Local Care Company rated Outstanding by CQC

Home Instead Senior Care has been awarded the highest accolade in the care sector. The company, which cares for people in their own homes in and around Selsey as well as Chichester and Bognor Regis, was inspected by the independent care sector regulator, the Care Quality Commission (CQC), in November 2017. The recently published results rate the service, directed by Simon McGee, as outstanding.

Only two per cent of home care providers inspected by the CQC have been awarded the coveted 'outstanding' rating, making this a truly impressive achievement. Commenting on the rating, Simon said, "We are delighted to receive an outstanding rating from the CQC. This is only possible thanks to our superb team who are totally dedicated to providing the best care services to our elderly clients and their families."

The team recognises the importance of being involved with the local community, as well as working closely with health and social services professionals. In the report, various professionals, including local GP's, expressed how they valued the service and spoke extremely highly of the caregivers and the exemplary leadership within the organisation.

A community psychiatric nurse praised the outstanding organisational culture of excellence and of going 'the extra mile'. Another health care professional said "Your excellent care and good communication with all concerned was invaluable and enabled us all to provide the best care."

Caregivers were described as extraordinarily dedicated, motivated and committed. One caregiver said, "It's a lovely family orientated company who pride themselves on person-centred care. It's a pleasure to work here." When asked what it meant to them to be able to provide a personal service to people, another caregiver said, "I really enjoy working for the company as it genuinely cares. It's just brilliant and if you can make someone smile that's it."

A client's relative told inspectors, "My mother has a habit of changing her mind. Her caregivers have the patience of saints. One minute they will be making her scrambled egg on toast, the next, they are required to walk down the road with her on her electric scooter. They are capable resourceful people who work together to get the right outcome."

The team have also set up free community events in Bognor Regis and Chichester including 'Music and Memories', community events for people living with dementia and their families to help minimise social isolation and loneliness. Inspectors spoke with people who were enjoying the event. One person was observed to be singing enthusiastically and thoroughly enjoying the music. They said "I love it, absolutely wonderful, everybody's wonderful."





Care visits last for a minimum of an hour, to allow caregivers time to get to know their clients, never rushing the care provided.

Selsey inshore lifeboat investigates lights in the sea off Bognor.

The D class inshore lifeboat (ILB) Betty and Thomas Moore launched at 1257am on Sunday



18 February at the request of the UK Coastguard. A fisherman angling on the beach reported seeing lights in the water to the west of Bognor Pier.

After launching with a crew of three volunteers the ILB made best speed to the area and after arriving on scene the fisherman reported that a person had come ashore wearing a wetsuit and said he and one other person were free diving (diving without cylinders). He said his buddy had come ashore further west and they were both ok.

The divers were Polish and dive all the time usually in the water for up to 5 hours they were very well kitted out including very good wrist lights which the ILB crew first thought were Coastguards on the beach searching. They were very apologetic for the lifeboat being launched.

The weather on scene was wind southerly force 2-3 sea state slight in clear skies with good visibility. The ILB was released by the Coastguards and returned to station at 1.45am. The crew tonight were Helmsman Dave Lamdin, Colin Pullenger and Kristina Dolan.

Donna's Deliberations

So, March it is, already - time is certainly 'March-ing' on! (Sorry, couldn't resist that one.)

I'm hoping that we've successfully navigated our way through the weird and wonderful meteorologial phenomenon of February and that we have well and truly turned the corner towards Spring. We can but live in hope!

As I write this I have just returned from Bournemouth, which isn't my favourite destination spot in our green and pleasant land but comes prettty near the top (regular readers will know that the Isle of Wight is at the top!) While I was there I had a go at writing this month's 'Deliberation' and got absolutely nowhere; such is a writer's lot sometimes I'm afraid. I opened the lap top on more than one occasion and sat looking at a blank screen for five minutes whereupon I closed the lid and muttered something unrepeatable under my breath. Contrary to what people may think, writing can be difficult. Sometimes, when you get 'in the zone' – you're away and pages just come flooding through, whereas other occasions will result in absolutely zilch for days on end. Seriously frustrating. When I was reliant on writing for a living, it was always a worry but somehow I managed to muddle through, like most people who share my 'craft'.

