SELSEY MUSIC GROUP'S NEXT CONCERTS

And grand strains of JERUSALEM old thinking to renew


We've notched up seven miles now since leaving Worthing Pier!



Year 3





Learning how we handle our sewage and wastewater has been one of the more eye-opening parts of being an MP, and something I know is especially important to those along our coast in Selsey. Many of the challenges facing our rivers, harbours, and coastal areas are not just sewage-related, but involve everything from agriculture, road run-off and chemicals in the water. Therefore, to really improve our natural environment we need a joined-up approach.

This April I chaired the third Southern Water MP forum, a forum I set up with Rt. Hon Penny Mordaunt MP and Alan Mak MP to bring together all the MPs across the region in an effort to hold the water company to account and support improvement work. I invited Richard Craven, Chichester Harbour Conservancy Director, to join the meeting and to speak about the amazing work he is doing in a group called CHaPRoN. The group brings together the Environment Agency,



Southern Water updated us on some of their current work to increase capacity as part of their £72million investment into the Solent Region. They also spoke about five pilot projects that are developing innovative ways to reduce system pressures. They are seeking to increase capacity and slow water entering the system through new technology including smart water butts, and even smarter approaches to fix broken pipework without the need to dig up the old pipes.

These improvements are being driven by new legislation the Government have brought in through the Environment Act meaning water companies have to be more honest and transparent and publish near real-time data on discharges. Most importantly they'll have to progressively reduce the adverse impacts of discharges from storm overflows. This has already led Southern Water to announce an 80% reduction in their discharges by 2030.

There is currently a consultation on the Government set targets, and I encourage you to have your say – I have published a link to the consultation on my Facebook page (@conservatives.g.keegan), as well as, in my newsletter, which you can sign up for at www.gilliankeegan.com. Improving water quality is vital not just to ensure we have clean water to enjoy, whether swimming, sailing or something else, but for all plants and animals that rely on us taking action so they can survive and thrive.

SELSEY PATIENT GROUP UPDATE

Your views are important to us

During the month of June Selsey Patient Group are once again conducting our annual survey and we would welcome your thoughts about the Medical Practice.

The survey is an important tool for ensuring that the views of the community are regularly captured and that feedback from patients, on what works well and what doesn't, is highlighted so that changes is not easily achievable given that a number of practitioners work and potential improvements, where necessary, can be considered.

We also compare the survey results with those produced both regionally and nationally to ensure that, wherever possible, local services exceed average expectations.

You can complete the short survey on-line at

www.selseymedicalpractice.co.uk at any time during the month of June. Alternatively, during weeks commencing 6 and 13 June we will have Patient Group volunteers present in the surgery at key times each morning and afternoon to hand-out paper copies of the survey and, where required, to assist patients to complete the form.

Last year's survey demonstrated a downturn in the community's general satisfaction with the service as a whole, whilst showing a continued satisfaction and respect for the specific services provided by the clinical staff. It identified that the key matters of concern to the community at that time were difficulties getting through to the surgery on the phone, and the necessary reduction in face-to-face appointments during the pandemic. The matter of reception staff undertaking triage assessments over the phone was also a concern for some patients.

Comparing the data against a similar survey undertaken both regionally and nationally by IPSOS Mori we found that Selsey patients were generally more content with their local Practice, and that local results were more often better than either the regional or national assessments.

For example, 95% (nationally 89%) of Selsey respondents reacted positively to say that practitioners listen to them, and 95% (nationally 93%) also felt positive that they are involved in decisions about their care. Both of these results were marginally down on our last survery 2 years ago but still exceeded national results.

Reception staff were considered to be helpful by 89% of respondents (also 89% nationally). This outcome was lower than anticipated from previous years here in Selsey but, nevertheless, matched the national result which reflects the difficulties experienced by both patients and surgery admin staff as a direct result of Covid pandemic restrictions.

There were several areas where the local community indicated that the Practice didn't meet expectations. The survey showed with some clarity that 21% of patients are particularly concerned about non-urgent appointments often not being readily available, and that continuity of care (i.e., seeing the same practitioner on each occasion) is important to many people but is very often not

Since the Survey the Patient Group has worked closely with the Practice to find ways of making improvements in these two key

areas. We're pleased to say that we've made some considerable progress in increasing the number of available appointments by substantially reducing the number of Missed Appointments. Although these still edical Premain far too high the trend is downward and we will continue to seek ways to reduce these further.

As regards the issue of continuity of care, the reality is that this part-time and all practitioners are entitled to holidays.

Can you help us?

Do you have a few spare hours on a small number of occasions each year to help us out?

