Burglary

A burglary in your own home is a devastating experience that can affect you and your family long after the incident has occurred.

The good news is that the risk of becoming a victim of burglary in Sussex is low. By applying a few prevention methods you can make your home less attractive to burglars. Please see our advice below:-

Daily Security

- Keep all wallets, purses, credit cards and car keys out of sight and out of reach.
- If you leave your house empty, even if you are in the back garden, lock all the doors and windows.
- An intruder alarm can be an effective deterrent against burglars, seek advice to ensure it is the most suitable for your needs.
- Make it a habit to mark your valuables by using your postcode and house number or name.
- Some articles are unsuitable for marking so photograph them next to a ruler.
- Register your property at immobilise.com, it's free of charge and can increase your chances of being reunited with your property.

During summer

- Remember to close all windows, especially those on the ground floor, when you go out.
- If you are in your garden, remember to lock your front door and close windows.
- Consider fitting window restrictors to keep you cool when you are asleep.

After dark

- Leave some lights on if it will be dark before you get home.
- When you go out in the evening, always leave a light on in a room that can not be peered into from the road.
- Fit security lighting either dusk to dawn energy efficient lighting that will come on automatically as dusk sets in, or infrared activated lighting which draws attention to movement.

In the garden

- Ensure that gates or access to the rear of the house are locked and secure.
- Trim overgrown plants don't give burglars a hiding place.
- Secure garden tools and ladders in a locked shed or garage to prevent them being used to break into your home. Fit outside security lighting and a visible burglar alarm to help deter burglars.

Burglars know the price of everything but the value of nothing. The best defence against burglary is prevention.

Date: 6 August 2018

Selsey RNLI inshore lifeboat goes to the aid of father and son in the water.

UK Coastguard received an emergency call from paddle boarder reporting he had come across a man and his five year old son in the water approximately half a mile off shore and a mile east of Pagham yacht club

The Selsey D class inshore lifeboat (ILB) launched at 12.32 pm on Monday 6 August and made best speed to Pagham arriving on scene at 12.39pm. The volunteer crew quickly spotted the paddle boarder who had been joined by a kayak and they had managed to get the boy out of the water. Apparently the vessel they were on sank and only the five year old had a buoyancy aid.

The ILB came alongside the paddle boarder and recovered both the boy and his father into the ILB. Both were given casualty care including oxygen. The father was exhausted and both of them were suffering from hypothermia and possibly consumed sea water so an ambulance was requested to meet the ILB at the Pagham yacht club.

The ILB landed the casualties on the beach at 12.56pm and were met by the Selsey Coastguard team and SECambulance. Both were taken to hospital for further checks. Lifejackets and buoyancy aids should always be worn when going to afloat. The ILB was released at 1.15pm and returned to station 1.30pm. The crew of the ILB today were Helmsman Rob Archibald, Colin Pullenger and Max Wiseman.


Date: 16 August 2018

Selsey RNLI all-weather lifeboat searches for overdue yacht.

The Selsey all-weather lifeboat (ALB) launched at 3.17am on Thursday 16 August to conduct a search of Chichester Harbour for a missing 20ft yacht Piglet with two persons on board.

The yacht had last been in contact with a relative at 10.15pm on Wednesday 15 August stating they had some sort of incident on board and one of them had sustained a head injury. The relative had agreed to meet the yacht at Wittering close to the entrance to the harbour but after waiting for several hours the yacht failed to turn up so the UK Coastguards were informed.

The Coastguards were given two mobile phone numbers but both were going to answer phone and there was no VHF radio on the yacht so they requested the lifeboat launch and conduct a search.



The ALB made best speed to the Harbour and commenced a search from the entrance heading towards Bosham Channel. Selsey Coastguard team were also conducting a shore line

search within the harbour. The weather on scene was wind south westerly force 5-6 with good visibility. At 4.29am the Coxswain requested the launch of both Hayling RNLI lifeboats to assist the search. The Coastguards also scrambled the rescue helicopter in case the injury proved serious. At 4.38am the crew on the ALB spotted the yacht aground just to the west of Itchenor jetty but couldn't close the casualty so waited for the Hayling lifeboats to arrive.

The Hayling D class was able to get alongside the yacht and confirm there were no injuries. The two persons were taken off the vessel and returned to Bosham quay were their car was parked the yacht will remain aground until the next high water. The Selsey ALB was released at 5.25am to return to station and both Hayling lifeboats were released at 5.47am.

The ALB arrived back at station at 6.30am and was rehoused straight away. The crew this morning were Coxswain Martin Rudwick, 2nd Cox Dave Lamdin, Mechanic Geoff Mellett, James Albrey, Steve Somner and Harry Emmence.

Date: 19 August 2018

Selsey RNLI Inshore lifeboat called to an upturned sailing dinghy.

The inshore lifeboat (ILB) launched at 1.16pm on Sunday 19 August after a windsurfer reported an upturned Topper sailing boat off Pagham to the UK Coastguards.

The ILB with a crew of three volunteers headed to a position half a mile off Dark Lane arriving on scene at 1.33pm to find the Pagham sailing clubs own safety boat had the Topper under tow. The weather on scene was wind west south west force 5 sea state moderate with good visibility. The ILB escorted the safety boat back to Pagham sailing club and then returned to Selsey.

The sailing club had several boats racing and unfortunately a few of them were caught out and capsized so the safety boat recovered the crews that couldn't re-right their boats before returning to tow the empty boats in. This info was passed to the Coastguards but after the windsurfer reported it they requested the launch of the ILB.

The crew of the ILB today were Helmsman Colin Pullenger, James Albery and Sam Corcoran-Smith. And was rehoused and made ready for service by 2.50pm.

