
Food to continue getting a second lease of life in Sussex

Due to the success of a trial in East Sussex, convenience store shoppers and local good causes across the whole of Sussex and the south will now benefit from discounted food and surplus product.

As part of a new programme to keep as many products as possible in the human food chain, Southern Co-op is currently rolling out the new food pathway across all of its stores - starting with products with use-by dates, before targeting food past its best before date.

The first stage, which has been trialled in six stores in East Sussex since April, is Too Good To Go Magic Bags.

Too Good To Go is the world's largest surplus food app that lets users rescue surprise 'Magic Bags' of delicious, unsold food from shops and restaurants so it doesn't go to waste. Via the free-to-download app, customers can buy surplus food and drink



The second stage will see the rollout of other initiatives designed to save food that has gone past its best before date - either by reducing it to 20p or donating it to local good causes.

Gemma Lacey, Southern Co-op's
Director for Sustainability and
Communications, said: "All of these
programmes involve a different method of
improving food sustainability..... we hope

we can prevent food from going off to be recycled and get more into the hands of customers and good causes.

It will benefit our customers as snapping up a Magic Bag could help those who are finding budgets tight as well as dozens of charities who can make use of goods past their best before date - which is a date that relates to quality, not the safety of the product."

All store waste is currently diverted from landfill and any unsold food sent off for anaerobic digestion, with food broken down to produce biogas and bio-fertiliser.

As part of the Too Good To Go trial, Magic Bags of food are available to rescue for just a third of the cost at £3.29 - with an original value of £10 or more.

The Co-operative Food stores in West Sussex which will be taking part in these new initiatives are: Angmering's The Square, Bognor Regis's Hawthorn Road, Bognor Regis's Rose Green Road, Bosham's Delling Lane, Bosham's Station Road, Broadbridge Heath's Wickhurst Square, Burgess Hill's Junction Road, Burgess Hill's London Road, Chichester's Bognor Road, Chichester's Lavant Road, Chichester's Oliver Whitby Road, Chichester's Spitalfield Lane, Chichester's Stockbridge Road, East Preston's Station Parade, East Wittering's Cakeham Road, Ferring's Ferring Street, Haywards Heath's Franklynn Road, Horsham's Guildford Road, Selsey's High Street, and Yapton's Main Road.

Southern Co-op is currently working towards ambitious sciencebased targets to cut direct and indirect greenhouse gas emissions from the business by 2030, supported by a climate action pathway of planned activity and an initial investment of £5.8m.





4Sight Vision Support Promotes National Eye Health Week

4Sight Vision Support provides support and specialist information to blind and sight impaired residents throughout West Sussex and is delighted to be lending its support to National Eye Health Week (NEHW). This will be held from 19 – 25 September with the theme for this year being 'Your Vision Matters', promoting the importance of good eye health and the need for regular eye tests for all.

Sight is the sense people fear losing the most, yet many of us don't know how to look after our eyes – National Eye Health Week aims to change all that! Two million people in the UK are living with sight loss, that is severe enough to have a significant impact on their daily lives, yet half of this sight loss is avoidable.

Regular sight tests can detect early signs of conditions, including glaucoma, which can be treated if found soon enough. In addition, during a sight test, other health conditions such as diabetes or high blood pressure may be detected. Those with vision loss should continue to do so as checking for further changes in the eyes can help make the best use of remaining vision and prevent any unnecessary further sight loss.

4Sight Vision Support will be raising awareness with a focus on prevention and the importance of getting things checked out. Anyone is welcome to contact the charity if they would like to learn more about what to look out for/signs.

SELSEY WINE INTEREST GROUP (SWIG)

Our latest monthly SWIG meeting was held on Wednesday 17 August from 7.30 - 9pm in a member's home off Manor Road. Our theme this month was based on New World Wines. At the start of our meeting, some discussion ensued (which remained inconclusive) as to whether some Eastern European countries (such as Bulgaria or Hungary), where they have been producing excellent wines for centuries, are "old" or "new"!

Our three superb tasting wines for the evening were:

- 2020 New Zealand 'The Hour Teller' Sauvignon Blanc (12.5%) - "The Hour Teller" is so named after the original primitive, old fashioned clocks used in the early days of the former Colony. wine's long process of making on the East Coast of North Island, and of course to be drunk and enjoyed in a leisurely manner in your own time. This is a fresh, juicy Sauvignon Blanc with notes of gooseberry, citrus fruits and herbs and with a crisp, dry finish. It may be served with salads, fish and very slightly spiced (mild) dishes.
- 2020 Bulgarian Yuli's Shiraz (13%). Ivana (the winemaker) and her husband Yuli survived World War 2 but by 1945 had lost all their vines to the ravages of the war. Never giving up and many years later they found an abandoned winery in the mountains and, working day and night, revived the family tradition of winemaking again. When her husband sadly died, Ivana continued producing some unique red wines, and named them in her husband's honour.

