All 135 young people and 23 adult helpers and supporters made their way to the Portsmouth Guildhall. With a huge removal van for the set, 2 coaches, 3 cars and a minibus we all arrived at the Portsmouth Guildhall with high spirits. The team were dancing on the steps, chanting and singing waiting to go in to the venue. After an hour of waiting out the front everyone was finally let into the auditorium.



Schools get the opportunity to watch all the other teams' performances. After 3 amazing teams' rehearsals, we took to the stage to do our run through. The team left everything on the stage, they gave it their all! After an incredible reaction from the other teams we came off and made some final changes due to some sections not fitting on the stage. The group who had to change their section were mainly year 7's and I was so proud at how incredibly professional they were and took a lot of time during the day going over it so it was ready for the final performance.

While this was all taking place our hair and makeup team were ensuring everyone looked good. With last minute stops at the shops to get our final bits everyone looked AMAZING! With lots of face paint, hair spray and 30 bottles of glitter spray everyone looked the part. The costume ladies were doing last minute amendments to the costumes and helping everyone get ready. One big team talk and chant later, the team were ready to take to the stage. The performance went incredibly well. Not a dry eye in the house. The team gave it everything they had and many of them came off in tears as they were so committed to the part. Our piece was about the Thailand Tsumani, exploring a family's journey of winning the holiday to Thailand to then getting caught up in the 2004 Boxing Day tsunami. The judges said it was an emotional and outstanding performance, commending our hard work and talents.



Then came the long wait for the results. We performed 3rd out of 12 schools. There was a lot of time to get ready for the journey home and to pack up. We were all so grateful just to be there. We are one of 3 teams in the south who have been at all the open finals since 2016.

The results then got relayed to us and the tension suddenly got bigger and bigger...

We won awards in the following areas; Parental Involvement, Drama, Concept, Soundtrack, Entertainment, Set Design and Function, Costuming Character, Visual Enhancement, Choreography, Stage Use, Lighting and Performance Skill... we were also awarded 1ST PLACE!!! The screams and cheers in the room were deafening and it was an incredible moment we will never forget! Winning the Southern Final is an incredible achievement. We have now been promoted to the premier division for next year where the top 9 teams in the South compete for the title of being premier champions. We are incredibly proud and honoured to be a premier team.

THE ACADEMY SELSEY CELEBRATES GOOD OFSTED RATING

Selsey School Praised for Improved Quality of Teaching and Welcoming and Positive Culture

The Academy Selsey has been awarded a Good rating from Ofsted, following an inspection in May 2019, just days after moving into the new school buildings. The inspectors highlighted the school's stimulating and challenging lessons together with significantly improved teaching, and praised its steady and determined leadership. The Good judgement is the school's first such ranking in its history as an academy; it had been classified as Requiring Improvement for two inspections.

The Ofsted report noted that the school enables pupils to thrive as a result of high aspirations, consistently strong teaching and strong relationships between staff and students. As a result, following a rapid rise in outcomes, pupils achieve well across a broad range of subjects.

The report recognised the improvements in the quality of the curriculum since the last inspection. It also noted the school's inclusive community where pupil's spiritual, moral, social and cultural development is a key focus. Of particular note was the outcome of the staff survey which showed unanimously that staff are proud to work at the school and that it was a harmonious setting with strongly shared goals.

Mr Tom Garfield, Headteacher, comments: "The Academy Selsey is a welcoming and friendly community, and since the last inspection we have worked hard to improve the quality of teaching and learning and outcomes for our young people, so it's fantastic to see these strengths recognised in the inspection report. This Good judgement recognises the determination and focus from the whole school community - parents, staff, governors and pupils - all of whom work together to make The Academy Selsey an amazing place to teach and learn."

Dr Karen Roberts CEO of The Kemnal Academies Trust commented: "Congratulations to Tom Garfield and all at The Academy Selsey. This accolade is fantastic recognition of the work of the Academy and the Trust to retain and secure high quality education in Selsey."

