A special thanks to Mr Sherlock, PE Specialist at Seal Primary Academy and for all the local clubs who have supported the school and its children.



move into new classes. This year for the first time we have added House Captains to the school, with one year 6 pupil from each house acting as captain for their team. Their role includes the weekly house point counts, and the pride of collecting the house trophy if their team wins at the end of the half term. They are supported by three vice-captains who can step in if they are away.

We also have a new team of librarians who are taking on responsibility for the library area. Already their tasks have included labelling up the new stock, and soon they will be sorting through all our books to decide what to keep and what new stock we should buy. Reading is very important to all the children at Medmerry, and the librarians want to make sure that they have to the best books to choose from.

At playtimes, the peer mediators – known as the Medmerry Conflict Calmers – will be available to help children to solve any friendship issues or playground squabbles. All children at Medmerry take part in peer mediation training, and by Year 6, some of our most skilled pupils take on this difficult role of trying to find a peaceful resolution to the sorts of upsets that happen on every school playground.



At lunchtimes, we have children of all ages eating together, so the oldest pupils help the newest recruits to find their way around and to enjoy a social and friendly lunch. In other news, Medmerry now has cycle and scooter shelters at the entrance to the school. Pupils can request a cycle & scooter permit to allow them to bring their bikes or scooters and leave them in the racks, but they must ride safely and they must wear a cycle helmet when they do. Everyone hopes that it will be a healthy and enjoyable way to get to and from school, especially when the weather is nice.



News from Councillor Roger Barrow

Another busy month, if you missed ITV Meridian news which feataured our Against Litter Team, you can see a replay on my Facebook Page fb.me/cllrbarrow.The District Council have also been shortlisted for two important awards for the Against Litter Campaign, so fingers crossed. Hope you have all seen the anti-litter road signs I arranged on the approaches to Selsey during the holiday season, they seem to have helped, although some selfish individuals still throw rubbish out of their cars onto the roadside.

We are setting up CCTV at the littering and fly tipping hotspots. Litter Enforcements Officers have been patrolling the beach front and have handed out a number of fixed penalty tickets for littering and dog fouling offences. Those that have not paid their fixed penalty notices have been taken to court and now find themselves with a criminal record. Hardly worth it for the sake of not taking litter home!

Giving your garden waste a new lease of life

With Autumn upon us I expect many of you will be giving your garden an Autum clear out. But what do you do with the waste?

There's nothing worse than lifting bags of heavy garden waste and having to transport them to the tip and make a mess in your car in the process. You'll be glad to know that the Council has the perfect solution! Our garden recycling service is a convenient and cost effective way of disposing of your green waste and the wheeled bin makes it easy to move from the garden to the point of collection. It is also great for the environment as your garden waste is recycled locally into compost.

It costs less than £1 a week when paid by Direct Debit. You will be provided with a green bin, and the council will collect from you every fortnight. The waste goes to a farm in Oving where it is converted to compost for use by local farms. There is a video on my facebook page showing what happens to the green waste.

The council have been running a promotion of 3 months free for new subscribers signing up for a year, and although this promotion ends on 1st October, I have negotiated an extension for Selsey Residents only until 21 October. Just visit www.chichester.gov.uk/ gardenrecycling before 21 October 2018 and use the promotional code GARDEN188

East Beach Outfall to be replaced

The existing outfall system at East Beach, which also conveys combined sewer overflows, is at the end of its serviceable life with failures as a result of full blockages experienced on a number of occasions.

The works will commence early October and last for approximately 6 weeks. Access along the top of the sea wall will be closed between Honest Bills and the public slipway, people will be able to choose an alternative route behind the sea wall.

Access at Honest Bills, Access up to the slipway and the slip way itself will remain open for the duration of the works. Flows from the outfall will be maintained throughout the works so there should be no impact on the existing drainage network.