I used to live in Selsey from circa 1947 to 1958 - we lived at Leslie This is built on the site of a house Cottage in Warner Road (I think) and then Danefield Lodge in Clayton Road. I went to Miss Davey's kindergarden (she spoke Russian and signed my autograph book accordingly!!) and then to Oakwood School near Chichester. My father was on the RNLI committee and was captain of the golf club around 1950. A great friend was Brian Wooding, son of Dr John Wooding. We used to fish off West and East beach. A great location to grow up and I have so many fond memories.

I have the fondest memories of my childhood in Selsey. I have enclosed six photos. There is one of me with two cousins at Leslie Cottage which I see from Google earth has been redeveloped although the macrocarpa hedge is still there. We used to watch the end of it disappear into the sea before the municipal sea wall was built. Note the thatched roof garage. Leslie cottage was then owned by an aunt who let us rent it after we lost everything in the war up in Esher, Surrey and we must have come to Selsey in time for the horrid winter

of 1947 so I would have been five years old.

The Horstead boys lived in a bungalow at the end of Danefield Road. Dad was Ronnie and he captained Chichester RFC and had his three sons playing in the same team at the same time. They made the national press. I have never seen them since we left Selsey in around 1958 - are they reading this?. The beach huts - with me - were at the bottom of Danefield Road. The two photos of prawn pots is me with the hand in the pot with white shirt and Brian Wooding (son of the late Dr John

Wooding) - standing up - off the RNLI slipway off West Beach. The local fishermen gave us their old pots which had seen better days and we repaired them and set them off here or at the Bill where we caught loads of prawns and the odd lobster. The slipway is the original as I think it was replaced some time later. Dad was on the RNLI committee and so on Lifeboat dDy we would be launched down the ramp - scared me to death the first time. We used to watch breeches buoy rescues off the slipway. The photo of Margaret Wooding is of a bass we would have caught off the slipway. We used to go out with the fishermen (most were lifeboat crew) to their pots off the Owers Lightship at 4AM and be home by 10AM with 120 lobsters which were stored in a keep pot just off shore until they had sufficient to market.

Looking at the sea front at Leslie cottage - just further west is a new development on Sea Grove.

once owned by a Mr. Debanale - a Panamanian - who used to patrol his sea wall with a 410 shotgun. He had great statues of eagles along the top. He was very friendly if he caught you throwing stones into his sea defences - you can see the triangular shapes of the groynes on Google earth - but if he caught you throwing stones out of his sea defences he threatened to shoot you with his 410. We used to bait him sometimes to see his reactions!! I remember him well as he was the fist millionaire I met - not that it meant much to me at the time.



Great to see Selsev has a Shannon

lifeboat. We live in Exmouth, east Devon and we have Shannon 13-03. 01 was the prototype and 02 is at Dungeness and we had the third (03). I am now retired but station manager of Exmouth NCI (National Coastwatch Institution) and we have a Lookout above a café on the sea front with 72 volunteers on the look out for maritime incidents which we report to the Coastquard. Have a look at www.exmouthcoastwatch.co.uk There is a photo on the front page of me with two new watchkeepers - sadly now a bit of a silver surfer. I have lots of anecdotes about Selsey and I could bore you to tears - but seriously we were so lucky to have the freedom of the village, beach and sea at such an early stage of our lives so have loads of happy memories. We have been back and it is amazing to see the changes but time does not stand still.

Give my love to Selsey.

The picture shows Mum standing, and me in my pram there out the front, this was a few weeks after they started in business in July 1963. They traded for about 8 years. Here is a bit that Mum wanted to add:

"Does anyone remember this? Barry was a familiar sight serving the whole of Selsey with his dinky mobile shop and van, ringing his bell to let folks know he was there, selling fresh wholesome garden produce grown from our own market garden nursery in Mill Lane. There were none of the pesticides back then, this was the original organic. Les Hillier was his errand boy. Barry always joked that the hard winter of 1962/63 (it snowed till April), was the best, because everything was frozen and you were unable to tell if it was bad!

I was in the shop in Hillfield road, running the Floristry side with my Mum, Ruby Burch helping out.

The pic shows me Beryl, and our daughter Theresa in the pram out front, it was taken in July 1963. The shop sign above was always there, even many years before we took over, but some years later the Council in their infinite wisdom, made us take it down. Something about new regulations!

Next door was the Gas showroom. Mr Ward Electrical was next, Mr White's Groceries, and Mrs Terry selling all sorts.

The Nutshell was at the end I think it was a barbers."

JOHN VETCH MD, FRSE Physician to the Forces Member of the Medical & Chirurgical Society of London Member of the Royal Medical Society of Edinburgh 1783 – 1835 PART I

It has always surprised me that so many eminent people and world-changing events have links with Selsey but, as you will see, Selsey was to play an important part in the well-being of soldiers due to the presence of Dr. John Vetch in our Napoleonic barracks.

As briefly mentioned in Selsey Life of November 2014, the threat of invasion by the French, during the Napoleonic Wars, was very real and Britain hastened to build defences along the South coast. Indeed, as early as 1793 the first artificial beacon in Sussex was put up on the Mixon Rocks, south of Selsey Bill but the threat continued and defences had to be increased.

On 21 October 1803, writing from the *Monarch*, off Broadstairs, Admiral Lord Keith wrote to the Duke of York informing him that 'Off Selsey Island in the Park there are two sloops of war'. Website <u>www.historyofwar.org</u>

Edward Heron-Allen's Selsey Bill 1911 provides us with a great deal of information about the Barracks:

'There is a stretch of shore on the east side of the Bill which, with the anchorage adjacent to it, is still known as 'the Barracks'. This name commemorates the Selsey Infantry Barracks, or Depot, the building of which was begun in October, 1803, and which was practically ready for occupation in December of that year, and completed in March, 1804... huts (were) constructed of English oak and wood from Memel in Prussia...'

