Hollywood Glamour at 100th Anniversary Ball



Tips for making other people feel safer on the streets:

Keep your distance

When walking behind someone, particularly at night, try to leave a good amount of distance between yourself and the person ahead of you. Remember that the closer you are, the more threatening you might seem.

Don't stare

Cross the road

Somebody running up behind you, particularly at night, can be frightening.

Keep comments to yourself

What you might think of as just a bit of fun, or flattery, can be insulting, upsetting or even scary to someone else. Keep any comments or opinions to yourself.

Keep your friends in line

Be an active bystander

If you notice someone is uncomfortable with another person's behaviour, show your support by being an active bystander. It can be as simple as standing between a person and their harasser to block their line of sight. Ask that person if they need any help, and back up anyone else who is intervening.

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REVEREND ROBERT FRANKLIN MA 3 March 1882 – 23 February 1944



Robert Franklin was born in Birkenhead, the son of Frederick Walter Franklin and Mary Hampton Lloyd. In 1891 the family lived at 45 Fairfield Square, Droylsden, Ashton Under Lyne. His father was a Commercial Traveller at that time but had been a Confidential Clerk in an Engineering Firm and, in later years, would be an Iron & steel Commission Merchant and a Wire Manufacturer's Agent. Whatever his occupation, however, it allowed him to employ a servant.

In the 1891 Census Robert was a Scholar, by 1901 he was working as a Clerk with his father who, in turn, was working on his own account.

Robert formally enrolled in the University of Cambridge, Christ's College to study for an Ordinary BA i.e. a BA without Honours on 21 October 1907. He specialised in Theology. On 21 December of that year the Hampshire Advertiser reported that among the Licenses to Curacies granted by the Bishop of London was one Rev. Robert Franklin to St. Barnabas's, Cambridge. This church was consecrated on 5 May 1880 and was built of yellow brick and Corsham stone. The original plans were to have included a tower and spire. Even the parish of St. Barnabas itself was young being formed from several others in 1889.

Robert passed his University examinations in 1909/10 and on 18 June 1910 he married Cora Jane Wildash at Woodford Green, Essex. On the same day he Graduated BA from Christ's College, Cambridge and the following day, 19 August, the Clergyman and his new wife emigrated to New Zealand on the SS Corinthic. On 21 October 1910 the Evening Post (in New Zealand) reported that he was 'Gazetted as an officiating minister under the Marriage Act'.

Rev. Robert Franklin BA became Vicar of Waverley, a small township which, in 2018, had a population of 819 souls and which was situated on North Island. The only clue as to when he became Vicar of Waverley is the report of a wedding at which he officiated which was dated 8 October 1914. However, he appears on the Taraniki Pata Electoral Roll in 1910 and again in 1914 so I think it is safe to say it was his first Ministry in New Zealand.



On 31 December 1911 a son, Theodore Robert Franklin, was born in Waitotara. And here is a family photo of the Rectory there.

Upon enquiry I discovered that the Cambridge University Reporter (Newspaper) confirms that he was given permission to graduate in absentia so becoming a Master of Arts on 10 January 1914.

The Wanganui Chronicle of 8 May 1915 reported that 'The Vicar of Waverley has been appointed vicar of Roseneath, Wellington and will take up his duties there at the end of this month.' Roseneath had a population of 1,788 souls in 2018 so this was a step-up for Rev. Robert. His house at 21 Crescent Road is wooden and on stilts with stunning views over Little Karaka Bay. It has recently been on the market for over \$1,500,00 Australian. I have asked permission to show the Estate Agent's picture but, so far, I have had no response.

Rev. Robert had enrolled in the Second Division of the Reserve and was described in the WW1 Army Rolls as 'B. Franklin Robert, C of E Clergyman, Vicarage, 21 Crescent Road, Roseneath, Wellington.' The 'B' indicates that he was a reservist with one child. On 23 July 1916 his second son, Lloyd Milner Franklin was born.

The New Zealand Expeditionary Force Record of Personal Service contains a List of Commissioned Officers who served in the NZEF and we find that Reverend Robert Franklin was a chaplain (4th class) to HMNZ Marama which entitled him to the rank of Captain and, furthermore, the Otago Daily Times of 31 January 1918 reported that *'the vicar of St Barnabas's Church, Roseneath, has been appointed a chaplain on an NZ hospital Ship'*. His actual date of appointment was 24 January 1918.