The farmer answered, "Acer is blind, I have to make him think he had help pulling the car out of the ditch - otherwise he would have just thought it was too much for him and wouldn't have tried." Interesting life lesson here, I think. Although we shouldn't wait for others to help us usaccomplish something, sometimes we just won't attempt something if we think we're on our own and don't have help. With the Vision, we are definitely not on our own and we can really help each other to come up with ideas and maybe even put those ideas into practice. All of us involved with the Vision are really looking forward to meeting more of you and listening to your ideas! Let's really make this a 'Vox populi' - a voice of the people!

Final word about the Selsey Life - if we all rally round and support it, Amanda and Steve can continue to produce it so I really hope you will join me in donating 50p for your copy.



JOHN VETCH MD, FRSE

Physician to the Forces Member of the Medical & Chirurgical Society of London Member of the Royal Medical Society of Edinburgh 1783 – 1835 PART 2

Dr. Vetch was appointed Physician and, afterwards, sometime around 16 July 1812, Assistant Inspector of Hospitals. The CALEDONIAN MERCURY of 3 AUGUST 1812 recorded that 'Staff surgeon John Vetch to be Surgeon to the Forces.'

On 5 February 1813, a splendidly entitled directory The Royal Kalendar and Court and City Register for England recorded that John Vetch MD was a Member of the Committee of the Geological Society, Bedford Street, Covent Garden.

He was on half-pay from 25 July 1814. Then, on 25 April 1815, he was promoted to Physician to the Forces on full pay. This promotion was effective either 25 April 1815 or 25 June 1815, depending on which list of British Army Officer Promotions you look at.

While on the surface, things seemed to be progressing in an orderly fashion, the Ophthalmic world was in uproar.

In 1818, John Vetch MD published his 'Observations relative to the treatment by Sir William Adams of the Ophthalmic cases of the Army'. This was an acrimonious attack on a fellow physician who had a different approach to the treatment of Ophthalmia. The details are too gory to record here but suffice it to say that his treatment had an adverse effect and had blinded some patients. The Observations were published as, in 1817, the Secretary at War decided to found an Ophthalmic Hospital and placed Adams at its head. Eventually the post of Ophthalmic Surgeon to the Army was also created for him, at a salary of £1500 which 'greatly offended the Military Surgeons'. This salary would equate to over £89,000 today. Was this professional outrage or merely sour grapes?

John Vetch's distress was compounded because Sir William had written to the Governors of Greenwich Hospital and made direct reference to Dr. Vetch's name and practice and accused him of blinding patients.

As you might expect, there were repercussions in the form of 'A reply by Sir William Adams to a Pamphlet Recently Published by Doctor Vetch upon the Subject of the Egyptian Ophthalmia'. It was also acrimonious citing several cases where Dr. Vetch's treatment had been either ineffective or had worsened the condition.

There was, apparently, no satisfactory outcome as, on 15 May 1819, John Vetch MD, FRSE, Physician to the Forces, Member of the Medical and Chirurgical Society of London and of the Royal Medical Society of Edinburgh wrote, at length, to Lord Palmerston, The Secretary at War.

By this time, Selsea had joined Aldwick and Bognor as Ophthalmic Hospitals and Dr. Vetch says that upwards of 4000 men had been lost to the service in other places due to Ophthalmia but that out of 3000 treated '*under my immediate care*' not one man was disabled from military service while 500 to 600 cases of blindness were recovered and rendered fit.

Dr. Vetch wrote the missive from 14 Edgware Road, London. The Appendix contained testimonials to the efficacy of Dr. Vetch's method and care and The Barracks at Selsea are mentioned as being thoroughly examined over three days in 1808 when there were 781 patients at all three Hospitals. In 1810, Selsea had 222 of the severest cases, Aldwick had 210 while Bognor had 137 cases.

Of course, money came into the reckoning and J. M'Grigor, an Inspector of Hospitals, estimated that the treatment and expense was just under 9d a day per man. In today's money that would equate to something rather less than 5p a day.

From this letter, we know Dr. Vetch was in Selsey on 1 April 1809 as he put pen to paper and wrote to Dr. Borland of the Inspector General's office. The address is Depot, Selsea. A glowing testimonial arrived from David Gordon, Assistant Surgeon 20th Foot, stating that he worked under Dr. Vetch from December 1807 to July or August 1808 at Selsea and Aldwick.