We presently have around 15 members but would like to grow this number somewhat. There is no membership fee and no regular weekly or monthly commitment but we would like some more 'names on paper' who can be called upon very occasionally to help out 'on the day' with matters such as the annual survey, our three evening medical presentations etc.

The main purpose of our page is to inform those in the local community, in a clear and concise manner, of health and welfare issues that may affect them. We receive suggestions for posts from Selsey Medical Practice, Chichester Alliance of Medical Practices (ChAMP), Innovations in Primary Care (IPC), and other relevant sectors of the NHS, and we use our own judgement to ensure that all posts are relevant, timely, and worthy of publication.

Our Facebook page also receives messages, and we are always pleased to hear from 'followers', although we are not able to pursue personal matters for patients and we have no legal status to insist or force the Practice or any other party to make any changes or take any particular action whatsoever. However, where there would appear to be a fallacy in a process which might or could detrimentally affect other people we can discuss this with Selsey Medical Practice to determine what the issue is and whether there are alternatives that might be available.

Evening Medical Presentations

Many of you will know that, prior to the pandemic, we regularly held evening medical presentations at the Town Hall whereby a Consultant would give a talk about a specific medical issue.

These events were always very popular but were sadly postponed during the pandemic. However, I'm delighted to say that we are anticipating re-commencing these very soon, initially with one event this summer and another later in the year and then, hopefully, running 3 events again next year.

THE WINGHAM FAMILY PART I AUGUSTUS CHARLES WINGHAM (Senior) 1873 – 1933

Many of these articles start with a picture or an enquiry but in this case the situation is quite different. As you may imagine, the Selsey Photo Archive Group and I are well acquainted and there is a healthy flow of information both ways. When they asked about Mr Wingham and the Forge I was convinced that I had written about him but couldn't find anything anywhere. So either I was going mad (which wouldn't be surprising) or I was mistaken. Thankfully neither scenario was the truth. I located my original file in West Sussex Record Office and borrowed it back. I had done most of the research but none of the writing! So I want to put that right.

Augustus Charles Wingham was born in 1873, the third child of Henry Charles Wingham (a Baker and Beer retailer) and Rosina Lucy Dridge. He was baptised, in Selsey, on 21 March of that year.

By 1881 the Winghams were living at 8 Fish Lane (now Albion Road). In 1891 they were in Manor Road (sadly no clue as to exactly where) but Augustus Charles had left home and was boarding with Albert Redman and his family in Old Fishbourne. He was 18 years old and a blacksmith and is recorded as Charles Wingham. What is probably more interesting is the trade of blacksmith. We know that Augustus Charles' father was a Baker and Innkeeper, one of his uncles was a Clerk and another uncle was, variously, a Comedian and Shorthand Writer; his grandfather, Charles, was a Maltster and the great-uncles were Cellarman, Licensed Victualler and an Ag. Lab; however, his great-grandfather, also Charles, was a blacksmith.




This picture is taken from Bygone Bosham by Angela Bromley- Martin, published by Phillimore & Co. Ltd. In 1978. I have contacted them to request permission to use the photograph but, to date, have received no response. It shows the third and fourth generation of Redmans at work in their forge in Walton Lane, Bosham.

Whether or not Augustus Charles was an apprentice is unclear but he learned his craft from the best as the Redmans were blacksmiths and farriers for at least 100 years.

Perhaps unsurprisingly, Augustus Charles married Alice Sophia Redman in Bosham on 13 November 1895 and in 1901 the happy couple lived at 1 High Street, Selsey with their children Eva Rosina, Elsie and Dorothy.

By 1911 the family had grown and now included Augustus Charles Junior (although his entry on the 1911 census has been crossed out), Florence and Eric Ronald (later known as 'Eck). Another son, Victor, was born in 1906 but died in that same year.

In April 1913 tenders were invited for the collection, removal and disposal of house refuse at Selsey. The Sanitary Committee recommended that the tender of Mr Augustus Charles Wingham was the lowest at the sum of £100 and that the Rural District Council should accept it, subject to Mr Wingham executing an agreement and giving additional security in the sum of £25 for the due performance of the work.

In July 1913 the Selsey Fire Appliances Committee (formed on 16th April of that year and consisting of Messrs Bromley, Benstead and the Chairman) reported to the Parish Council that they were 'glad to inform the Council that Mr Charles Wingham would undertake the Captaincy of the Fire Brigade, in succession to Mr Cutler'.


Mr Wingham did not get off to a very good start. Following a contretemps when Mr Cutler lent the Selsey Fire Brigade hose to a third party which was returned damaged, they issued instructions to the newly appointed Captain of the Brigade that in future the Council's hose should be used for fire purposes only and under no circumstances must it be loaned or hired out for any other use.