I'm often asked about how I became a writer and the answer is largely through necessity. For reasons I will never understand I left university with two psychology degrees which are all very well and good but, for me, had little practical application. I had a very inspiring English Teacher when I was at school and she always had high hopes for my literary achievements so I thought I would give writing a go and happily, I managed to do OK. Truth to be told, though, I was always too busy earning a living to have time to spend writing the proverbial novel which may well have earnt me nothing...but one day....

Depending on who you ask, writing is either extremely easy (wrong) or something so impossibly difficult that only a combination of training, genius ability and luck will enable you to actually achieve anything (equally wrong.) Another fallacy is that you need inspiration – you don't, infact most of us have this only rarely and are too busy paying the bills to have to wait around for inspiration to strike – it's a luxury we just can't afford, literally! As Stephen King once said: 'Amateurs sit and wait for

inspiration the rest of us just get up and go to work!' Trust me, he's so right. Would be writers also worry about their grammatical ability – again, not important, that's why we have Editors (actually they aren't always too good these days either – just look at some of the newspapers!) The point is though, that you don't need to be a grammar expert to write. You do need to be moderately interesting,

though and even a bit engaging. Beyond that, there will always be someone around to make sure that you have your semi colons in the right place.

One of the biggest untruths about even best selling writers is that they earn loads of money. Honestly, they really don't. By the time everyone has taken their cut there's not a lot left for the poor writer. You might only earn a pound or two for every book you sell and given that the average book will struggle to sell 50,000 copies and it may well have taken you 5 years to write, it's not a great return. Particularly as you may not have earnt much in the time you were writing it. It's really not a 'get rich quick' profession – unless, of course, you happen to have written Harry Potter.



Teaching is quite a popular way for writers to earn a living – and public speaking. Mark Twain was deeply in debt and had to spend an entire year on a speaking tour just to pay off his creditors. A good speaker will get paid much, much more than a writer and they are often given a subject which helps things along a bit.

I became a 'general' writer – give me a subject and I'm away and if you don't have one but need something, I'll probably work it out. I'll research something to within an inch on its life – doesn't matter what it is. Not all writers are like me, though – some will specialise but I always preferred the variety.

Some of us go into journalism, of course – and I've done a fair amount of that as well. It can be quite lucrative if you're freelance and your story goes 'national'. It's competitive but a really rewarding field - the foundation of the media industry, vital for a democracy. You need the courage to go out and get a story, though – and sometimes make a nuisance of yourself! It's a very good way to hone your communication skills because you need people to open up and talk to you. The one drawback is that it may not be easy to be objective but unbiased reporting is important.

This is a field where grammar and punctuation does matter, though, because sometimes what you write goes live immediately without anyone in the middle able to sort out your mistakes! I've covered everything from local flower shows to political conferences; if you are first on a scene and can get a 'scoop' then the sky's the limit. To be fair, it's harder these days with social media – within a nano second everything has gone to Twitter and Facebook and gone half way round the world before the journalist has even written a word! Not an easy environment for 'hacks' these days! Having said that, although the days of 'hold the front page' have gone it is exciting and it beats working for a living! There's a real buzz from covering live events and knowing that people are being informed about it because of your work.

So, there we have it – I have made an entire 'Deliberation' from not having any inspiration – perhaps though, that was my inspiration.... who knows!

So, what's happening this month? First and foremost I am

seeing G4 in concert – at least once! I haven't seen the guys since Christmas and I'm having withdrawal symptoms. My family will no longer allow me to play their albums in the car which I believe is extremely cruel – the two exceptions to this rule being Mothers Day (which is, just to remind you 11th March.) and my birthday. So, to all Selsonian mums, have a lovely day and make sure that you are well and truly spoilt!