A footnote states that 'The eastern part of this parish is considered particularly healthy; so much so that in the late war a depot was established there for convalescents'.

EHA continues:

"...they were built in some haste...for the accommodation of 16 officers and 330 men of the rank and file, and they included hospital accommodation for 50 patients, and stabling for 20 horses'.



The HAMPSHIRE TELEGRAPH AND SUSSEX CHRONICLE of 20 June 1808 reported that:

"...the 78th and Maida Regiment, a part of which marched to Selsey Barracks a fortnight since, being afflicted with the Ophthalmia, we are happy to state, are fast recovering.

On 10 October 1808 we read:

'A party of the 89th and 72nd Regiments, about sixty, were landed on Saturday, at the Depot at Selsey, etc.,, part of whom came from the Cape of Good Hope, afflicted with the ophthalmia, and others are daily expected from the Mediterranean. There are now upwards of 400 men afflicted with the dreadful disorder in the Barracks of Bognor, Aldwick, and Selsey.' But the Barracks were to be short-lived.

HAMPSHIRE CHRONICLE 31 AUGUST 1812

'The whole of the Barracks at Selsey is just disposed of by Auction. The price they sold for, we are informed, is three thousand pounds; a very trifling sum in comparison with what they cost the Government'.

And now to return to the hero of our piece.

John Vetch MD was born on 31 December 1783, Haddington, East Lothian, son of Robert Vetch, the Laird of Caponflat and a merchant, and Agnes Sharp(e). He was baptised on 12 January 1784 and had 8 siblings. He graduated Doctor of Medicine at Edinburgh

University on 12 September 1804.

History tells us there was an outbreak of Egyptian Ophthalmia at the Royal Military Asylum, Chelsea in 1804 and as this is very relevant to our story it would seem sensible to record that this scourge of the Army, with 1500 cases in six years, was what we would now call Trachoma. A Staff-Surgeon named Patrick MacGregor prescribed a treatment of eye washing to cleanse away the pus. The contagion had, not surprisingly, been transported from Egypt by soldiers and their families, hence the name, and, rather surprisingly, it took some time for medical experts to determine that it was catching. Full details of this story may be found at <u>www.npplweb.com</u> on the website for the World Journal of Medical Research.

In 1827, the London Medical and Physical Journal, Vol. 57 contained the statement that 'In 1805, at Riding-street Barracks, nearly twenty miles to the interior of Romney Marsh, the second battalion of the 52d Regiment appears to have suffered severely from catarrho-rheumatic ophthalmia. Dr Vetch attributes the severity of the disease in that situation, and the intermittent form of some of the symptoms, to the influence of the marsh.'

This would seem to be reasonable as the Romney Marsh had been closely associated with malaria for 240 plus years.

We are fortunate that we can trace Dr. Vetch's Military career from newspaper reports, letters and articles written by him and the 1727-1898 Roll of Army Medical Staff on The Genealogist website. Prior to being commissioned he was Surgeon's Mate on the Hospital Staff in 1806 (not attached to a regiment) which is confirmed by the following announcement in The CALEDONIAN MERCURY of 1 SEPTEMBER 1806:

'67th Regiment of Foot, Hospital Mate John Vetch to be Assistant Surgeon'.

John Vetch was actually appointed Assistant Surgeon on 6 August 1806 according to his Army record.

While with the 67th, he wrote An Account of the Opthalmia, which was advertised widely upon its publication in January 1807 in both the MORNING POST of 10 January and MORNING CHRONICLE of 23 January.

The Account was reviewed in the Edinburgh Medical and Surgical Journal for April 1808, vol XIV in which we learn that 'Ophthalmia cases were removed from Riding-Street, to the Barracks at Selsey'. Dr. Vetch later averred that 'the measure has been attended with all the success my most sanguine hopes had led me to expect'.

On 25 September 1806, John Vetch was appointed to the 54th Foot as an Assistant Surgeon and was promoted to Surgeon on 2 December 1806.

Perhaps as a result of this publication and its glowing review, John Vetch MD was transferred, serving with the 1st Garrison Battalion from 18 December 1806 and the 20th Foot from 30 April 1807.

He became 'Staff', on 25 February 1808 and 'S. Staff' on 21 December 1808, this latter appellation meaning that he was Surgeon to the Forces.

THE EDINBURGH MEDICAL AND SURGICAL JOURNAL 1808 VOL. IV contained two reports by 'John Vetch MD, Assistant Surgeon with Ophthalmia Detachments at Riding Street Barracks, 12 August 1807'. One was 'A Report on the influence of a Moist Atmosphere in aggravating the form, and retarding the cure of the Infectious Ophthalmia' while the second had the catchy title of 'Remarks on the Difference between the Infectious Ophthalmia and that produced by the Artful Application of irritating Substances to the Eyes'.

These remarks stated that 'The affection of the eyes which prevailed in the 28th regiment of foot, and which has been proved in the greatest number of cases to have been caused by the wilful application of irritating substances to the eyes, was confined entirely to the privates and non-commissioned officers of the regiment. Where infectious ophthalmia has prevailed, it has uniformly affected the women and children, in a proportion equal to that of the men...'

If it weren't so serious, it would be funny as it would seem that soldiers with ophthalmia were being shipped from Romney Marsh to Selsey, cured and discharged and then, upon returning to their regiment, they were deliberately putting things in their eyes to simulate the disease, presumably in the hope of another holiday in Sunny Selsey.