By 1914 further consternation was caused by the discovery that Captain Budden of the Chichester Fire Brigade had inspected the Parish Council's fire equipment without any authority. An immediate investigation was lauanched and it transpired that the Captain of the Selsey Brigade, Mr Wingham, had invited Captain Budden 'to come and have a look'. Once again there were signs that the regulations had been ignored when the Surveyor had borrowed a standpipe, so it was again resolved that no part of the fire equipment should be allowed out on hire or loan without the consent of the whole Council.

Daughter Joan was born in 1916.

The Fire Appliances Committee, in 1920, again inspected the apparatus and reported that a section of the hose was in a very bad state and that the Fire Brigade was practically non-existent.

The Council decided that the Fire Appliances Committee should reorganise the Fire Brigade, with the recommendation that it should consist of six men and a Captain and that they should be granted the sum of £1 each per annum for the loss of time taken up by fire practices, which should be at least one per quarter. This led to S. Dewey, Clerk writing to Mr Wingham as follows:





13th October 1920

Dear Sir,

At a meeting of the above Council held last evening I was instructed to write and say that the Council having re-organised the Fire Brigade by enlisting the services of some young men, desire to place on record their appreciation of what you have done while Captain of the Brigade and to tender you their very best thanks.

I am, Yours faithfully, S. Dewey Clerk





This letter brought an immediate, although unusual, reply from Mr Wingham, dated 14th October 1920:

'Dear Sir, I am in receipt of Yours today re Fire Brigade. I sincerely think the Council ought to Furnish me with some sort of medal if only Putty. Thanking you for same. I Remain Yours Obediently A. C. Wingham'

According to the Oxford Reference website, the phrase 'putty medal' originated around 1898 and describes 'An appropriately worthless reward for insignificant service.'

By the 1921 census Augustus Charles was 49, still at the Forge and an Employer. His assistant may have come from outside the family as Augustus Charles junior was a 'contractor' or carrier while Eck was a Carter and Coal Merchant.

This card is dated around 1923 and we can see that the horses have been replaced with cars

Petty troubles seemed to dog the footsteps of Augustus Charles as the Chichester Observer of 4 July 1923 reported that 'summonses had been issued against parents in respect of the non-attendance of their children at school. He was fined 10/- (50p for modern readers!). it is interesting to realise that 10/- was a considerable amount of money even in the 1960's while today's 50p buys you very little.

PASSED AWAY.—A life-long resident and familiar local figure passed away by the sudden death of Mr. Augustus Charles Wingham, of The Forge, High Street, Selsey, at the age of 60 years. Mr. Wingham was taken ill on Friday, and on Saturday his condition was so critical that removal to the Royal West Sussex Hospital at Chichester was urged by his medical advisors, but he died in the Hospital in the early hours of Tuesday morning. Mr. Wingham was a blacksmith and wheelwright by trade, and was also a cartage contractor, acting as such for many years to the Selsey Tramways and the Petersfield and Selsey Gas Company. He was a member of the Selsey Parish Council and took much interest in parish affairs.

Augustus Charles Wingham died on 21 March 1933, probate was granted to his wife, Alice Sophia, and he left £876. 6s. 8d. The Hampshire Telegraph of 24 March 1933 contained the announcement of his death

Alice Sophia Wingham continued to live at The Forge which, by the 1939 census, was 61 High Street and died on 27 October 1949. Probate was granted to Florence Wingham (her unmarried daughter) and Eric Ronald aka Eck (her surviving son).



Ghost Moth

A few years ago, as the sun set over the South Downs, I was wandering through a wood on a twilight hike. Through the trees I noticed about a dozen figures decked out in brilliant white gathering in a small clearing. I hit the floor and, buried amongst the bracken, watched as other white figures joined them. Each individual slowly started swaying, swinging hypnotically like a pendulum suspended on an invisible wire. The whole silent scene felt eerie, otherworldly, ancient. I was spellbound and barely breathing, scared I would be discovered and this mesmerising performance would end. As some of the figures swung fixed to their stations, others oscillated wildly, whirling and crashing into each other. The light was fading fast and as my surroundings dissolved into shadow the swaying white figures seemed luminous against the gloom. Then, as the full moon rose and illuminated the glade, the action slowed, the figures retreated and I was left alone in the gloaming.

The ritual I had witnessed was the dance of the Ghost Moths: elaborate courtship behaviour performed by the males on warm summer evenings across Sussex. That moonlit glade had been temporarily transformed into a miniature moth disco where these incredible insects pirouetted, pranced, swaggered and strutted in an attempt to attract a female. More 'Saturday Night Fever' than 'The Wicker Man'.