Vehicle Crime

Since the New Year, there has been an increase of reporting of theft from motor vehicles. The majority of this type of crime is opportunistic, and occurs because valuables have been left on view or the vehicle left insecure. If a vehicle is left insecure it only takes 10 seconds for your valuables to be stolen. Protect your Belongings:-

> Close your windows and sunroof, lock all doors and activate any security devices when leaving the vehicle even for a few minutes. Check your doors manually as automatic locking devices can sometimes be affected by electronic interference.

> Take all valuables including sunglasses with you if you can. If you are unable to take them from the vehicle, lock them in the boot or place them out of view.

Fit a locking petrol cap if your vehicle doesn't already have one. Fit anti tamper screws on your number plates and locking wheel nuts if not standard to your vehicle.

Remove parking permits, radio face plates and portable satellite navigation systems including their cradle ensuring to wipe the window where the satellite navigation holder may have left a visible mark.

Consider getting a steering lock or gearstick lock and pedal box to improve security of your unattended vehicle.

Park with care, particularly at night or if you are leaving the vehicle for some time. If possible always park in a busy, well-lit area. Managed car park facilities may be a better choice a list of police approved safer car parks can be found at the British Parking Association website.

Never leave your keys in the vehicle, even if you are just leaving it for a few seconds. Try to avoid leaving car keys close to your front door or in a visible location. A thief can reach in using a hand or device and steal the keys to your vehicle. Fitting a plate to the rear of the letterbox opening can prevent this.



AMY RHODES 1877 - 1961

I was running out of inspiration for your monthly article so I took myself off to the Antiques fair in Chichester where I came upon this card. As we can see, it's St Peter's Church with the old Victorian Vicarage in the background. Bog standard you would think (although it is unusual being coloured).



It is a John Valentine card serial no. 43722. It is quite difficult to determine who now owns the copyright but it is over 75 years old as it is ca. 1909 and I'm not using it for commercial purposes so we'll hope for the best. If I have inadvertently infringed someone's copyright then I apologise wholeheartedly.

And here is the message on the reverse.

'Dear Amy, Just a line to say we are better hoping you are well, Florrie is getting very brown. Willie is all white, not a bit of colour in his face. It is very quiet here. With love from F R.'

Amy was born on 3 August 1877 in either Chichester or Oving – it depends which census return you look at. She was one of the daughters of George Thomas Rhodes, a bricklayer born in Shipley, and Emma Amy Rhodes. In 1881 she was 3 years old living at 2 Rock Buildings, Oving with her parents and siblings.

By 1891 Amy was in service, as a General Servant, aged 13. Her employers were John Dunn and his wife Sarah S A Dunn who were 25 and 23 years old respectively. John was a Draper's Assistant living at 8 Westgate, Chichester.

Amy worked for a different family in 1901 at 64 Florence Road, Preston. This was the home of the Sutherland family the head of which was an outfitter (clothier). Amy was a Mother's help as Mrs Sutherland had a son of 8, Alexander, a daughter, Helen, who was 4 and another daughter named Christina who was 1.

And this is where I got really excited! Sad, I know, but that's me!

By 1911 Amy had moved yet again and was a cook in the household of Walter John Shippam of the famous Chichester company. By this time she was 32 and lived with the Shippams at 2 St. Martin's Square – the very address on the postcard. Her fellow domestics were Lilian Ethel Smith, a Governess, and Dorothy Lizzie Bridger, a Housemaid.

Amy was obviously a good cook as she was still with the family when the 1939 registration took place although they had moved to Whyke Lodge, Whyke Road (a substantial building which is now a care home). Walter had retired although was probably still a Director of the Company.

Walter John Shippam still lived at Whyke Lodge at the time of his death on 4 January 1955.

His wife, Rebecca, also of Whyke Lodge, died on 23 February 1956.

Amy never married and, after her retirement, lived at 1 Lake Road, Chichester. She died at St Richard's Hospital on 5 August 1961 aged 84.