The 67th Foot served in the Peninsular War taking part in the Battle of Barrossa in 1811 and the Siege of Tarragona in 1813. The Peninsular War was a military conflict between Napoleon's empire, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and the Kingdom of Portugal, for control of the Iberian Peninsula during the Napoleonic Wars which took place between 1803 and 1815.

The $54^{\mbox{\tiny th}}$ Foot served in Gibraltar between 1803 and 1807 but then left the Peninsula.



The 28th Foot were sent to the Iberian Peninsula and fought at the Battle of Vitoria in June 1813, where it formed part of the "backbone" of the Duke of Wellington's forces and it is at this time, 1812-1813, that Dr Vetch saw overseas service.

Dr John Vetch married Henrietta Maria Grant on 7 March 1812 at the parish church of St. Mary, Marylebone Road, Middlesex with Edward Scobell, Curate, officiating. Dr Vetch was 29 and Henrietta was 19. The Marriage Certificate is interesting because it describes Dr. Vetch as being 'of the Parish of Pagham in the County of Sussex' which places him at Bognor Ophthalmic Depot at Aldwick and, consequently, links him with Selsey Barracks.

THE PERTHSHIRE COURIER of 19 MARCH 1812 contained the following notice:

At London, on the 7th March, John Vetch, M. D. younger of Hawthornbank, Haddingtonshire, to Henrietta Maria Grant, eldest daughter of Sir Alexander Grant, Bart. of Baker Street. At Aberdeen, on the 27th February, Mr William Lal to Mice Hannah Fraser.

'At London. on the 7th March. John Vetch MD the younger, of Hawthornbank, Haddingtonshire tto Henrietta Maria Grant, eldest daughter of Sir Alexander Grant.Bart. of Baker Street.'

Sir Alexander Grant was 8th Baronet of Dalvey.



September highlights at Pagham Harbour & Medmerry

Summer's warmth lingers a little longer and September is a great time to spot some more unusual birds that pass through our reserves on migration.

Now is the time to scan the skies for ospreys. These spectacular fish-eating birds of prey can be seen fishing in both Pagham Harbour and Medmerry reserves. They appear similar in size to a buzzard, but have clean white underparts and a white head. Flying above the water they target their guarry before folding up their wings and hurtling into the water, legs outstretched to grab their prey. Once airborne again they carry the fish, head first to limit air resistance, off to a quiet place to eat.





Look in the fields, especially around livestock for yellow wagtails.

These pretty little birds have bright yellow underparts and faces, and like their black and white cousins, the pied wagtails, have long tails that they continually Osprey - Chris Gomersall

wag up and down. They will often follow cattle and other large animals, feeding off the insects disturbed by their feet

Another bird with a constantly quivering tail is the redstart. These robin sized birds have a bright orange-red tail and are always on the move, flying up and sometimes hovering to catch insects in mid-air. Church Norton is one of their favourite spots.

The whinchat is slightly smaller with a shorter tail. It has streaky brown upperparts, a light orange-brown breast and a white stripe above the eye. You can often spot them sitting on fence wires and posts.

The real challenge however, is to find an elusive wryneck. These small sparrow sized woodpeckers are superbly camouflaged with grey, brown and buff mottling and none of the bright colours associated with our resident woodpeckers. At this time of year, The Severals at Church Norton traditionally turn up a wryneck or two. They are often seen hopping on the ground feeding on ants, grasshoppers and other insects.


All these birds and many others are making their way south to their wintering grounds. Here on the peninsula, we are the last chance for them to fuel up before they head out across the sea, making our autumn migration just as exciting as spring. Mother nature bites back - horseflies by Michael Blencowe of the Sussex Wildlife Trust

For centuries man has waged war on wildlife. Apart from destroying its home we've systematically killed it for food, fashion or fun. It seems we're winning. There isn't much wildlife left, which isn't surprising as nature really hasn't been retaliating. Sure, you may occasionally get pooed on from above or find a hole in an old jumper but overall the battle has been rather one-sided. Yet within nature there lie certain extremist factions whose sole purpose, it seems, is to make us pay in blood for our crimes. Leading the insect axis of evil are nature's most tenacious terrorists; horseflies.

On hot, calm days horseflies launch an airborne offensive against us, using some impressive aerial manoeuvres which have been compared to the 'Immelmann Turn' perfected by WWI fighter pilots. Different species target different parts of the body. Imagine a moustachioed horsefly Squadron Leader rapping his baton against a map of the human anatomy and co-ordinating the assault. "Tabanus and Atylotus, you fly in low for a bally bite behind the knees. Haemotopata, aim for the wrists. Chrysops sneak up from the rear and go for the neck."

Of course vengeance isn't the real motivation for these attacks. In a darkly delicious twist it turns out that we humans each have a resource that horseflies would like to exploit. Eight pints of it in fact. In order for their eggs to develop, female horseflies require a small snack of mammalian blood.



Most horseflies target the hardened hides of horses, deer, cattle and sheep, so thin-skinned Sussex hikers are fast food for the fly. Whereas mosquitoes silently siphon our sanguine syrup with the precision of a phlebotomist, horseflies perform a tactless transfusion with their stout, dagger-like stylets. To prevent the blood clotting she squirts in saliva (it's this alien anticoagulant which causes itching and swelling) and slurps up our body's natural resources. You've been fracked!