The NZ Hospital Ship, SS Marama (built by Caird & Company, Greenock) was the second ship to be converted to a hospital ship and could carry 508 wounded in cots. Rev. Robert Franklin was on board for the third and fourth commissions and a list of ports dated from January 1917 to September 1917 and from October 1917 to June 1918 is available online nzhistory.govt.nz/war/first-world-war-hospital-ships. If you are interested but can't go on line just give me a call.

By March 1918 he was heading the Chaplains Department.

A document in the possession of his grandson states the following: 'Reported at this office on 26 September 1918 at the request of the Bishop of Wellington. He has been granted leave without

pay from 4 October 1918 inclusive until further notice. The Rev. R Franklin's services are being utilised by the Bishop of Wellington until he is again required to join the hospital ship.'

He proceeded to Point Chalmers on 16 October 1918 to re-join NZ Hospital Ship SS Marama on 18 October 1918.

The New Zealand Expeditionary Force Record of Personal Service shows that on 12 March 1919 he was discharged from the SS Marama and re-absorbed into the strength of the NZ Chaplains Dept. In May 1919 he was appointed organising secretary for the diocese of Wellington, taking up his duties early in July and in May 1920 he was appointed vicar of St Mary's, Hawera.

A report of 7 July 1920, in the Oamaru Mail, contained the news that Rev. R Franklin attended the opening of the Anglican Diocesan Synod and that he had raised a sum of £10,000 to go towards a pay rise for the clergy. Each received an extra £300. From 1921 he carried out the duties of a regular vicar conducting weddings and funerals and in 1923 he returned to the UK, with Cora, Master T (Theodore Robert) and Master L (Lloyd Milner) arriving in Southampton on 18 August.

The family tells me that the reason Rev. Robert returned from New Zealand was because 'one of his fearsome sisters' came out to visit and was shocked that both his children had developed New Zealand accents and told him that they had to get the children back to England to stop this happening and for them to get a proper education!

He was inducted in September of that year as Rector of Trotton, West Sussex.

The following week a newspaper article in the West Sussex Gazette contained a report that 'The Rev. Robert Franklin is in the unfortunate position of being a rector without a rectory. Sadly it doesn't say why but this is where he should have been!

The Hampshire Telegraph of 3rd August 1934 announced 'The Lord Bishop of Chichester, as Patron of the living, has appointed the Rev. Robert Franklin, MA to be Rector of St Peter's Church, Selsey, in succession to the Right Rev. Bishop T C Twitchell, DD,' Bishop Twitchell having retired through ill-health. It then lists his previous appointments including one which we haven't found in the records, this being the Curacy of Christ Church, Great Warley, Essex in 1905.

The Bognor Regis Observer of 19 June 1935, under the heading 'Church Chat' reported that Rev. Theodore Robert Franklin AKC was ordained on Trinity Sunday at Chichester Cathedral – surely



a proud moment for Rev. Robert and his wife. (AKC means Associate of King's College).

past times past times

As you can see, a most important event took place on 7 February 1937! John Mariner was baptised by Rev. Robert Franklin!

A further two important events for the village were surely the funeral of Mr. Arthur Robinson, reported in the Chichester Observer of 19 March 1938 along with that of Miss M Gardner. A third arrived in May 1938 when the funeral of Mrs E G Arnell was held at Norton. Happy events of the year included the wedding of Desmond Stephen Carrick Dew and Marjorie Esther Smart.

In April 1939 Rev. Robert Franklin officiated at the funeral of Mr Henry Benstead (a name you will recognise from February 2019 Selsey Life). In October he was represented by the Rev. G Hayes at the dedication of the New Sunday School extension. The Bishop of Chichester, Doctor G K Bell, delivered

Suffer the little children to com 'A member of Christ, the child of God, and an inheritor of the hinzdom of heaven. Parish Church of S. Peter SELSEY, SUSSEX.

'an address expressing his pleasure at being invited to attend the ceremony and particularly stressed the unity of the Anglican and Free Churches' which was reported in the Portsmouth Evening News of 27 October 1939.

Normal clerical duties continued including a presentation to Her Grace, Gwendolen, Duchess of Norfolk in June 1942 and a fête at Large Acres in August of the same year.