And, like tiny Travoltas, the male Ghost Moths know that to stand out on a crowded dancefloor you need a flashy white suit. Their wings are whiter than white and look as though they have been hand-painted with Tipp-Ex. The female Ghost Moth has a more subdued wardrobe and

wears pale yellow wings with elegant orange



swirls. Males also have another trick up their sleeve (or in this case their trouser legs). Their hind legs contain furry scent-brushes, which release pheromones into the air like an overpowering aphrodisiac. Once the ladies are lured, it's the individual moth's dancing which seals the deal. It can be murder on the dancefloor and scuffles start as the males try to assert their positions. It's a behaviour known as lekking and the dominant dancers will lead a lucky lady of the lek into the surrounding shadows.

In days gone by the moth's mysterious, ethereal waltz was interpreted as something supernatural and it has been suggested that the dance of the Ghost Moth gave rise to local legends of fairies and Will-O'The-Wisps. If anything, the reality is just as magical and spellbinding to watch.






Avocets

Rob Yarham (Volunteer Coordinator and Guide, RSPB Pagham Harbour & Medmerry Reserves)

With its tapered white and black body perched on thin grey legs, black-capped head and slim, upwards-pointing black beak, the avocet is an elegant and delicate-looking bird. It is also a relative newcomer - or returner - to the coast of West Sussex, and it's still a pretty scarce breeding bird in the county.

Avocets became extinct as breeding birds in Britain in the 19th century – they were over-hunted, their eggs taken for the table and their feathers for fishing flies - but they returned to breed in southern Britain in the 1940s, at Havergate Island and Minsmere in Suffolk, both still managed by the RSPB today. They benefited from the defensive wartime flooding of coastal areas in East Anglia and the simultaneous increase in undisturbed birds across the North Sea in the Netherlands. The breeding population in the UK has grown from those initial eight or so pairs in Suffolk to around 2000 now. The avocet's conservation success story has been an important part of the RSPB's history ever since, its image being first adopted for the organisation's logo in 1955.

Avocets bred in Sussex for the first time in about 200 years in 1979, but have only bred in larger numbers more recently, most at Rye Harbour in East Sussex. However, the RSPB's newly created reserve at Medmerry welcomed breeding avocets for the first time in 2014. Each summer the number of nesting birds has increased to over 20 here, but they're still vulnerable to predators. To help protect them, the RSPB has put up fencing around the "Stilt Pools" and the island where you'll be able to see them bringing up their chicks. Watch out for them launching their aggressive, missile-like attacks at passing gulls, crows and herons to defend their young. And you can't miss their sharp, piping alarm calls overhead.

Avocets mainly feed on invertebrates, such as shrimp and other crustaceans, as well as worms, either by picking them from the surface of water or mud or by sweeping those slender bills back and forth through the murky water. This side-to-side movement helps them find their food by touch in the loose sediments.

So, the next time you visit the RSPB reserves at Pagham Harbour or Medmerry, have a look at the logo on the sign. It features the black and white head and black curving beak of this rather lovely little bird, which holds a special place in the history of bird conservation in Britain.

The Lifeline Group Selsev

My first trip to Poland to deliver supplies to the displaced people fleeing Ukraine was quite spontaneous when I replied to a request for a co-driver to take supplies to Medyka near Przemysl on the Polish – Ukraine border.

Medyka is the railway station very much shown on TV in the early days of the invasion, it is where Poland meets the Ukraine and where the refugee women and children were saying goodbye to their menfolk who we saw returning back across the border to fight the Russian attackers. The supplies from that trip served to refresh and bolster both those fleeing and those returning with food being prepared and served in what can only be described as a well-run makeshift open air kitchen set up by the Polish within the station car parks. The women, children cats and dogs after taking basic refreshment were then ferried out by a constant stream of coaches under police escort to transit/refuges within Poland.

We learned from this first trip clothing items and other bulky goods such as sleeping bags, blankets, shoes etc were not required at the borders simply because the refugees crossing had no way of carrying these things and the Polish were far too busy to even begin sorting the items. What was in short supply though were all types of foods, water basic medical supplies etc.

At the same time as my first trip and unbeknown to me, Kirsty Hammond had been here in Selsey collecting, packing and taking supplies to two other groups where the items were being transported on into Poland and Romania. Up until my return Kirsty and I had yet to meet but were quickly introduced to each other via a third party, then following some relatively short discussions we decided that we could provide a far more structured approached if we worked together and decided to form our own home grown effort right here in Selsey, this is how 'The Lifeline Group' was

We went on to recruit the assistance of three local ladies Pat, Tracy and Aine who have continued to collect from the various drop-off points around the town and bring the goods to a central location for sorting and packing into the cartons supplied by local packing company IMS. These boxes were filled and marked up in both English and Polish then transported to a container supplied free of charge by Danielle of Katchadan storage in Siddlesham. Simultaneously the JustGiving trust that was originally put into action to partly fund the first trip was extended to enable the finance the second journey now completed and presently we are attempting to fund the third.