It's hard to love a horsefly but look your enemy in the eye and you will see one of nature's most amazing sights, a psychedelic swirl of pixelated patterns. True beauty. But this probably won't endear them to Horseflv you as you're slapping, swatting and swearing on the South Downs. 2018 has been a good year for the c. Neil Fletcher biters and a bad year for the bitten. Horsefly larvae develop in wet conditions and the high rainfall in the Sussex Wildlife Trust spring created plenty of perfect habitat. I get bitten yet I find it hard to grumble. I get so much free pleasure from watching the natural world (not to mention all that water, food and air too). Call me a traitor but if the occasional drop of blood is the price I have to pay then I'm happy to donate to their cause. Viva la resistance!

Team paged to reports of a missing 11 year old child at West Wittering Beach. Stood down on route with the child found safe and well. **1/07/18 14:58**

Team paged to reports of two missing 14 year old children at West Wittering Beach. Both children found safe and

well as we arrived on scene. 1/07/18 15:54

Team decided to stay at West Wittering Beach for a while after our previous tasking, and it didn't take long before we took reports of another missing child from the lifeguards and deployed two search teams from the Lifeguard Tower.

Child found safe and well and reunited with parents. 1/07/18 17:10

Team re tasked to West Wittering Beach just as we arrived back on station to reports of a 4 year old missing child.

Stood down on route with the child found safe and well.

****Free wrist bands are available at the Lifeguard Tower on West Wittering Beach for you to write your contact number on them in case you and your children get separated - please make sure you use them when visiting the beach and please keep an eye on your children at all times especially at the seaside.****

04/07/18 14:26

Team paged to reports of a possible missing person after clothes were found between Chichester Marina Locks and Dell Quay. Hayling Lifeboat, Hayling Coastguard Team, Coastguard Helicopter Rescue 175 and Sussex Police were also tasked to carry out a search of Chichester Harbour.

With all search teams deployed and a full search of the area carried out by all assets involved, nothing further was found or seen and with no reports of any missing persons matching the clothing found in the area all assets were stood down.

05/07/18 19:30

Team paged to reports of a drifting dinghy off Brackelsham Bay. On arrival the team had eyes on the vessel and were able to confirm that the vessel was ok and was at anchor attached to a buoy.

False alarm this time but with good intent.

On the way back to station we stopped off at Selsey Lifeboat Station to take a picture of an inflatable toy to send to Solent Coastguard that had been picked up by Selsey Inshore Lifeboat while out training which was found drifting out at sea. Selsey Inshore Lifeboat carried out a quick search of the area with nothing found.

On returning to station we recieved further information from a member of the public saying she had witnessed a family losing control of the inflatable toy and it blowing out to sea and drifting.

Blow up boats and toys are great fun in the swimming pool, but we do not recommend their use at the seaside. This is because they can easily be blown out to sea.

We strongly recommend that blow up boats and toys are not used in an offshore wind – that is when the wind blows from the land out to sea – because they can quickly be swept out to sea. Go to a lifeguarded beach if possible and heed the lifeguards' advice. If people do find themselves being swept out to sea, our advice is to stay with the boat or toy and shout for help, waving arms if possible. Do not attempt to swim for shore if out of depth. Ideally make sure that someone ashore is keeping an eye on you.

05/07/18 22:07

Team paged to reports of a person in the water near Medmerry Park Holiday Village.

Hayling Lifeboat was also tasked.

Once on scene the casualty was accounted for and all persons were out of the water and on the beach, the casualty had also been drinking.

An ambulance was requested to assess and check the casualty, the casualty and their two friends were taken to the awaiting ambulance in the Coastguard Vehicle. The two friends were kept warm in the back of the vehicle as they had both entered the water to try and rescue their friend. Once their friend had the all clear from the paramedics and free to go, all three people were then taken back to where they were staying.

Stood down and returned back to station at midnight.

07/07/18 12:07

Team paged to reports of a person and a dog stuck in the mud in Chichester Harbour off Thorney Island. Selsey Coastguard Mud Rescue Team and Portsmouth Coastguard Mud Rescue Teams were both tasked with West Sussex Fire Service, Chichester Harbour Patrol and Hayling Rescue.



Three Mud Rescue Technicians from Selsey Coastguard Team were deployed on to the mud in full mud rescue gear and went out as far as they could before being transferred onto Chichester Harbour Patrols Rib and were taken slightly closer by boat. They then continued out on to the mud to where the casualty and dog were stuck. Once with the casualty drinking water was given to the person and the dog as it was extremely hot out on the mud flats. The casualty was ok, although had been suffering with cramp beforehand but no medical assistance was needed. The casualty was extracted from the mud and he and the dog were brought back and transferred to Chichester Harbour Patrols Rib and taken to Itchenor. The three mud technicians were brought back by Hayling Rescue and then they continued back across the mud to the shore.

08/07/18 15:29

Team paged to man the helicopter landing site at St Richards Hospital. Coastguard Helicopter Rescue 175 had picked the diver up around 19 NM South off Littlehampton after they made a rapid



ascent and were suffering from signs of decompression Sickness. Coastguard Rescue 175 then transferred the diver to St Richards Hospital for the Decompression Chamber.

08/07/18 20:03

Team paged to reports of a missing rower in Chichester Harbour. Team tasked to carry out a search of Chichester Harbour, thankfully the missing rower was found safe and well and the team were stood down on route.

14/07/18 14:37

Team paged to reports of a missing 4 year old child at West Wittering Beach.

Team stood down on route with the child found safe and well.

15/07/18 15:44

Team paged to reports of a missing 10 year old child at West Wittering Beach.

19/07/18 16:48

LIFE SAVED THANKS TO SELSEY LIFEBOAT CREW! Team paged by to reports of a 11 year old boy stuck on the groyne and hanging off the red basket at East Beach after getting into difficulties swimming.

