trust Tortoiseshells all depend on them.

Halfway through the nettle patch all this is offering me little comfort. If I focus my mind, I can rise

above it and the waves of pain can start to feel strangely invigorating. But not for long and I soon start Sussex Wildlife Trust frantically searching for a cure. Rubbing mashed dock leaves on my legs has soothed my stings since I was a schoolboy, so I was surprised to read that it's all a ruse. Scientists claim dock leaves are simply a placebo - and the searching and rubbing is just a distraction that numbs the pain.

Beyond the nettle patch I stumbled across an amazing glade of orchids, vibrant and stunning in the sunshine. In an instant the stinging stopped. Maybe it was all in my mind after all. Even when we are in our darkest night we need to keep pushing through the painful patches. There's something surprising and soothing awaiting us on the other side.

Birdwatching can increase skills such as critical thinking, observation, listening and memory, as well as developing patience and focus. Jobs for JULY

Leaf-cutting Bees are very active this month, taking large, semi-circular 'bites' out of leaves. The Bees prefer soft-leaved shrubs such as Hypericure, Roses, Wisteria and others. The Bees are very useful pollinators so it is not desirable to spray with an insecticide but badly affected plants will benefit from a feed or two.

Lift and dry Shallots that were planted early in the year. Drying outdoors is practical only if there is no likelihood of rain otherwise lay them out on the greenhouse bench where the air can circulate freely. After two to three weeks they can be stored in the shed or garage between sheets of newspaper.

Outdoor Tomatoes will usually form four or five trusses of fruits | Pick Sweet Peas regularly - they'll stop flowering if seed during the season. Pinch off the tip of the main shoot a leaf or two above the fifth flower truss. Greenhouse plants can be left to grow on until early September when the main shoot beyond the topmost flowers should be pinched off. Even if some of the top fruits don't ripen pick them as green Tomatoes for Chutney.



Being surrounded by sea and with thousands of miles of coastline, Britain had to become a maritine nation. However, the sea is cruel and unpredictable so loss of ships and lives is inevitable. We now possibly take for granted that whenever a maritine incident occcur the RNLI will attend. So how did this come about?

Coastal communities began to keep a boat for sea rescues centuries ago.. However, this provision was ad hoc and relied on the local community to provide crews and put themselves at risk. A comprehensive, professional rescue service was founded by an Isle of Man resident, Sir William Halliday, who a pamphlet proposing a local but still voluntary group of men ready at all times to assist vessels, their crew and passengers in distress women joining the service and crewing the boats. at sea. He proposed 6 priorities which still govern the RNLI today. These are

Saving lives Assisting vessels in distress Preservation of vessels and property Preventing plunder Supporting the rescued Rewarding those involved

For Sir William, it was initially a struggle to persuade influential persons to take much notice of his proposals. Eventually some prominent MPs, bankers, ship owners and nobility did. Thus in 1854, the Royal National Lifeboat linstitution (RNLI) was formed and lifeboats began being stationed around the British Isles, Ireland, the Channel Isles and the Isle of Man. By 1883, there were 274 lifeboats in regular use.

In World War Two the lifeboat was launched over 50 times with 38 Early lifeboats were large rowing boats crewed by men, although calls to crashed or suspected plane crashes.. Post 1945, erosion women often assisted in launches and were called "lady was still a problem and the gangway to the lifeboat house had to launchers". The boats were moved on skids laid under the keel and be extended. In 1958, WSCC undertook extra sea defences and were dragged down the beach and into the water by ropes. As the the RNLI decided to construct a new boathouse and slipway closer to the shore. Some lifeboats were also moored in harbours which did not dry out As well as an all- weather life boat, an inshore boat arrived in 1962; at low tide. The first steam driven lifeboat was introduced in 1890 it was updated in 2018 and both boats are housed at the lifeboat and the first moterised boat in 1905.

By 2018, there were 238 lifeboat stations including some on inland waterways - the one on the Thames is particularly busy. By 2016, the RNLI was operating 444 lifeboats - 332 on station and 112 on relief. Modern boats are firstly All-Weather (ALB) which have enclosed wheel houses, survivors' space below decks and are

On the 5th June, the former Skerries lifeboat was transported to Selsey and re-named "The Friend". This craft was 35 feet long and rowed by 12 oars. It was launched by being pulled on skids across the beach; this was re-enacted in 2011 on the 150th anniversary. "The Friend" was in service for 2 years. To ease the launching, a wooden slipway was built with the lifeboat sitting on top but also outside in all weathers. Therefore, in 1919, a new concrete slipway was constructed from the lifeboat house. The lifeboat sat on a trolley which ran on rails guided by ropes into the water.