In contrast to the first trip the second exercise was far more organised, we collected specific goods to fulfil the requirements learnt from the previous trip, we omitted things like clothing and other bulky items as requested by those we met on the previous

So the goods and the funds started to arrive and the next step was to organise a way of transporting the goods, we managed to hire a Van from Panther Rentals in Chichester at a cut price and we found to do so by themselves, a 'conduit' to give what may just be a can we qualified for a free crossing from Folkestone to Calais compliments of EuroTunnel if we travelled freight, money is always at a premium so whatever we could get free or cut-price was indeed welcome.

At the onset we had everything in place bar a destination and a co-driver but as luck would have it we were given a contact by our local priest Father Max for a Polish member of parliament (we feel it would be inappropriate to publicly give details) who resides a few miles east of Warsaw. Father Max also gave us the details for a local co-driver Patrick who was prepared to share this 2300m journey, so now we had everything.

We left this last Good Friday morning and drove non-stop to the address provided by Father Max arriving Saturday lunchtime where we were greeted by our contact and her family who warmly greeted us whist unloading our van into their garage where it was sorted

into three distinct lots before they gave us a very welcome Polish Lunch.

We learned from our hosts that contrary to what we had first imagined, the goods we transported being destined for refugee/ transit camps in Poland, they were in fact going into Ukraine. This family run what I believe to be quite a covert operation regularly collecting supplies, sorting then transporting them deep into Ukraine to both the frontline and the shelters and underground bunkers of the towns and cities that are constantly under attack.

It was quite liberating when we were informed that everything we took was exactly what they needed from dog food to tourniquets and diabetic medicines to pasta, everything was gratefully received. They thanked us and asked that we pass on their gratitude to the kind and caring people of Selsey for this tremendous effort, they also promising to keep in touch sending news of where our supplies would be eventually delivered.

As promised about a week after our return we were given the details that he supplies that we Selsev folk provided, collected and delivered went to Kharkiv and Nikolaev the front lines (circled in red) deep in Ukraine to aid those fighting the Russian invasion. Other essential items went to Vinnitsa (circled in pink) where the women and children who fled the war sites along the front are sheltering.

Our contact was overwhelmed with all our efforts and support, therefore we, like her, really want to keep this going, it is in a small way making a big difference to some.

This last trip cost £1,400.00 but delivered more than £4,000.00 of supplies, it is a dilemma and some may say perhaps we should have just sent the cash, but the cost of some of the medical equipment given to us would have, if we had to purchase it, far outstripped the cost of the journey and of course providing this service gives the people of Selsey who really want to help but are unable of soup or a bag of nappies to these poor people undergoing a truly awful experience of more than we can imagine. Therefore we see our group of providing a two-way service and connection between, here on the quiet south coast to the utter mayhem in Ukraine.

It was has been mentioned that perhaps we should just pass on the cash to a bigger charity BUT unlike bigger charities we are all unpaid volunteers using our own resources and premises, we have no overheads and take nothing for ourselves, everything we receive goes solely to the cause maintaining the spirit it which it

We are now organising our third trip and this time we are even more focussed on the specific requirements that include essential supplies for the fighting men in Ukraine as well as the women and children sheltering in central Ukraine underground in bunkers, so apart from our usual we are now collecting men's underwear

sleeping bags etc.

As ever we need a constant stream of supplies and cash, supplies can be dropped off at the following

- Asda (just inside the main door).
- The Care Shop.
- Pets Pantry.
- The One-Stop.
- The Fruit Basket.

The sorts of things we are collecting are:-

- Dried food.
- Canned food.
- Pasta / Rice etc.
- Pet food.
- Toiletries Soap razors shaving foam etc.

- Baby Formula Bottles Food etc.
- Underwear (new) ladies, children. Plus men's (for those
- Biscuits Sweets.
- Cereal.
- Bandages.
- Medicines.



The initial stage of the project will now begin which will include site surveys, designs and costings.

The five sites were chosen based on a number of factors including public and partner feedback and level of use.

The public conveniences that have been identified for refurbishment are: Priory Park, Chichester; East Beach, Selsey; Tower Street, Chichester; Bosham Lane, Bosham and Market Road. Chichester.