Made for easy drinking, this plump and plummy, charming Shiraz is easy to get along with and is guaranteed to bring a smile to your

2014 Lagoon View (Single Estate) Reserve Cabernet Sauvignon (14.5%) – This powerful, award winning Cabernet Sauvignon was "Australian Wine of the Year" in 2019. This wine was vintaged from selected high quality grapes from this single

estate vineyard in the Goulborn Valley in Central Victoria, (a wine region that is said to be one of the best in Australia, producing excellent quality wines and has been doing so since 1860). Matured in high quality French and American oak barrels for 24 months, this wine displays aromas of vanilla and spice supported by blackberry and blackcurrant on the palate with a pleasant lingering finish.

Once again, surprisingly, our 'Mystery Wine' a 2019 Hungarian 'Campanula' Pinot Grigio (12.5%) defeated everyone, in spite of some good, close guesses. It was a perfect example of a Pinot Grigio from the New World.

The name was intended to celebrate the nature of time - both in the When King Matthias of Hungary married the daughter of the King of Naples in the 15th. Century, he encouraged the planting of Italian grape varieties – particularly those from his new queen's native Campania. Named after the bluebells that grow in profusion around the vineyards, "Campanula" bears all the hallmarks of a classic Pinot Grigio with flavours of fresh, well rounded, ripe citrus and green apple fruit. It makes the perfect summer aperitif and an excellent partner to simple fish dishes.

> Our next Tasting will be a short tour of Europe with an international comparison of three fantastic reds from Spain, Portugal and Italy, plus of course our 'Mystery Wine'. 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SAMUEL DEWEY 1870 – 1936

It was one of those times when inspiration failed to dawn so I looked through Mollie Tupper's Archives and came across this picture:



The gentleman on the left is Samuel Dewey and the boys are the Selsey School Football Club for, I think, 1928. Back Row L – R, in the striped sweater we have George Male, next to him is Jack Bryan. Middle Row -Dave Prior (holding the football) and one of the Lee family is sitting cross legged on the right hand side.

So who was Samuel Dewey? Samuel was born on 16th May 1870 in Newport, IOW, son of George Dewey (Millwright) and Louisa Poore. Louisa's father was a Statuary Carver and Mason. For those who don't know, which included me, basic Millwright skills include installation, maintenance and repair of industrial machinery and equipment. In 1871 the family lived at 25 Hearn Street, Newport but in 1881 they resided at 10 Vances Street, Aylesford, Kent where George was a Carpenter.

Samuel was confirmed by the Bishop of Rochester in 1882 and this important occasion allowed him to be admitted to Culham College on 31 January 1890. And now a small digression (for which I must be famous). If Culham College sounds familiar it is because Henry Benstead was admitted to Culham College in 1884 and was the topic in February 2019 Selsey Life. Culham College was a Teacher Training College for Men run by the Church of England and its dioceses.



This postcard is written by someone at Culham College in 1905 and addressed to Miss Hales in Portsmouth..

At the time of his admission Samuel's parents lived at 28 Belgrave Street, Eccles, Maidstone, Kent

His academic record is kept by the Oxford History Centre and shows that he was 19 years old on admission. Previously he had attended Aylesford National School.

Samuel won a scholarship to go to Culham and his academic attainments were as follows:

Euclid Two Books and deduction Latin
Algebra Quadratic Equations Frence

French

Little French: took paper

Mensuration Plane Surfaces
Trigonometry -

Sciences Botany I E Drawing Free hand

There was a Practising School at Culham and Samuel was observed by the Principal on 18th September 1890. 'A fairly energetic teacher. His manner was quiet and pleasant and his duties were performed with care and precision. He set the boys excellent examples in neatness and accuracy of work but failed to secure their attention while teaching the class subject. He did not question them sufficiently.'

Several more observations followed with that of 13th October 1890 eliciting the comments 'Manner magisterial but hardly effective.

Questions good on the whole but too many of this kind – Can you think of another reason? Can you tell me another use? Nevertheless he was classed as Good. Samuel was still at Culham College when the census of 1891 was taken and, in that same year, Henry Benstead left Selsey having been replaced by Frederick Turley.

Students obtained a 'Parchment' if they could show competent ability in Scripture, Reading, English Grammar and Composition Writing, Arithmetic, English History, Geography, School Management and either Algebra or Geometry or Mechanics of the Elements of Physical Science. Optional extras were Vocal Music, Drawing, French and Latin. Samuel obtained his Parchment in May 1894 and left College to take up a position at Barking Church of England School. Should anyone need more information on Culham College, I have 2 books.