Selsey Inshore Lifeboat were also paged and arrived on scene just in time, after a 16 year old boy who went into the sea, to try and help the young lad out that was clinging onto the groyne also got into difficulty. He tried swimming out to him and struggled with the currents, and was just going under water as the lifeboat arrived on scene. The owner of the fishing vessel is now aware and is arranging for its recovery.

The fast thinking lifeboat crew managed to grab the hand of the 16 year old boy and pulled him out of the water; they then quickly recovered the boy from the groyne and made it back to the Lifeboat

Station where first aid treatment was given until an ambulance arrived on scene. The 16 year old was then taken to hospital by ambulance to be checked over.

This could have been a whole



different story if the Inshore Lifeboat was just a few seconds later so a massive thank you to the three crew members on the lifeboat this evening for their fast response and quick actions, well done and thank you!

Thank you also goes to the lifeboat crew that were on station as well, for helping deliver first aid while we were waiting for an ambulance!

THIS COULD HAVE BEEN A WHOLE DIFFERENT STORY THIS EVENING!

If you see someone in trouble out at sea or along the coast please don't try and do a self-rescue, please dial 999 straight away and ask for the Coastguard, as like tonight the person that tried a self-rescue became worse off and instead of one person needing rescuing two people needed rescuing - and they were both very lucky!

24/07/18 17:22

Team paged to reports of a missing 9 year old girl at West Wittering Beach.

Two Coastguard Rescue Search Teams were deployed and Hayling Island Inshore Lifeboat was also tasked.

Coastguard Rescue Officers found the 9 year old girl on the beach playing with other children and was safe and well and she was quickly reunited with her family.

25/07/18 14:07

Team paged to reports of a person in the water at Lakeside Holiday Village.



Littlehampton Coastguard Team, Coastguard Helicopter Rescue 175, the Air Ambulance, HART Team, Fire

Service, Technical Rescue and the Police were all on scene.

Our thoughts are with their friends and family at this difficult time.

26/07/18 12:30

Team paged to reports of two kayakers in difficulty south west of Selsey Bill.

Selsey Inshore Lifeboat was also tasked.

Both kayakers had made it out of the strong currents that they were struggling with and made their way back to shore where they were met by the Coastguard Team and safety advice was given. Once we had dropped one of the kayakers back to their car we were stood down to return to station.

26/07/18 17:54

Team paged to reports of a missing 5 year old child at West Wittering Beach.

Team stood down on route with the child found safe and well.

29/07/18 13:11

Team paged to reports of a large fishing vessel which had broken its moorings and had washed up on the beach at the end of James Street.

The team made sure the vessel had been secured in the best possible way and that no persons were on board and fed all details of the vessel and the owner back to Solent Coastguard.



29/07/18 14:08

While we were on scene another 999 call was taken by our operations centre, and we were tasked to Prinstead where a smaller vessel had broken its moorings and was being thrown against the rocks by the wind and waves.

Both Hayling Lifeboats were tasked and the lifeboats with the Chichester Harbour Master towed it to deeper waters and to a new mooring.

A KIND OF MAGIC

Since the time of the Greco-Persian wars, when the rituals of Persian Priests were thought to influence the fortunes of battle, people regarded magic with great suspicion. Forces of nature, such as earthquakes, were believed to be the work of magicians, witches, or sorcerers. Vagabonds and court jesters performing tricks of illusion were thought to have special powers.

In the wake of the Enlightenment in the mid eighteenth century, attitudes changed and Modern Magic was founded by John H.E.Robert-Houdin who took street magic into a theatre in Paris in 1845. Robert-Houdin had been a clockmaker and he started to develop large mechanical automaton that appeared to have human or animal form. The most popular could write and draw.



At the same time as Robert-Houdin, in Britain, John Henry Anderson was pioneering magic shows, appearing as the Great Wizard of The North. In 1840 he opened the New Strand Theatre in London, and in 1845 he opened a second theatre in Glasgow.

There were great advantages to performing magic tricks on stage. People could be charged an entrance fee, and the use of trap doors and curtained wings on the stage ensured that what was visible to the audience could be tightly controlled.

Magic became widely regarded as a performance art, and audiences were entertained by a variety of illusions.

People flocked to the shows and came away with a sense of awe and mystery as ever more complicated illusions were performed. By the end of the 19th Century long running shows in large theatres were the norm. John Nevil Maskelyn's show at the Egyptian Hall in London's Piccadilly ran for 31 years.



Professional magicians formed organisations to promote and protect their craft, a condition of membership was that they never revealed how any of their tricks were done. In Great Britain the Magic Circle was founded in 1905 with the specific aim of supporting and developing the art of stage magic, and preserving the secrets of magic shows, a tradition that is largely upheld today. However, when an illusion in Las Vegas went wrong last year, David Copperfield was forced by a court of law to reveal the secrets of the trick that appeared to make an audience disappear.

The advent of television in the 1930s provided magicians with new opportunities for illusion and deception, and magic shows remained as popular as ever. Street magic all but disappeared.

Amongst performers there emerged a debate as some wanted to shed the image of tricks as being something still routed in the unexplained phenomena of magic. They insisted they were illusionists, there was nothing magic about them or what they were doing.

Illusionists such as David Copperfield, and David Blane took their craft back on to the streets. Using modern technology, and many of the old principles of stage magic, they have performed elaborate shows all over the world.