The Academy Selsey experienced a significant fire in August 2016, and until April 2019 had been delivering all lessons in temporary accommodation. The report noted how the school had been 'impressively steered' during the period of its rebuild and reconstruction.

new books were bought for each junior class, and another £200 worth for the library. These books complement the new books bought for the infant children with money raised by the school book fair before Christmas. Now everyone in the school is enjoying the new reads.

Year 6 tests

All across the country children in Year 6 took their Year 6 tests during May, after preparing for them over the year. At Medmerry, the Year 6 children got in early to enjoy breakfast together before the tests began, and then made the most of the time in the rest of the day to get out in the sunshine. Thankfully the weather turned out okay for the week.

Sponsored Bounce

The whole school celebrated at the end of SATs week with a Sponsored Bounce. This was organised by Friends of Medmerry. Every child got timed to see how many bounces they could do on the bouncy castle in one minute, with all their totals added up to find the winning class, who got an extra go on the bouncy castle at the end of the day. It's hoped that the Sponsored Bounce will raise lots of money for the new outside area at the school.

Lessons from Hedy Lamarr



I spent the recent bank holiday at home in Selsey with a small dog who I was asked to look after by a relative. I was feeling lonely and she felt like the ideal companion. She's aptly named after the beautiful Hollywood star Hedy Lamarr. All the images I can find of her (the actress) are in black and white, which is befitting, as so too is my little furry companion, as you can see from the picture above.

I offered to look after Hedy without knowing too much about her. Then she arrived on my doorstep along with her little bed, a snuggly blanket and a couple of fluffy toys. She's turned out to be a bit of an enigma actually. I didn't even know what breed she was, or how old, and so when people stopped to ask me about her, thinking she was a puppy, I fumbled through a few cross-breeds and age guesses, feeling a little ashamed that I was doing my new companion rather a disservice with my lack of knowledge. It turns out Hedy has just turned 9, so not a puppy at all. I hope to look that good when I'm 63.

Her first owner, who had her from birth recently died, and I felt at times that little Hedy suffers from some mild depression. So, during her stay, I gave her heaps of love and attention. Whilst I may not know too much about her, what I *can* say with all my heart, is that I've fallen head over heels in love with her. I didn't want to give her back! We had so many adventures together in the village and beyond and it feels like there are more to come.

This week I spent with her was precious and the timing couldn't have been better. She's been the exact tonic I've needed, bringing with her a sort of calmness that made me forget my troubles and to-do lists and instead allowed me to sink into the warm(ish) shingle of West Beach and watch the waves crashing along the shoreline. It felt right that we were together on the beach to share our company.

In my view, life is a series of valuable lessons and this little dog has given me them in abundance. Here are 5 thus far that I wanted to share with you:

Lesson #1 Curiosity

When shown something new, something not even remotely remarkable such as a new room, or a new person, the outdoors, a shoe, a pebble with a new smell, the sea, a new route, or even a new flavour meal, dogs embrace these with total delight. In fact, they embrace *everything* with total delight as if seeing it for the

very first time. A bit like small children do before we start moulding them into responsible adults. If we could all adopt this outlook then life would take on far greater meaning and we would cherish more and take less for granted.

Lesson #2 Always give fully

Dogs seem able to tell when you're only half or even quarter present and like to remind you of it. With a little nudge of the nose or a jump onto your lap, they instantly bring you back to the present moment and reward you with love and gratitude. This is akin to the new buzzword (although it's not very new at all) called Mindfulness. Whilst we seem to have forgotten this powerful way of being, dogs have never strayed far from the mindfulness path. We can all learn a thing or two from their approach in this crazy, hectic modern world of worries we live in.

Lesson #3 Give with no expectation of receiving

When we give without expectation of receiving, it's the purest form of giving you can make. Most of us find it extremely difficult to give without some form of expectation in return. Dogs, however, live in this pure giving space, permanently.