The letter to Palmerston was published and the wider world, including The Quarterly Review of November and March 1820 and the Edinburgh Medical & Surgical Journal published reviews which seem to indicate that Dr. Vetch was 'the winner' of this medical tournament.

John Vetch MD then settled down in London as we see him paying his rates at 5 Argyll Street.

But tragedy was to strike as the PUBLIC LEDGER & DAILY ADVERTISER of 28 February 1821 reported

'Died 15 February 1821 in Regent Street, Pall-Mall, Henrietta Maria, daughter of Dr. Vetch.'

This took the form of a family notice so we have no further details.

Munk's Roll stated that on 16 April 1821 Dr. John Vetch was admitted a Licentiate of the College of Physicians and on 19 April The Times published a notice for the Royal Westminster Infirmary for Diseases of the Eye. John Vetch was to be one of the Stewards at the Anniversary Dinner at the Thatched House Tavern on Friday, May 18.

A further event served to disrupt Dr. Vetch's peaceful life in the form of a theft. The ensuing Court Case may be found on OLD BAILEY PROCEEDINGS ONLINE (<u>www.oldbaileyonline.org</u>) which gives full details of the trial of Robert Baker for Theft and grand larceny on 20th February 1822.

'Robert Baker was indicted for stealing, on the 24th January, three tea spoons, value 20 shillings and one tea pot, value 10 shillings the goods of John Vetch.'

Thomas Goodger testified that he lived in Argyle-street (*sic*) and that Mr. John Vetch was a doctor. He stated that the dustmen 'gave an alarm that two men had come in at the front door' and, after checking he found that the tea pot and spoons were missing from the breakfast table. He then pursued the prisoner and brought him back. He also said that the prisoner had dropped a basket in the street which was never picked up.

One of the dustmen, William Atkins, identified the prisoner as being one of the men and agreed that the prisoner had a basket. He confirmed he had alerted Thomas Goodger.

The prisoner's defence was 'I was going by. Two men stood behind the cart – I was walking on; the servant ran after them, and took me – my trade does not require me to carry a basket'.

A Guilty verdict was returned and, at the age of 29, Robert Baker was sentenced to transportation for seven years. He appears to have been transported on 3 September 1823.

John Vetch MD was still in 5 Argyll Street in 1822 and 1823 and The Times of 29 November 1823 contained a notice on behalf of The Founders Day celebrations at Charterhouse on Friday December 13. Again, Dr. Vetch was appointed Steward. *'Divine Service will begin at a quarter after 4. Dinner will be on table at 6 o'clock precisely.'*



The MORNING POST of 18 November 1824 contained a notice informing readers that The Royal Universal Infirmary for Children, Waterloo Bridge Road, held a Special General Court of the Directors and Governors of the Charity on 17 November 1824. The purpose of the meeting was to elect a Physician to the Infirmary. There were two candidates: Charles Julius Roberts, MD and John Vetch, MD, FRSE etc. Dr. Roberts received 92 votes while Dr. Vetch received 339 votes and was duly elected to the post.

MEDICO-CHIRURGICAL TRANSACTIONS published by the Medical and Chirurgical Society of London in 1827 reported that John Vetch, MD, FRSE had been appointed Vice Chairman to The Council of the Society between March 1 and May 6, 1825, and that he was living at Charterhouse Square.

On 28 February 1831, Dr. Vetch wrote 'Observations on the use of Tobacco, as a local application in Gout and other cases of constitutional inflammation.' He recommended an infusion to be rubbed on joints and testicles to reduce pain and inflammation, his final recommendation being that '*in many cases it is well to rub the part with eau de cologne after the use of the tobacco*'.