"Good quality facilities and public areas are vital to leaving people with a positive lasting impression of the district, which helps to support the visitor economy. This is a key aim within the visions that have been developed for our city and towns," says Cllr Tony Dignum, Cabinet Member for Growth, Place and Regeneration at Chichester District Council.

"This is why it is important that we provide modern and clean public conveniences for those who are visiting or moving around the district. We've already seen the impact that improvements can make on the sites that have already been refurbished. This includes introducing better disabled facilities. 

Jobs for TUNE

Amongst the worthwhile perennials that will be on sale at reputable nurseries this month are Penstemons, including the pale, mauveblue 'Stapleford Gem', Hidcote Pink' and the burgundy coloured 'Blackbird'. They are ideal for enlivening bare bits of ground and, given a sunny well-drained spot, many flower prolifically through the Summer.

Daphnes can be quite difficult to propagate, but cuttings taken now often prove successful. Use 3/4" long non-flowering shoots, potted up into freely draining seed and cuttings compost. Some patience is called for as rooting may take three months or more.

Cut Sweet-Pea flowers regularly to promote continued flowering and water with a proprietary liquid feed every ten days or so. Ensure each plant is receiving adequate water and, if the weather is very dry, mulch the soil surface after watering.





- Train bindweed up a/cane to keep it away from other plants before applying weed killer.
- Cut back Spring flowering perennials to encourage fresh foliage to develop.
- Pinch out leading shoots of Helianthus and Chrysanthemums to encourage bushy growth.
- Plant some garlic next to Roses to help prevent blackspot.
- Shade greenhouses and remember to damp down surfaces and ventilate on sunny days.
- Softwood cuttings can be made of Fuschia, Forsythia, Hydrangea and Philadelphus.
- Sow French Beans, Runner Beans and Peas.
- Plant out Leeks, Purple sprouting Broccoli, Cabbages and Courgettes.
- Don't forget the birds feeding table and bird bath save
- Don't forget that many plants like liquid refreshments stronger







June's **Update**

Focus on Carers

Sometimes it can be difficult to keep up to date with the various national focus days or months - some guite weird and wonderful. random, and intriguing! Working closely with Selsey Community Forum I tend to focus on the most pertinent and relevant for the charity, and which may resonate with yourself. However, I am mindful that there is not a particular day or week, but a longer lasting period of weeks, months, years. Last month the focus was for Dementia Awareness Week and this month will Carers Week......

Carers Week will run from the 6th of June to 12th of June. The theme has been set by www.carersweek.org "Making caring, visible, valued and supported." Their website goes on to say: We believe that unpaid carers and the challenges of caring should be recognised in all areas of life, caring should be valued and respected by everyone in our society, and carers should have access to the information and support they need, where and when they need it. I am sure that you would agree with that statement, whether you are a carer or not at this point in time. However, that is the what, and the why. But it is the how, that may be difficult to achieve.

The Selsey Community Forum and the services that it provides, recognise that carers play a massive part in caring for loved ones, neighbours, friends, and are often caring for people of any age with some complex health care needs. We recognise that they too require a range of support to help them in their usually unpaid role. Typically, people are coping amazingly well, juggling their family responsibilities, work, home and caring for a loved one. Quite often people cope stoically, then a curve ball is thrown, such as the carer requiring their own medical treatment, and the world feels like it is imploding on them. A carer may pop into the Selsey Care Shop with a minor request, and it becomes apparent quickly to the skilled staff that the situation may be more complicated.

Sometimes an extra ear to listen, a hug to give you care, guidance to get through the challenging confusing paperwork, can make the difference for carers to continue to care for their loved ones. It could be that the carer is feeling so isolated they are no longer able to pursue their own hobbies or interests, leading to potential burnout, or they are needing to know who or how they can safely leave their loved one while they attend a hospital appointment. Carers Support Selsey supports 'unpaid carers' with advice and opportunities for social contact. Various activities take place at various venues and times in Selsey and all aim to be compassionate and inclusive. One special

event we have coming up is the annual Carers Summer Tea on Friday 12th of August. So, if you are

a carer and would like to join us, please ensure you have registered with the Selsey Care Shop.

Carers Support Selsey links in with other community groups in Selsey providing opportunities for both the carer, and the

cared-for, to attend. These can help to develop additional friendships with people who understand your circumstances. Financial guidance (such as Debt Advice and access to Government financial Entitlements/Benefits) can be offered by Selsey Money Support, and emotional and mental health needs can lead to links with Selsey Wellbeing Services. If the carer finds they need to return to work. the Selsey Employment Services will be available to help identify some solutions. Also remember that Selsey Befriending Activities and the Good Morning Call Service may give a carer that additional link to the community particularly when they are experiencing more challenging times and help them to feel less isolated.