Lesson #4 Go with the flow

When have you ever seen a dog stressed about a decision you've taken on their behalf? Dogs go with the flow. They just *are*, permanently. That's not to say, of course, that we shouldn't have boundaries, of course we should, but accepting difficult situations can be powerfully empowering. It's when we resist something we cannot change, that we suffer the most.

Lesson #5 Knowing who to trust and who's good for you

Dogs seem to know who the bad eggs are. They pick up on energy, wagging their tails when they feel good about something and growling when they sense something isn't right. Dogs follow their intuition and we'd do well to develop the same senses ourselves. We're all capable, but most of us have just forgotten or ignore our ability to be intuitive in modern life.

Lesson #7 Excited about life

A dog gets excited at the simplest of things. Their curiosity generally leads them to this – looking here and there for something to enjoy. Imagine if we were that excited all the time by new things? As we get older, we generally hide or dampen our excitement because we think it's the grown-up thing to do. Why is that?

So, if you see me about town with a little black and white dog, do stop and say hello, but do it with excitement and curiosity!

June is the month where nature's colours are at their finest. Roses, both wild and cultivated, are flowering in their full glory and exuding many wonderful scents. Irises' blue yellow and purple are a striking sight on the pond and river banks. Elders come into their own. "Summer is never established until they are in flower and only ends when the berries are ripe" The pungent flowers of Elders were once brought indoors to get rid of evil smells!

Beautiful Dragonflies hover over streams and pools. The Water Vole is busy eating the seeds of mousetail by the riverbanks. Baby rabbits are prolific and lambs are growing rapidly, the echoing call of the woodpecker can be heard from afar in the woods.

Fledgeling birds and young animals are growing at a rate of knots, and look out for the striking Red Admiral butterflies.

Jobs for Tune

Give late flowerring Tulips a generous liquid feed, leave these and other spring bulbs to die down naturally - just remove the dead flower heads. Leave the foliage to die down naturally as their foliage will feed the bulbs which will ensure lots of flowrers next year. Cut back the dry foliage in late June.

Inspect plants regulary for signs of pests, check short tips for Aphids and the underside of leaves for Whitefly and insects, also look for speckled leaves or any signs of webbing which could support the presence of red spider mite. Apply a suitable organic systemic insecticide or biological control.

Give wooden furniture a facelift by rubbing it over with fine sandpaper, brushing away any dust and then treating with teak oil apply the oil with a brush or lint free cloth, then leave to soak for a day, wipe with a clean cloth to remove excess oil before use.

Prune Forsythia, flowering Currant and other spring flowering shrubs as soon as flowering is finished. Regular pruning will control the size and shape of shrubs and new growth produced this year will carry flowers next spring, remove a third of the oldest stems as well to encourage new growth to develop from the base.

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Tip Top Tips

- Moderate temperatures under glass by painting with shading paint or putting up blinds.
- Damp down the greenhouse floors on hot days to raise humidity and prevent red spider atttack.
- Apply a good lawn feed when grass is not too dry.
- Order bulbs for Autumn planting
- Keep potatoes, leeks and celery well watered to increase yield
- Stop harvesting aspaagus by the end of the month and let the stems develop.
- Feed tomatoes weekly with liquid fertiliser in hot weather
- In hot weather water hanging baskets troughs and tubs morning and evening and feed weekly
- Rhubard leaves are poisionous soak some leaves in water in a bucket for a few days strain and use as an organic insecticide
- Place used Tea Leaves and Coffee grounds around Roses as an excellent top dressing.
- Beware of rough weather if there is halo effect around the moon
- Feed Pelargoniums with tomato feed for better and longer lasting blooms.

Selsey comes together to celebrate its open spaces

With five parks across the town Selsey certainly isn't short of open spaces and this year Selsey Town Council will be celebrating the great outdoors with their first Love Your Parks event.

The event takes place over two days on 22nd and 23rd June at two popular spots to encourage the community to come and enjoy the green spaces and find out what else is on offer in the town.