In a Letter to the Editor of the Morning Post of 8 July 1831, John Vetch MD, writing from the Charterhouse, was 'desirous of availing myself of the publicity of your Journal to call attention to the most prompt and powerful means of arresting the symptoms of cholera...' Without going into all the details, he suggests folding a piece of linen, placing it over the stomach, applying boiling water and immediately removing the cloth. He signed himself 'I am, Sir, your obedient humble Servant'.

On 20 October 1831, John Vetch, Physician to the Charter House, and late Physician to the Army wrote to the Editor of The Times berating 'the tardiness of the Board of Health in promulgating what may appear to them the best means of counteracting the operation of the contagion of cholera'.

Cholera had arrived in Sunderland that very month via a ship whose crew had the disease. Dr. Vetch listed the steps he thought should be taken by the authorities in London which included ensuring ventilation was not obstructed, that diet and personal cleanliness should be regulated, that 'filth' should be cleared every night and public conveniences should be erected.



Some time in 1823, John Vetch MD was appointed Physician to the London Charter House where he introduced new arrangements for looking after the brothers. Previously care was undertaken by a motley collection of women of bad habits, bad character and loose morals but he replaced them with 10 nurses. He was to be the last Physician to the Charter House as, after his death, no new Physician was appointed.

John Vetch MD, FRSE died on 28 April 1835, aged 52 at the Charter House and is remembered in the chapel there. Records show he was buried in the vault of the chapel on 5 May 1835 but a private individual suggests that he may have been moved to the family burial ground at Highgate, North London.

His goods and chattels were left to his wife.

Probate was applied for by Henrietta Maria Vetch on 21 May 1835 and was granted.

On 25 May 1835 a Form no. 3, Required for placing on the Pension List the Widow of an Officer who Died on Half-Pay was completed. On this form Henrietta Maria Vetch swore that she was lawfully married at the Parish Church of Saint

Marylebone, Middlesex to John Vetch and was residing at Boulogne sur Mer in France. The Form was signed by the Director General of the Army Medical Department. She continued to live in France and one of her daughters married the Count Taille des Essarts in 1838.

Did the marriage to John Vetch founder because of his continued absence from home? Did the age difference come into play? We shall probably never know.

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

Technology is allowing us to do more and more things through our phones, from shopping to banking to social media – as well as making calls and sending texts. Not only are our phones more valuable in themselves but many of them will also contain valuable data. As a result, mobile phones can be a very tempting target for thieves.

There are some simple steps that you can take to protect your mobile phone against theft. These include using the security features provided, being aware of your surroundings and knowing how to identify your phone if it is stolen.

Each mobile phone manufactured for use in the UK has a unique IMEI number. Knowing the IMEI will help the Police and Insurance Companies identify your handset should it be stolen. UK Network operators will also prevent a stolen phone from working across their respective networks if they know its IMEI. You can find the IMEI number on the side of the box or on the associated paperwork, that you received when purchasing the handset; looking inside the battery or SIM card compartment of your handset or by typing *#06# into the keypad or dialer of your handset.

Always be aware of your surroundings when using your mobile phone and protect your handset from opportunist thieves.



A different kind of beauty

There is a nip in the air and you may be finding, like the autumn sun, you struggle to rise in the morning. However, if you do you will be rewarded with the sight of jewels glistening in the sunshine – dew drops on spiders' webs catching the early rays. This is the time of year many of our spiders become most conspicuous and the classic circular webs of orb web spiders look almost perfect glinting in the damp vegetation. Most orb weavers spin a new web each night after eating the remnants of the old web. Is it just coincidence they appear more numerous as we approach Halloween?



Meanwhile there are bodies emerging from the ground.




Fungi. Throughout the rest of the year, the main part of fungi, known as the mycelium, remains hidden, living underground. It is vital to the health of woodland recycling nutrients needed for plants to survive. Now however, the fungi reveals itself as the fruiting body we recognise, ripening and releasing their microscopic seeds, known as spores, into the air to disperse and start a new generation. Fungi come in all shapes, sizes and even colours but beware, many are poisonous and best left admired but untouched.