Henry Benstead was appointed to Selsey by Culham College and is listed in Kelly's Directory for 1885 so perhaps the same thing happened to Samuel in 1896. In 1897 Samuel was listed in that year's Kelly's Directory and on 19th December 1897 the Banns for his proposed wedding were read at St Peter's Church, Selsey and recorded by Rev. Charles Storrs DD. On 28th December 1897 he married Mary Ann Kemp at Aylesford, Kent and by 1899 they were living at 1 Hawthorn Villas, High Street. In 1901 he and Mary were living at 9 New Road, Selsey (now Hillfield Road) and Samuel was described in the census as a schoolmaster. Their son, Kenneth Thomas Dewey, was born in Selsey on 16th August 1902.

Originally Samuel taught in the Little School behind the red brick school house

By 1906 the school was too small for the number of students for which it catered and a new school was built across the road (known to the locals as 'the Big School) but also known as Selsey Mixed School.

The School Log Book Govt. Registration No. 116 was supplied in June 1906 and is held in West Sussex Record Office. As part of his duties, Samuel was expected to record an entry for every school day and the information is fascinating. Sadly, only a small part can be reproduced here!

At the commencement of the Year Staff were as follows:

Samuel Dewey – ACP certificate and Trained (Headmaster) Has charge of standards VI and VII

Emma Elizabeth Archer – Certificated (Assistant)

Standards IV and V

Elizabeth Sedgley Buchan – Uncertificated (Assistant)

Standards I and II

Harriet Fanny Goodger (supplementary)

Standard III

Miss Archer and Miss Goodger taught needlework to the girls.

Samuel Dewey assisted by Miss Buchan taught drawing to the boys.

Miss Archer taught the cookery class which lasted for 2 hours and took place in the Scholl House.

The entry for 2nd July 1906 is as follows: *'School closed in the afternoon owing to a circus coming for the first time into the village and the children naturally wanting to attend the afternoon performance*.' I wonder if it really was only the children who wanted to see the show!

Other school closures were less enjoyable. On 12th October 1906 children from Thorney Coastguard Station were kept away by the doctor owing to an outbreak of diphtheria. The children returned to school on 2nd November.

past times past times

Rev. J Cavis-Brown inspected the registers on 30 November and a glowing Diocesan report was written: 'The teachers have done conscientious and painstaking work with excellent results. The children take much interest in their subjects and answered thoughtfully and with reverence.'

January 1907 got off to a bad start with the Sherrington family having whooping cough. It was still around on 15 February and the entry for 22nd February stated that the disease was still spreading. On the 8th April, 'the school has been closed for 5 weeks due to whooping cough' and by 26 April it had returned and again on 24th May.

3rd July the school was closed and the Chapel Sunday School children were taken to Goodwood.

Following the summer holidays it was recorded that 'many children absent for blackberrying in the afternoon'.

In November chicken pox arrived.

Attendance was a constant concern which reflected in the fact that in 1908 only 15 medals were given to those who had not missed an attendance. The school was built for 210 children. The children were photographed on 27th March (such a pity he didn't stick a copy in the book!). Social History also appears – on 19th June 'three girls gained Labour Certificates and two of them have left.' Apparently, under the employment of Children Act 1903, a child needed to obtain such a certificate (by passing a certain grade standard in school work) before being able to leave school and commence employment.

Samuel Dewey was not only a school master. 'Almost from the beginning Samuel Dewey had been involved with the Parish Council in general and in 1909 he proposed a motion regarding the provision of Fire appliances in Selsey.' For further information see Putty Medals and Heroes published by the Selsey Society in 2008 of which copies are still available!

In 1909 there were two inspections! One was by Mr Witcombe and Mr E G Arnell to inspect the premises and to suggest repairs. The other was the Rev. J Cavis-Brown and his report was as follows:

'Discipline and instruction deserve praise. The offices are seriously inadequate, their condition is offensive and dangerous to Health. Immediate attention is required to the supply and the use of well screened dry earth'.

It seems unlikely that this relates to the 'New School' (it being only 3 years old) so must relate to the 'Old School'. After extensive analysis, it appears that the Infants were moved to what is now Medmerry Primary School with older pupils remaining at the Public Elementary School i.e.the 'Old School'. Both schools operated in tandem until 1938 when Seal School was opened in East Street.

In September 1910 'several children have been away this week suffering from sore throat including Elsie, Florence, Dorothy and Augustus Wingham'. At the beginning of October another note indicated 'The Wingham family has diphtheria'.