Sue Osborne, Community Support & Events Coordinator for Selsey Town Council, has organized the event - "We wanted to create an event to help the community reconnect with our green spaces and help those groups who currently use them and help to manage them showcase their work. We're incredibly lucky to have so many parks in our town, our maintenance team work hard with local volunteer groups to manage them and they offer residents access to fitness, social and family activities".

Each day of the event will have a different theme; Saturday 22nd June takes place at East Beach Pond and will focus on Wildlife and Conservation with activities from Manhood Wildlife & Heritage Group, Men In Sheds, East Beach Model Boat Club and much more.

Sunday 23rd June will be at Manor Green Park with the focus on Wellbeing and Activity; there will be live music in the sensory garden, and local sports/fitness groups providing taster sessions

in the park as well as a free inflatable obstacle course for younger visitors.

Selsey Town Council manage 5 parks in Selsey amounting to approximately 79,000sq mtrs.

A recent study by Fields in Trust assessed that the wellbeing associated with the use of green spaces equated to savings of £111 million per year to the NHS in reduced GP visits.

A recent report 'Estimating the impact urban green space has on property price' by Hamish Anderson and Vahe Nafilyan (Via the Office for National Statistics) concluded that properties within 500mtrs of green space, functional green space or blue space (inland water) on average were valued £4,813 higher than those that were not.

POSTCARDS FROM YESTERYEAR

Here is the first offering, sent in 1915. It is addressed to Mrs Nicholson in Plymouth and is from Rose, her niece. It's a very 'tidy' picture and the absence of gravestones is striking. You can even catch a glimpse of Pagham on the opposite side of the harbour.



My dear Auntie

We are spending our holiday here this year, as Arthur can't be away long on account of his police duties. We are a party so altho the place is small are not dull. The sands are lovely and bathing good, we have our own tent – on the beach – so have such fun. Am still learning to swim. Hoping you and Winnie are well.

With Love. Rose

Rose is actually Rosalie Louise Parkhouse who married Arthur Albert Adkins who was 46 years old when he came to Selsey. Arthur was a Master of Arts and became an Art Teacher in various parts of Surrey. Rose's older sister, Bessie, also married

into the same Adkins family. Arthur is likely to have been in the Second Police Reserve which was created to fill the vacancies left by those who either volunteered to fight in WWI or who had been 'Recalled to the Colours' as they had previous Military experience. The Thames Valley Police website, www.thamesvalley.police.uk, provides the following information:

'A Second Police Reserve, also known as the Special Constabulary, was introduced. Local people, with good character, were asked to volunteer for police duties. Initially they were only provided with an arm badge to indicate their role. They were unpaid, and worked a limited number of hours to meet local requirements. Turnover within the numbers occurred when either people ceased to volunteer, or they were recruited to the military when conscription was introduced.'

Winnie is Winnie Louisa and is Mrs Nicholson's daughter who never married. Mrs. Nicholson is Caroline Florence Eva who married Charles Albert Nicholson – an Accountant. Caroline's father was a blacksmith in Cornwall. Amazing what one small piece of card and a bit of research can tell you, isn't it?

The next card was a 'must have'. On the face of it, it is quite the most boring card I have ever seen!



Dated 1929 the message on the reverse tells us it is 'our view from the Bungalow'. Sadly, it doesn't say which bungalow. Its redeeming feature is that the stamp commemorates the Postal Union Congress of that year and, if it were in better condition, would have been worth more than the cost of the card.

Oh! And the weather was 'glorious'.

But...I showed the card to another dealer at the fair who said he had never seen it before - and neither had I. The stamp on the reverse is East Beach Stores. Selsev. so I'm wondering if this is a photo taken by the writer of the card and printed with a postcard back. Does anyone remember East Beach Stores having either the ability or an arrangement to process camera film?

Perhaps it is the only card that ever was!

I cannot go into details of the addressee other than to say Mrs Edmunds is Gertrude Edmunds who was married to Reginald Chase Edmunds, an Insurance Brokers Manager. She may have relatives still living.