The leaves are turning and acorns litter the ground beneath the oaks. With the majority of our

summer visitors having left for warmer climes, our woods and fields have fallen hauntingly silent. Our resident birds, feed up on nuts, seeds and fruit, some stashing secret larders in preparation for leaner times ahead and many will return to garden feeders to take advantage of our goodwill. October is a good time to be putting up new nest boxes and cleaning out old ones, as some birds will use them to roost in during the long cold winter nights.

As darkness falls, fingers of mist creep out of the shadows and the hoot of an owl cuts eerily through the still night. This is likely to be a male tawny owl setting up territory in preparation for the breeding season later in winter. The classic 'tu-whit, to-whoo' is actually two owls responding to each other. The sharp and more accurately, 'kee-wick', is typically the female, while the familiar long wavering 'hooo-hoo-hooo' hoot belongs to the male.

Ivy: the kebab shop of plants by Michael Blencowe of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

In the Autumn many parishes celebrate the year's yield with Harvest Festivals, a tradition which dates back to pagan times. But for our insects, nourishment is now in short supply. The beautiful flowers which have filled our countryside and gardens with colour and which have provided our insects with nectar will have shut up shop for another year. But there is one plant that will just be revealing its flowers in October; opening for business long after the others have closed their doors. Your nearest Ivy will now be coming into bloom; look Red Admiral on Ivy c Bob Foreman for its flowers - bobbly explosions of pale green. Sussex Wildlife Trust



In some ways Ivy is the kebab shop of plants; it offers welcome nourishment for those insects that like

staying out late in the year. And, like a kebab shop, you're going to find a right old mix of characters queueing up for that one last meal before they go to sleep for the winter. Beautiful butterflies dine alongside wasps; bumblebees jostle with hoverflies and our lvy bushes literally buzz with life. The importance of Ivy to the wildlife of our towns cannot be understated. Aside from this vital late season nectar supply, Ivy's evergreen leaves also feed caterpillars – including those of the Holly Blue butterfly and the delicate Swallow-tailed Moth. These leathery leaves provide a hibernating site for brimstone and peacock butterflies. On cold winter evenings the lvy sings with the chatter and chirp of an invisible sparrow choir roosting in the waterproof warmth. Its black berries keep our winter thrushes filled, and in Sussex Wildlife Trust sparrow choir roosting in the waterproof warmth. Its black berries keep our winter thrushes filled, and in the spring it is a nesting site for our robins and wrens. Ivy covers a blank brick wall with a piece of living graffiti. It's a nature reserve that has spread itself across our towns and villages.

But despite all the life it supports, Ivy has a reputation as a killer and its roots are accused of sucking the life from the trees it surrounds. This isn't true; Ivy manufactures its own nourishment just like any other honest plant. And we can't forget the important service that Ivy provides for us humans. For centuries Ivy has protected us from house goblins. Bringing Ivy into your home as a decoration at Christmas (the time when goblins are at their most pesky apparently) will ensure that your festive season passes Hornet c Neil Fletcher without a burnt turkey or a blown fairy light. 

Our thanks to all who donated raffle prizes especially Munneries who gave a splendid fruit basket for this event, and to all the generous supporters who helped to make this a special evening.



Selsey Inshore Lifeboat was also tasked and on arrival they had both been helped by a passing paddle boarder.

Selsey Inshore Lifeboat recovered the two casualties from the paddle boarder and gave first aid, both casualties were taken to hospital by ambulance to be monitored and checked over as they had both swallowed a lot of sea water.

The 5 year old was wearing a buoyancy aid however the father wasn't, and was very lucky that there was a paddle boarder that had spotted them, who was able to help them. The father was tired, exhausted and was also suffering from shock and had swallowed a lot of sea water.



A cordon was put in place and the beach was closed while photos were sent to our Operations Centre. E.O.D. (Explosive Ordnance Disposal Team) were tasked and took both pieces of ordnance for safe disposal.



If you come across any ordnance on the beach or anything you're not sure of please don't touch it and dial 999 and ask for the Coastguard straight away. Some ordnance found on this beach in the past has been found to be highly explosive so please don't touch it and call the Coastguard.