In 1912 a bit of light relief appeared although it was a serious matter. One of the students (who is named) had a visit from P C Prior. The miscreant 'by throwing a Bengal match set fire to the barn opposite during the dinner interval'. He was duly reprimanded and the other children were given a stiff talking to about the danger of fireworks.

And then came the UK declaration of WWI on 4th August 1914. As early as August 1914, Edward Heron-Allen tried to 'get up a section of the National Guard' but was prevented from doing so by 'military authorities'.

The first record of Samuel Dewey living at Oakwood that I can find is in 1913. But I do wonder if all his addresses are actually the same property. If anyone can tell me, please do!

The Chichester Observer of 22nd October 1913 reported on the Selsey Minstrels show at 'The Institute' when Samuel Dewey was the interlocutor i.e. Master of Ceremonies and Mrs Dewey was the pianist. Good to know they were interested in something other than schools! The Minstrels were otherwise occupied during WWI and were revived in 1923. A further Chi. Observer report on 17th November 1926 covered the 'Minstrel's Dinner' and, apparently, Samuel Dewey was one of the founder members of the group some 28 years earlier (i.e 1898). At this event he 'took the chair'.

On 3rd September 1914 a postcard was sent from Oakwood by someone called Gwen.

'Thought you might like to see our house here. The 2nd under the verandah is 2 doors beyond us so you see we are all quite near one another. We are still having the most perfect weather and shall be awfully sorry to go home on the 7th.'

Back to the School Log!

7th September 1914, 'The school opened this morning...Many are away, engaged as errand boys, some helping the father with boat in place of men called up for war and the Boy Scouts are being employed by the Admiralty'.

By 11th September 'the school house being in the occupation of soldiers on duty in Selsey, the cookery class has not been held.' They were still there on 24th September. On 24th December Samuel Dewey was 'away from school this afternoon having urgent business in Chichester.' There is no indication what this was. But we can hazard a guess.

In March 1915 high-level discussions were already being held regarding a Volunteer Training Scheme. These discussions involved the King, the Prime Minister, Lord Desborough and other worthies from the War Office and culminated in the publication of the 'Official Regulations for Volunteer Training Corps' edited by J P Blake.


The Chichester Observer of 22nd September 1915 reported that the 60 members of the Manhood Volunteer Training Corps were inspected by Major Willoughby at Paisley Cottage, home of Mr Archibald Hamilton, Recruiting Officer for Selsey and District.

In January 1916 the Military Service Act was passed to allow conscription into the Army for single men between the ages of 18 and 41. Teachers were exempt. The Act was extended in 1918 to include men aged up to 51. Samuel Dewey was therefore exempt three times over. Like many others, he would have wanted to 'do his bit'. The aforementioned Volunteer Training Corps' duties include 'Guarding railways and other vulnerable points'.

In 1916 the school was closed for 7 weeks due to measles but on 3rd July the circus returned so the children had a half-day holiday. On 2nd October Mrs Dewey 'commenced her duties as a Certificated Assistant.'

20th June 1917 Samuel Dewey reported 'I did not commence duty this morning till 10.30 having been away from the village all night on military duty (guarding ammunition trains at Ford)'. On 5th March 1918 'On guard at Littlehampton the whole of last night.'

In Edward Heron-Allen's 'Journal of the Great War' page 104, 20 July 1917, he states 'we... have now a Selsey Platoon of men who know their drill both with arms and without, the drills are well attended, we take our turn as part of the Chichester Battalion in night-guard for the munition train which assembles every night at Ford Junction...' Quod erat demonstrandum!



In 1920 Samuel wrote a letter of thanks To Augustus Charles Wingham, thanking him for his services as Selsey's Fire Captain.

Later Samuel was to be a member of the fledgeling Royal Observer Corps, founded in 1925).

Increasingly through 1918-1922 Mary Dewey was 'in charge of the school' and the 1921 census describes her as an Assistant Certificated Teacher – Elementary School. Both she and Samuel are employed by WSCC Education Committee and living at Parkwood which, I believe, should read Oakwood.

On 30th July 1931 the Diocesan Inspector wrote: 'As the time of their retirement is at hand the grateful and appreciative thanks of the Diocese are due to Mr & Mrs Dewey for the devoted and excellent work for the church and the children of Selsey during their long term of office.'

On 8th July 1936 the Chichester Observer reported that the local education

authority was to take over control of the Selsey Church of England School from July 1st. The school had been under the control of St Peter's Church, Selsey since it was built. Selsey had greatly developed and accommodation was inadequate. Seal School was built in response to this increase in the population. When Samuel came to Selsey the population was 1,258. By the time he retired it was 2,514 – almost double.