The West Sussex Gazette of 2 March 1944 announced the Death of the Rector, as follows: 'The rector, the Rev. Robert Franklin, whose sudden death on February 23 at the age of 62 will be widely regretted by those to whom he had ministered for ten years, was one of the many incumbents of the diocese with experience of the work of the Church overseas.

Ordained in 1905, he was for five years a curate in the diocese of St. Albans, but in 1910 went to New Zealand where, for 13 years, he rendered useful service in the diocese of Wellington where he was incumbent, successively of Waverley, Roseneath and Hawera. He was also for a short time Diocesan Organising Secretary and from 1920 to 1923 was Chaplain to the Bishop of Wellington.

Returning to England in 1923 he was appointed Rector of Trotton and held that benefice until 1934, when he succeeded Bishop Twitchell as Rector of Selsey. Mr Franklin was the father of the Rev. T. R Franklin, who will be remembered at South Bersted as assistant curate there from 1935 until 1938, when he left to take up work as a Chaplain to the South African Church Railway Mission.

Our correspondent writes - All who have appreciated the Rector's devotion to duty, kindliness, and sympathy with those in distress will join in the grief felt by the people of St Peter's and in sympathy with Mrs Franklin and her family. The Bishop of Chichester conducted a service in the Parish Church on Friday (cremation followed on Saturday) and was the preacher at the morning service on Sunday.'

He died of a heart attack and was succeeded by Rev. George Henry Handisyde.



The pulpit in St Peter's Church was installed in his memory and bears the inscription 'To the memory of Robert Franklin, Rector of Selsey, 1935 - 1944 RIP'.

PS: Rev. Robert Franklin's grandson, Simon, has recently discovered that the original name of the family is Franckel. Robert's great-great grandfather was a Polish Jew who came over to England in the 18th century. His name was Benjamin Wolf Franckel and changed his name soon after his arrival presumably to fit in with the locals and perhaps avoid antisemitism. Simon told me that a lot of the ancestors were Rabbis and since the family became Christian has produced a lot of vicars, including Simon and his father who was a former vicar of Sidlesham.



Selsey RNLI lifeboat joins search for Selsey KNLI IIIeboat joins search to overdue rhib with two persons on board.

The UK Coastguard requested the launch of the all-weather lifeboat (ALB) to assist in the search for a small rigid inflatable craft that was missing after leaving Worthing beach on Saturday morning 21 August with two persons on board to go fishing. They were due to return around 8.00pm and attempts to contact the pair were unsuccessful.

The ALB launched at 12.59am Sunday 22 August and headed to a position south of Worthing to join Shoreham lifeboats and the Coastguard helicopter Rescue 175. At this stage it was unknown where the persons had gone fishing, so the search area was initially south of Worthing including the Rampion wind farm. Shoreham and Littlehampton Coastguard rescue teams were conducting a shoreline search. The weather on scene was wind westerly force 4 sea state moderate with overcast sky.

As the time went the search area increased and Newhaven and Brighton lifeboats joined the search. Rescue 175 returned to base to refuel and shortly after returning just before 4.00am located the craft off Brighton with both person in the craft. The Brighton lifeboat proceeded to the position and came alongside the vessel. The two persons were ok apart from being wet and cold, they said they had run out of fuel and tried paddling ashore. The casualties were taken aboard the Shoreham ALB and taken back to Shoreham lifeboat station and checked over. The Brighton lifeboat took their vessel to safety. All other units were stood down to return to station.

The Selsey ALB arrived back at station at 5.30am and was recovered straight away washed down, refuelled and made ready for service. The crew today were Coxswain Rob Archibald. Mechanic Jake Harnett, Craig Sergeant, Neil Hopcraft, Terry Healey and Tim Scott (trainee).

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29 August 2021

Lifeboats Selsey inshore lifeboat launched to paddleboarders in difficulties

The paddleboarders had fallen off their boards at the entrance to Pagham harbour entrance and were seen struggling to get back on the boards.

The RNLI inshore lifeboat (ILB) launched at 6.05pm on Sunday 29 August and made best speed to the area. The weather on scene was wind northerly force 2 sea state smooth in broken sunshine. At 6.14pm the ILB arrived on scene and spotted two paddleboarders in the water already being picked up by a sailing dinghy after the owner had seen the incident unfold and launched off the beach to give assistance. The ILB located the third paddleboarder on the beach.