And finally, a propos of nothing, I came across the following:

Returning to the card, the following questions were posed. Who sent it? Who were Florrie and Willie? I looked at Amy's wider family and soon found Alfred Rhodes who lived at 1 Franklin Villas, East Road, Selsey in 1911. Alfred had a wife who was born Florence Louisa Lee and they were Amy's brother and sister-in-law. Amongst his children he had Florence Emma (possibly Florrie) and William George (who could have been Willie) as well as Edith Irene. I assume, therefore, that Florence senior wrote the card. I am open to other suggestions though.

And 1 Lake Road? This was the house Amy's parents occupied in 1911 so Amy had, effectively, returned home!

Whether or not there are any Rhodes descendants still here in Selsey, I'm not sure. I do know there are members of the Lee family though. If any of them have any more information, I would love to hear it.



WHAT TIME IS IT WHERE YOU ARE?

On the 25th of March, clocks in Britain, some European and North African countries will go forward one hour, as we switch over to British Summer Time, BST. BST runs an hour ahead of GMT, Greenwich Mean Time.

Some other countries make Daylight Saving changes to their standard time. Dates in 2018 vary from 11th March in Canada to 30th September in New Zealand.



Greenwich Observatory In 1876 Sandford Fleming called for a global 24 hour clock. The earth was divided into 24 one hour zones, each zone separated by 150 latitude. It was some time before it was finally agreed, at the Meridian International Conference, that each day would begin when it was midnight at 00 latitude, referred to as the meridian line, which runs through Greenwich.

Initially many astronomers refused to recognise midnight as the start of a new day, because it meant a single nights observations actually spanned two dates.

GMT is a time zone; it is not standard time around the world. Working out local time

involves some basic maths, a knowledge of standard time zones (ST) and any local deviations from ST. Mainland USA has four time zones, six if you include Alaska and Hawaii. Russia had 11 time zones, but has recently reduced this to 9 different time zones across the country. China never accepted the need to follow the 24 clock based on latitudes. Despite spanning five time zones, the whole country follows CST (China Standard Time) and it is the same time in Shanghai in the East as it is in Kasjgar, five thousand miles further west.

With the growth in trade and travel in the 1800s it became necessary for companies to be clear about whether they meant local standard time or GMT. In many countries, but not all, sailing times, etc., were referred to as being + or – so many hours from GMT. For example 7pm in New York (EST Eastern Standard Time locally) is GMT – 5; 7pm in Vladivostok (VLAT Vladivostok local time zone) is GMT + 10 hours.

For over a hundred years this system worked very well. By the 1960s the rapid increased in air travel, the growing shipping fleets of cargo and oil tankers, and the dawning of early computers being linked across countries it was clear that a universally accepted standard time was needed.



The first Coordinated Universal Time was adopted in January 1960. Over the next decade there were several adjustments to universal standard time, but in 1967 it was agreed that it would be UTC (Coordinated called Universal Time) and that at midday UTC would, conveniently for the British, be in line with mid-day GMT.

UTC is set by an atomic clock, and every few years leap seconds are added to allow for the tilt, rotation and elliptical orbit of the earth. Mid-day GMT can vary from scientific UTC midday by up to 16 minutes.

UTC is widely used by airlines, and shipping companies, and worldwide technologies such as the internet, and global telecommunications providers.



Volvo Ocean Race

Organisations such as Volvo Ocean Race rely on UTC to send information to the fleet at a set UTC time each day, and they broadcast a daily half hour programme at 13.00 (1pm) UTC. At present the seven yachts taking part in the round the world race are en route Kong between Hong and Auckland New Zealand, but all information broadcast or exchanged is recorded at UTC timings.

Internet service providers have silos of servers scattered around the globe. As these are taken off line for upgrades, it is essential that computer engineers in Delhi, London, Los Angeles and Sydney are all working to the same standard time.

As we adjust to the clocks changing from GMT and leaping forward an hour to BST, at least UTC will remain atomically accurate.