Partnership working is critical for Selsey Community Forum and Carers Support Selsey work closely with Carers Support West Sussex www.carerssupport.org.uk who provide additional information via the telephone, their website, and face-to-face activities. Registering with them may also provide financial support to the carer to enable them to take some down time. SCF also work closely with

Tuvida West Sussex who are a registered service and can offer respite services and short breaks for couples.

www.tuvida.org/westsussex . Details of both organisations can be sourced from the Selsey Care Shop. If you do not have access to a computer, you can use a computer in the Selsey Library.

The charity works closely with Selsey Medical Practice. It is important that you ensure that they are aware of your caring role. and your own records updated. This will ensure that information and support can will be offered to you in the best way possible.

Reflections Event ~ update - During the 9th - 13th of May, I was



privileged to tour the county with the 200 Forget me Not's with Martha Pusey from Sage House, Tangmere. Our local MP Gillian Keegan launched the event and spent time talking to some of the loved ones

of those lost during the

pandemic. The tour enabled communities to come together in Crawley, Burgess Hill, Horsham, Worthing, and Chichester. Each event had an incredibly special feel about it and whilst some of the people attending had lost loved ones or had not been able to visit towards the end of their lives, the opportunity appeared to give some closure. There were tears, plenty of them, but a sense of peace too.

People added their reflections to a jar, some in poetry, some pictures, some in song, some in Hindi, some with just a few poignant words.

ON GERMANY

Hello, and welcome to 'Flaming June!' Of course, whether it actually turns out to be 'flaming' remains to be seen, but we can but hope. I have already 'cast' that 'clout', but whether or not my optimism is misplaced remains to be seen. May and June are exam

I took my O level English Literature on 25th June. I was at an all girls school with a rather stern headmistress, and I recall her coming into the hall telling us that as it was 'quite a hot day' we could take our ties off! How kind! It was quite horrific, sitting in that hall, with all the windows closed, and the curtains drawn against the noise from the playground. I would like to think that today's schools and colleges would be a lot more sympathetic, but I certainly hope that, as much as many of us would like a heatwave. it doesn't hit until after exam season!

Exams have certainly changed a lot since I sat both my 'O' and 'A' Levels. (No more chalk and slate to write on, Ed.) For obvious reasons I'm very familiar with the English Language syllabi, and to some extent the Literature as well. As someone who has always had something of a passion for the written word. I do worry that the syllabi are very 'functional' and technical - which opens up an entire debate about the 'prescriptivist' versus 'descriptivist' methods of writing. I'm very much in the latter 'school', and I worry that we are squeezing the life out of English. For me, it's all about effective communication, and that's always been a passion of mine. As C. L Wrenn, a famous English scholar once said: 'Language is an ever-changing and developing expression of human personality, and does not grow well under rigorous direction'. I have to say, I do agree. We shouldn't constrain language - it's all about exchanging information, and so long as it's effectively and accurately received - I think that's okay. However, I always say if I have to read a sentence twice, it probably doesn't make sense, so spelling and punctuation do

So...what's happening in June? Mmm, difficult one! I do know, actually! Unless we have been living under a rock or in a cave, it would be impossible not to be aware that our Queen ... QUEE. is celebrating her Platinum Jubilee this month. Whatever our individual feelings about the monarchy may be, it would be hard not to respect the Queen's contribution to our country over the last seventy years; I think it will be a very long time before this country has a monarch who 'reigns' for so long. Many of us will have only known this country with a Queen 'at the helm,' but my children are likely to see one Queen and, perhaps three Kings (Princes Charles, William and George.) We often assume that the Queen has little or no power, but in reality that's not really the case; only she can officially open Parliament and 'sign off' on a bill before it goes into effect. Basically, that means that she approves of the proposed law and gives it 'royal assent', but in reality whether she 'approves' or not is irrelevant. The last time a monarch didn't give royal assent was in 1708, when Queen Anne vetoed a measure that would have restored the Scottish militia. So, the chances of

If she sees fit, Queen Elizabeth can also grant a royal pardon to anyone who commits a crime. Unsurprisingly, it's not a power she's used much, although she did use it in 2013, when she granted a posthumous pardon to World War Two codebreaker Alan Turing.

Technically, the Monarch is Commander in Chief of the United Kingdom's entire military. In reality, the Queen assigns this position to someone else - most commonly the Prime Minister

or the Secretary of State for Defence. Only she can declare 'all out warfare' and she's the one person in the country who has authority to do that. However, Parliament, the Prime Minister, and the rest of the Government would have to permit it. The Queen has never declared war though, but her father did, of course.