All the casualties were ok and taken back to the beach they left from and given safety advice by the ILB crew. The ILB returned to station arriving back at 6.47pm and was recovered straight away, washed down, refuelled and made ready for the next call. The crew today were Helmsman Will Moir, Harry Emmence and Tim Scott (trainee)



Sloes by Michael Blencowe of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

From up there, it felt like I could see the whole world: the Oak trees adorned in

summer's fading leaves, the fields at harvest, the city far in the distance. Each October, my Grandad would load me and a bucket into Betsy, his faithful 1963 Ford Anglia. Together we'd cruise the county's back roads. Every few miles he would ease Betsy to a halt and inspect the landscape until finally declaring "this is the place." My bucket and I would be hoisted high up on his shoulders and

from there I'd get my Grandad-stand view of the world. More importantly though, it'd put me within reach of the treasure. The jewels we sought on our expeditions were sloes, the round, purple-black berries that bedecked the Blackthorn bushes.

My Grandad was convinced that the finest fruits were located high on the hedge. And the best sloes made the best sloe gin

Each spring, the Blackthorn hedges bloom: their brilliant white flowers creating snow-white drifts against the woodlands and along our roadsides. These ephemeral petals soon fall and the Blackthorn becomes cloaked in small. oval leaves,

bush is a prickly character and as approachable as an enraged

porcupine. Each twig is armed with spikes, which deter cattle and Grandads from helping themselves to its leaves and berries. This

spiny spinney fortress also safeguards a wealth of wildlife. Nightingales, Turtle Doves and other birds nest under its protection and the elusive Brown Hairstreak butterfly lays its miniature

sea urchin-like eggs on the bush's Blackthorn Blossom black bark. c Derek Middleton

Many years after my Grandad and Betsy had departed, I decided to honour them both and concoct my own sloe gin. I found an online recipe and, in what was and still remains one of the biggest

disappointments of my adult life, I discovered that the main ingredient in sloe gin...was gin. After watching my Grandad making his moonshine I had genuinely believed that by submerging a load of sloes in a bottle vou would

magically turn water into gin. It seems my Grandad couldn't perform miracles. Indeed, looking back, our hedgerow pillaging raids could easily be dismissed as forced child labour. Was he exploiting me and my tiny hands to bypass those thorns and reach the best berries? A few decades earlier he'd probably have sent me down a mine or up a chimney. But my Grandad wasn't some Fagin-like character. Now I think of it, I never once saw him actually drinking any of his sloe gin. Perhaps just being out in the countryside in the autumn sunshine, on an adventure with Betsy and his grandson, was the truly intoxicating ingredient.

Big news for little terns

Church Norton oozes serenity but in the summer, through your binoculars, you will see a frenzy of comically short legs, chopsticklike beaks and dramatic eye stripes, a frenzy of little terns. This

time of year, the chattering little terns have flown to West Africa to escape the wet Sussex winter - who can blame them!

But summers at Church Norton haven't always been alive with the noisy tern colony. Since 1985 little tern numbers have plummeted nationwide. in part, due to climate

change, as rising seas and frequent floods Little tern and sandeel wash away nests. When disturbed, by a dog off the lead or a visitor straying from the path, a little tern leaves its nest, leaving the chicks vulnerable. Lastly, little terns are forced to nest in areas where foxes, badgers, kestrel and crows can catch them, or steal their eggs. Today, there are only a handful of little tern colonies in the

But all is not lost for Pagham Harbour's little terns, thanks to the tenacious staff and volunteers who happily spend time giving the little terns a




helping hand. Initially, the Little Tern Project, funded by EU LIFE+ Nature, worked on 16 sites around England and Wales. Here at Pagham, volunteers have maintained a protected haven for the little terns at Church Norton, an island protected from land predators at high tide. Even at low tide the fencing gives the little terns the upper hand.