Samuel Dewey died on 11th October 1936 at the Royal Masonic Hospital, Ravenscourt Park, Middlesex after a serious operation. The funeral was held on 15th October at 2pm at St Peter's Church, Selsey with Bishop T C Twitchell DD officiating and Samuel was buried in double plot CVI5 at Church Norton that same day, He was 66 years old.

We know from the Chichester Observer of 14th October 1936 that Samuel had been a head-teacher in Selsey for over 40 years, that he was Secretary of the Selsey Masonic Lodge being elected in 1918 and was made Master of the Lodge in 1927. The Hampshire Telegraph of 15th October adds that Samuel acted as lay reader at St Peter's Church and for several years was Clerk to the Parish Council and Assistant Overseer. Another of his claims to fame was that he was one of the founders of the Selsey Football Club. The Hampshire Telegraph of 23rd October adds that Bishop T C Twitchell DD was a Past Grand Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of England.

Mary Dewey died on 4th March 1939 in Mount Start Nursing Home in Torquay. Her funeral service was held at St Peter's Church, Selsey at 2.30 pm on 8th July with Rev. R Franklin MA officiating and she was then buried at Norton with her husband. A full report can be seen in the Chichester Observer of 15th July 1939 – there were over 30 wreaths and the donors are all listed.

PS: If anyone has pictures and/or memories of Miss Pike, please let me know as I would like to write about her.

PPS: The London Gazette of 24th October 1961 mentions John Edward Wooding MD. For those of you who knew him, you all know he lived and practiced from The Homestead but I can tell you he had 'lately resided at Oakwood'. If you knew him there, perhaps you could tell me exactly which house it is in the postcard image.

Some areas of the UK are carrying out trials of rental e-scooters and it is in these approved areas only that e-scooters may be

At this time, West Sussex is not part of these trials.

It is however legal to use an e-scooter on private land as long as you have permission from the land owner. When riding an e-scooter, please always ensure that you wear appropriate safety protection, especially a helmet and keep to a reasonable speed.



Wags and other celebrities by Rob Yarham

With the Autumn fast approaching, it's customary to expect to experience the onset of "mists", "mellow fruitfulness" and, I'm sure, many other seasonal clichés. At the same time, we say goodbye for another year to many of our summer visitors, which have been heading South in increasing numbers through August and into September. It might seem sad to see the songbirds that have serenaded us since the spring leave, and there's always a poignancy to watching chattering sand martins, house martins and swallows pass overhead and fly out to sea.

But September brings new spectacles to enjoy at RSPB Pagham Harbour & Medmerry reserves, too, as many other birds drop in on migration, making the most of the food and shelter offered by these special places and the neighbouring fields. Ospreys often visit - hovering over the water to hunt for fish – and rare birds, such as the weird and wonderful wryneck, might stay for a few days. But there's one spectacle I especially look forward to each autumn - the arrival of flocks of yellow wagtails, or 'wags' as they're affectionately known. These beautiful little birds - mostly yellow and green, with long, flicking tails - visit nearby fields to feed up on insects before they, too, migrate to sub-Saharan Africa.



The gorgeous yellow wagtail can often be spotted in flocks near the coast during the month – watch out for the small, long-tailed birds flying up and down around the feet of feeding cattle.

Yellow wagtails nest on the ground in lowland open, wet grassland, meadows and arable farmland, mainly in central, eastern and some parts of northern England. But their numbers have declined dramatically – the breeding population fell by an estimated 75 per cent between 1970 and 2009 – making them more and more difficult to see. Until they migrate, that is, and we get the chance to see them in all their golden glory on our own doorstep, sometimes in large flocks! The RSPB has been helping yellow wagtails by researching the reasons for their

decline - thought to be intensive agriculture and the drying up of their favourite habitats - and providing advice to farmers on what agricultural practices can best increase the birds' breeding

success. Hopefully, this means yellow wagtails will become easier to see in the future. But, until then, watch the feet of cattle in the fields this month. You might just catch sight of these

wonderful birds in shimmering flocks, dancing, rising and falling, searching for flies and other insects, or flitting over your heads as they fly towards the sea to begin their long journeys South.

Great Tit

Just for the record; I've never trusted them. Unlike all the other familiar, friendly faces on my back garden bird table there's just something about the Great Tit that's always made me suspicious. Perhaps it's my mistrust of uniforms. The Great Tit's smart plumage with a collar, black tie and a glossy black cap makes them look too official, too authoritative. And that bright yellow chest? Far too garish for the garden.