At the beginning of his career, Derren Brown made it clear that he saw himself as a mentalist and illusionist. At the end of his stage shows he reveals how he has apparently made a random member of the audience pick a word from a newspaper that he had predicted, highlighted and sealed in an envelope before the show began. By the use of bill boards, signs in the theatre, and key words in his script throughout the evening it then becomes obvious that there is no magic involved it is illusion and deception. At the end of his many television spectaculars, he again debunks the myth. A master of his craft, for many it is still hard to believe that there is no magic involved.

Modern Magic in all its forms, remains popular on television, in theatres and in the streets. Its' success relies upon the skill of the performer, and the willingness of the audience to believe what they *think* they are seeing. All the time audiences continue to ask *'but how did they do that'*?, there will always be a kind of magic in the art of Magic.

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In the Garden

our monthly guide to gardening - written by Giles Peare award winning broadcaster

September offers producers the best weather of the year - soft, mild and mellow. The hedgerows abound with the bright red Hawthorn berries and are laden with lush Blackberries, Sloes and Crab Apples. Watch out for the Pigeons and Pheasants feasting in the fields on the left-overs from harvest.

The gardens abound with the result of over-endeavours - produce and flowers. Multi-coloured Dahlias and Chrysanthemums and white Michaelmas Daisies make a marvellous show at this time. Spider's gossamer is beautiful to behold in the early morning sunlight speckled with dew. Swallows and Swifts are departing on their long journeys to foreign climes but the House-martins are still here tending their third and last brood. Chestnut trees are bearing many conkers which are being rapidly stored and eaten by the Squirrels. Purple Autumn Violets add their beauty to our woodland banks. Wild Mushrooms can now be found and enjoyed, and watch out for the Puff-balls which dissolve into a fine white powder when knocked.

September-time is a relaxing time when we can be entranced by all that nature can offer us.

Jobs for Septemper

This is a good time to plant Potato tubers if you want to harvest them as a Christmas treat. Choose a second-cropping variety and plant them in large pots or gro-bags. Place them in a sheltered spot outside for the next few months and then bring in when the temperatures drop. An unheated glasshouse is ideal or else large cloches can be used. The crop should be ready a few weeks before Christmas.

Wasps are generally very useful as they have a good appetite for aphids. If they are interfering with ripening fruit you can reduce their numbers - make traps as follows - put some beer, honey or jam in a jam jar and fasten a paper lid, with a small hole in it over the top. Place in strategic spots.

Always keep some neat Tea Tree Oil handy as it relieves Wasp stings immediately.

Ensure compost in pots, window boxes and containers containing Summer bedding never dries out and continue to feed weekly with a high potash liquid feed. This will ensure that displays keep going for as long as possible and, combined with regular dead-heading, will make sure they will look good through the Autumn. Most will keep blooming until the first frost.

- Start a new Compost heap to take this autumn's (compostable) prunings and fallen leaves.
- Add some well-rotted manure to compost heaps to help the compost 'cook' more quickly.
- Pick off any diseased Rose leaves showing signs of Black Spot or rust, and dispose or burn them. Collect any that have fallen on the ground below.
- Earth up Leeks and Celery.

Tip Top Tips

- Lift and dry Onions. •
- Start purchasing bulbs for planting later-on.
- Don't always buy on account of cheapness sales always have a reason!
- Don't leave bulbs where mice can get at them free breakfast costs money!
- Water dormant Cyclamen to bring them back into growth.
- Plant pots of prepared Hyacinth bulbs for Christmas bloom and scent



place to be, it's the school holidays and families are making the best may spend a day or two beforehand, or perhaps a week or more, of the good weather. And yet I bet nobody has noticed that female feeding up to put on enough fat reserves to face this ordeal - which Eider spending its summer only just offshore, or the gathering of not all of them will survive - and that's when we birders monitor and Swifts overhead, swirling around to feed up on insects before they count them, whilst always hoping to find a rarity amongst them. head off due south. They will have left by tonight, starting their long return migration to their wintering grounds in Africa.....blackish,



arrowhead-shaped birds totally equipped for a life of flight, yet as soon as their limited breeding duties here are over they're off!

Nationally, by mid-August all but a few late stragglers will be gone not to be confused though with

Swallows (very long tail-streamers) and House Martins (black above there - see if you can spot with white rump patches) that may remain and even continue nesting one - especially on duller, into mid or even late October - a totally different strategy.

And that's the thing about birding - it's dynamic, there's something list to see how many going on all the time as seasons change, even if it doesn't seem that different species you can way sometimes during the summer doldrums. Back on the beach, it may be high summer to the human population, but to the birdlife autumn is already well underway. It's time for those small migrant species to head for the coast and feed up for all they're worth, ready And if you go for a walk along the beach or across fields, watch out to face the coming challenges, whilst many species that went north for the Wheatear. This perky, upright and rather sandy coloured little to breed in the brief Arctic summer - such as waders, ducks and bird may perch up right in front of you, like a small thrush, before geese - will already be streaming back southwards towards us.

Last month, I stressed the importance to wildlife of the remaining but ever-declining green spaces around Selsey - especially to the So, when the longer days of summer start to fade and darker nights migrant birds and insects that depend on the limited tree cover and beckon, there is still so much to look forward to with the onset of bushes to rest, feed and shelter. I also mentioned it would be nice to add a bit of colour and vegetation to the bare Oval field; well news at our (free) website: I'm pleased to say that plans are now well advanced to do a bit of 'Birding the Selsey Peninsula' (selseybirder.blogspot.co.uk) planting in a couple of the field corners to enhance the appearance and benefit people and wildlife - a small step in the right direction - Selsey Birder so don't be alarmed if you see volunteer activity there in the autumn/ winter.





Now on to the continuing story of Selsey Cricket Club, from Ruth Mariners Book.

1899

Selsey achieved a higher profile in cricketing circles in 1899.