The hard work has paid off; 2021 was Pagham's best year for breeding seabirds on record, 46 little tern pairs were documented, the most since 1982! 25 little terns Little tern adult and two chicks c Kevin Simmonds fledged this vear- the nighest

number sin

records began! This is reassuring news, as terns who successfully rear chicks will almost definitely return the following year, meaning Pagham's colony will likely thrive in years to come!

write zone gardening

In the Garden our monthly guide to gardening - In memory of Giles Peare Jobs for October Tin Ton Tins

Sow Sweet Peas in deep pots in a cold frame. Pinch out tips of shoots after they've developed three leaves. This will produce stocky and branched plants for planting out next March/April, which will flower quite a bit earlier than Spring-sown seed, and give a fine display of colourful and scented flowers.

As Summer flowers begin to fade in the borders, fill any gaps with Primroses, Polyanthus, Pansies and Primulas to provide colour through to early Spring. Plant them out and leave them to grow on once they have finished flowering and they'll bloom in years to come. Plant some Wallflowers for early Spring bloom.

This is the time to wipe shade paint off the greenhouse glazing to let in more light, and while you're at it, wash thoroughly any glass you can reach - inside and out because plants inside will benefit from the extra light at this time of year. Remove any shade netting and blinds you have been using during the Summer. Clean them up, then store them away for use next year.

Preparing the evening salad together and singing to our favourites on the Alexa became the routine I enjoyed most. In leaps and bounds, Grace's English improved, as did my Spanish. I found a great deal of pleasure in helping a young person in a very hands-on way. We formed a bond that not only surprised me, but led me to dread my evenings without her.

Grace's flight back to Barcelona meant driving her to Gatwick at 04:00. It was dark and silent on the street and Grace immediately had a fit of the jitters. Bundling her into the car we set off. At the check-in hall she was practically wringing her hands in anxiety at the number of people in such close proximity. Without warning, a young woman who can't have been much older than Grace, calmly walked to the front of the queue, pointed her finger at the hundreds of bemused faces now staring at her, told everyone that she had been chosen by God who would punish non-believers, and asked who would join her. I've never felt my heart race so quickly. What have you been chosen for, I wondered.

"What is she saying?" Wide-eyed Grace clutched my arm.

"This is one time when not having good English is a blessing," I told her quietly. The last Grace and I saw of this young woman was the sight of her in handcuffs, being dragged on her bottom across the check-in hall floor by two police officers. It was now nearly 06:00.

I left Grace to pass through security on her own, relieved that she was on her way safely, and more confident than she was that she would navigate Gatwick departures to board her flight. As I drove home, tiredness starting to creep in, I reflected on the weeks she'd been under my roof and wondered if I'd do it again. Yes, I decided. It has been fun, educational and mind-expanding, and without realising it at the time, a lovely diversion from an exhausting period

at work. I got home at 08:00 to clean her room, strip the bed, vacuum the house and put a wash on. When I logged on to my work mails it was 08:50.







Community Wardens partner with local charity to support the most vulnerable

A local project run by the Community Forum, which is supported by Chichester District Council's Community Wardens, has been providing a vital lifeline to vulnerable people in **Selsey** and Bracklesham

and the Witterings.

The Good Morning Selsey and Bracklesham and the Witterings schemes aim to combat loneliness by making telephone calls to check in on local people who may be vulnerable or who live alone.

Volunteers are available for calls seven days a week, 52 weeks a year; including bank holidays and Christmas.

The charity, chaired by local resident Mike Nichols, laid the foundations for the scheme eight years ago. Since then it has become a lifeline for many older people across **Selsey** and more recently a further scheme has been introduced in Bracklesham and the Witterings.

Hundreds of calls are made each day by 25 volunteers, who offer friendly support to people across **Selsey** and Bracklesham and the Witterings, from either the office, at home or out and about, while two part time staff members from the Community Forum coordinate the scheme.

Mike Nichols, who chairs the Community Forum, says: "Eight years ago I started working on the Good Morning Selsey scheme, back then it was only two or three people. Now we have nearly 100 residents using our service to help them connect with other people. A lot of these people only have the radio or TV to know what's going on outside their homes, so even a half hour conversation with because we know how valuable this connection can be. another person can really brighten them up and help keep them connected.

"We have really come into our own during the pandemic. Before,

many people were visited by their family and friends, but the risk of Covid-19 has kept everyone inside. Without these phone calls older people in Selsey and Bracklesham and the Witterings may not have had a conversation for weeks or



"And, with the help of our local Community Wardens, Neil Hill and Drew Allardice, we've been able to help keep those using our service safe and looked after."