Brown Hares: March Madness By Michael Blencowe Learning & Engagement Officer, Sussex Wildlife Trust

I once had a girlfriend in the big city and found myself attending swanky dinner parties around East London. During one such soiree a guest, desperate to impress, boasted that for next week's meal he would be cooking a hare. I was outraged and I asked if anyone at the table had actually seen a hare in the wild. My question was met with blank stares. I'd like to think that I then launched into an impassioned rant about the untamed magnificence of the hare and society's disconnection with nature before heroically storming out. In reality there was cheesecake for dessert so I wearily sighed and quietly finished the main course. But I knew two things; hares don't belong at Shoreditch dinner parties and neither did I; I never returned. I still maintain that if you've witnessed the reckless energy of a hare cavorting in a Sussex sunrise then the very idea of eating one is, well, madness.

While the fields are still bare March is the best time to observe hares. On paper a hare could easily be dismissed as a big rabbit but they're different beasts altogether; it's all in the way they move. A hare possesses powerful hind legs; a pair of pistons that can send them rocketing towards the horizon at over 40mph.

Hares are mostly nocturnal. They don't burrow underground like rabbits but instead spend their days hidden in a shallow scrape (a form). Young hares (leverets) are born in separate forms and attentive mother hares return to secretly suckle them undercover of dusk.

In spring amorous male hares approach females in the hope of finding a mate but chatting up a hare is a risky business. Potential sexual partners can suddenly transform into sparring partners when uninterested female hares rise up and strike a blow for equality by punching the males in the face. The frenzied 'boxing matches' that ensue are such a striking spectacle that they have given us the phrase 'as mad as a March hare'.

Yet who are we to be questioning the hare's mental stability? Us level-headed humans used to believe that sprinting hares can start fires; eating hare brains made you sleep better and witches could transform into hares and only be killed with silver bullets. Hares have been closely associated with Pagan springtime ferti

Hares have been closely associated with Pagan springtime fertility rituals and the goddess Eostre and they still play a role in our Easter celebrations (albeit watered down, chocolate covered and transformed into the Easter Bunny). Their prominence in the English countryside has also diminished. Numbers have declined due to changes in farming practices, especially the removal of hedgerows. It's been a long, cold winter. As spring returns the Sussex countryside will be exploding in a crazy celebration of life. Get out there, find yourself a hare and experience the madness.

The Selsey Shuttle has been running for over 25 years . We run a service around the village with scheduled stops

in prime locations. It also operates as a hail and ride service.

But who is for? Easy answer ,everyone! There is a misconception that it a service for the elderly only. This could not be further from the truth. It is true that most of our clients fall into that category, but if we do not get more passengers, the danger is that as our customer base gets older, the numbers using the Bus will go down. Stop press!

I regret to inform our customers that it will no longer be possible to hire out our minibus to local groups and organisations. The reason for this is somewhat complicated, but the explanation is as follows.

The Selsey Shuttle has been allowed to operate our local community bus services on what is known as a "Section 22" permit because we use unpaid volunteer drivers; the advice from the Government's Department for Transport has always been that as a "not for profit" organisation we were allowed to undertake other activities such as hiring out our bus in order to raise income to support our low-cost local services.

Following a legal challenge nationally from some large commercial bus companies (though not in this area), the Department for Transport has informed us that it is changing its advice, and it now states categorically that if an organisation such as ours raises income from the occasional private hire of our vehicle it will be categorised as a "commercial" activity and we would not be able to continue to provide our local public services using a "Section 22" community bus permit.

We very much regret the disappointment this will cause; we also now, of course, have to work out how we can continue to provide low-cost local services without the financial support provided by our other activities.

Now more than ever we need your support on our local bus service.

In the Garden

our monthly guide to gardening - written by Giles Peare award winning broadcaster

March is the time when Nature is at its most active after its Winter slumber. Posies of Primroses and Violets are still a lovely old-fashioned gift for Mothering Sunday (11th March).

The sap is rising and the buds on the trees are fattening ready to open and the birds are busily singing and mating. The early Bees and Butterflies will be seeking out Poplar Catkins with their sweet scent and also the Primroses and Daffodils. Keep a look out for the first Daisies and Dandelions. Now March is here it will bring us great cheer.