Their behaviour isn't exactly endearing either. Great Tits are the bullies on the bird table. They'll aggressively assert their authority and violently peck at other birds as they plunder the peanuts. When a house-hunting Great Tit can't find a suitable hole to nest in, it'll simply evict a Blue Tit and move in.

Their dominance is also heard in spring when their two-note song, "Tea-cher! Tea-cher! Tea-cher!" rings out through our woodlands. It was this "Tea-cher!" that taught me my first lesson in bird song identification; an easily recognisable two-note war cry used to proclaim the tit's territory. But I was soon to learn that not everything was how it seemed. Each male actually has an average of four different songs, which can be sung at three different tempos. This varied repertoire is a sly Beau Geste trick employed to trick other Great Tits into thinking that a woodland is more crowded than it really is. The birds who know the most tunes secure larger territories and breed more successfully. And it's a trick that fools me each year too; if I don't recognise a bird call in the woods it's always a

Through aggression and deceit, these birds have successfully established an empire that spreads from England to China. And it's from the far-flung corners of this empire that we've recently received reports of some rather worrying behaviour. From

Finland came news of a group of Great Tits changing their yearn diet of seeds and nuts to something much more meaty: other birds. In Hungary, scientists made the chilling discovery of a population of Great Tits which have developed a taste for the brains of hibernating bats. Sure, these are isolated incidents at the moment but with human society plunging rapidly towards the abyss and an army of Great Tits acquiring a taste for blood and brains, is it unreasonable to hypothesise a post-apocalyptic future where humans are at the mercy of plagues of zombie Great Tits? Close your windows people - they're coming for us!



September's Update

Responding to the Cost-of-Living Crisis locally

Whilst the cost-of-living crisis takes hold across the UK, the impact locally on individuals, families and businesses is rapidly emerging. Responding to a serious problem isn't new to Selsey, and the Selsey Community Forum has been active in supporting, signposting and meeting a need where appropriate. The ongoing accumulation of issues is leading to a perfect storm with numbers increasing who are seeking advice from the Selsey Care Shop - we are now up to 150 enquiries a week!

Just prior to the pandemic plans were underway for the creation of **Selsey Money Support**. This rapidly came into it's own with the resulting impact of covid with people losing their jobs, being furloughed and finding themselves running out of money.

Debt Management:

Working in partnership with **Frontline Debt Advice**, our trained financial advisors can work closely with a person(s) to work out a plan of support to reduce, and in some circumstances eliminate, their debt. This of course in turn can relieve stress and anxiety about a situation that felt out of control.

Utilities:

The increased bills from utility providers is also creating huge worry and recommendations from social media and TV can cause more of an issue. Discussing this with one of our volunteers and making contact with a supplier is important as people see their bills spiralling - and we haven't hit the colder months as yet. If you are struggling with your bills, or simply want someone to talk to your Utility company on your behalf, then please ask. In addition, working in partnership with **Citizen's Advice Bureau**, has led to funding to support people through this difficult period.

In some situations, a person may not be receiving all the financial assistance from the **Department of Work and Pensions** that they are entitled to. A discussion with one of our volunteers about your circumstances, can lead to access to entitlements, such as:

- ✓ Attendance Allowance
- ✓ PIP
- ✓ Carers Allowance
- ✓ Blue Badge
- ✓ DS1500 for some people with a terminal diagnosis
- ✓ Free TV licence (for those over 75 and receiving pension credit)

Pop Up Pantry:

In partnership with **UK Harvest**, SCF has been able to maximise food usage and reduce waste with the **Pop-up Pantry** based at **Beacon Church** (Marisfield Place) from 2-3 pm on Tuesdays. Often there will be between 35 -60 people using the pantry, making use of food that will often go to waste. More recently we have seen people who have settled in Selsey from the Ukraine, Armenia, Afghanistan, Iraq and Romania using the Po-up Pantry regularly

too and in increasing numbers. As well as supporting them with affordable food provision, it provides an opportunity for them to connect and speak in their own language as they meet together at Beacon Church.

Young Person's Development Workshop:

These workshops took place over the summer and provided support for people with a learning disability, or additional needs, to develop independent living skills. This included opportunities to make money go further by developing skills in money management, shopping and cooking affordable nutritious meals.

Selsey Employment Services:

SES offers bespoke to access a range of employment services. This can include skills analysis, planning, CV writing, researching, and accessing employment opportunities. This service is proving popular for people with a range of special needs who may can develop their experiences through voluntary or part time work.

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DONNA'S DELIBERATIONS

Hi everyone, and welcome to the beginning of autumn - welcome to the Yarborough Monument, and has been a September! seriously prominent feature of the Island's

All in all I think we can say, with some assurance, that August was a pretty hot one. We had amber heat warnings for extreme heat which reached the mid 30s - although that was slightly lower than the record 40 degrees which was recorded in July. It was one of the hottest summers on record, from the 20th century average, and 2022 is actually on track to be the hottest year since 2010.