Neil Hill, Community Warden for **Selsey**, says the partnership has made a huge difference: "If we don't get a reply from someone for a couple days then the team will let me know. I then go round to the person's house and just check everything is okay. Sometimes they've gone on holiday or been taken to hospital, but in more serious cases they can be incapacitated in their home and then I call the local emergency services and we get them the help they

people. We've also been able to put people in touch with council services that can offer further support."

The scheme receives a grant from Chichester District Council, along with money from charitable trusts and donations, so that it can continue to be delivered free of charge.

Ronelle and Amanda work as part time call managers for Good Morning Selsey. Ronelle says: "The service we offer the people of Selsey is such a lifeline. I remember one lady

I regularly spoke to over the phone had a fall in the garden. Amanda adds: "Because we speak to our clients for so long we can pick up on their personality, their likes and dislikes. After a while people open up and that can help us get through to them if there's an issue or pick up on slight changes that are part of larger issues."

The scheme continues to provide support for the resident, even if they temporarily have to move to another location as Mike explains: "If one of our residents goes into hospital we keep up the phone calls with them, and if they go to a care home we ring them as long as they want us to, until they feel settled. We take this approach

"We couldn't do any of this without our brilliant volunteers and we're always looking for more. If people want to get involved and help their community they can call the Selsey Care Shop on 01243 201616 or contact the Community Wardens. After a DBS check we can give volunteers all the training and support they need."

Chichester District Council provides the Community Warden Service in five areas of the district, including Chichester East and Whyke; Chichester West; Tangmere and Oving; Selsey, and Bracklesham and The Witterings.

Roy Briscoe, Cabinet Member at Chichester District Council for Community Services and Culture, says: "We are so lucky to have such caring people in our district who give up their own time to help those who are vulnerable or lonely. As a council we are proud to support Good Morning Selsey/ Bracklesham and the Witterings through both our Community Warden Service and grant funding and seeing the huge difference it makes."

HEDGEHOG CARE SEASON APPROACHES

As the busy summer season begins to end and the admissions of seasonal wildlife casualties become a lot less demanding, we will be switching our admission hours to reflect this. From the start of September, the hospital will be accepting patients from 8.30am until 6.30pm

daily. All emergency admissions after this time are subject to appointment by calling the hospital.

We are now starting to release hundreds of healthy rehabilitated animals admitted at the start of the summer season. The freed-up space is now needed to house the impending seasonal influx of hedgehogs, where we anticipate treating over 250 hedgehogs as well as hundreds of other wildlife casualties. Many of these will be underweight baby or juvenile hedgehogs that require over-winter care. Once healthy and up to a good weight, we will gradually release hundreds of these healthy wild animals back into suitable local habitats next spring.

The biggest issue currently facing hedgehogs is the lack of suitable habitats for foraging, breeding and raising young. Gardens are being made more secure with extra fencing and walls, which in turn reduces their territorial area. Bonfires can cause hibernating hedgehogs to become fatally injured and climate change means hoglets born too close to winter will not likely survive hibernation. All these factors have contributed towards them being pushed close to extinction and the loss is not sustainable. Simple steps

need to be taken to protect their habitats and ensure these habitats are thriving with healthy hedgehogs.

- Creating a 13cm hole in your fence will give hedgehogs access between gardens, to find food and a suitable hibernating spot. Our Hoggy Walkway signs help to ensure the gap is left open for roaming hedgehogs.
- Making space for a hedgehog house in your garden will provide a valuable nesting and hibernation area. Wooden hedgehog houses and Hoggy Walkway signs can be purchased from our hospital reception.
- Check before you light bonfires for any signs of sleeping hogs.
 Lift the edges of the bonfire and shine a torch. Construct
 bonfire piles on the day of the event or surround the area with
 chicken wire (not net). Any hedgehogs found inside should be
 moved a safe distance away.

If you have a hedgehog in your garden that looks too small or underweight (below 600g) then you should call us for advice, it

may need overwinter care to survive the hibernation ahead. We would like to thank everyone for all of their support throughout the busy summer season. We will of course appreciate your continued support as we face our busy hedgehog care season ahead. Donations and Wishlist items are very much appreciated,

to help us meet the rising costs of medical treatment, food and care.