This card of the Fishing Beach is blank on the reverse so there are no clues as to a date. Husband John has the identical card in his collection with a postmarked date of 1 September 1933 so perhaps that is when the photo was taken. In attempting to date this card I investigated when telephone poles arrived in Selsey. Easier said than done! I couldn't locate any information about Selsey and its phones at all. And then I found www.bt.com/archives. Nothing ventured, nothing gained so I contacted BT and the following day received a detailed response from James Elder, the Archives Manager. The following extract is taken from the National Telephone Journal (the National Telephone Company's staff magazine) for 1907:

SELSEY-ON-SEA. -- GOOD WORK BY THE SUSSEX CONTRACT A private branch exchange is one which DEPARTMENT.

Selsey-on-Sea has recently figured somewhat prominently before the public, owing to the formation of a company to develop this rising seaside resort, which is so favourably situated on the Sussex coast, standing on the wellknown promontory of Selsey Bill. It was therefore thought that it would be an opportune time to canvass the district for the opening of an exchange, as the Hotel appears to have connected to the nearest telephone exchange is seven miles away. A beginning was made by new exchange at this point, being given the well circularising the place with telephone literature, together with an intimation telephone number 15 while The Selsey Hotel that the Company would be prepared to open an exchange, provided sufficient support could be secured, and on following this up fourteen measured rate orders were obtained together with an agreement for a private branch exchange at the Marine Hotel with 27 stations, which allows for a telephone in every bedroom. The hotel proprietor in this case has been keen enough to see the various advantages to be gained by the establishment of a private branch exchange in his hotel, one of the principal being the great saving of servants' labour. Under the old regime of electric bells, two journeys to the guest's room were necessary to ascertain and then fulfil his requirements. Now only one will be required. With the servant problem ever before us, this is a point no canvasser should fail to drive home when laying before hotel companies the Timothy J McCann and John Mahoney. has some internal lines but which need not necessarily be connected to the outside world. The same journal for September 1908 recorded that a new exchange was opened at Selsey on August of that year. The Marine

The same journal for September 1908 recorded that a new exchange was opened at Selsey on August of that year. I then attempted to go down the Edward Heron-Allen route as I had been told that his phone number was T.N.1. This time I contacted two stalwarts of the Heron-Allen Society. contributed their evidence and discovered that in 1939 EHQ's letterhead had Selsey

T.N. 19 while the 1940 letterhead had Selsey T.N.1. A further email to James Elder brought the response that the telephone directories of the time reflected the information on the letterhead so it seems likely that EHA found that T.N.1 was not being used and asked for his number to be changed. A further interesting snippet revealed that, usually, the Post Office number anywhere would be T.N 1 but. at this time, Selsey Post Office was Selsey T.N.10. And at this point I laid the matter to rest. The postcard remains with a possible date of

This lovely picture of Beacon House and its tennis courts is postmarked 1906. The recipient was Miss Lissaman c/o Thomas Ely of 25 Rye Lane, Peckham, London. Thomas Ely was a draper whose establishment spread over three street numbers. The business was founded in 1876 and the family were still drapers in 1950 (I'm told my uncle bought a suit there). Perhaps Miss Lissaman was a draper's assistant or even a cashier. The girl in the centre of the picture is probably under 17 as her hair is worn long. In Edwardian days young ladies put up their hair at 17. There is another younger girl behind the chap on the left and she is wearing a short skirt. It wasn't too many years before this card was posted that women could



not have played tennis as women's suffrage was partly responsible for a change of fashion which released the girls from their corsets and allowed them the freedom to indulge in outdoor sports. The long skirts must have been somewhat of a handicap and I can't imagine how difficult it was to play in a hat.



The final card is from 1912 and shows the Marine Hotel. Here children are wearing hats and sunbonnets and there seems to be a dog underneath the cart, fast asleep. The young girl on the right has a doll's pushchair and on the left there appears to be a refreshment booth.