It wasn't just us, either. There were wildfires in France, Spain, Portugal and Greece and the USA saw over 100 million people under what they call 'heat advisories'. Interestingly though, whilst I'm sure we would all agree it was pretty excessive out there, from a pure numbers standpoint, it wasn't as dire as we may have thought. The first six months of 2022 were only the 6th hottest period since the 1880s, but we can be sure that it will join the top ten hottest years - a signal to all of us that the earth's temperature baseline is certainly changing. Having said that, in Europe we have to place the heatwave we experienced in the context of other heat waves which we have had in the past, so it may be a little premature to go out and buy an air conditioner!

Trouble is, of course, that we 'Southerners', particularly, are never prepared for sudden 'heat surges' in much the same way that we are never prepared for 'snow surges!' Both are possible, indeed quite probable now, but we always greet both extremes with bewilderment and disbelief. Fact is that we may have to brace ourselves for generally more intense and widespread heat, even though this summer may have been a little extreme, and equally be a little more prepared for the 'white stuff' to fall during the winter!

The good thing about the weather this summer, however, was that planning could be a little easier to do - although we were all wondering just when it would 'break' and the rain would descend so violently as to be apocalyptic. We managed to avoid that, but over in Ventnor and Shanklin, there was a particularly torrential and violent flash flood, which sent water cascading down the hills of both towns, and an actual 'lake' appeared at Lake! Fortunately, Mr J and I weren't over there at the time, but the videos we were sent were truly terrible.

One of the most interesting places on the island we went to this summer was Bembridge. We'd been there before, but only for a fleeting visit, so we thought we'd go back to explore this time - and try to actually see sunny Selsey. We just about managed it, and using a 50 x magnification could just about make out the houses along by Medmerry. Unfortunately, trying to reproduce it here would be completely pointless, as it just looks like a few 'blobs' but we did at least manage to prove that we could see our lovely little town from both sides of the Solent!

We took a somewhat challenging coastal walk around by Bembridge and ended up at a small cafe right by the cliffs; turned out that the rock formations and fossils are used by geology students. It's an area of special scientific interest which means that anyone can visit the site

that anyone can visit the site but you can't damage the rock. It's quite incredible to see it.

We also walked up to Culver Down. Now, there is a massive landmark there - the Culver Down Monument. I had no idea what this was, but I had seen it from afar when we were on our travels and I assumed that it may have some very important historic significance - like, for example, the Marconi Monument at Alum Bay which marks the exact spot where Guglielmo Marconi carried out some experimental work which eventually led to the telecommunications we all take for granted these days. I was wrong, but nevertheless it is an impressive sight. It's actually called

the Yarborough Monument, and has been a seriously prominent feature of the Island's skyline for many years. It's a gigantic granite obelisk which was originally built slightly higher up on Bembridge Down, but moved, stone by stone to it's present location, in the 1860's. 'Why was it moved?' I hear you ask - it was to ensure that there was sufficient space to build the Bembridge Fort, considered important for the Island's sea defences.



So, what exactly is this extremely grand monument memorialising? The Earl of Yarborough, apparently. He rose to wealth and power due to an accident of birth and marriage; he had a passion for sailing, becoming a founding member of what was later to become the Royal Yacht Squadron in Cowes - arguably the most prestigious yacht club in the world. It would appear, from the inscription, that he was a decent chap and that people felt strongly enough to fund the building of a rather magnificent monument.

We also went for a wander around St Helen's Duver - it's an important site for wildlife, and provides really superb feeding for migrating birds and those over - wintering. It's not the easiest of terrain, but it is very varied. We walked through grass, sandy dunes, pebbly beaches, ancient woodland and then a concrete promenade. It's certainly varied!

Also on our meanderings, we walked past a double decker bus, painted with the Union Flag. For those of us of a certain age, we may recall that the Spice Girls made a film in 1997 called Spice

World - this was the actual bus! It's been turned into an Airbnb by a very entrepreneurial owner; it's pretty expensive to rent. Having said that, it's a bit of nostalgia for those of us who remember the Spice Girls with some affection!

And so, my lovely fellow Selsonians, we wave goodbye to the summer and usher in the autumn - probably my favourite season. It slightly loses its hue for me because of the amount of stuff relating to the 'C' word which will be starting to hit the shops, but let's face it, it's been

One of my favourite little poems is dedicated to September:

'There are flowers enough in the summertime,

More flowers than I can remember -

there since August!