I have heard it said that Royalty is the stuff of fairy tales and soap operas which, let's face it, are two pretty powerful types of storytelling. Societies evolve around 'stories' and they are partly what makes us human. We all think we know about the Royals - all their family dramas, their love lives, even their enemies. They have many 'personas' which they seem to embrace effortlessly - the dramatic pageants, the sumptuous, staged weddings, the seriousness of the opening of Parliament etc. We are all 'pulled' into their lives to some degree whether we want to be or not, and a person's attitude to the Monarchy can be quite defining. The question, of course, is how will the Royal story unfold after Queen Elizabeth's reign is over and how will that impact our country? Only time will tell....

I've never actually 'met' the Queen, although I've seen her three times - the first. I was too young to remember. My mum took me to a library which the Queen opened when I was around three years old - I have no idea whether I enjoyed it or not, but I strongly suspect I wasn't too bothered! The second occasion was in 1979 when

she opened the Brighton Marina. This was a good one. I was just one person away from her, and my abiding memory is that she had used a very bright lipstick. I'd just finished some university exams and had a temporary job in the centre of Brighton, so this seemed like too good an



opportunity to miss. We had a long suffering and incredibly tolerant boss (who was also a staunch monarchist with a rather grand portrait of the Queen in his office) so we all took the opportunity to ask for the afternoon off so we could go to 'see the Queen'. Sadly, I have no photos at all, although I can picture the occasion very clearly.

The final instance hardly counts. I had gone to Ascot for Ladies

Day, but it happened at a time when for some reason I was seriously suffering with travel sickness. To deal with it, took a couple of pills which had the side effect of making me extremely



tired. The consequence of which was that I sat on my picnic chair on the grass, and fell asleep, only to be woken by cheers as the Queen's carriage passed by. I caught a mere 'glimpse'. However, both she and I were technically in the same place at the same time, so I feel I can use it as my third encounter!

So, my fellow Selsonians, I hope that you have a good month. Enjoy the good weather, if we have any, and let's hope the weeds

don't grow too fast! Take care, everyone.

This month I wanted to tell you about a cat that arrived with us in March.

Logan-Lee was found in the woods by a kind member of the public and brought to The Centre as he didn't look great. When he arrived he had really sore eyes and needed to be started on treatment immediately. Under the guidance of our vet, the staff tried different eve medications but unfortunately none of these made a difference. The next step was for Logan to visit our vet for them to make a new plan to save his eye. He was put on stronger antibiotics and two different types of eye drops that he had to have put in his eye every hour! One of these eye drops he was on was a serum eye drop, I couldn't believe it when my staff told me that this is made from spinning blood from a healthy animal to separate the serum out. The blood for his treatment was very kindly donated by Berry. the dog of one of the vet nurses at the vet practice. Of course, I am not keen on dogs but what a kind thing for Berry to do, we really appreciate it. Logan's eye is now doing much better and my staff are hopeful he will be able to find his forever home soon.

Babysitting for birds

Bird season is in full flight here at Brent Lodge! Every year is different, but 2022 seems to be the year of the great tit. Judging by the number of chicks we're feeding, they're having a good breeding season. But they aren't alone. Among the

garden birds we've also got a young wren and a couple of fledgling blue tits, while 20 ducklings make up most of the waterfowl contingent. We've even got some cheeky juvenile magpies. All these birds need to be fed very regularly – sometimes as frequently as every 15 minutes – to mimic their feeding patterns in the wild. It's lucky we have such



dedicated animal care assistants and willing volunteers to give these babies the care they need. Nurturing such beautiful creatures – and cute ones like the pair of baby rabbits here now – is hard, but very rewarding, work.

Great Tit feed

Supporting local wildlife

There are many simple ways to support birds at this time of year. Many birds are still breeding, so if you have thick hedges in your garden, be careful when trimming them, because they are ideal nesting places for shy warblers. Parenting birds can use all the help they can get in feeding their young, so leaving out food (remembering to chop any nuts) regularly is a fantastic boost. They can also struggle to find water in the hotter months, so providing fresh sources of water is a must – and that goes for mammals, too. Avoid spraying aphids with insecticide, since this can poison helpful insects like ladybirds too – and aphids can also be a food source for birds. Try using a diluted fairly liquid solution instead, then wiping the insects off the leaves.

Your gardening calendar

There's still time to plant quick-growing annuals from seed to fill any gaps in the flowerbeds. If you are planting pre-potted plants, remember to water them in well. You can also use annuals to create hanging baskets and containers. You may also want to think ahead and plant perennials like foxgloves which will return year after year, as well as attracting bees and other insects. Any seedlings being grown inside can be brought out to acclimatise before planting into the soil about now, and it's a great time to sow vegetable crops such as courgettes and lettuces.