This card is addressed to Miss Clarke at Red House, Wellington College, Berks. Her name was Ethel and the writer of the card was Edie who was staying with her family at Saxony House. She says Selsey is 'about as lovely as Well'. I'm assuming this is a shortened form of Wellington as no well brought-up young lady would indulge

in rhyming slang, would she! Thinking it would be easy to research Ethel I looked for her and the address in the various Genealogical

programs. There are dozens of Ethel Clarkes in Berkshire at that time. I contacted the archivist at Wellington College, Caroline, and asked her whether Red House was a property within the College or perhaps even a property which carried the name of the school 'house' (my own Primary School houses were red, blue, yellow and green (Drake, Raleigh, Nelson and Scott but not necessarily in that order). Caroline looked for Ethel among the staff, teaching and domestic, because Wellington College became co-educational relatively recently. She drew a blank too.

Another blank was Saxony House. Mrs Pullinger lived there in 1897 and 1899 and that fount of all knowledge, John Prior, doesn't remember a house of that name in his lifetime. However, a newspaper article of 17 February 1909 reported that Mr Percy Warnford-Davis of Bedford Park and Saxony House, Selsey was elected as a member of Middlesex County Council so Saxony House was a holiday retreat. Further research revealed that he was a Manufacturer of Crystalate Billiard Balls. You can still buy them on e-bay if you are interested.



Percy Warnford-Davis' company was The Crystalate Manufacturing Company, of which he was Chairman, and he formed a partnership with an American Company which made not only billiard balls but also poker chips and gramophone records. The formula for Crystalate was so secret that it was kept in a sealed iron box which required two keys to open it. George Henry Burt, the American half of the company, held one key while Percy Warnford-Davis held the other. Kelly's Directory of 1918 shows Percy Warnford-Davis living at High Street, Selsey but there is no house name. He died on 5 November 1919, aged 64. His wife, Annie Rebecca is there between 1913 and 1922 but not thereafter and, again, there is no house name.

If you should live in an older property and your deeds mention Saxony House, please do get in touch. It would be great to find out where it was (or is).

I'm now going to take advantage of this article to make an appeal. 

Sussex Police Campaign to help prevent moped and motorbike thefts

The campaign, advises riders to "lock, chain and cover your bike", wherever they park.

Moped and motorbike thefts saw a rise in Sussex during last summer and the end of 2018, with various operations being put into action to tackle this. This advice campaign aims to maintain the recent fall in thefts and to support the work that police have already carried out.

Posters will be placed in areas where moped and motorbike thieves are known to operate, as well as bike parks and other areas parking areas.

Advice includes locking your bike in order to make it harder to steal. A chain is another deterrent, making it impossible to wheel away from the parking area. Covering your bike hides what make and model it is, as well as adding another obstacle to would-be thieves. Also think about parking your vehicle in well-lit areas and choosing a location which has CCTV if possible. All these precautions add up to a better-protected vehicle and fewer incidents of stealing.

Mopeds and motorbikes are frequently stolen in Sussex in order to sell them on or for joy-riding. Unlike recent occurrences in London, it is unlikely the stolen vehicles would be used for "moped-enabled crime", where they are taken in order to carry out a further crime such as robbery, but that does not mean it will not

Inspector Brian McCarthy said: "We are appealing to all riders in Sussex to be vigilant in keeping their vehicles safe whenever they are out on the road. You may just be parking for five minutes, or just leaving your vehicle while you run an errand, but that's all that is needed for thieves to take advantage of an unlocked moped or motorbike. "Don't give them the opportunity they are looking for. Your vehicle is worth more than a £10 bike lock, so invest now and keep your property safe."






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Donna's Deliberations

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Deadly nightshade by Michael Blencowe of the Sussex Wildlife Trust "A poison bouquet to strike him down"

June 16th is Bloomsday, a celebration of the life of James Joyce, whose novel Ulysses follows Leopold Bloom's escapades on that June date in 1904. Throughout Ulysses, Joyce uses flowers to symbolize romance and the lure of the exotic. Aside from fornication Joyce also tackles expiration, hallucination and urination. All of which (well, apart from the urination) remind me of another bloom that will be raising hell around Sussex in June.