16/08/18 02:50

Team paged to reports of an overdue vessel that had left Bosham Quay with two persons on board.

One of the casualties had contacted their mother and reported that they had a head injury caused by the boom of the boat; they had agreed to meet the mother at West Wittering and didn't arrive. Selsey Lifeboat was also tasked and launched around 3.15am to carry out a search of Chichester Harbour along with both Hayling Lifeboats.

Coastguard teams were deployed to search car parks for their vehicle which was found in Bosham and then shoreline searches were carried out around the harbour by the Coastguard Search Teams.

Coastguard Helicopter Rescue 175 was also tasked to carry out a search.

Selsey Lifeboat located a vessel that matched the description we were looking for near Itchenor where we also relocated to. One of the casualties told the lifeboat the other person was unconscious. Hayling Inshore Lifeboat was able to get to the vessel and board it which was aground on the mud flats. Lifeboat crews went aboard the vessel to check the casualties, they confirmed there was no need for any medical assistance as both casualties were ok and neither had received a blow to the head.

Hayling Lifeboat transferred both casualties to the Lifeboat and took them back to Bosham.

Team stood down and returned to station at 6.20am.

19/08/18 13:13

Team paged to reports of a capsized vessel off Pagham Sailing Club.

Selsey Inshore Lifeboat was also tasked.

Pagham Sailing Clubs Rescue Boat had picked up the casualties from the sailing boat as they were struggling with the conditions

and brought them safely ashore and had the boat under tow so the lifeboat was stood down, the team continued to the yacht club to get further details to pass to Solent Coastguard.

19/08/18 17:30

Team paged to reports of a windsurfer in possible difficulty off Marine Beach, Selsey.

On arrival the windsurfer had just made it a shore safely and was ok.

24/08/18 12:43

Team paged to reports of a capsized boat and one person in the water off Pagham Yacht Club.

Selsey Inshore Lifeboat was launched and recovered the casualty from the water and brought the casualty and vessel ashore. Littlehampton Coastguard Team were also tasked but were stood down on route as we were on scene and no first aid was needed.



Once the boat had been recovered and all was ok we were stood down to return back to station.

Thankfully all the casualties managed to make their own way safely back to shore with the assistance of a windsurfer.

When we arrived on scene the casualty was safely out of the water and in the care of the Police and we were able to stand the lifeboat down before returning back to station ourselves shortly after.






The all-weather Shannon class lifeboat Denise and Eric launched at 3.00pm on Tuesday 29 August and guickly arrived on scene at 3.12pm. As soon as a tow was established between the Lifeboat and

Maverick a course was set for Chichester Harbour. At 5.03pm Chichester Harbour entrance was reached. The Maverick was taken to Itchenor jetty and safely berthed alongside at 6.15pm with the lifeboat departing at 6.30pm.

As the lifeboat was departing the harbour at 6.43pm the Coastguard had a report via mobile phone that an 18ft speed boat with 3 persons on board had broken down inside the harbour and they could see the lifeboat. Selsey lifeboat was asked to assist the speed boat and took the boat under tow at 6.48pm. With the ebbing tide the lifeboat could not tow the vessel to their home berth so Havling RNLI lifeboat was requested to take over the tow. The tow was passed to Hayling lifeboat at 7.23pm and the Selsey lifeboat continued the passage back to Selsey.

The station was reached at 8.00pm and the lifeboat was rehoused. washed down, refuelled and made ready for service by 9.00pm. The crew today were Coxswain Rob

The inshore lifeboat launched at 6.00pm after a request from the UK Coastguard. Sussex police were searching for a missing vulnerable elderly person at Pagham with the Coastguard team from Selsey. The lifeboat conducted a search along the coast from Pagham harbour to Bognor Pier.

At 7.15pm it was reported the woman was found safe and well and all units were stood down with the inshore lifeboat returning to station at 7.28pm and rehousing was completed by 8.00pm. The crew today were Helmsman Colin Pullenger, Craig Sergeant and Neil Hopcraft.