But none with the purple, gold and red

That dye the flowers of September.' Mary Howitt (1799-1888)

We also have a few interesting National Days in September: International Literacy Day on the 8th, Roald Dahl Day on the 13th and The International Day of Peace on the 21st. The hope was that the latter be considered a day of global ceasefire and non-violence. We can only hope that it will be observed.

The new capsule it will eventually carry into space will be able to accommodate at least 4 astronauts to and around the Moon. We can bring along our telescopes to areas of least light pollution like my back garden in Seal Road, and we can attach our cameras for some memorable space photos. But even a good pair of binoculars will be fine for most viewing of our Solar System.

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
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




Selsey Gardening Club

In the Garden our monthly guide to gardening - In memory of Giles Peare Jobs for September Sow sweet peas in deep pots in a cold frame this month and Out to Bill trades or from other professions, weeds could

October. Pinch out shoots after they have developed three leaves. This will produce stocky and branched plants for planting out next March/April, which will flower earlier than spring sown seed.

Plant out large Colchicum bulbs before the end of the month and they will produce flowers within weeks - as their common name (Naked Ladies) implies, the flowers form on bare stems in Autumn with luscious clumps of foliage next spring.

Plant bulbs 10cm deep in fertile free draining soil in a sunny site and choose a spot where these hardy bulbs can be left to grow undisturbed for years to come.

As summer plants start to fade fill any gaps with winter bedding to provide colour up to spring'

Violas, primulas and Polyanthus are ideal for pots, borders and baskets. Pansies are good for Autumn and Winter colour and wallflowers for early Spring. Try planting some bedding over the top of spring bulbs so that the bulbs will grow up through the bedding to flower in Spring.

Tip Top Tips

Don't look for gardeners/from those with claims to be Jack of all trades or from other professions, weeds could replace flowers.

Apply weak manure water to runner and french beans, late peas.

Earth up leeks, celery and late potatoes.

Trim lower leaves from tomatoes to expose sunlight.

Start to plant daffodils, narcissi, crocus and snowdrops.

Lift and store onions.

Don't purchase just on account of cheapness, sales always have a

Wild mushrooms abound, gather early in the day.

Collect elderberries towards the end of the month for good wine and jellies,

Pick off diseased rose leaves with black spot and destroy, and also collect any leaves that have fallen on the ground.

Start to gradually apply water to cyclamen to bring back into growth.

Harvest and store as much produce as you can this month.





Treat and Release

As the summer comes to a close, the hospital continues to treat the late summer admissions. At this time of year, we can now begin to release our juvenile and adult patients. Many of these were the young or baby birds and

mammals admitted at the start of the season, but after weeks sometimes months, of rehabilitation they are now ready for release.



We are now starting to see a rise in orphaned hedgehogs as well as families of mum and babies admitted together. Busy hedgehog mums are likely becoming exhausted or dehydrated in the wild due to the warm weather, food

sources could also be scarce and watering spots are few and far between. Being poorly and in 'temporary' captivity during recovery can be stressful, especially with babies, so our hedgehog families are kept outside of the main hospital in our maternity unit, where it is quieter. Staff taking care of these babies are handling them carefully to minimise human contact. The younger families are monitored from a distance to reduce unnecessary stress. Once old enough they will move to an outside enclosure to prepare for release.

Unfortunately, we are still managing the risk of Avian Influenza (bird flu) by restricting the number of bird species we admit. We are regularly updating our admissions policy as well as monitoring the guidelines released by DEFRA. Our advice is still to contact a member of our team if you have a bird casualty and not to bring them onto our site until advised to do so. Most veterinary clinics are still able to offer a treatment service for birds, so if you have an emergency patient, please feel free to contact your local vet.



These ducklings, admitted at the beginning of the season, have now grown into beautiful juvenile/adults with full feathers. After a period of isolation at a local

vet, to ensure they were clear of bird flu, they were admitted into our care at only a few weeks old. Once at the hospital we continued to provide warmth, fluids, and safe place to recuperate. Ducklings grow fast so once they had completed a further period of isolation, the once fluffy ducklings, were moved to our outside enclosure with a shallow pool area where they could waterproof their feathers, learn and develop to prepare for release.

Remember to leave out fresh water and supplementary food for your garden wildlife friends especially when food and water sources are reduced due to the recent warm weather. The start of autumn is soon approaching, and many hedgehogs will need to build up their fat reserves for their long hibernation, leaving out regular dishes of chicken flavoured cat food will be a welcome treat. With so many hoglets and hedgehogs in our care we will need a healthy stock of poultry flavoured cat/dog food as well as other cleaning products such as antibacterial spray, kitchen roll and sponges to see us through this busy period.