Deadly nightshade looks innocent enough. A tall plant with lush leaves and purple, bell-shaped flowers. Later in the year the glossy berries will catch your eye; dangling temptingly like black pearls. It's in the plant family Solanaceae; related to potatoes and tomatoes. But deadly nightshade isn't the sort of relative you'd invite round for dinner. And you certainly wouldn't want it anywhere near the food. It is lethally poisonous.

It's name should be warning enough (and if not, colloquial nicknames such as 'Satan's Rhubarb' and 'Death Cherries' underline the message). In 1597, Elizabethan physician John Gerard warned us 'banish it from your gardens' and steer well clear but we obviously weren't paying attention. An internet search today reveals recent stories of accidental deaths, comatose children and a naked, hallucinating German monk.

It is reported (but possibly exaggerated) that just three berries will kill you. Symptoms start with a dry mouth, dizziness and urinary retention (ha – so there was a link to urination after all!) and progress to delirium, convulsions

and a heartbeat so furious that it can be heard from several feet away. It's all downhill from there. Incredibly, the berries are the safest part of the plant - you wouldn't want to go anywhere near the

Wicked witches would use the berries in a potion to make their broomsticks rise. Wicked women in Venice, looking for a similar reaction in their men, used deadly nightshade eye drops to dilate their pupils. The plant's scientific name belladonna means 'beautiful woman.' The potential side effects of this beautification would later be the answer to the guestion 'how do you make a Venetian blind?'

Barcombe botanist David Lang tells a tale of a student found staggering the streets drunk and disorderly. Nothing new there – until a police doctor saw his wide eyes and realised he had been poisoned by belladonna. He was rushed to hospital where it transpired that his landlady was trying to extract medicine from the berries and was straining them through the same strainer she was using to make his coffee each morning. You won't get a kick like that in Costa. So, be cautious of this killer as you walk the Downs in June to ensure that your life, which to paraphrase Mr Joyce is already a 'parenthesis of infinitesimal brevity', is not made any briefer.

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Far up in the summer sky...

Walking around our reserves on a warm sunny day in June I revel in the rich continuous outpouring of silvery warbles and trills cascading down from the skies far above me. This is the skylarks' song and the guintessential sound of the summer countryside. It can be hard to spot this little lark against the bright sky despite its ability to hang in the air on straight angular wings while it delivers its song for several minutes at a time. However, if you see one perched on a post you will discover a simple brown streaked bird which often raises a crest on its head when alarmed or excited.

However, the real masters of the summer sky are far, far higher. Higher still than the skylark, resembling little black anchors, swifts hurtle through the air at break-neck speed, reminiscent of dog-fighting WWII pilots, screaming like banshees to one another. These superb fliers only land to breed. From the time the fledglings take their very first flight, they will not touch down again until they make a nest. They do everything on the wing: eat, drink, preen, mate, they even sleep in flight! The nest is built by both adults out of any material that can be gathered on the wing, including feathers, paper, straw, hay and seeds. It is located high up in the roof space under the eaves of old houses and churches where the birds are able to drop into the air from the nest entrance.

For those of you interested in the fortunes of our nestcam 'reality TV stars' our tawny owl

hatched all three eggs and the fluffy owlets have been delighting us with lovely images. They have grown rapidly and got curious about the world outside their box. 