Jobs for March

If Bush Roses (Hybrid Teas or Floribundas) have not been pruned do so now. Using clean, sharp secateurs, remove all dead, damaged or diseased stems. Cut away any thin, spindly twigs.

Don't forget that hard pruning encourages strong growth, so cut above an out-ward facing bud and leaving about an inch (2.5 cm) of last year's growth. On stronger stems leave about 3" (7.5 cm) of last year's growth.

Shrub Roses require less radical pruning.

Using a pruning saw, take out about one third of the oldest and thickest branches at their base. Tidy up the remaining stems by using the secateurs to trim the top of the shrub, reducing the stems height by about 4" (10 cm).

March is the time to hard-prune Buddleia 'davidii', Leycestria and Lavatera. Also lightly prune mop-head and lace-cap Hydrangeas. Take off any older flower heads (cutting each stem above a strong pair of buds) and completely remove any spindly twigs. On old, congested bushes, take out some of the oldest stems at ground level.

- Give lawns a first mow towards the end of the month on a high cut.
- Dig out and divide large clumps of Hostas.
- Sow Broad Beans in double rows spacing them 8/9" apart and 11/2" deep.
- Take steps to deal with Slugs and Snails which thrive at this time of year feasting on the numerous soft, young shoots that are appearing everywhere. They are especially prevalent when the season is mild and wet.
- Clean all Greenhouse windows and cold-frames to ensure that all seedlings and plants will receive maximum light.
- Buy gro-bags now, if you use them, and lay them in the green house for a week or so to allow the compost to warm up before you start sowing.
- Seeds of outdoor Tomatoes should be sown now under glass.
- Never bury added lime too deep, just fork it into the surface.
- Don't spend too much time in the warmth of the Greenhouse when out-of-doors work needs to be done.
- Plant some Garlic under Roses to make the Roses smell sweeter.
- Grow some Celery next to Beans for a bumper crop of Beans.

As promised last month, we are going to do a series of articles on the History of the Club, extracts taken from the book A celebration of Cricket in Selsey by Ruth C Mariner.

Although the Present Club was founded in 1834, the history goes back before that, and this is something we will be covering over the next few issues, but one of the earliest mentions of Cricket in Selsey is in 1647, and ended in tragedy.

In 1647 there was a game of cricket held in Selsey which resulted in a tragedy. The Quarter Sessions Roll records the following:

'The examination of Margaret Brand of the parish of Rumbolsweeke taken on oath the 13th of December 1647 before William Cawley Esgr one of her Majesties Justice of peace for the said County.

These deposeth that her Brother Henry Brand of the parish of Selsey told her this Examinant about a month before he dyed that he had aboubt 6 weekes before that time received a wound in the head given him by one Thomas Latter of the sayd parish with the Cricket bat, and that her sayd Brother told her he woulde cause Thomas Latter aforesaid to be brought before Mr Cawley that soe he might give you some allowance towards the charge he was at while his wound was in cure, that he tolde this Examinant farder that he felt no payne in his head aboubt a month before his death, but

she deposeth that she being with him what time he dyed, observeth both his head, and face, to be much swollen and that Thomas Latters Mother and Goodwife Holloway, whoe dressed his wound, came to get this examinant about 14 days after her Brother's death, the mother earnestly desiring her with teares, to take 26s in moneys in recompense of such charges, as she and her brother hath been at, wch summe of money this depondent accepted, and farder sayth not.'

This month we jump forward in time to 1974, and some memories from Jim Crowley.

JIM CROWLEY'S MEMORIES OF THE SELSEY CRICKET CLUB1974 to 1980 Matches

In 1974, there were absolutely no changing facilities on the field and the nearest toilet facilities were in Warner's Yard. Players thus appeared for play already changed for action. Indeed, the Rev. Hugh Pruen, San upper order batsman of some quality, was known to conduct baptisms on a Saturday with his cricket flannels under his cassock!