Selsey RNLI all-weather lifeboat tows yacht to safety

The UK Coastguard received an emergency call from the 32ft yacht Freedom saying their engine had seized and with no wind they were unable to make headway. Freedom had two persons aboard and was bound for Brighton.

The Shannon class all-weather lifeboat (ALB) launched at 12.35pm on Thursday 13 September. The vacht's position was 2 miles southeast of Selsey so the lifeboat was quickly on scene. At 12.45pm a tow was established between the ALB and Freedom and a course was set for Littlehampton Harbour. The weather on scene was wind Calm sea state smooth in Sunshine.

Littlehampton Harbour was reached at 2.35pm and after the yacht was safely berthed alongside the ALB departed Littlehampton at 2.55pm. The ALB arrived back at Selsey at 3.25pm and beached straight away. The lifeboat was washed down refuelled and made ready for the next call by 5.00pm. The crew today were Coxswain Martin Rudwick, Mechanic Phil Pitham, Andy Lee, Steve Somner, Max Wiseman and Neil Hopcraft.

The Selsey Birder -

Banish those autumn blues - look at trees!

Many of you may not be relishing the thought of the shorter daylight hours and changeable weather ahead, as autumn engulfs us and winter creeps into our reckoning....it's the time of the autumn

blues, sometimes leading to the so-called seasonal affective disorder (SAD).

It's one of the strange things about birding, but actually most of us in the green army really look forward to this time of year with a sense of anticipation, whilst most other folks are still mourning the passing of summer.... but why? Well, autumn is obviously a season of great change, with unpredictable weather conditions and trees beginning to shed their leaves. But it is also the season of great change for birdlife, with millions of migrants heading away from our shores to warmer climes and many others arriving to spend the winter here.... in short, a time of mass movement. And amongst it, the occasional scarce or even rare species may get caught up with the commoner ones. Picking out that oddity from the crowd is a skill that requires a bit of knowledge, a good deal of patience and a large slice of luck, but the thrill of finding something unusual excites most birders - certainly including me!

The Pied Flycatcher is one such scarce species, with no more than a handful of sightings locally most years, but autumn 2018 has proved to be the exception, with a small influx and multiple sightings. Most have been seen around the Northcommon Farm area - situated to the north of the town and one of my favourite birding spots - Pied Flycatcher at Northcommon Farm and it is no co-incidence it



still has a good number of trees and lots of mature hedgerows, a green oasis amongst the desert of development.

Late autumn brings Atlantic storms, usually from the south-west, to have arrived! which can be productive in delivering scarce sea-birds, so we Don't forget you can always get up-to-date birding news at our birders will be spending a good deal of time scanning the sea, (free) website: 'Birding the Selsey Peninsula' recording the departing terns, skuas and occasional shearwater, (selseybirder.blogspot.co.uk) whilst logging the returning ducks, geese and waders. Swallows and House Martins will also be flying out, whilst thrushes -Selsey Birder including regular species such as Blackbird and Robin (yes, some do migrate) - will be arriving in good numbers.

But it is winds from the east, especially if prolonged, that really get a birder's adrenaline flowing. Add to that an overcast sky and a bit of light drizzle in late September-October and you have the perfect recipe for a 'fall.' Hundreds of thousands of migrant birds, which


will be moving from as far away as Siberia, may get caught up in this weather pattern and drifted over Scandinavia then out across the North Sea, so will be desperate to make landfall. Whilst the UK East coast receives the brunt, the South coast will also receive its share. Goldcrests – tiny and smaller than a Wren - may arrive en masse into coastal trees and bushes, including your gardens! Restless, with a soft, high-pitched little call, time when diminutive rare

birds known as Yellow-browed Warblers and Pallas's Warblers could appear.... just as active, but mossy green in colour with lots of yellowish wing-bars and eye-stripes. I won't bore you with the small differences that separate them, but do let me know if you find a potential candidate!