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A note – or thought - on the 79th Anniversary of Dunkirk (26th May – 4th June 1940)

As Selsey is closely associated with the sea, fishing and the running of small sea vessels, I thought it might be relevant to note that this May was the 79th anniversary of the evacuation of troops from the beaches of Dunkirk and the sending of boats large enough to make the crossing of the channel to pick up the stranded troops off the beaches of this northern French coastal town. Many of us would, I imagine, have seen one of the motion pictures of the event, or possibly both films. If so, you may remember the part in both films where a young boy who had lied about his age, was signed up and allowed to man a boat (the age limit was 18 for this temporary, yet official short term, naval appointment). Having successfully crossed the English Channel and reached the beach pick up point for transfer to waiting offshore Royal naval vessels he was tragically wounded by one of the persistent German air attacks while pulling up troops into the boat and subsequently died in the action.

I was recently working in the mountains of southern Turkey on my brother-in-law's villa, and about three weeks in we had a delivery of all the cutlery and glassware etc that had been kept in storage locally for a few years. Imagine my surprise when on opening the storage boxes for the glass to find that every piece had been neatly wrapped and packed with newspaper. The newspaper used however, rather than being Turkish, was English newspaper dating from the 1940's!

The very first item I came across was wrapped in a Daily Mail newspaper dated Friday June 14 1940, (the strap line under the title included, 'For King and Empire') its price being one old copper penny (for young people that means that two and a half new pence would, therefore, have purchased a week's papers).

Love, John.

There were eight columns on the front page and in the fourth there was a small photograph of a smart, gently smiling young boy with the traditional short black hair and left parting, who was wearing a white shirt, tie and black iacket, which may have been a school blazer as it may have been the traditional school photograph. The bold heading underneath the photograph was '15, Gave Life at Dunkirk'. There was limited comment following, but the short entry stated 'Britain's youngest war victim is believed to be John Edward Atkins, 15 - years old barge hand of Denton, near Gravesend. His parents have been officially informed that he has died after being seriously wounded in the Dunkirk evacuation'.

Every sheet of paper had a report on

the progress of the events taking place at the time, thus producing a historical record of the time as read by the population at family/dunkirk 1940 home. I kept every sheet I could, many being whole front pages. Not only were they important as an actual account by war correspondents, the adverts were very informative. Did you know that a round chocolate sweet wrapping a honeycomb ball was being sold for two pence (can you remember two copper pennies?) and a box could be purchased for six pence (two and a half pence today). A sweet that can be found in every sweet shop and most supermarkets today, but costs far more than 2.5 p. (At current

So, as next year will be the 80th anniversary of this transformative event, are we, with a close affinity with the sea going back over a thousand years going to mark the occasion in any way? Did anyone have a relative who took part, ether by sailing over or being rescued? It was an event that changed our country.

My next book is set in two separate time-zones: an eighteenth century monastery in Tunisia, and modern day holiday resort. Trying to get the timing and pace right so that my characters end up in the right place at the right time, has been proving




section by Eddie Williamson when she was Captain in 2008.

Brent Lodge Briefings - Wildlife Advice

Over the last 18 months we have seen an increase in the number of injured wildlife who have been kept by their finders for a few days before being brought in to us. Often such people who are keeping them are kind-hearted but sadly the end result is often a bad one. Without the correct training and knowledge, it is a sad fact that many of these animals end up suffering as a result of misguided 'kindness'. Further suffering can often be preventable if an animal is brought in for attention immediately rather than waiting for days.

We see several cases where people have had a 'good look' and come to the conclusion there isn't anything wrong, so they keep them until they suddenly go downhill and rush them to us. On arrival to us it is often immediately obvious what the problem is and then we are racing against time



to save the animal. Staff in wildlife hospitals like ours are trained to look for things that the untrained eye would miss. We know about certain behaviours so we can often tell what is happening just by watching the animal. Centres like ours simply wouldn't need to exist if it was easy to care for wildlife.



This is why we are asking that if you find a bird or animal that you think is injured, orphaned or in distress please call a centre like ours before touching it, advice can then be given on what to do next. Please NEVER try to

care for the animal yourself, we know it may seem like a kind thing to do but these animals really do need and deserve the correct care and rehabilitation to get them back to a state where they can released back to where they belong. The same goes for orphaned animals, we appreciate that they are very cute and sweet, but the reality of wildlife care is very