Selsey's notorious coastal erosion was a continual problem and eventually a second, replacement lifeboat house was required with a concrete slipway.

Our month since the last Selsey Life edition started off with us singing at the Emsworth Marina Fun Day and the Portsmouth Gin and Chilli Festival over the weekend of the 20/21st June. That busy weekend was just a preview of what was to come. At 6 am on Thursday 1st June, 4 fully loaded cars left Selsey bound for the Euro-Tunnel where we were all booked onto the 9.40 am train to France. North through France into Belgium we arrived at our destination, Oostende, in time for us to check in at our hotel, change out of our "civies" into our Shanty gear, grab some lunch and be ready to perform at 3.30 local time

The Manhood Wildlife and Heritage Group When planting trees we use a range (MWHG) is a small volunteer led wildlife of native species that offer the best charity based on the Manhood Peninsula

(MP), that works hard using volunteers to improve habitats for wildlife, maintain the countryside landscape for people and nature, and to connect up the protected areas of RSPB Pagham and Chichester Harbour through good quality hedges and waterways.

The MWHG have recently gained a small Southern Water Biodiversity Grant for hedge planting across the area. Hedges are really important to combat climate change through carbon sequestration, to fight soil erosion, offer shelter to livestock, improve soil water permeability to lower local flood risk, and offer homes to the declining hedgehog, hazel dormice, nightingales, and other amazing species. This hedge project looks to fill in the gaps in existing hedgerows and to plants kilometres of new ones.

We will be basing our planting on hedgerow surveys carried out through previous projects, data gained from the Sussex Biodiversity Records Centre and research at the WSCC records Office where it can be seen old maps where hedgerows previously existed. We will then draw up a planting program with landowners to prioritize hedge planting and improvement.

We have set up 2 local tree nurseries on the MP to create a sustainable source of local trees for planting. We have volunteers collecting seeds in late summer and autumn from exemplar trees grown on the peninsula, and then process and pot them up. Once they have germinated and grown a little, they are popped into a tree nursery and watered through the summer. By autumn they can be planted as part of a hedge or standalone tree, already acclimatised to the local conditions and genetically predisposed to coping with the unique environment of the MP.

While we have the trees ready to plant, we also have to find resources for stakes and guards, to protect the young trees from rabbits, deer, and enthusiastic contractor strimming! For every tree there is a cost of approximately £1.75 and this can add up when you are planting thousands of trees. Ideally, we like to plant biodegradable tree guards as this means that there is no plastic introduced into the environment as, after a couple of years, plastic guards can become fragile and break up.

habitat for wildlife and focus on highly fruiting and flowering varieties that are great for pollinating insects. These include hazel, rowan, spindle, crab apple, blackthorn, hawthorn, oak, guelder rose, wild cherry and dogwood. These trees offer a long flowering and fruiting season and ensure there are different feeding opportunities for different species in the hedgerow.

This coming autumn and winter we will be carrying out tree planting sessions to create many hundreds of metres of new hedgerows, to fill in gaps in older hedgerows that need a bit of TLC and adding new species into hedgerows, including climbers like native honeysuckle and clematis. This is a very positive and joyful activity that is putting back a heritage and wildlife feature into our landscape. Please do get involved. Put on your wellies, bring a spade, and get stuck in! We are famous for our refreshments and there will be lashings of tea, coffee, and cake.

If you would like to see more information on what we do or to sign up as a volunteer then please go to our website www.mwhg.org.uk . We are going to need lots of help with our tree planting, no previous experience required. You can plant one tree or a hundred, we don't mind and you can do it in memory of someone or as a celebration of a life.




Selsev inshore lifeboat tasked twice while on exercise.

The UK Coastguard had received an emergency 999 call from a member of the public who said a vessel was flashing a light approximately 2nm south west of Selsey Bill.

The inshore lifeboat (ILB) was tasked at 5.06pm on Wednesday 14 June. The Selsey Coastguard Rescue Team (CRT) had been sent to Warner Road Selsey where the first informant could see the light flashing, so the ILB proceeded to meet them first before heading straight out to the area. Arriving on scene at 5.18pm the ILB crew found two vessels at anchor fishing, after checking both boats crew were ok and with no other vessels in the area the ILB was stood down to return to station. The flashing was probably the sun reflecting on part of the boat, a false alarm with good intent. The ILB crew Helmsman Will Moir, Sam Corcoran-Smith and Craig Sergeant.