Which brings me back to the subject of trees in and around Selsey. Basically, there just aren't enough of them, so those that exist are a precious habitat. If you have garden trees, check them out this autumn - you will have migrant birds using them. Berry-bearing trees and shrubs are always valuable, but migrant warblers just love sycamores and field maples.... such a mature example should guarantee a Goldcrest at the very least! So, if you feel the autumn blues coming on when the weather goes downhill, start looking at your local trees... that little bird within may well have travelled hundreds if not thousands of miles to get there and is just happy



the Garden

our monthly guide to gardening - written by Giles Peare award winning broadcaster

October provides lots of colour- Virginia Creeper ablaze with carmine leaves deepening to a crimson that, at sunset, sets a wall or fence ablaze. Squirrels are, at present, busy eating and storing Acorns, Chestnuts and Beech nuts which are being produced in abundance.

Look out in the countryside for the wild Autumn Crocus (Meadow Saffron) which is very noticeable as it has no leaves, it is a beautiful mauve flower and the leaves appear next Summer. It isn't really a Crocus but is related to the Bluebell family.

Look out for the greenish/yellow lvy flowers which provide a late feast of nectar for butterflies, bees, wasps and various insects. Sloes, Blackberries and Crab-Apples are ready to be eaten or made into wine or jelly. House Martins, Swifts and Swallows are now leaving for their long journeys abroad.

Gardens are ablaze with yellow-golden Marigolds, multi-coloured Dahlias, late flowering Chrysanthemums and of course, Michaelmas Daisies

In the woodlands, all types of Toadstools and Puffballs are to be seen. In the fields wild edible mushrooms can be found, they have pink gills, peel easily and are delicious.

Harvest Festivals should not be missed in local Churches- this is the culmination of all the efforts from farms and gardens. The glorious mellow fragrances that fill the Church are indeed a reminder of all the wondrous gifts that Nature has bestowed on us all.

Jobs for October

Harvest evergreen Herbs including Sage, Lavender, Thyme, Rosemary, and Bay for drying the leaves for use in pot-pourri etc. Tie stems of the herbs in bunches and hang in a dry location. They can be used to make Christmas gifts.

Harvest and dry maincrop Onions for storage; brush off any soil and peel off the dirty, dry outer layers of skin; store in wooden boxes or crates and place in a cool, dry place. Shallots can also be stored in the same way. Check regularly for deterioration or rot and remove.

Leave some windfall Apples and Peas for the wildlife to enjoy. Blackbirds especially enjoy some fruit and it will discourage them from pecking at any fruit still ripening on the trees

Selsey Town Council has received a National Lottery grant of £9,900 for an exciting heritage project to preserve and make accessible a significant collection of photographs, which document Selsey's history. Made possible by money raised by National Lottery players, the project will focus on creating a dedicated website as an invaluable photographic resource for everyone.

Supported through the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF), the project will bring together volunteers from the community with members of the Manhood Wildlife & Heritage Group, former members of Selsey Society, Selsey Town Council and expert staff from the West Sussex Record Office to catalogue the images, scan the best and create a website. Full training for volunteers will be provided by the Records Office staff.

The Selsey Society, which dissolved in 2015, collected a wideranging collection of 4000 photographs, postcards and other artefacts. The collection has images dating from the 19th century to the present day and covers significant topics unique to Selsey and rare in Sussex, such as lifeboats, coastal erosion, fishing industry, railway carriage homes, the Selsey Tram light railway, caravan and holiday parks. All parts of the town are covered. The collection, for its safe-keeping, is to be transferred to the West Sussex Record Office in Chichester. This project aims to ensure it is easily available for local people to use while also ensuring the long-term preservation of the originals.

Commenting on the award, Cllr Mike Beal, Chairman of Selsey Town Council said, "We are delighted that this worthwhile project can go forward thanks to National Lottery players, meaning that all these important visual images of Selsey's past will be available to the town's current and future residents for years to come."



Bits of Bruce:

In Ephesus, the word 'Christian' was used as a derogatory name, it was a micky take, yet very shortly afterwards it became the name of a great people, a people of Hope and Joy. 