The wicket which ran east-west, making batting difficult in the late afternoon with the sun behind the bowler's arm, could best be described as lively and somewhat unpredictable. Batsmen were often laid out by deliveries rising up sharply off a length and even Ray Tillyer, 6ft 7 inches in height, needed an ambulance for a head wound.

In short, a total in excess of 80 was a likely winning score in those days (the leading individual batting average being about 16) and most home games usually ended early, allowing us a ten over beer match!

Match teas were usually provided by the team Captain, materials purchased at cost from Wally Lightfoot's Spar shop on East Beach and eaten al fresco or at the Netherton Club in Manor Road where mine hosts, Elise and Bertie Buck, also provided convivial 'after match' hospitality.

All the weekend fixtures were friendlies at that time but we did enter the Aldingbourne 6-a-side knockout competition most years and enjoyed an annual club single wicket day at Selsey. Fixtures were not difficult to arrange as Selsey was known as a very sociable venue with clubs as far apart as Aldershot (Hampshire), Puttenham (Surrey) and Preston Park (Brighton) being willing to play here. In turn, for away games, we would often stay until closing time.

Committee

Monthly Committee Meetings were usually held in Patrick Moore's study at his home, Farthings in West Street, Patrick kindly providing beer from his hearth-side pewter mugs after eviction of spiders. The main subject for discussion was inevitably the condition of the wicket. Any letters arising were typed immediately, during the course Selsey Cricket Club of the meeting, on one of Patrick's many classic typewriters.

The Cricket Pavilion

From 1974 Ron Maidment, the then Selsey Cricket Club President, had registered an interest with the developers of the Broombank School 45 site, in Manor Road, for the large wooden building used as a sports hall. In 1976 it was made available to the Club, subject to the Club being responsible for its immediate removal.

Up to then, a number of other sites were under consideration but, in view of the limited time available, it was necessary to accept the Parish Council's offer of a recreation ground site without delay. The Committee then went into overdrive with various options being discussed including removal of the whole building by helicopter or tractor. Neither proved to be practical so it was necessary to dismantle it all, except each wall section, piece by piece.

This was dealt with by a large number of Club members with Jim France supervising the demolition and Jim Crowley arranging the oversite concrete and sleeper walls on the recreation field site to receive the building.

Farmer Darren Nelson Smith kindly loaned SCC a JCB together with driver, cheery John Freeland, for the excavation work as well as a tractor and trailer for transportation of the pavilion sections.

With great effort by a hard core of 7 or 8 members (Alistair Mallet, Nick Argent, Alan Barrett, Derek Mitchell, Andy Horner, Jim Crowley, Jim France and others) and a bicycle which was used to power a dynamo to provide light so construction could continue after dark, the building was finally erected in shell form through the winter of 1976, ready for the 1977 season.

Penny Hesp successfully campaigned in the local pubs for help from local builders when the roof trusses were dislodged during a gale.

Fundraising

Penny was also heavily involved with Gillian Crowley on the Fundraising Committee. They pulled out all the stops, arranging the 1977 and 1978 summer fêtes, raffles and draws, providing enough funds to proceed with improvements to the pavilion. The Club was

thus drawn more into the social side of the village, participating in the Carnival Week (pram race, procession – winning third place with 'Cricket through the Ages' – charity cricket match, etc).



Patrick Moore gave a splendid 'Sky at Night' lecture to a packed house at Manhood School, raising much needed funds. In recognition of the hard work of the ladies for two or three years, there was an annual ladies match, with tea provided by the men.

On the playing side, sponsorship of the Colts section continued, a policy which paid real dividends in the 1980's with the majority of the very successful Sussex Village championship side being former Colts.

Nevertheless, in 1976/77 we were often short of players but the local Kirklands Boarding Tutorial College 46 saved the day by providing a number of very useful players. One, in particular, is worth mentioning. John Boughton, who took some very fine catches at Slindon, is now renowned as pilot of the RN Sea King helicopter which lifted Guardsman Simon Weston off the 'Sir Galahad' in Falklands Sound in 1982 during the Falklands war and was awarded a gallantry medal.