The ILB was almost back at station when a yacht called the UK Coastquard reporting a small rubber dinghy with an engine going round in circles. The dingy had two males on board. The skipper was concerned for their position safety. The ILB was asked to proceed to the position given by the yacht which was 1.5nm west of Selsey Bill. Once on scene at 6.06pm the ILB closed the dinghy and discovered the engine failed so the ILB towed the dinghy back to the beach at the Cove Seal bay resort, where they were met by the Selsey CRT. The ILB returned to station at 6.47pm. The ILB crew were Helmsman Sam Corcoran-Smith, Will Moir and Craig Sergeant. The Shore crew today were Richard Brady, Simon Hutt, Mark Penny.

second part of the competition was won by Jacqui Towns who scored a net 76 and had the lowest gross score of 107.



Hello everybody! It's me Markus the office cat bringing you all the latest news from The Cat and Rabbit Rescue.

Sadly, last article's pet of the month. the lovely female cat Speckle, is still here at The Centre waiting to find her forever home.

Last month I told you about the largest intake of cats CRRC has ever had. We had 42 cats and kittens arrive from one home! One of these


cats, a lovely female cat called Yuki, gave birth to 5 gorgeous kittens a few weeks ago, which brings the total number of cats from this group to 47!

The last few months at The Centre have been very challenging. Not only did these 42 cats all come in with cat flu, but we were also battling against a flu outbreak with our other onsite cats. My staff also had to provide around the clock care to a litter of 4 kittens who arrived suffering with herpes. The herpes caused these poor kittens to have sore and inflamed eyes that they could barely open; in fact our vet nurse said it was some of the worst eyes she had seen! On top of this, we had two separate cats arrive with us who were in suspected road traffic accidents. Grey Graham arrived with a fractured pelvis and he needed an operation to put his leg back into place. Eddy arrived with a horrific hip dislocation: sadly, his first operation to have his leg put back into place still left him in pain, which meant he had to have another operation to remove his leg. Luckily, both Grey Graham and Eddy recovered well from their operations and have now been rehomed!

I am so grateful to all of our supporters who donate to help us to continue to save these animals. However, this month I also wanted to give a special shout out to my amazing animal care team; without their hard work and dedication we would not be able to save all these animals. Apart from the sheer volume of work these girls take on, the emotional toll caring for sick animals can be so hard. So, this is a special thank you to my animal care team, thank you from me and all the furry friends you have saved. Lovely to chat to you all again, see you next month. Love Markus x



AVIAN FLU: Please call us on 01243 641672 (option 1) BEFORE picking up any birds so we can ask vital questions about the bird before taking action. We are still restricted regarding high-risk water birds but still please give us a call if you come across ANY sick/ injured bird.

Every new appliance you buy comes with a manual, and generally in numerous languages! This manual guides you as to how you get the best from the new machine. The Bible too is considered as a manual, with instructions and guidance for how we can get the best from our lives. It too is translated into different languages - 700 of the full Bible

and over an additional 2000 languages have at least part of the Bible! More than any machine manual.

Recently at Beacon Church, we have been exploring the Old Testament of the Bible which has quite an unusual collection of characters! As we have looked and the plot of Scripture unfolds, we have discovered things we may never have known about several of the less-famous characters in the Bible. We have been inspired and encouraged from the lives of godly men and





women like Daniel, Moses, Esther, Ruth and King David. We have explored Psalms and then the love poems in Song of Songs. We have been surprised at the number of phrases from the book of Proverbs that are still used in our daily language. We revisited the captivating stories of Jonah and the big fish, Noah and the great flood, and of course, Moses, the

plagues and the Israelites miraculous escape from slavery in Egypt followed by 40 years of wanderings in the desert during which he received the ten commandments.... and twice! Mother's Day gave us opportunity to look at 10 mums from the Bible who inspire us.



Like us, none of these characters in the Bible were perfect. Many had their own struggles. A couple were murderers, but still, the captivating stories in the Old Testament help us learn vital lessons. The challenges and struggles the characters encountered, have parallels at times with ours and as we are journeying through the Bible, we are seeing how the Old Testament reveals God's heart and his interactions with people as they cycle coming close to God and falling away, repeatedly. He wanted them to live right lives and offered grace time and again when they fell short. We have seen how important maintaining a strong faith and an unwavering commitment to God's principles helps us too today to cope with our uncertainties, challenges and issues that we face in everyday life, some of which just do not seem to get better. It brings 'hope'.