The Observer and West Sussex Recorder of 15th February 1899 reported:

'CRICKET CONCERT - The Cricket Club again benefited on Monday night, when an excellent concert was given in aid of the funds. The following is the programme:- violin and piano, 'Perpetuo Mobile,' Miss Minniece, and Miss G Malaher; song 'The Laird's King', Mr F Hobgen; recitation 'Aunt Abigail's Adventures', Miss Barker; song 'Guiding Light' Major Todd; duet 'Surely', Miss K and Mr F Hobgen; song the King's Own', Mr Buhl; song 'Life's Lullaby', Miss Woodhams; song 'Kings of the Road', Mr T C Hobgen; comic song 'One-legged Family', Mr Miles; song 'Tatters', Miss K Hobgen; comic song 'I am a Philosopher', Mr Steere; violin solo 'Lisette', Miss G Malaher; song 'The Outlaw', Mr T C Hobgen; song 'All the While', Miss Woodhams; song 'The Smuggler', Major Todd; recitation, Miss Barker; song 'The last Watch', Mr Buhl; song 'A Dolly and a Couch', Miss K Hobgen; comic song 'A Story of a

Musical Box', Mr Steere; song 'The Distant Shore', Mr F Hobgen; comic song 'The Stammering Sweethearts', Mr Miles.'

It seems that Mr Fogden was still a little tardy with his letter-writing. Although it had been suggested to him that he write in January 1899 if he wished to play Priory Park (and, of course, it is always possible a letter is missing), he wrote to E Messum (perhaps Messam) on 20th February 1899 and received the following response:

'Dear Sir

Replying to your favour of 20th ult. We can offer you May 17th for match to be played at Priory Park. The Committee are sorry that owing to so many fixtures this year they can only give you this one date.

Please say if this meets with your approval and oblige.

Yours faithfully'

This match took place and the report appears in its proper place.

A general meeting of the Selsey Cricket Club was held at the 'New Inn' (now the Neptune) on Wednesday and reported in the newspaper of 15th March 1899. Mr Newton Clayton was in the chair, having been re-elected to the Parish Council the previous week.

'The meeting was well attended. The Secretary's report shewed the Club to be in a prosperous condition, thanks chiefly to the entertainments given on its behalf by the Manhood Minstrels, and an entertainment promoted by Mr H Penfold, enabling the Club to start the financial year with a balance in hand of between two and three pounds. Votes of thanks were passed to the Minstrels for their efforts and also to Mr Penfold. On election of officers all the old officers were re-elected with Messrs. Cutten and Flint added to the list of Committee. Several out and home matches were arranged; the ground being in a greatly improved condition should assist the Club to make the season a success. Votes of thanks to Treasurer, Secretary, Captain, &c., brought the meeting to a close. The Hon. Secs. Are Messrs. S E Dewey and F Fogden, with Major Todd as Treasurer.'

On 17th May of the same year Priory Park and Selsey played at Priory Park when the home team secured an easy victory. 'For the winners the Hon. B Gordon-Lennox scored a fine innings of 106, included in which were 17 fours. He gave no chance. Biddle, the new professional, took five wickets for 39 runs.'

The Chichester Observer and West Sussex Recorder of 24th May 1899 reported a match between Littlehampton and Selsey.

'The opening match of the Littlehampton Cricket Club took place on Friday, when they entertained Selsey and beat them by 50 runs on the first innings. The weather was fine, but in the afternoon there was a rather fresh breeze. The wicket was in capital condition. Littlehampton went in first, and before the last wicket fell 113 had been recorded. Six of the wickets fell under the bowling of C Marshall at a cost of 52 runs. Selsey then went in, but failed to reach their opponents' total by 50 runs, four of their men coming out for 'ducks'.'

The ubiquitous Mr N Clayton fielded his own XI at a match played between them and Northgate Grammar School (Chichester). The match was reported on 26th July and was held at Selsey. '...the Grammar School scored an easy victory. H Lake batted and bowled finely for the winners.'

Brent Lodge Briefings - Protect and Respect

As we continue through summer the hospital buzzes with the sound of young life - as well as caring for

over 150 gulls we have several nests of baby birds, abandoned fox cubs, owls as well as many other injured wildlife in need. We have seen a wide variety of species and cases over the last few weeks of summer 'silly season' (called so because this is the time of year breeding starts to take place and wild animals get a bit silly and we see an increase in patients when babies fledge their nest). As the season ends we will then start to welcome our first few hedgehogs in autumn

We recently had a beautiful Buzzard brought to us from Goodwood which was found grounded, after arrival it was immediately assessed by our vet at Alphapet. It is now out of the hospital and rehabilitating in one of our outside enclosures and is feeding well.

However, we are going to monitor it for the next few weeks and months as it has trouble

assessing its surroundings and flies into staff unknowingly. The vet is unsure if it has sight issue or a neurological problem, so we will continue to assess the bird's condition before we make a decision on its release.

Also received in the last few weeks, a juvenile little owl, a very hungry juvenile kestrel, 3



cubs and a very friendly juvenile Jay who is now sharing an aviary with a magpie and crow before release. All of these are expected to make a full recovery and will be assessed for release soon, we have already successfully released a number of patients including a group of mallard



ducks to Chichester Harbour. and a barn owl that was found having a clumsy moment on the ground.

Please remember to keep an eye out for any injured or grounded wild animals over the next few weeks as we

continue through the hot weather, as we are still receiving dehydrated animals. As always we are in need of tinned pet food, fresh fruit and vegetables to feed all of our patients as well as volunteers to help care for them. We look forward to updating you further on Brent Lodge news and patient updates very soon.



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