The Pavilion building was fitted out (complete with bar) between 1977 and 1979 and an improved wicket orientated to a north-south-aspect. An artificial wicket was also a very useful addition.

This served to attract more playing members and also to increase interest in the social side of the Club and a higher standard of cricket.

In the 1980's, two very successful cricket tours of The Wirral, Cheshire, were followed by a tour of the Isle of Wight where Selsey was unbeaten.

So it's a New Year and time to face some new challenges - learn some new skills and perhaps try a craft you've not tried before.

So here's one of the tricks of the trade.....

Simple but effective – Decoupage

With a bit of patience you can bring to life an old piece of furniture or even accessorize frames, glass bottles or drawer knobs to match your décor. So how do the professionals do it?

There are a couple of general basics -

÷ Have everything you need to hand, decoupage requires you to work confidently and quickly.

 $\dot{\cdot}$ Pick some good quality napkins (you'll need to peel the top layer off and discard the rest!). You can use wallpaper but you'll need to soak it to strip the top layer – perhaps we'll tackle that later!

* Make sure you have a clean work area and brushes - the last thing you'll want is it realise that your beloved cat's hair has attached itself to your masterpiece!

Plan your colour pallet and layout in advance - this may include cutting out patterns or images. •

Now get creative....

We always use our beloved Frenchic range – it's great for decoupage and all you'll need is paint and finishing coat (500ml - £12.95) I would always recommend using a chalk or mineral paint and you could use a PVA based glue as an alternative to finishing coat (FC) but for ease of use FC is simply the best!



Step one - you'll need to apply your base coat of paint (you may need two depending on the item), make sure you allow the paint to dry completely before moving onto the next step.

Step two – apply an even layer of finishing coat to the area that you are going to decoupage - I would advise starting small or practising on a scrap piece of wood first - in the below example we've used some old wooden drawer knobs.

Step three - Apply the napkin directly to the damp FC with a soft clean paint brush and smooth out any wrinkles (you may need to dip your brush in FC at this point to make smoothing easier). Be gentle, once the napkin soaks up the FC it will



become delicate and possibly rip.

Allow this to dry completely and then apply one last coat of FC to give a hardwearing finish.

Once you've mastered something small you can work your way up, tea trays, kitchen chairs, wardrobes doors - the list is endless! See, told you it was easy..... So what are you waiting for..... Order some paint and FC now and away you go! Don't forget, we offer

We feel that in Selsey, we initially to just plant a seed, provoke discussion, and create a proactive approach to do something more, in order to become part of this movement. People:

You are already doing an amazing job. There are a number of Dementia Champions in Selsey who are trained to deliver information sessions, try to make contact with them to arrange an information session for you and your staff team. This will enable you all to become Dementia Friends. Alternatively a member of staff will be keen to become a Dementia Champion themselves, and deliver information sessions to you and your staff team.

Other methods of becoming a Dementia Friend can take place on line via the Dementia Friend website. In fact there is a huge amount on the internet that can be useful resources for your staff teams. Having those conversations with your teams already will provide a base to work from, developing a culture of responsiveness and understanding will enhance your reputation as an organisation and as an employer. Having a better awareness as an organisation will lead to positive interactions with your customers, whether on the telephone or face to face. There are video's on line that can demonstrate the "customers" experience across a wide range of services and how those organisations have adjusted as to how they support those people with dementia. As an employer, you may also be supporting a valued member of staff who may also have significant caring responsibilities. There is a wealth of information around supporting carers on the website, along with advice as to what your legal responsibility as an employer is to <u>http://www.acas.org.uk/index.aspx?articleid=3235</u>

to understand what the issues are for staff members, and having conversations about those. It will make a real difference to employee contribution, satisfaction and retention. We can signpost to any relevant supporting agencies, which have local knowledge.

Likewise you may have a member of staff working in your organisation who is going through the process themselves of being diagnosed, or already has a diagnosis, and is continuing to work but adjustments may need to take place. Be respectful of that person and keep them in the loop in a tactful way, as to how you all want to work together as an organisation.
